## Bush: If war comes, Iraq will lose badly

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush says Iraq's Saddam Hussein does not understand the military threat he faces in the Persian Gulf and must be made to realize his country is going to lose badly if it comes to war.

"If we get into an armed situation, he's going to get his ass kicked," Bush was quoted as telling lawmakers Thursday.

However, some congressional leaders expressed concern about the fallout from fighting.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, just back from the Middle East, said he and members of his group detected "considerable support among the masses" in Arab countries for Saddam.

"And that is a reality with which

we must deal, even though the governments of some of those countries are allied with us at this time," the Maine Democrat said.

Furthermore, he said, he told the president that allies in the region - particularly Egypt and Saudi Arabia - were fearful of a broader conflict that would bring Israel into the battle, thereby complicating the scenario with Arabs pitted against Israelis.

Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., said it was an open question whether soldiers from Arab countries would fight those from another.

Bush met with two delegations of lawmakers who visited the Persian Gulf.

White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the president would welcome a strong endorsement

from Congress along the lines of the United Nations resolution that authorizes military force against Iraq unless it withdraws from Kuwait by Jan. 15.

On the other hand, he said Bush told lawmakers, "If you're going to debate this for months and not reach a conclusion and argue about it, then that may not be that helpful, or if you're going to water it down...."

Fitzwater added, "I'm sure that every committee up there has got 40 brilliant little staff guys running around drafting resolutions."

Rep. Anthony C. Beilenson, D-Calif., said he believed there should be a declaration of war before the use of force.

However, Beilenson said, "It's not

## Hereford, area in deep freeze as winter comes

Winter doesn't officially start until tonight, but chilling arctic air moved into the Hereford area last night and the low temperature reading this morning was minus 2 degrees with a light, swirling snow.

The low tonight was predicted at 5 below and the forecast for Saturday called for a 20 percent chance of light snow and temperatures in the teens. The weather Christmas Day will be partly cloudy with a low in the mid teens and a high in the lower 30s.

Temperatures dipped below zero in northern sections of the Panhandle and two inches of snow fell at Childress between midnight and 5 a.m. Light snow fell across the Panhandle and South Plains and

dense fog was reported along the immediate area of the front.

A freezing drizzle advisory was issued today for a vast area of North Texas, including the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Forecasters expected that the freezing drizzle would be short in duration.

The strong front triggered rainfall heavy enough to cause some flooding of low lying areas just north of Clarksville in Red River County. Marble-size hail pelted the Lufkin area late Thursday.

Funnel clouds and possible tornadoes were reported along the Texas-Louisiana border early today. There were no reports of serious damage.

During the pre-dawn hours, the front extended from Clarksville to Fairfield to Temple westward to just south of San Angelo to near Wink and into New Mexico.

At Dallas, temperatures plunged 14 degrees in about 30 minutes late Thursday as the front roared through.

Forecasters are calling for cloudy skies and very cold temperatures across West Texas and North Texas and for cold temperatures across South Texas tonight and Saturday.

In West Texas, lows tonight will range from 5 below zero in the Panhandle to the 40s in Southwest Texas. Highs Saturday will be mostly in the 30s, ranging from the teens in the Panhandle to the mid 40s in Southwest Texas.

## Russia said headed toward dictatorship

MOSCOW (AP) - Leading reformers told parliament today they share Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze's fear the Soviet Union is slipping toward dictatorship and warned the army may have to take charge of the failing economy.

If economic agreements between the independent-minded republics are not reached soon, Leningrad Mayor Anatoly Sobchak said, "in January, first tens, then hundreds, then thousands of factories across the country will stop work."

"And then all - democrats, radicals, conservatives - will have to bow to the army and say 'go in and take charge,'" he said.

Shevardnadze stunned President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and the 2,250-member Congress of People's Deputies Thursday by announcing he

was resigning to protest what he said was the country's turn toward dictatorship.

Although he stopped short of criticizing Gorbachev, some deputies said they believed he was worried by the rapid growth of the president's personal power.

The Soviet president said Thursday that he had spoken to Shevardnadze twice by telephone after his resignation and persuaded him to stay on as foreign minister until a replacement could be found.

Hard-line Communists have been urging Gorbachev to impose a state of emergency in republics ridden by ethnic conflict and separatist movements, including Shevardnadze's native Georgia. Gorbachev has asked the Congress to

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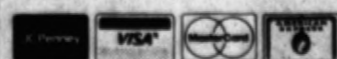

## Friona takes two OT wins from Hereford

The Hereford Whiteface and Lady Whiteface varsity teams closed the pre-Christmas portions of their schedules Thursday with overtime losses at Friona.

The Herd fell to the Chieftains 75-66 while the Lady Whitefaces suffered a 51-49 defeat.

In the junior varsity contests, the Herd JV scored a 74-63 win and the Lady Whiteface JV lost 43-21.

### Friona 75, Herd 66 OT

Friona outscored the Herd 9-0 in the extra period to claim the win.

Hereford took a 22-19 lead at the end of the first quarter, but the Chieftains used a 19-16 edge in the second to tie the game at 38-38 at halftime.

The Herd regained its three-point lead in the third period with an 18-15 advantage in the quarter only to have Friona come back to tie the game again at 66-66 at the end of regulation and force the extra period.

Hereford was led by Richard Sanderson with 18 points and Leo Brown with 15. Derek Mason added nine points with Chris Steward and Sean Smith adding eight each, Ben Weatherly five and Andrew Tijerina three.

Friona was paced by 18 points from Snead while Herring and Barrett added 10 each.

### Friona 51, Lady Whitefaces 49 OT

The game was decided at the free-throw line as Hereford made only one of 10 attempts while the Maidens were 25-of-32.

The Lady Whitefaces took a 13-11 lead after one period and upped the margin to 25-16 at the half with a 12-5 run in the second quarter.

Friona bounced back with a 14-10 edge in the third to pull within 35-30 and sent the game into overtime by outscoring Hereford 16-11 in the fourth.

The Maidens then outscored the Herd 5-3 in the extra period for the win.

Hereford was led by Shantel Cornelius with 12 points and Jennifer Bullard with 10. Donna Grotgeat added nine for the Herd and Brek Binder eight while D'Ann Hill and Stephanie Wilcox scored four apiece and Brenna Reinauer two.

Procter led the Maidens with 24 points, including an 11-of-11 night at the line, with Gordon adding eight.

### Herd JV 74, Friona 63

Hereford jumped out to a 28-16 lead after the first quarter, but Friona responded with a 26-16 edge in the second to trail by two at the half at 44-42.

## Marshall's Parker looks to knock off old pal before heading to college ranks

At least for Marshall coach Dennis Parker, Saturday's clash between the Mavericks and Converse Judson at the AstroDome will be for more than just the Class 5A big school championship.

Parker, who was announced Wednesday as the new coach at the University of North Texas, will be coaching his last game for the Mavericks (13-2) against a team he helped guide to the 1983 state title.

Parker told his players about the UNT job Wednesday morning.

"They took it like they've been taking everything else, with very little emotion," Parker told the Marshall News Messenger.

"I told them it was their fault that I was leaving. I said if they hadn't won all these games, I wouldn't be going. If they had lost two weeks ago, I'd still be here. Had we gone 5-5, I wouldn't have been offered the job."

The Mavericks qualified for the playoffs once in the 16 years before Parker arrived in 1984. Marshall has since won three district titles, advanced to the quarterfinals and semifinals and now has a chance for the state crown.

"We're going to win the state championship Saturday and I will have finished what I came here to do," Parker said.

Saturday's game also will be a reunion between Parker and Rockets coach D.W. Rutledge. When the two were assistants at Judson, they lived about a mile apart near the Guadalupe River and commuted the 40-mile

round trip daily together for three years.

Parker emphasized the title game is not between him and Rutledge, but between two determined football teams.

"I think he's a special person in my life. I love him like a brother," Parker said. "He's a better man than he is a coach and he's a good coach."

In other games Saturday, it's No. 9 Wilmer-Hutchins (13-1) vs. Austin Westlake (13-2) for the 4A title, No. 1 Vernon (15-0) vs. No. 5 Crockett (15-0) for the 3A championship, No. 1 Groveton (15-0) vs. No. 5 De Leon (14-0-1) for the 2A crown, and No. 1 Munday (15-0) vs. No. 8 Bartlett (14-1) for the Class A title.

Both Marshall and Converse Judson enter the championship round after cruising through their first five playoff games.

The Rockets (14-1) smashed San Antonio McCollum 62-0 in the bi-district round before breezing through San Antonio Clark, 31-12, Victoria, 33-7, San Antonio Marshall, 49-30, and Humble Kingwood, 51-22.

Meanwhile, the Mavericks beat Garland Lakeview, 36-26, Richardson Berkner, 61-6, Cypress Creek, 33-7, Plano, 24-19, and Arlington Sam Houston, 21-0.

Rutledge said getting into the proper alignments will be the key to stopping Marshall's multiple offense.

The Mavericks use several offensive formations designed to confuse defenses and create mismatches, he said.

"The number one thing we have to do defensively is get lined up right," Rutledge said.

Rutledge said other defensive keys will be stopping the big play and preventing Marshall from having a big game rushing or passing.

One of Rutledge's headaches will be stopping D.D. Turner, who ran for 160 yards and touchdowns of 10, 17 and 5 yards against Sam Houston, and speedy receiver Trency Clough.

Clough injured his right knee in the Sam Houston game, but is expected to play Saturday.

"They are a very balanced team offensively and we have to have a balance where we try to limit both their rushing and passing," Rutledge said. "We also have to be patient enough not to get beat by the big play. We want them to use the clock. We

don't want them scoring in six seconds with a big play."

Munday faces similar problems playing Bartlett for their second Class A title. The Moguls won their first championship in 1984.

The Bulldogs boast receiver Johnny Walker and quarterback Kevin Cavanaugh, both first-team All-State selections. Cavanaugh threw for 22 touchdowns, including 12 to Walker, during the regular season.

"They've got a great quarterback in Cavanaugh and a great receiver in Walker and they also run the veer," said Munday coach Jim Edwards. "They can present you some problems. We're just going to try to do what we've been doing. Its going to be a battle. They've really got a great team."

Munday doesn't lack offensive

weapons, either. Twin tandem Terry and Perry Collier combined for 36

all-purpose touchdowns. Terry was selected as a first-team All-State running back with 1,518 yards on 146 carries, while Perry made the first team as a defensive back.

De Leon may have the most difficult task afforded any of the championship contenders: containing Groveton running back Rodney Thomas.

Thomas, a first-team All-State selection, rushed for 2,070 yards and 28 touchdowns during the regular season. In the bi-district round against Warren, the senior ran for 349 yards and three scores.

Thomas then steamrolled Overton for 348 yards and four touchdowns before an off-night - 161 yards and three TDs against Grand Saline - and

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# Owens ignores report, leads Syracuse to win

Billy Owens decided to do what he does best - play basketball.

The junior forward had 30 points and 16 rebounds Thursday night as No. 3 Syracuse beat Towson State 78-73 on the day a Syracuse newspaper reported the school's basketball program had broken a number of NCAA rules.

The game was played in Hershey, Pa., and was supposed to be a homecoming for the native of Carlisle, also located in the south-central part of the state.

"I'm not worrying about it," Owens said of the allegations by the Syracuse Post-Standard, which included his receiving cash from former Orange star Derrick Coleman. "I'm out here to play basketball. I'll let that other stuff take care of itself."

Owens had earlier denied receiving the money, but after the game he and coach Jim Boheim refused comment on the allegations.

Syracuse had trouble offensively early on and things only got worse when starting point guard Michael Edwards sprained his left ankle midway through the first half and didn't return to the game.

"We didn't adjust real well to playing without Mike Edwards," Boheim said.

That was obvious as the Orangemen (10-0) committed 18 turnovers, but Owens was there at the end.

He broke the game's final tie with a short jumper that gave Syracuse a 49-47 lead with 14:12 to play, and it was his recovery and 10-foot shot which gave the Orangemen a four-point lead with a minute to play.

In other games involving ranked teams on Thursday night it was: No. 10 Louisiana State 122, Loyola

Marymount 114; No. 19 Virginia 74, Marshall 60; and No. 24 Michigan State 74, Central Michigan 61.

Chuck Lightening led the Tigers with 29 points and Devin Boyd had 18 points and 10 assists.

Syracuse finished with a 46-39 rebound advantage.

**No. 10 LSU 122, Loyola Marymount 114**  
Shaquille O'Neal had 29 points and 14 rebounds.

LSU was able to take command down the stretch as O'Neal scored 17 of his points in the final 15 minutes and the Tigers converted at the free throw line when Loyola Marymount was forced to foul to try and get the ball back.

Terrell Lowery led the Lions with 40 points and 14 assists.

**No. 19 Virginia 74, Marshall 60**  
Kenny Turner's 22 points and 10 rebounds led the visiting Cavaliers.

Virginia's defense made the difference as the Cavaliers held Marshall's top two scorers, John Taft and Andre Cunningham, to 21 points on a combined 7-for-28 from the field.

Taft, who entered the game averaging 26.3 points per game, finished with 13 points on 3-for-14 shooting, the first time this season he has been held below 20 points.

**No. 24 Michigan State 74, Central Michigan 61**

Steve Smith scored 38 points, one short of his career-high and two more than the rest of his teammates.

The 6-7 senior also had eight rebounds and was suffering from the flu.

Central Michigan was within 54-53 with 8:39 left, but Michigan State scored seven points in the next minute, six by Smith. Sean Waters led the visitors with 25 points.

# Warriors trip up Blazers

Portland's few problems this season are all within the Pacific Division.

The Trail Blazers lost Thursday night for the third time in 25 games this year, losing to Golden State 125-118. Portland is 7-3 within its division, 15-0 against the rest of the NBA.

"This team doesn't linger on one loss too long," Portland's Clyde Drexler said. "Our focus is on the (Los Angeles) Clippers (tonight). Everybody makes such a big deal when we lose the game. We just got beat. We're going to lose some more games this season, too."

Tim Hardaway scored a career-high 36 points for Golden State, which lost 112-94 at Portland on Tuesday night.

## Ask Dr. Lamb

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** I am 76 years old and had a biopsy of my prostate by ultrasound. The results showed a very small tumor, the size of a small pea. It was malignant. The doctor said it was at a very early stage. He said I wouldn't need an operation. I was X-rayed from head to toe and everything was negative and I was in perfect health.

I decided to have the prostate removed. The operation turned out fine. Four months have passed and I feel great. The doctor said I have done real well. As I no longer have my prostate, do you think I have to keep going back to be examined? If so, for how long?

**DEAR READER:** In recent years the wisdom of not operating on early prostate cancer in older men has been seriously questioned. One reason is that many such men live much longer than in the past and that means there is enough time to get into trouble with progression of the prostate cancer. It sounds like you made a wise decision.

If there has been no spread at all of the cancer and the operation removed all of the prostate gland, you should be cured. Such a procedure is called a radical prostatectomy. That is an

open surgical removal, not just sticking the tube up the penis to ream out the prostate.

The X-rays and other studies evidently showed no evidence of cancer having spread to the bone or elsewhere. That affected what your doctor recommended to you.

But there is always that small danger that there may be some cells that could not be visualized. That is one reason why your doctor wants to continue to follow you. If that should occur he would want to institute additional early treatment. So you want to return to see him as long as he thinks it is advisable in your case.

I have discussed the current thinking about treatment for different stages of prostate cancer in Special Report 71, The Prostate Gland, which I am sending you for more information on your status. **DEAR DR. LAMB:** I am enclosing a clipping that explains heel pain may be caused by a stress fracture and not a heel spur. A year ago I went to a foot doctor and he took X-rays and said I

had a heel spur. He gave me a Cortisone shot. It was so painful I almost screamed. It is bothering me again and I sure don't want another shot. Could I have a stress fracture?

**DEAR READER:** Yes. Or you could have other causes for heel pain. A stress fracture can involve the heel bone and it may not be seen on a plain X-ray. Rather, a bone scan done after injecting radioactive substances into the circulation is much more likely to identify the fracture. Stress fractures are really a crack in the bone, and not a complete fracture as you are used to thinking about. Stress fractures can cause severe pain and will not respond to Cortisone shots. Rest and time is the best treatment.

Heel spurs are bony outgrowths where the bone has been injured. You can have heel spurs and have no pain. Or you can have heel pain without either a spur or stress fracture. Often it is from inflammation of the soft tissues and attachments to the heel bone. Repositioning the foot with pads at the inside of the foot to put more weight on the outside of the foot sometimes helps. The proper treatment depends on first making the right diagnosis.

## Soup tastes good after tree trimming

After boosting the littlest angel aloft to top the tree with a glittering star, tree trimmers will be ready to sit down to a supper built around satisfying hot soup.

**Seafood Chowder** is a quick-cooking soup; it takes just 12 minutes cooking time. Make it with homemade **Fish Stock** or chicken broth. To streamline preparation, cut the fish into pieces with a sharp knife; then place them in a bowl, cover, and chill until needed. You can cut up the vegetables, cover, and chill ahead of time. Finish the soup and slice the bread while the tree trimmers tidy up.

Before dishing up the soup, heat the bowls in the dishwasher or by placing in hot water for several minutes. The soup will stay hot to the last spoonful.

### Seafood Chowder

Cut the fish into uniform pieces so it will cook evenly. Be sure not to overcook the seafood; 2 to 3 minutes is enough for fish pieces and shrimp.

- 1 1/2 pounds fresh or frozen fish fillets (cod, pike, or orange roughy)
- 1 pound fresh or frozen shelled shrimp
- 4 cups Fish Stock or chicken broth
- 2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
- 2 large carrots, sliced (1 1/2 cups)
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon dried marjoram, crushed
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 15-ounce cans tomato sauce
- 4 large tomatoes, peeled, seeded, and chopped
- 3 tablespoon finely shredded lemon peel

Thaw fish and shrimp, if frozen. Remove skin from fish, if present. Cut fish into 1-inch pieces. Devein shrimp. Cover fish and shrimp and chill in the refrigerator till ready to use.

In a Dutch oven combine Fish Stock or chicken broth, mushrooms, carrots, onion, garlic, marjoram, salt, pepper, and bay leaf. Bring to boiling. Reduce heat, then simmer,

covered, for 10 minutes or till vegetables are tender.

Stir in tomato sauce and tomatoes. Add fish and shrimp. Bring just to boiling. Reduce heat; simmer, covered for 2 to 3 minutes or till shrimp are done and fish flakes easily with a fork. Stir once. Discard bay leaf. Season soup to taste with salt.

In a small bowl combine parsley and lemon peel. Ladle soup into bowls and sprinkle parsley mixture atop. Makes 8 servings.

### Fish Stock

3 pounds fresh or frozen fish (cod, pike, flounder, haddock, hake, orange roughy, or porgy)

- 1 medium yellow onion
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 2 stalks celery with leaves, cut up
- 3 cloves garlic, halved
- 1 tablespoon grated gingerroot or 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 tablespoon dried marjoram, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

Thaw fish, if frozen; rinse. Place fish in a 6-quart Dutch oven or stockpot. Cut onion into wedges. Add onion, lemon juice, celery, garlic, gingerroot, marjoram, salt, and mustard to fish. Add 8 cups of water. Bring to boiling. Reduce heat. Simmer, covered, 1 hour.

Pour stock through a colander or sieve lined with 2 layers of cheesecloth. Discard fish, vegetables, and seasonings. Clarify stock, if desired:

Store stock in a covered container in the refrigerator for up to 2 days or in the freezer for up to 6 months. Makes about 6 cups.
