## Despite major policy setback

# Reagan vows to win Contra aid fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, suffering a major foreign policy setback when the House rejected his plan to send military aid to Nicaraguan rebels, vowed "to come back again and again" until the congressional battle is won.

Reagan called Thursday's vote "a dark day for freedom," and said, "This vote must be reversed" after the House defeated, 222-210, his hotly contested request for \$100 million in lethal and non-lethal aid to the insurgents trying to overthrow the leftist government of Nicaragua.

The Senate will begin debate on the package next week, and the House will vote April 15 on alternative proposals. Reagan is expected to eventually win some aid for the rebels.

Reagan, continuing an intense lobbying campaign for his package, which calls for \$30 million in non-lethal aid and \$70 million in military assistance for the Contra rebels, was scheduled to deliver a speech today at the White House to advocates of rebel aid.

In addition, White House Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan and former national security adviser Robert C. McFarlane were made available for appearances on television.

The president, in a written statement, told Congress: "You have my solemn determination to come back again and again, until this battle is won, until freedom is given the chance it deserves in Nicaragua."

He said that as of today, "I will begin to press in the Senate — and then back again in the House — for

the real and effective assistance for Nicaragua's freedom fighters which was denied them today, and which those brave men and women deserve."

Arguing that Americans "have begun to awaken to the danger emerging on their doorstep," Reagan said, "And one day, in the not too distant future, that

awareness will come home to the House of Representatives.

"We are gaining ground; we are winning converts," Reagan said. "The next battle will bring us the victory this just and good cause rightly deserves."

# Board approves teacher contracts, sets calendar

The Hereford School Board Thursday night approved the contracts of some 310 teachers, eliminating only one, and decided to keep a "spring break" while approving the school calendar for 1986-87.

Trustees were in open session for

one hour while taking care of the calendar and several other matters. The board then went into closed session to interview principals about their teachers. The closed session lasted about five hours.

Supt. Harrell Holder announced that three actions were taken by the board following the teacher-contract

session. Trustees voted to eliminate a half-time orchestra position, thus eliminating that teacher; approved a cut in the vocational electrical trades position to two-thirds time, and voted to rehire all other teachers.

A tentative school calendar was presented to board members which had five holidays during the year and no spring break. After discussing the proposal, the board decided to cut out the random holidays, including three for Easter, and schedule a week for spring break. The spring-break week next year was designated for March 23-27.

Since the board had a problem with making up bad-weather days this year, trustees designated March 23-24 as days to be used to make up bad weather. In order to get the spring-break days, the board did away with holidays which had been proposed on Oct. 31, March 6, and April 16-17-20. An early dismissal is set for April 17, Good Friday.

School will start Sept. 2. Inservice days for teachers are scheduled Aug. 25-29, Jan. 19, Feb. 13, and May 30.

In other business, the board approved a letter to Congressman in protest of HB-3838, a bill which would

## Tests show driver drunk in fatal wreck

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Tests revealed that the driver of a station wagon involved in an accident in which seven died had a blood-alcohol level two and a half times higher than Texas' legal intoxication mark, officials said.

Investigators are waiting until two survivors of the crash improve before questioning them in an attempt to determine how the east-bound station wagon arrived in the westbound lanes of I-40.

Potter County Justice of the Peace Lewis C. Brazier, acting coroner in the deaths, said Thursday that a blood-alcohol level of .26 was indicated for Linda Johnson Scott, 38, of Fritch, who died from injuries suffered in the two-car crash.

Under Texas law, any person determined to have a blood alcohol level of .10 or higher is considered legally intoxicated.

The tests also were performed on six women killed in the head-on collision, Brazier said. No alcohol con-

### Shuttle probes to show film

WASHINGTON (AP) — The presidential commission investigating the Challenger explosion is using its first public hearing in two weeks to show a computer-enhanced film which panel members say confirms that a failed seam in the right booster rocket led to the accident.

Testimony prepared for the session today is designed to provide a "detailed explanation for every turn of the road" during the 73-second flight, one source said Thursday night.

The result will be to narrow the cause of the accident "down to the joint" connecting two aft segments of the right-hand booster rocket, added the source, speaking on condition of anonymity. Investigators are still trying to determine the precise reason the joint failed.

Two sources said the public session will provide the panel with an opportunity to formally rule out as a cause the only other part of the shuttle still in the suspect category — the large external tank which contains volatile liquid oxygen and liquid hydrogen fuel.

The commission, chaired by former Secretary of State William P. Rogers, also has called two key officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to provide an update on the space agency's accident investigation and salvage and recovery efforts.

The two include J.R. Thompson, the No. 2 official on the space agency's accident task force, and Air Force Col. Edward O'Connor, director of the salvage effort.

O'Connor is expected to testify about a 500-pound piece of debris that rocket specialists have identified as part of the right booster rocket. It is not known if the piece contains the joint suspected of causing the explosion, but was thought to have come from a section of the rocket near the failed seam.

The commission issued a statement disclosing that it would hear testimony about the film, which is tied to a revised, more detailed timeline of Challenger's brief flight.

### More drug tampering reported

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — SmithKline Beckman Corp. asked that three of its products be removed from shelves nationwide after tainted drugs were found in two cities, and officials said they knew of no motive for the latest corporate attack.

Health officials in several states issued warnings Thursday and stores began pulling Contac, Dietac and Teldrin capsules from shelves after SmithKline and the Food and Drug Administration announced the contamination.

Cyanide and rat poison were mentioned in telephone threats against stores in Orlando, Fla.; Houston; St. Louis and Chicago, said Bruce Brown, an FDA spokesman in Washington. SmithKline President Henry Wendt said tests so far have revealed only flour and cornstarch in products from Texas and Florida.

Tests on samples from St. Louis and Chicago were under way, Brown said.

The incident comes within two months of the death of a woman in Yonkers, N.Y., after she consumed Tylenol capsules tainted with cyanide. No arrests have been made in the case, the second involving Johnson & Johnson since 1982.

### Gramm proposes oil deregulation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government should admit it cannot "work miracles" for the oil industry, says Texas Sen. Phil Gramm, who has suggested a program of deregulation and tax incentives to help the oil industry and the banks that back it.

Gramm, a Republican, offered his program Thursday, countering calls by others, including his Democratic Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, for an oil import fee to stabilize prices, which have dropped 50 percent on the world market — to less than \$15 a barrel — since December when OPEC lifted production controls on its members.

"Nothing is going to compensate for \$30 (per barrel) oil," Gramm told a news conference. "Despite the claims of government that we work miracles, the truth is, there is nothing we can do that will produce the impact on the industry that oil prices doubling will produce."

Instead, Gramm suggested a program that would allow out-of-state banks and holding companies to acquire troubled Texas banks, deregulate natural gas, repeal the Windfall Profits Tax and retain energy producers' exemptions slated for elimination under pending tax overhaul legislation.

"My view is there's a crisis in Texas," Gramm said. "The crisis was borne out of the collapse of oil prices. It has passed through the industry, decimating the service company, the supplier, the independent, and now it threatens the financial structure of the entire state, and therefore the economy of the entire state, and I think we need some bold action to try to use the strength of the regulatory agencies to try to assure that this does not become a financial panic that could hurt the economy of the whole state far beyond just the oil industry."

## Poll released on teacher evaluation

HOUSTON (AP) — Poll results showing that only 4.9 percent of those asked to evaluate teachers believe educators are doing a poor job in the classroom may help boost ailing morale, a teachers' association president says.

And despite claims that teacher testing was needed to increase the public's confidence in educators' abilities, Texas State Teachers Association president Charles Beard said that of 1,000 state residents polled, more than half said they believed teachers were doing an excellent or good job.

The poll follows "a most devastating week for teachers — the week of March 10 when the TECAT test was given," Beard said Thursday, referring to the mandatory competency test taken by educators statewide.

But the poll's results may help increase teachers' morale, which is "probably at the lowest ebb its ever been," he said.

Beard and about 1200 of TSTA's 97,000 members are in Houston for the association's 107th annual convention, which continues through Saturday.

"It's been said by the governor of the state and Ross Perot and by others that teacher testing was absolutely necessary because the public had lost confidence in the teaching profession," Beard said. "They are dead wrong."

The poll, conducted Jan. 24-Feb. 6 by the Public Policy Resources Lab at Texas A&M University and Harte-Hanks Communications, asked 1,000 adults around the state to evaluate teachers in their local school district. The ratings were excellent, good, only fair and poor.

A total of 17 percent said their teachers were doing an excellent job, 44.1 percent said teachers were doing a good job and 23.7 said they were doing a fair job.

About 10 percent declined to give a rating or said they didn't know.

"There's not a politician in this state that this kind of polling results in their favor," Beard said. "It proves that TECAT was enacted as a political excuse for raising taxes and not as a means to satisfy a disenchanted public."

"Most teachers in this state were competent (before taking TECAT), and they still are," he said.

Beard said he does not know if taking TECAT will help teachers get better pay raises from the state next year.

And although Gov. Mark White supported teacher competency tests, Beard said the governor hasn't "closed the door" yet on his chances of getting the association's endorsement in the gubernatorial election.

Beard said delegates planned to meet Thursday to discuss upcoming elections. The association was scheduled today to announce which candidates the group plans to endorse in primary and regular elections.

Meanwhile, legal challenges to TECAT will continue, he said.

"I don't think the furor (over teacher testing) is going to die down by election day," he said.

"Politics controls everything we as teachers do. We're finally realizing we must use the political process," he said.

sumption was indicated for any of the other victims, all Malaysian students from North Texas State University.

Police rated the Monday night accident the worst in the city's history.

Mrs. Scott was driving a station wagon occupied by her husband eastbound in the westbound lanes of I-40 at the time of the crash, traffic investigators reported. No signs of skid marks were found by officers at the scene.

When the station wagon reached the top of an overpass, the vehicle collided head-on with a westbound two-door sedan occupied by seven women, all Malaysian students from the Denton-based college.

Three of the Malaysian women were dead at the scene; three died later at Northwest Texas Hospital, and one, Norlaili Mohamed-Yunus, 21, was reported in serious condition Thursday night at N.W.T.H.

Mrs. Scott's husband, Donald Wayne Scott, 38, also of Fritch, remained in critical condition at the Amarillo hospital.

Officers at the scene Monday night took beer cans from the station wagon as evidence.

Brazier conducted a preliminary inquest at the crash site Monday night and ordered autopsies performed on all seven victims by Amarillo forensic pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann.

The seven Malaysian women reportedly were on their way to a spring break vacation when their rented two-sedan collided with the station wagon occupied by the Scotts, police said.

The six dead women were identified as Rosetizana Othman, 21, the driver; and Salamah Bintimohamed Ismail, 21, Mastura St. Sharif, 21,

Hartini St. Sharif, 21, Marina BTE Taha, 21, and Mariah Abubakar, 21.

Their bodies were shipped late Thursday from Amarillo International Airport en route for funerals and burials in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. Malaysian authorities from Washington, D.C., came to Amarillo during the week to make arrangements to fly the bodies of the students home.

The president had suggested that a vote against aid for the Contras was tantamount to support for the Nicaraguan government. Buchanan said that with the vote, "The Democratic Party will reveal whether it stands with Ronald Reagan and the resistance — or Daniel Ortega and the communists."

## Antipasto fans should take note

BOSTON (AP) — People who want to ward off heart disease but can't stand the tasteless tedium of very low-fat diets might consider a researcher's suggestion: Eat Italian.

Dr. Scott M. Grundy said he has evidence that fats called mono-unsaturates — among them olive oil — reduce cholesterol levels in the blood.

Olive oil is a key ingredient of meals prepared in Mediterranean regions such as southern Italy and Greece, where heart disease is relatively rare.

"This paper supports the concept that a Mediterranean-type diet, high in mono-unsaturates, represents a reasonable alternative to a very low-fat diet for Americans," Grundy said of his research, published in today's New England Journal of Medicine.

"We may have been a little too rigid in our dietary recommendations, saying that everybody has to eat the same diet to get the benefit of cholesterol lowering."

Like olive oil, peanut oil is naturally high in mono-unsaturates. Sunflower oil and safflower oil could also be processed to be rich in mono-unsaturates, Grundy said.

But even a diet high in mono-unsaturates would still have to be low in saturated fat, and people would have to be careful that they didn't put on weight by eating calorie-laden fat.

The American Heart Association recommends that people with elevated cholesterol levels limit fat intake to 20 percent of their daily calories. Americans typically get 40 percent of their calories from fat, nearly half of it saturated fat.

Saturated fat raises levels of blood cholesterol, which clogs arteries that feed the heart, causing heart disease.

The heart association isn't likely to change its dietary guidelines because of the latest findings, said Dr. W. Virgil Brown of New York's Mount Sinai Medical Center, chairman of the association's nutrition committee.

However, Brown said a diet high in mono-unsaturates and low in saturated fat may be useful because people may be more likely to stick to it. Among foods that are high in saturated fat are coconut and palm oil, butter, whole milk and meat fat.

"Over the long term, you may be able to sustain a lower (cholesterol) level purely on the practical grounds that people will eat it," he said. "That's probably the major reason that this is an important paper."

Grundy conducted his study at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Dallas on 11 middle-aged men and women who consumed three liquid formulas, each for one month.

## Play based on ancient legend is long-time hit

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A Passion play based on the ancient legend of Veronica and her veil has attracted thousands of people during every Lent for the past 73 years, even though the story is conspicuously absent from Biblical accounts.

Whether fact or fiction, it's an appealing — even addictive — story, says Gertrude Schmitt, who's been starring in "Veronica's Veil" for the past 50 years.

"It's as true as anything...in the Bible," says Miss Schmitt, 65. "History is in the eyes of the beholder... (Besides) once you get in it, it's like taking dope. You can't give it up."

Whether the tale is true or not "doesn't really matter," agreed the Rev. Donald Breier, pastor of St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church, where the play is performed. "The whole purpose is to bring out a moral point."

Called America's Passion play, "Veronica's Veil" first was performed in 1913 at St. Michael's Auditorium, built specifically for the show across the street from the landmark church on Pittsburgh's South Side.

Written by the Rev. Bernardine Dusch, a Passionist priest in Pittsburgh, the 2½-hour drama centers around the legend of Veronica.

According to a story dating back to at least the Middle Ages but found nowhere in the New Testament, Veronica was a follower of Christ even though she was married to Sirach, a member of the Sanhedrin, a Rome-dominated Jewish court back-

ing the Roman governor's condemnation of Jesus to death.

Veronica, part of the crowd following Jesus on his way to Calvary, offered her veil to him to wipe sweat from his face, the legend says. The cloth supposedly was returned to her with the impression of Christ's face on it, and she used it to perform miracles and spread the Gospel.

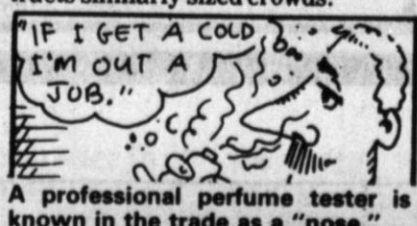
Miss Schmitt said she portrays Veronica, a saint in the Catholic church, as "a decent, upright woman." The play has been revised numerous times over the years to update it and delete anti-Semitic references.

"I play her as a dominant character due to the fact that she has to lead these people," she said.

Performances are given each weekend during the 40-day Lenten season.

More than 1 million people from as far away as Colorado have traveled to see the play since annual performances began in 1919. About 10,000 people are expected this year.

Sts. Joseph and Michael Roman Catholic Church in Union City, N.J., which has been performing "Veronica's Veil" since 1914, attracts similarly sized crowds.

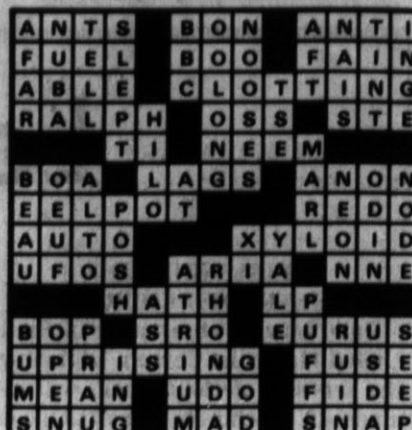

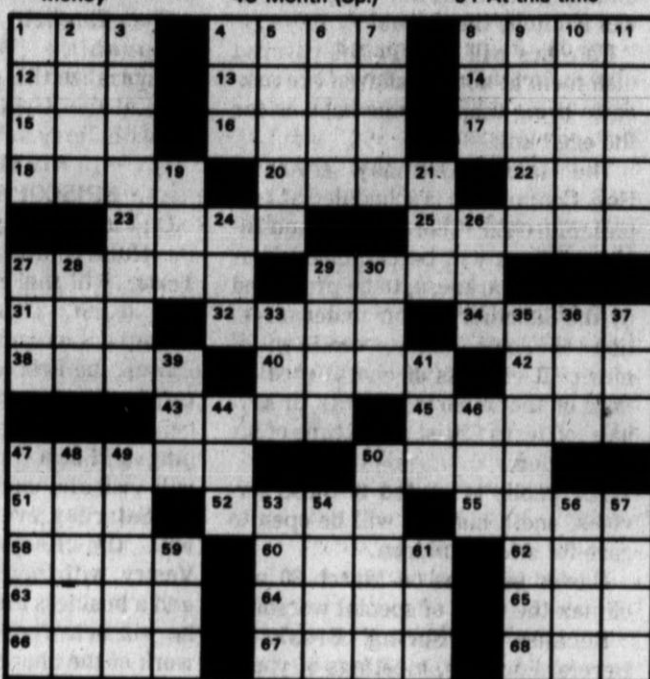

### Out West a lady needs a 'facial'

DEAR POLLY — Thought you might appreciate my recipe for homemade face cream. It was given to me years ago under the name "West Texas Face Cream" because it was formulated by women ranchers who retained their unlined skin with it despite the constant hot drying winds of that area. I have renamed it "Central Nebraska Face Cream" because my adopted state also has hot drying winds much of the year.

Combine with an electric mixer at medium speed two cups white vegetable shortening, two tablespoons lanolin, two tablespoons odorless castor oil, two tablespoons olive or any other cold-pressed cooking oil, and two tablespoons glycerine. Stir five minutes at medium speed, then whip 10 minutes at high speed. Add a few drops of your favorite perfume and blend it in. Pack into several small jars such as baby food jars, label clearly and refrigerate to store. — BEV

DEAR POLLY — I make my own lint remover, very inexpensively, by purchasing a two-inch roll of masking tape. Peel back a strip long enough to reverse roll so that it will attach to the sticky side. Do not tear it off.

Place your hand in the center hole and roll back and forth on the linty area. When this portion is full of lint and becomes smooth and not sticky, remove the used tape, tear it off and reroll a new sticky length and attach

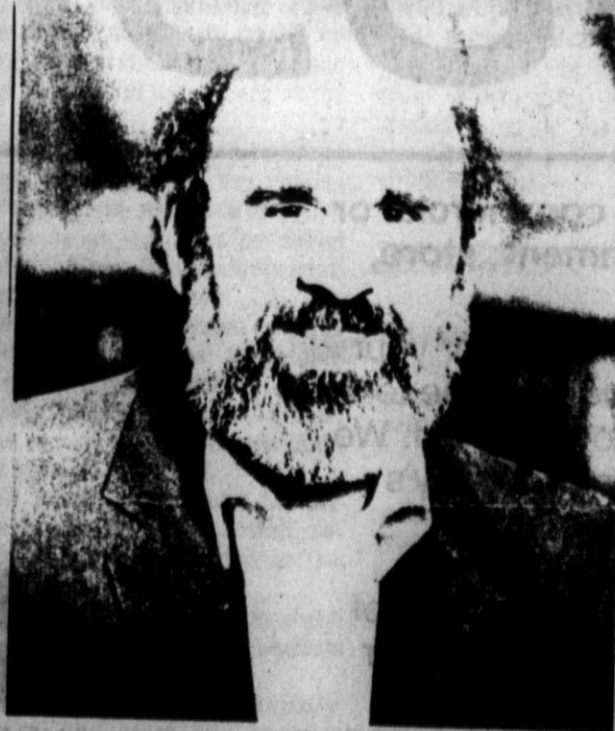

### Tinker to announce departure plans from NBC

NEW YORK (AP) — Like a hit television program that has lots of life left when it voluntarily leaves the air, Chairman Grant Tinker plans to leave NBC soon — while the network is still on top.

Tinker expects General Electric Co.'s acquisition of NBC's parent, RCA Corp., to be finalized in August, and he added in a Wednesday interview, "Very soon thereafter I will tell what part of the world that cares that I'm ready to go."

"I'm not hiding it," he said. "For those people who have a little difficulty dealing with it, I'm trying not only to get them into the idea but I'm trying to persuade everybody that

they'll never miss me when I'm gone."

Tinker said in a later telephone call to The Associated Press that he did not mean to suggest he would leave NBC as soon as the merger is completed. He stressed that he does not want to leave without an orderly transfer of power, but after the merger is final, he said, "Then it will be time for Tinker to think about Tinker."

Tinker, 60, intends to return to the production part of the business.

## Teacher group calls for tax, pay hike

AUSTIN (AP) — Every Texas teacher should get a raise of at least \$2,500 a year and local property taxes should go up \$437 million to cover the pay hike, says the Texas Federation of Teachers.

Not much chance, says a Texas Association of School Boards official. TFT President John Cole told a Wednesday news conference that public school teachers need a pay raise to boost sagging morale. They are entitled to a raise because they have taken the required basic skills test and labored to enact recent education reforms.

"We have a right to ask for more money," said Cole.

Under the TFT plan, average property taxes would increase by 5.6 cents per \$100 worth of property. That would mean a \$56 a year increase on a home valued at \$100,000.

The plan calls for \$430 million in tax hikes to pay for a \$2,500 across-the-board raise for all Texas teachers in September and \$125 million in hikes to put more money in the career ladder program that rewards good teachers.

About \$118 million in available state money could be used to offset some of the local tax hikes, Cole said.

"We have gone to extraordinary lengths to satisfy public doubts about the quality of education in Texas, and we now think it is fair to put a new question before the public — What is the state of Texas going to do to show its appreciation for and support of its teachers?" he said.

TFT has 15,000 members.

James Crow, director of governmental affairs for the school board association, said most Texans won't stand for any increase in property taxes — even for teacher pay hikes, a cause he deems worthy.

"To say a new mandate of that kind should be totally assumed for next year by the school districts is absurd," Crow said.

"Most districts are saturated in terms of property tax burden," he said.

Cole said state tax hikes also will

be needed to fund salaries high enough to keep teachers in the classroom.

The state starting salary for teachers is \$15,200. The state average, including local supplement, is about \$17,000. Cole said the starting pay is "not that bad," but experienced teachers should be making around \$50,000 a year.

"We know that any increases in local property taxes will be denounced by some. However, it seems to us that a small increase of less than six cents in local taxes would be a small price to pay to say thank you to teachers for a year in which teachers were tested, both in the literal and figurative sense," he said.

State Education Commissioner William Kirby said Tuesday that the state might have to pump \$400 million more into education just to maintain current levels.

Kirby, Cole and Crow all said teacher morale is low and a pay hike would help.

But Crow said, "To ask the local districts to dig deeper into their own pockets, it's just not something that is going to be met favorably."

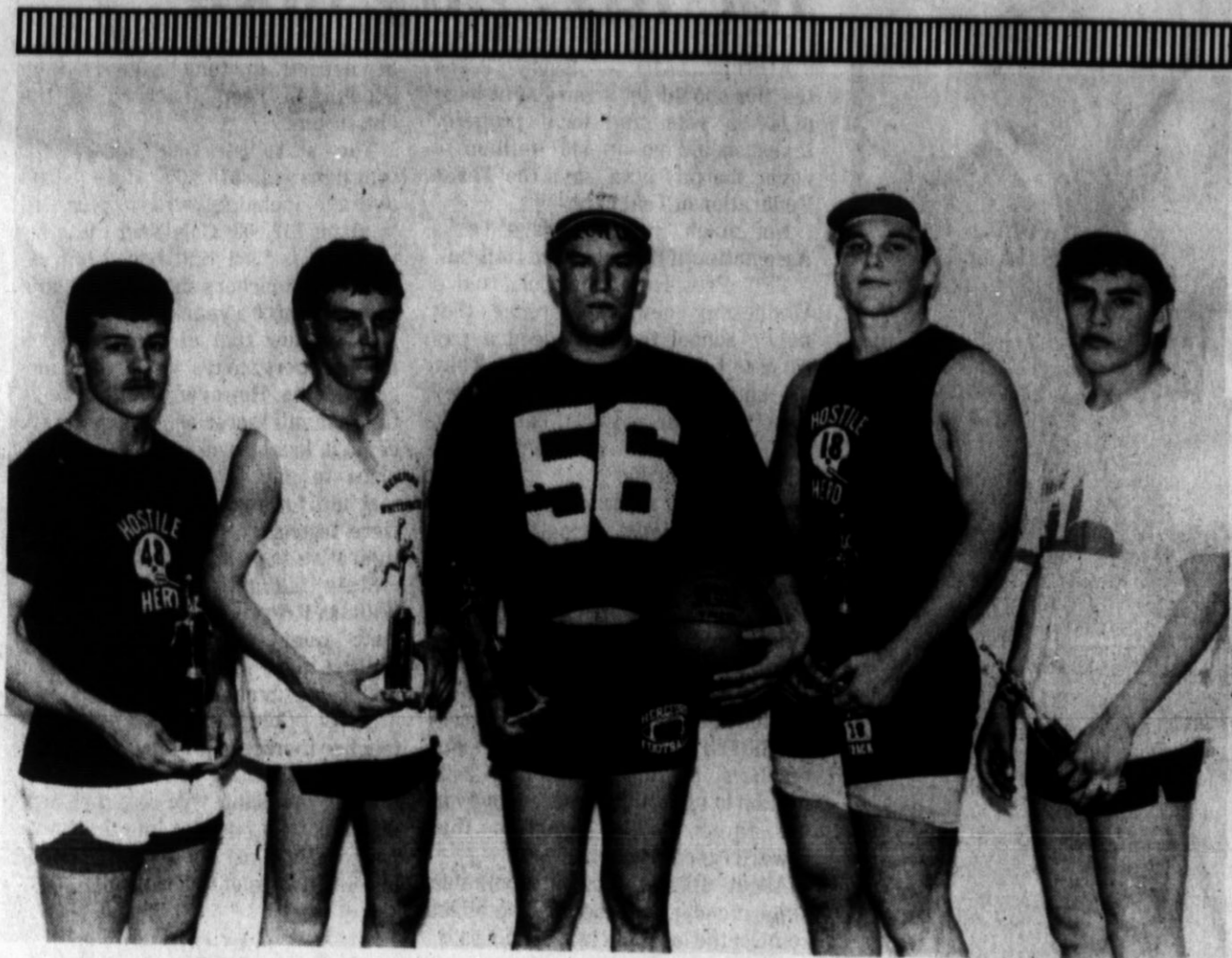

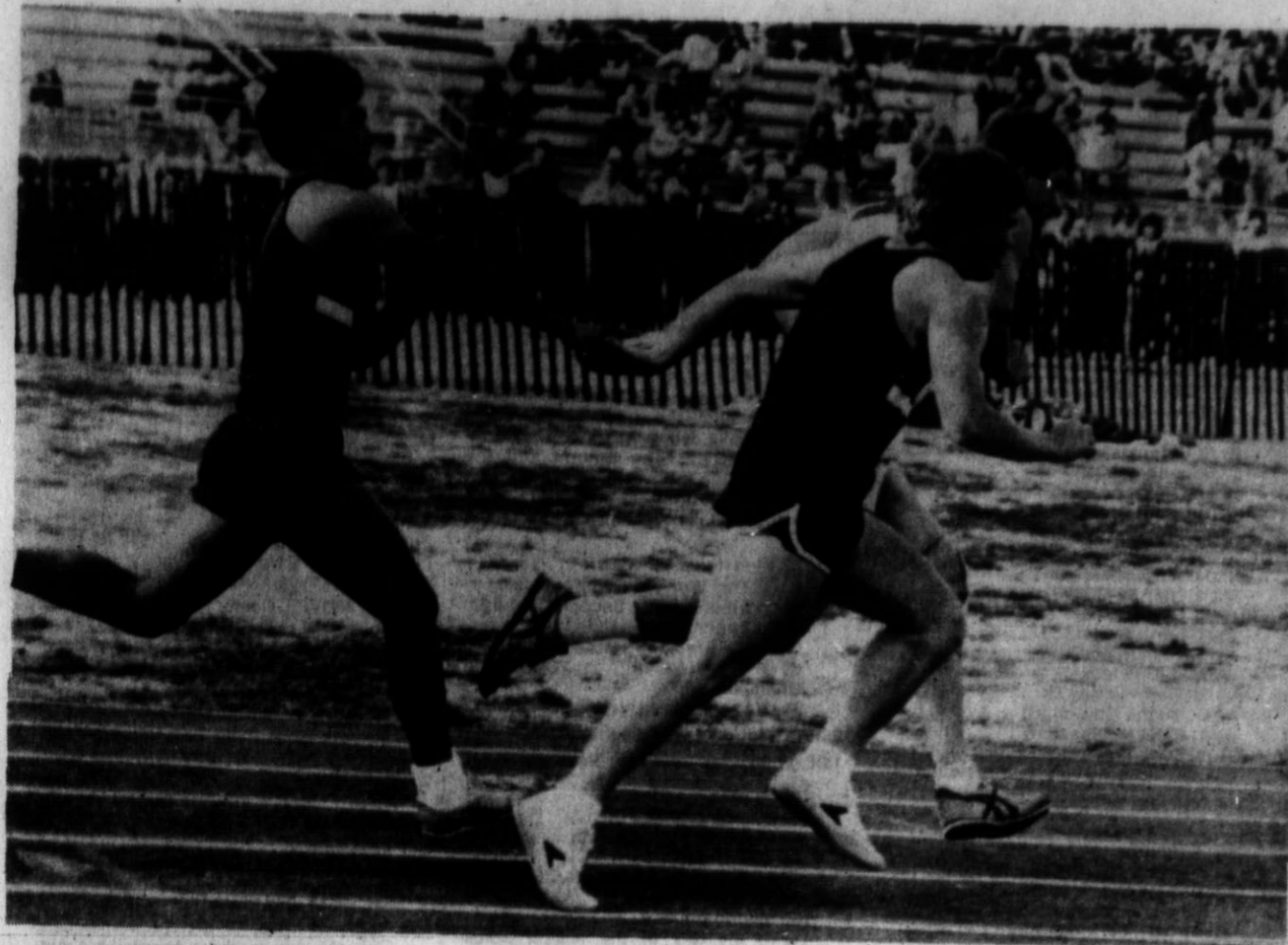

# Parting is such sweet business in salvage yard

GRAND PRAIRIE, Texas (AP) — It is a little painful to watch.

Johnny Rodriguez ties a chain around the right door post of what was, until recently, \$35,000 worth of Mercedes-Benz. Then he climbs into a forklift at the other end of the chain and begins backing away. Metal against metal. Wrenching creaks and groans.

He stops when the post, which had been caved in by a Corvette, is more or less straight. Now, at least, the doors can be opened, which is important, Rodriguez says, because a customer is coming out to look at the interior.

To motorists on the east side of this suburb, Jefferson Boulevard is an ugly mile-and-a-half tangle of mangled automobiles. Each of the dozen or so salvage yards blends into the next. All Economy Cars, where Rodriguez is working on the Mercedes, is indistinguishable from the rest.

Last year, the New Car Dealers Association reported that more than 190,000 new cars and trucks were sold in Dallas County. The salvage yard operators did not make a comparable announcement, but estimate that more than 100,000 cars and trucks were dumped in the 150 yards they operate in the Dallas area.

To many people, the undulating fields of auto carcasses are not only a health hazard but a visual blight on the countryside. Grand Prairie officials grit their teeth every time the president or vice president files into Dallas, because the only view of the suburb is this stretch of Jefferson Boulevard between the Dallas Naval Air Station and the Dallas city line.

Jim Lay says he can understand the city's concern, but adds: "These cars pay a lot of salaries, and they pay a lot of taxes. And they gotta go somewhere."

About 3,800 of them have gone to All Economy and another nearby yard that are under joint ownership.

"We get 'em from everywhere," says Lay, 25, who manages All Economy with his brother, Rick. "Auctions, wrecks, you name it. We

find all kinds of things in 'em. Drugs, money ... teeth.

Most yards pay about \$25 for a badly mangled car and as much as several thousand dollars for expensive cars with salvageable parts. A reusable engine is particularly valuable.

The only overhead that the Lay brothers believe in is the one on the wooden shack they use as an office. There is a battered desk, a pair of bucket seats for the brothers to sit on and a vinyl-covered couch that is losing its stuffing. The paneled walls are papered with signs warning against refunds.

One reads: "If the part you bought is not what you need, you now have a spare."

The telephone and two hotline radios provide a constant racket as salvage operators throughout the region exchange information about what buyers are looking for and what is available.

While a voice on the radio advises that someone is looking for a couple of front fenders for a 1969 Mercedes 280-SE, Lay fields a phone call from a man wanting a left front door for a 1975 Volvo.

"Yeah, we got one," Lay says. When he hangs up, he adds, "It's just like at home. At home you know pretty much where everything is."

Another customer wants a back seat for an unusual car: a 1972 Toyota Carina. Lay knows he doesn't have one, so he calls a computer locating service. Ten minutes later he locates an undamaged back seat at Lone Star Auto Parts in Wylie. The cost: \$35.

Outside, Rodriguez is preparing to move the Mercedes farther back into the yard. He stops for a moment and points to a car in the distance that appears, in profile, to be almost brand new.

"That's a 1985 Audi 5000," he says. A collision with a bridge abutment crushed the left side but left the right side unscathed.

Sometimes the good die young.

### DR. GOTT

### Keeping up a good image

Images in medicine are more complex than those black-and-white patterns seen on X-ray films that radiologists shuffle around. It is said that the entire image of American medicine is being tarnished. The crisis has reached Epidemic Proportions. There is a great hue and cry being raised by the medical guilds — the academy of this or the college of that. Doctors are viewed by the public as being no more ethical than used-car salesmen and — heaven help us — attorneys. What can be done to reverse this trend?

Good question. As a start, you must realize that people's deprecation and defilement of doctors is not the fault of the practicing physician. He or she has recognized for centuries that appearances are the very lifeblood of the profession. Therefore, most M.D.s have developed a system of plausible excuses to explain away, in wonderfully magical terms, what is perfectly apparent: Namely, that doctors suffer from and exhibit the same little quirks affecting any taxpaying adult.

I've invented 10 excuses and would like to try them out on you. See if you can sympathize with the overworked professional who uses them.

Next best excuse: "My brother-in-law owns the dealership."

The truth: "I forgot."

(4) The best excuse for a bad reaction to prescription medicine: "I didn't know you were taking vitamins! Why didn't you tell me?"

Next best: "The pharmacist must have made a mistake."  
The truth: "I didn't think of it."

(5) The best excuse for the patient's condition worsening in the hospital: "The medicine didn't work."

Next best: "The nursing care was lousy."  
The truth: "I didn't make the correct diagnosis."

(6) The best excuse for a surgical mishap: "I didn't do it."  
Next best: "It must have been my assistant."

The truth: "I got lost in there."

(7) The best excuse for a padded bill: "The patient was very sick, so I had to charge more."  
Next best: "My accountant (or computer) made a mistake."

The truth: "I thought I could get away with it."

(8) The best excuse for not being available on Wednesday: "I was taking an advanced course at the medical center."

Next best: "I had an illness in the family."

The truth: "Wednesdays are national holidays for doctors and I was off playing golf."

(9) The best excuse for not being available at 9 p.m.: "I had a meeting."

Next best: "I've just changed my answering service."

The truth: "I was watching a good movie on TV and couldn't be bothered."

(10) The best excuse for the crazy 2 a.m. order given over the telephone to the floor nurse: "I was sick with the flu and don't remember being awakened."

Next best: "I'd put in a long day and was tired."

The truth: "I drank too much brandy after dinner and passed out."

Of course, this brief sampling could be expanded to cover several pages. My purpose is to show that we doctors are doing our darndest to improve our public images by telling people what we know they want to hear. Only the most hardened, belligerent and unsympathetic skeptic would fail to believe us. After all, physicians' statements are taken as gospel, right?

DEAR DR. GOTT — My 11-year-old son has been complaining about leg cramps for almost a year. The cramps start in his knees and run down his legs to his feet. He gets them playing and sitting, day and night, hot weather and cold. I've taken him to a doctor twice; the doctor said they were growing pains and refused to give me a referral to a specialist. Do I have reason to be concerned about this?

DEAR READER — I doubt that you have as much reason to be concerned about your son's cramps as you do about your doctor's attitude. I think referral to a specialist is a logical next step and I would bug your doctor until he or she recommends one — or seek an orthopedic opinion on your own.

As children reach their period of maximum growth, there is a discrepancy in the speed with which tissues develop. For example, bones grow faster than muscles. Therefore, youngsters may often experience leg cramps during and after exercise because muscles are put under unusual tension by rapidly lengthening bones. Although leg cramps are normal in children, get an orthopedic consultation to make sure that your son's pattern fits the norm.

DEAR DR. GOTT — My wife, 65, has been suffering from mild to severe distress with leg cramps for years. They're worse around 4 a.m. She takes two Fosfree tablets and a 3- or 5-grain quinine tablet before retiring. Do you know of anything else she could do?

DEAR READER — Nocturnal leg cramps in older patients often mean circulatory deficiency. Ask your doctor to send your wife to a vascular specialist to determine if there is anything further that can be done to relieve her discomfort.

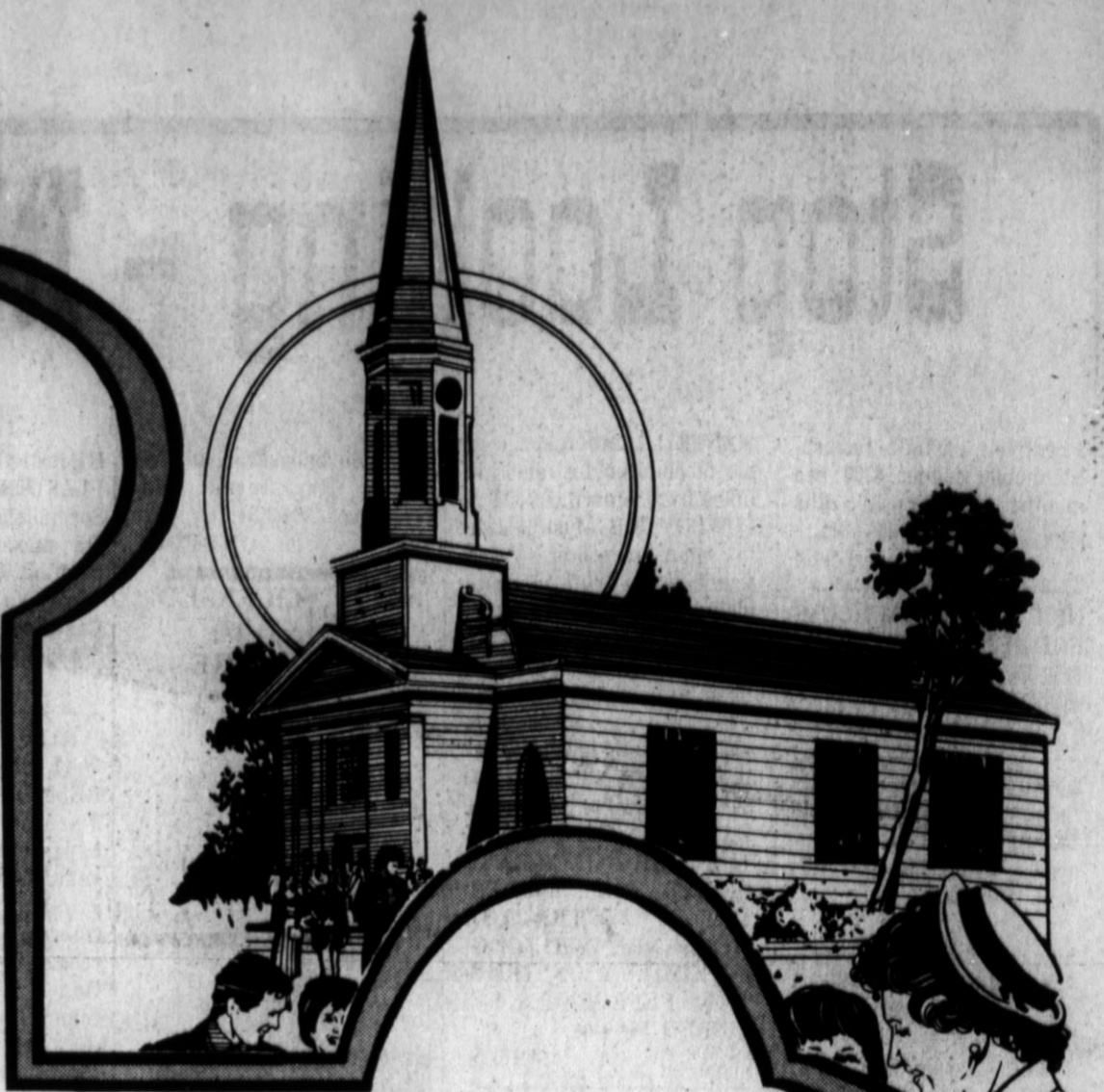
