School Expansion Vote May 26

Despite a small number of absentee votes, a large number of qualified voters are expected to cast their ballots Saturday, May 26, on the question of a \$775,000 bond issue for expansion of Hereford Rural High School District facilities.

Polls will be open at two locations from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday. Robert Veigel will be presiding judge at the box in the school tax office. Assisting him will be Lisle Woodford, Nona Jewell, Mrs. Urlin Streu, Mrs. J. S. Solomon and C. Ora Cockrell.

Baccalaureate Is Slated Sunday

Mr. Ernest Highers will address the largest graduating class in the history of Hereford High School during the annual Baccalaureate Program Sunday, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Hereford High School auditorium.

"Forgetting the Things That Are Past" will be the topic as Mr. Highers, pastor of the Church of Christ, addresses approximately 150 graduating seniors.

Seniors will participate in the second of the graduation exercises Tuesday, May 29, at 8 p.m. in the annual Commencement Program, according to high school principal L. B. Russell.

Processional and Re-recessional will be played by Mrs. John T. Sims and Don Baugous. Rev. Wesley Ferguson will offer the invocation, with Rev. H. L. Thurston giving the benediction.

Hereford High School Mixed Choir will present two numbers, under the direction of Don Moore. Seniors completed regular classes Monday, with final examinations given Tuesday and Wednesday.

Practice for Baccalaureate and Commencement will be held Friday. In the largest class on record, some 150 seniors are expected to graduate. Previous record was last year when 136 seniors received diplomas.

There will be a meeting of the agricultural committee of the Chamber of Commerce at the Chamber office on Monday, May 28, at 8 p.m. Chairman Frank Ford Jr. said goals and working committees for the year would be discussed.

The Hereford Art Guild will sponsor an art show on Sunday, May 27, in the Community Center. The exhibit will be from 2-6 p.m. and is free. Displaying their work will be members of a class taught the past few months by Bill Brand.

The other box will be at Dawn School, with Mrs. H.V. McCabe the presiding judge. Helping her will be Mrs. C.C. Stewart and Mrs. Bertha Frye. Sought is the expansion of Northwest Elementary School additions to the high school and a small field house-restroom building.

Proposed for Northwest Elementary School is the addition of 17 classrooms to the present eight-room structure. Of the new rooms, 16 would be for regular classes, while one would be used for testing, special education and other purposes. Also included would be an "all-purpose room" for cafeteria, auditorium and gymnasium, plus a kitchen. There would be additional restrooms, a change in administrative space and addition of a small library.

Total expansion at Northwest Elementary would be about 34,000 square feet. Total cost, including all equipment and fees, would be about \$352,000.

The elementary school addition would be designed so that another eight-room unit could be added later, to provide for a maximum of 1,000 students. The all-purpose room, kitchen and administrative area would be designed for this maximum number.

A two-story classroom addition is proposed for the north end of the present high school building. It would include six classrooms downstairs, with two classrooms, physics laboratory and chemistry laboratory on the second floor. This wing would total about 13,000 square feet. Total cost is estimated at \$161,000, including all equipment and fees. Included in the cost would be facilities for installing a complete language lab anywhere in the building.

A large addition would be made to the present vocational agriculture building. This would provide for all vocational classes in the same building and eliminate the present wooden barracks buildings now used for some vocational classes. Included would be two classrooms, woodworking and power-mechanics shops, plus minor changes in the present agriculture facilities.

Included in the vocational plant would be about 10,000 additional square feet. Cost, including fees and equipment, would be about \$90,000.

Added along the south side of the present gymnasium at the high school would be two clothing labs for the homemaking department and some remodeling of the existing foods lab to provide for more students. Total area is about 3,000 square feet with total cost, including equipment and fees, of about \$40,000.

Proposed for the east side of the present gym is an addition for more physical education facilities. It would include a classroom, physical education facilities for girls, plus a girls' dressing room.

County Hospital Given An Accreditation Extension

Deaf Smith County Hospital this week received official notice that it has been accredited for a three-year period. Action was made public by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

This actually is the second term of accreditation, the first having been for a one-year probationary period. At the end of the current three-year period, the hospital will be surveyed again for the Commission to determine fitness for continued accreditation.

At the end of 1961, there were approximately 600 hospitals in the state of Texas, only 135 of which were accredited. "We are proud to be among that group," hospital manager T. E. Seigler said Wednesday.

The accreditation came after a hospital survey conducted here on April 12, 1962, by Dr. Peter D. Ward, a field representative of the Commission. The survey includes all phases of hospital operation.

Connally Greeted By Large Crowd At Campaigning Address

A large crowd—estimated at about 150 persons—listened attentively here Tuesday afternoon as John Connally talked on his platform for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. His reception in Hereford's Jim Hill Hotel ballroom was the largest given any candidate here during the current campaign.

The crowd, likely would have been larger had Connally not been about 45 minutes late in arriving.

Calling friends by name, the tall, distinguished-appearing candidate showed all the qualifications of a veteran campaigner, although this is his first race for an elective position.

Introducing the speaker was Ernest Langley, who acclaimed Connally as "thought by many to be the finest Secretary of Navy ever."

After recognizing some Hereford residents, known since he was an attorney for the REA and from his attendance at Hereford cattle raisers meetings, he got into the heart of his platform.

"No one got me into this governor's race; I got myself into it," Connally said, countering the oft-asked question about his connections with Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and President Kennedy. Connally said that he resigned from his post as Secretary of the Navy because he was concerned with Texas and some of its problems.

Education, the increasing crime rate and taxation were among the items mentioned. He emphasized that of the 3 million workers in the state, one-third were women. He said that he favored women serving in the Texas House and Senate and that he intended to appoint some of them to various boards, authorities and commissions.

"We face many problems in the state, but none which we can't solve by working together," he stated.

He said that he felt every Texan should live up to his duties as a member of a sovereign state. "All our rights are predicated upon keeping a free government, starting on the local level, the county, the state and the nation."

"This state indicated on May 5 that it wanted new leadership and new ideas," Connally told his audience.

He said that he favored more emphasis on local educational support, to provide the finest possible background for our children. He spoke of a need for more industry in smaller towns, providing employment for that community's young people. He also said that he favored an increased emphasis on attracting tourists to the state.

"I am quite concerned about the rising crime rate in Texas—now the fourth highest in the nation—and want to place an emphasis upon local and state law enforcement with respects for the laws of the state," he said.

Connally said that he believed the progress of the state was in

large measure dependant upon how well the governor works with the Lieutenant Governor, the Attorney General and members of the House and Senate and declared that he felt he could work with the people. He pledged himself to frequent

City Amends LP Gas Rule, Sets Up An Airport Board

In a lengthy City Commission meeting held Monday, commissioners gave approval to two new ordinances approving the setting up of liquefied petroleum gas service stations within the city limits.

The first of the ordinances passed set the regulations governing the construction of stations and the location of servicing sites. Regulation of the transportation of butane and propane within the city were also set by the Commission and limited to tank

trucks approved by the Railroad Commission.

However, parking of tank trucks on city streets was prohibited by the ordinance.

The second ordinance passed by the Commission was to amend the present zoning ordinance which prohibited the construction and operation of LP gas service stations within the city limits.

Construction of the servicing facilities for vehicles operating on LP gas was limited to "D", "E", "F", and "G" commercial zones.

In the ordinance setting the requirements for the stations, each facility must have the approval of the City Commission. It was pointed out that requests to construct facilities must be submitted through the building inspector.

In order to begin operations, the station must be approved by the Railroad Commission and the city must be notified of the approval.

In other business, the City Commission created an airport board at the request of the Aviation Committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber

of Commerce. Curtis Traweck, spokesman for the committee, outlined its request pointing out that those appointed would serve only in an advisory capacity.

Purpose of the Airport Board, he explained, only would be to make recommendations concerning the future growth and improvements at the present facility.

He also told the commissioners that the board envisioned by the committee would not be concerned with the operation of the airport.

During the discussion on the purposes of the board, Traweck proposed that Hilary Easley, Lloyd Sharp and Morris Easley be appointed by the Commission to serve as board members. The request was approved with the three named as members of an advisory board to the City Commission for the term of one year.

A group representing the Retail Trade Promotions Committee, with Harold Kids as spokesman, also appeared before the Commission asking for permission to use downtown sidewalks for a sidewalk sale during the Harvest Festival.

Commission approval of the request hinged around the city's liability in case of an accident since there is a city ordinance prohibiting the sale of merchandise on sidewalks.

Representatives of the Chamber of Commerce offered to assume the responsibility in case of an accident and to take out a policy to protect the city.

No definite action was taken on the request. However, tentative permission was given with the understanding that the committee would set plans for the promotion and submit another request.

In other business coming before the Commission, the approval of a \$1250 payment to Emmett Milburn for damages was given.

Also approved was the resolution to borrow \$35,000 and a request of Little League to build

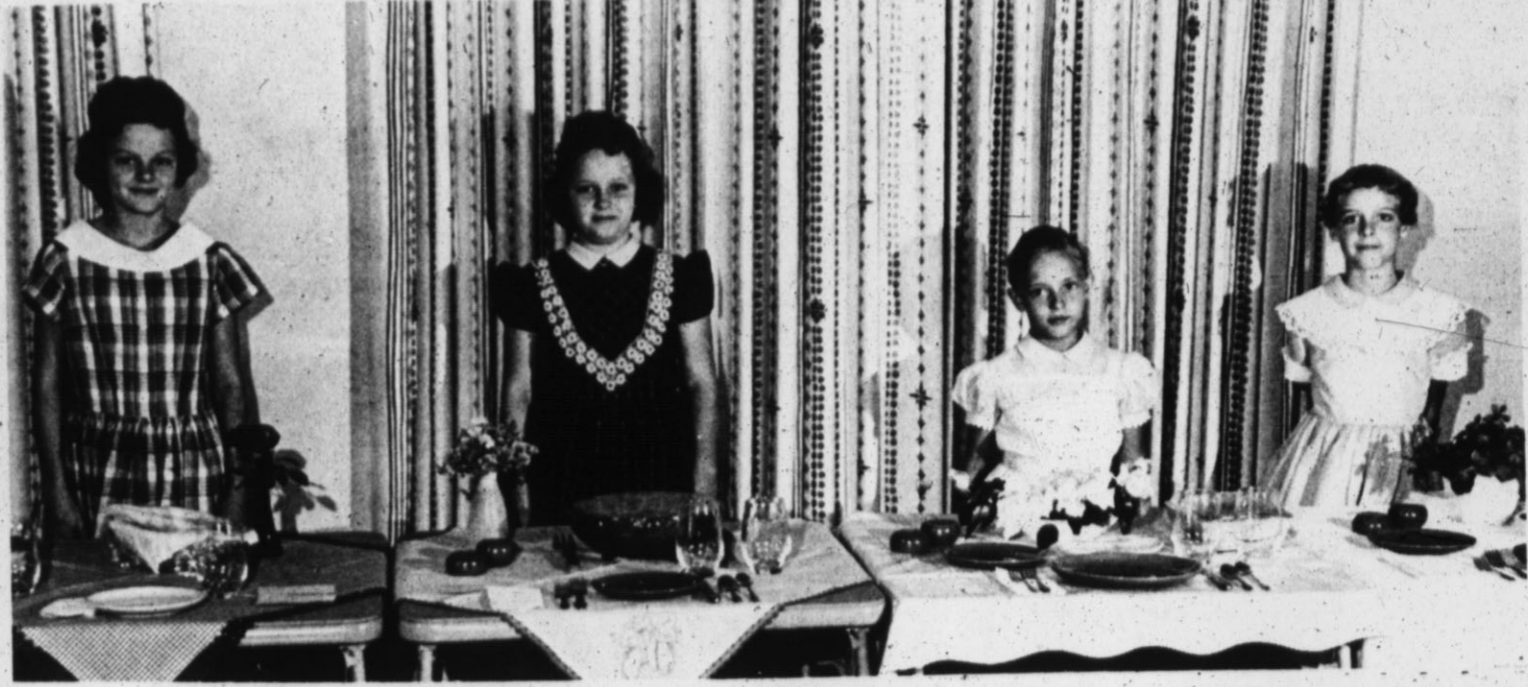

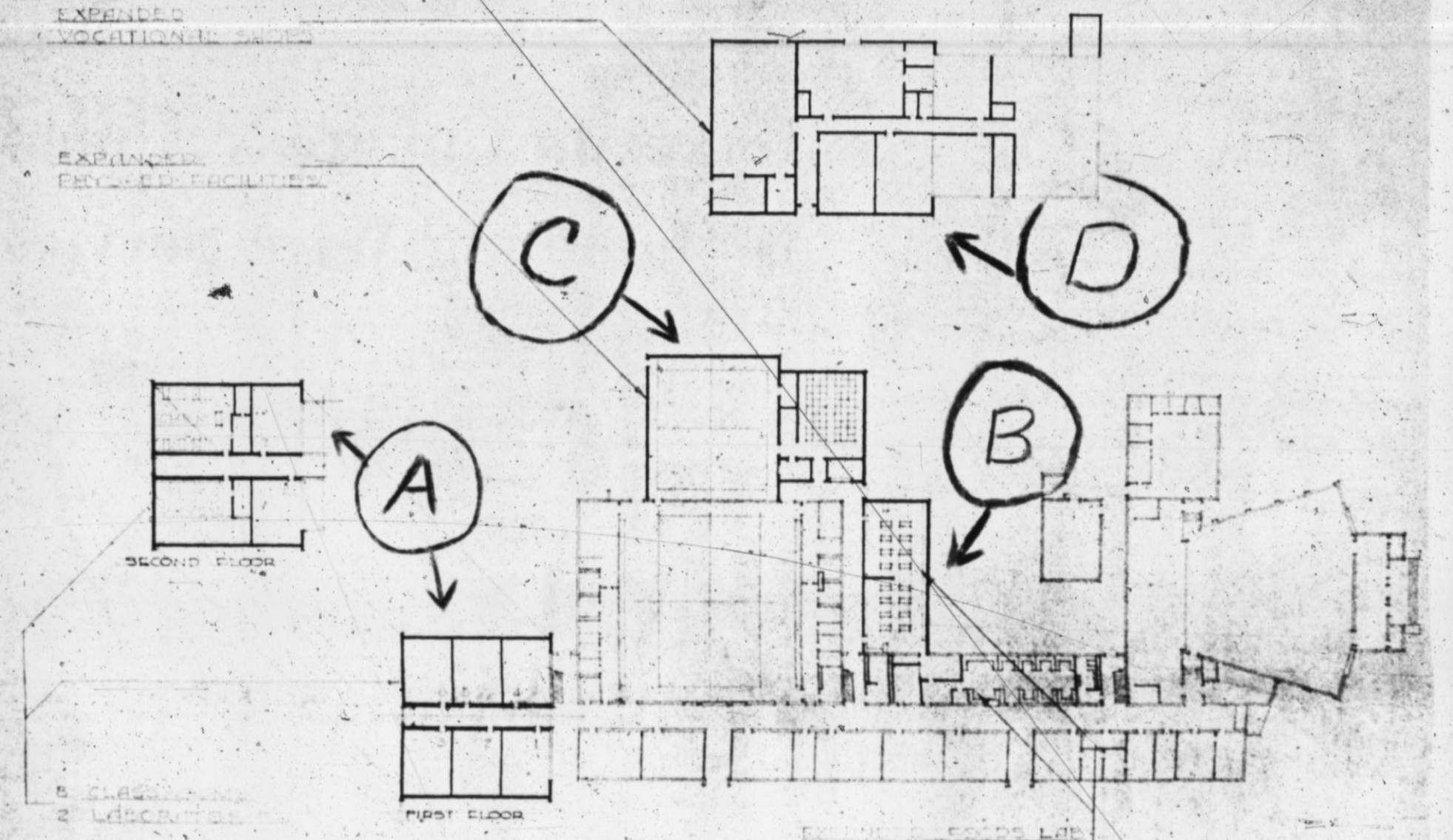

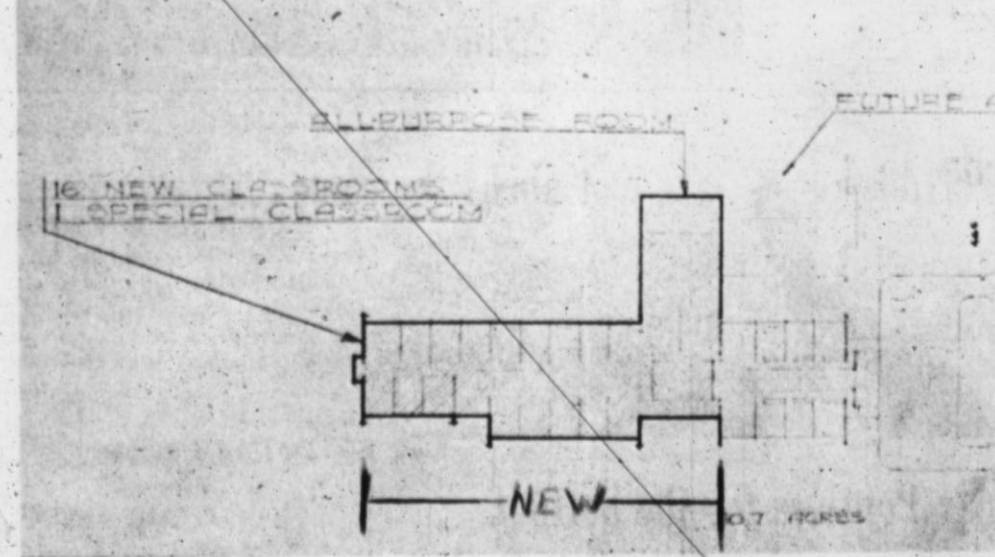
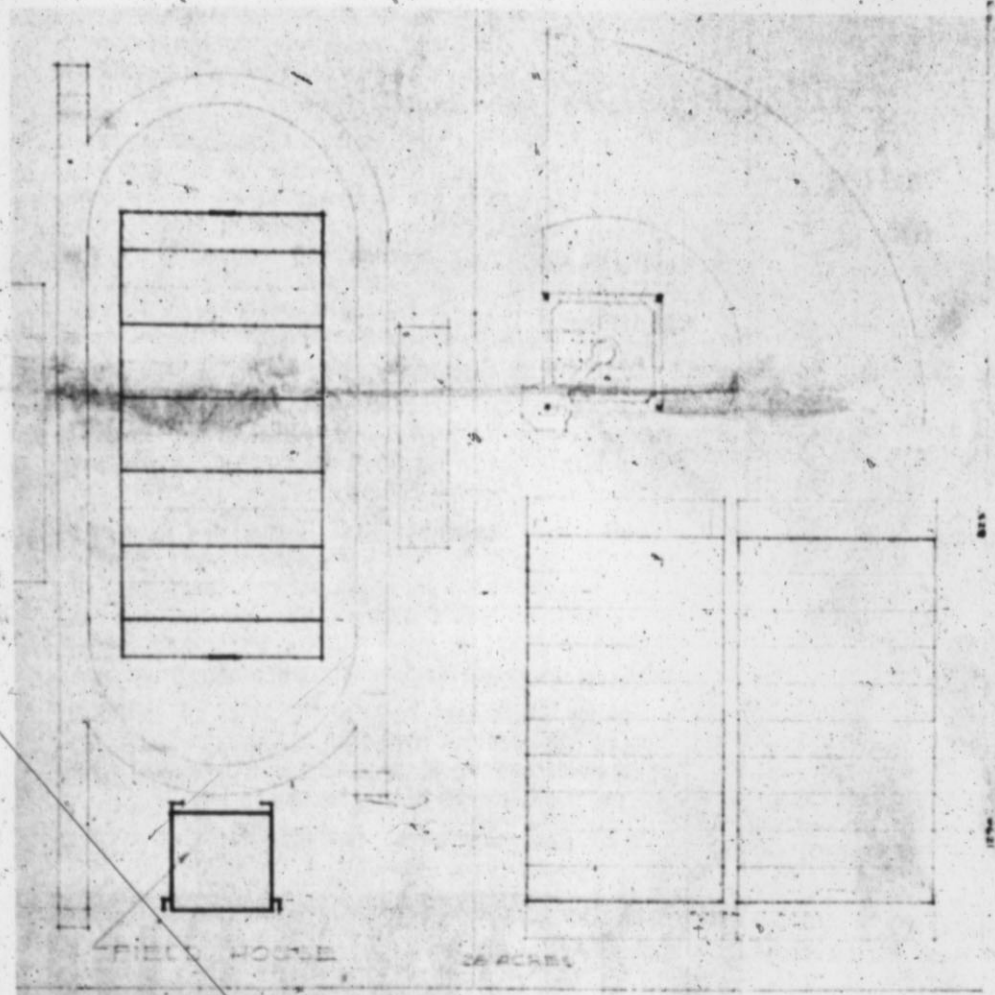

EXPANDED VOCATIONAL BUILDING

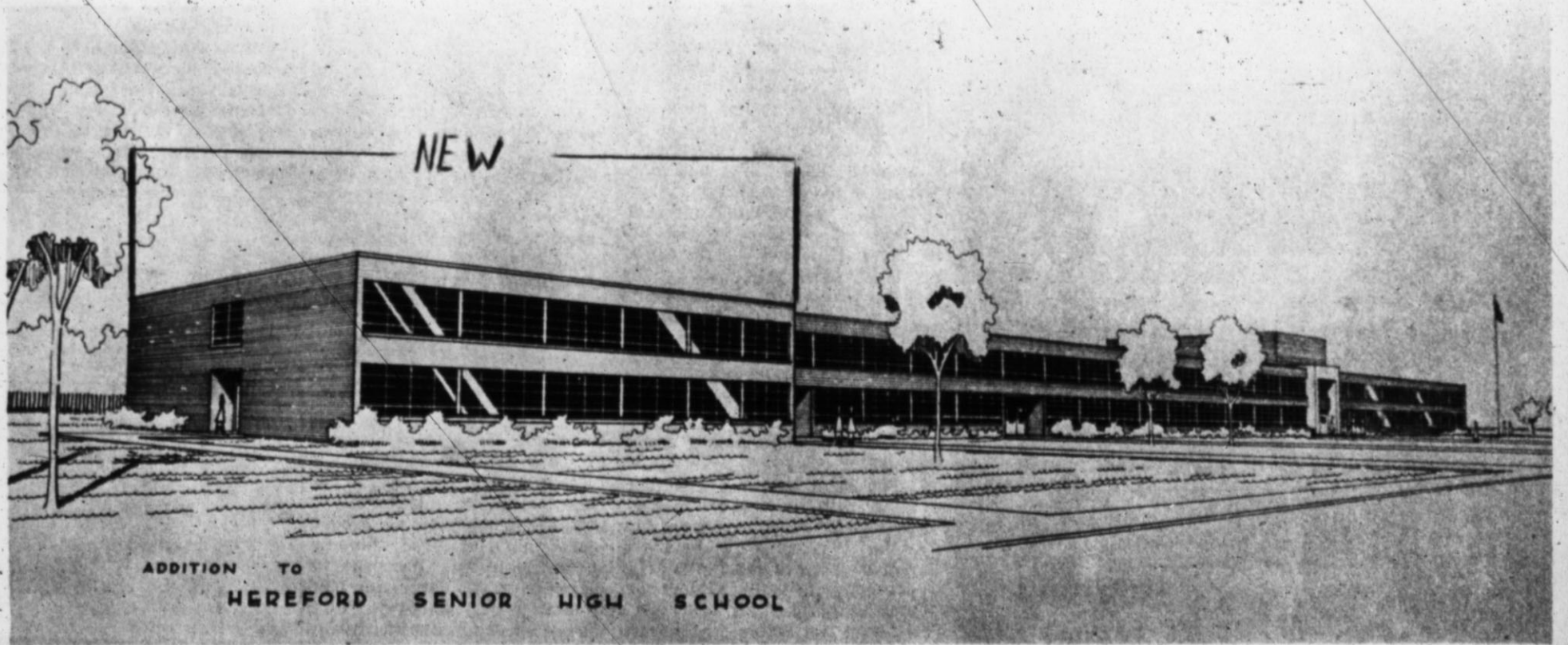
EXPANDED PHYSICAL FACILITIES

### REP. ROGERS WRITES

## Action In Congress Aimed At Gambling Wire Service

#### TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT:

The Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce of the House of Representatives is presently engaged in final action on a bill which will contribute measurably to breaking the back of crime.

Several measures have been passed in the last year directed at the very roots from which crime feeds. These have been aimed at curtailment or shutting down of wire services furnishing information which the bookies, sports pool betting, and lay-off operators must have to operate on a big time scale. Cutting off this information is in effect cutting off the very source upon which gambling feeds.

Without gambling and the enormous profits reaped therefrom, criminals are unable to finance big time crime. It has been the profit from gambling that has enabled the crime syndicate to flourish. It makes no difference whether it is a small, local syndicate, a national syndicate or an international group. In recent years some of these associations have become so rich and powerful that they have completely outgrown local authority. There has been evidence of collusion between public officials and the syndicates that effectively blocked law enforcement. There has been evidence of arrogant flouting of local authority and enforcement officers, due to flaws and loopholes in the present laws.

Big time criminals are dealing with millions, if not billions, of dollars. By the use of these funds they can employ the best brains available to circumvent statutory prohibitions. An excellent example of this has been the manner in which the Johnson Act, which is sometimes referred to as the "slot machine law", has been conveniently avoided. The requirement of the certainty with which a crime must be spelled out in a criminal law makes it possible for these criminals to work out methods of obtaining a result without actually violating the law. The Johnson Act which was passed in 1951 outlawed the interstate transportation of slot machines.

In that Act, gambling devices referred to had to be defined. It was this definition which afforded the loophole for the gamblers. They simply shifted their operations from the slot machine defined in the Johnson Act to the "pinball" machine, which had been used primarily for amusement only.

By making some intricate changes in the operations of these machines, they were able to perfect a method of continuing their gambling operations, and in fact increase their take in many areas.

The American Bar Association took a leading role in instituting action to stem this tide. Out of their activities and the activities of the lawmakers who have long fought the gambling syndicates, a bill referred to as S. 1658 came into being. As could be expected, much pressure has been brought to bear on Members of Congress, from many directions.

The gambling syndicates themselves do not lobby directly, but do their best to obtain help from every segment of the economy to which they can appeal. Usually, this help is innocently provided by those who do not suspect what is behind the scene. For instance, I have received quite a number of communications opposing this legislation on the ground that it is designed to concentrate power in Washington, and to infringe upon the rights of American citizens.

This concentration will not be in Washington, but will be in the hands of the vicious criminals throughout this land and the

world who have no inhibitions about preying upon American citizens, whether they be business people, teenagers, or little children.

It will be by those same criminals who have no regard for human rights and who contribute to the destruction of the very inner character of human beings, and whose activities have throughout history destroyed home and churches and entire nations.

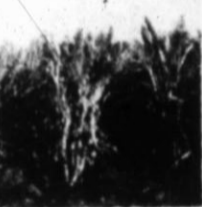

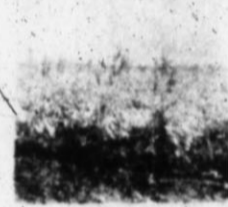

# Age-Old Food Cooked By Modern Methods

Roastin' ears bring many memories to mind of happy childhood when Sunday dinner always included 'corn on the cob' with plenty of homemade butter for a dressing. Corn is not only good for eating but can be used as a table decoration for an informal meal, the idea being to please the children. Modern-day cooks have devised many ways of preparing this delicacy, some of which are listed below.

**INDIAN STYLE ROASTIN' EARS** are different but delicious. They are prepared by turning back the husks and stripping off the silk. Lay the husks back in position. Place the ears on the grill over hot coals. Keep turning the ears frequently for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the husks are dry and browned. The corn will look sun-tanned. For browner, sweeter corn, continue roasting it to suit your own taste. To serve, break off the husks. Paint on plenty of melted butter, salt and pepper.

**CORN ON THE COB YANKEE STYLE** brings out the real fresh corn flavor. Steam the tender ears atop green husks. Line heavy kettle with the washed husks; don't dry them — clinging drops of water make the steam. Lay the ears on the husks. Cover tightly. Steam over a low fire for 20 minutes. Serve **PEPPER BUTTER** for an unusual taste treat. **PEPPER BUTTER** is prepared. Form into a long roll and chill until firm. To fix **FOIL-ROASTED CORN**, spread corn with butter, sprinkle with salt and pepper, then wrap it securely in aluminum foil. Roast for 15 to 20 minutes over hot coals, or bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) for 15 to 30 minutes, depending on the size of the ears. Turned by adding 1 tablespoon each of finely chopped green pepper, parsley, and onion to ½ cup of soft butter or margarine. Blend

Avoid overcooking. **SPANISH CORN EN AVOCADO** ingredients include 3 avocados, ¼ cup oil, ½ teaspoon minced garlic, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 teaspoons chili powder, ½ teaspoon salt, ¼ cup tomato juice, 1 cup whole grain corn, ¼ cup grated quick-melting American cheese, and crushed potato chips.

Prepare avocado halfshells. Heat the oil in a skillet, add garlic and onion and fry until onion is wilted but not brown, add flour, chili powder and salt and cook and stir until smooth. Add tomato juice, corn and cheese and cook and stir until the cheese is melted. Fill avocado centers with piping hot Spanish corn. Sprinkle tops with crushed potato chips. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

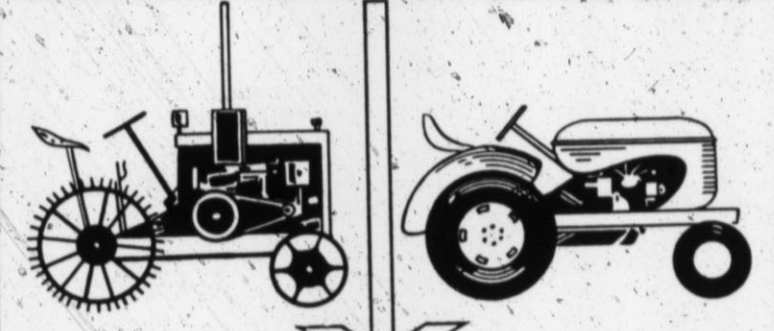
**CORN IN CREAM** is not one of the ordinary corn dishes served. It is prepared by placing 1 box of frozen cut corn, 1/3 cup light cream, chopped parsley, ½ teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, and a dash of garlic salt in the top part of a double boiler. Cook covered, over boiling water, for about 10 minutes. Makes 3 servings.

A buttered casserole is a necessity for making **SCALLOPED CORN**. Arrange alternate layers

of 2 cups of corn and 1 cup of bread or cracker crumbs in a buttered casserole. Sprinkle each layer with a little salt and pepper and a tablespoon of minced green pepper. Add 1 cup of milk, dot with butter and bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

**OTHER WAYS TO SERVE** corn off the cob are by adding butter and cream, salt and pepper; combining with sauted onions and green pepper; combining with cooked little green onions; combining with baby green Lima, making a succotash; combining with meat in

stuffing green peppers, or as a filling in stuffing baked tomatoes; sprinkling with crisp bacon bits, parsley, chives or pimento, or chopped green pepper; and by combining canned cream style corn and whole kernel corn, with butter and seasonings added.

Big news around the State Capitol is that the state finally got out of the red.

Treasurer Jesse James announced the good news. Deficit, which had existed since September 28, 1958, was wiped out by heavy income from annual insurance and corporation franchise taxes, plus revenue from the new sales tax.

As of 1 p.m. May 18, there was a cash balance in the state's main checking account — the general revenue fund — of \$1,233,106.

Fund will be back in the red again, from time to time, before everything gets squared away.

### BUSINESSMEN LOSE MILLIONS

Texas businessmen are throwing away more than \$3,000,000 a year, according to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. This because they're not taking advantage of the prepayment plan under the new state sales tax.

Since small and big businessmen usually pay their bills within 10 days to earn a two per cent discount, Calvert can't understand why they waste \$3,160,000 a year by failing to get this same discount from the state.

Under the sales tax law's Prepayment plan, a businessman can increase his allowable discount from one to three per cent. He can do so by rendering the tax for each quarter by the middle of the quarter to be reported. In other words, he can pay the tax in advance on a logical estimate.

Prepayment was conceived by the Legislature, Calvert said, as an incentive, with some consolation to the business that is forced to collect and report the tax law.

But to date prepayment has been the most neglected section of the sales tax law.

When the House Textbook Investigating Committee was holding open hearings on books recommended by the State Textbook Committee of the Board of Education, one of the most frequent complaints registered by those who protested selections was that they could not get copies of the texts in time to study all the content.

The newly-appointed textbook committee for 1962 has set forth a system for adop-

tion which will give every possible protestant as much time to pore over this year's offerings as the committee itself will have.

On or before July 1, publishers must file a statement of intent, listing all books offered by title, subject, copyright and authors. A compilation of this information will then be forwarded to all school districts, as well as interested groups and individuals who request the list from the Texas Education Agency.

Textbook publishers also have

been instructed to make all considered texts available for purchase by the public from their various depositories.

Final date to file intent to protest any book offered for adoption will be August 1.

### OUTSTANDING YOUTHS TO BE REWARDED

If you'd like to nominate a youngster for a distinguished service award, or for bravery, write to Governor Price Daniel. He is seeking recommendations for Young American Medals for Bravery and Service awards for 1961. He asks that nominations of boys and girls under age 19, who have performed acts of extraordinary courage or achieved outstanding records of service, be submitted to him by August 15.

Act of bravery or record of achievement must have been performed during 1961. Two medals may be awarded for each category by the Young

American Medals Committee of the U. S. Department of Justice, after final approval by Attorney General Robert Kennedy.

Governor Daniel will forward his recommendations to the Justice Department after he receives nominations which include facts about each youngster's achievement with supporting statements by witnesses; authenticated evidence of the time and place of the candidate's birth; a biographical sketch and photograph.

### RAMPS ALONGSIDE HIGHWAYS

Fishermen and other boat owners soon will be cheering lustily for the State Highway Department.

D. C. Greer, department head, has just announced that 40 boat launching ramps soon will be built from surplus funds in the Highway Department.

State boat registration law provides that any income re-

maining after enforcement of the boat registration act shall be spent building public launching ramps for boats. Highway department has handled registrations and the funds since enactment of the law two years ago.

"Additional ramps will be built as money becomes available," Greer stated. "These will be located according to need, accessibility to highways, and availability of private launching facilities."

R. W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division, reported that as of November 30, 1961, licenses had been issued for 173,300 Texas motorboats.

"We still hope for some remedial legislation to strengthen the water-safety, boat-registration Act," said Townsley.

### SHORT SNORTS

After representatives of major oil companies gave gloomy testimony as to the demand for Texas oil, State Railroad Com-

mission ordered another eight-day allowable for June. The 22-day shutdown means a slight production increase over May on an average calendar day basis.

Governor Daniel named Daniel Boone of Abilene and C. Herbert Cowell of Houston to the State Board of Architectural Examiners.

Miss Mildred Blair of Cisco was reappointed to the Texas State Board of Tuberculosis Nurse Examiners and C. D. McKnight of San Antonio to the State Board of Barber Examiners.

### NEPHEW DIES SUDDENLY

Robert Noel Gatewood, 33, nephew of Mrs. H. E. Wester of Hereford, died suddenly Wednesday, May 16, after becoming ill at his home in Samnorwood. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Gatewood of Tulla. The funeral services were held in Pecos.

### WINS HONOR

Robert N. Berry, uncle of Mrs. Jess Robinson of Hereford, a former resident of Canyon, has been named Science Teacher of the Year in Arkansas. Berry is head of the science department at Hall High School in Little Rock, Ark. His son, Charles, was a sweepstakes winner in state competition on physics, and placed fourth in the National Science Fair at the World's Fair in Seattle, Wash.

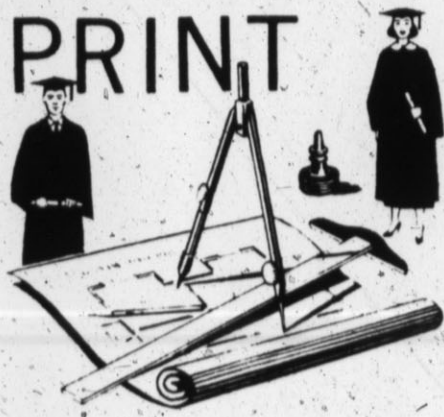

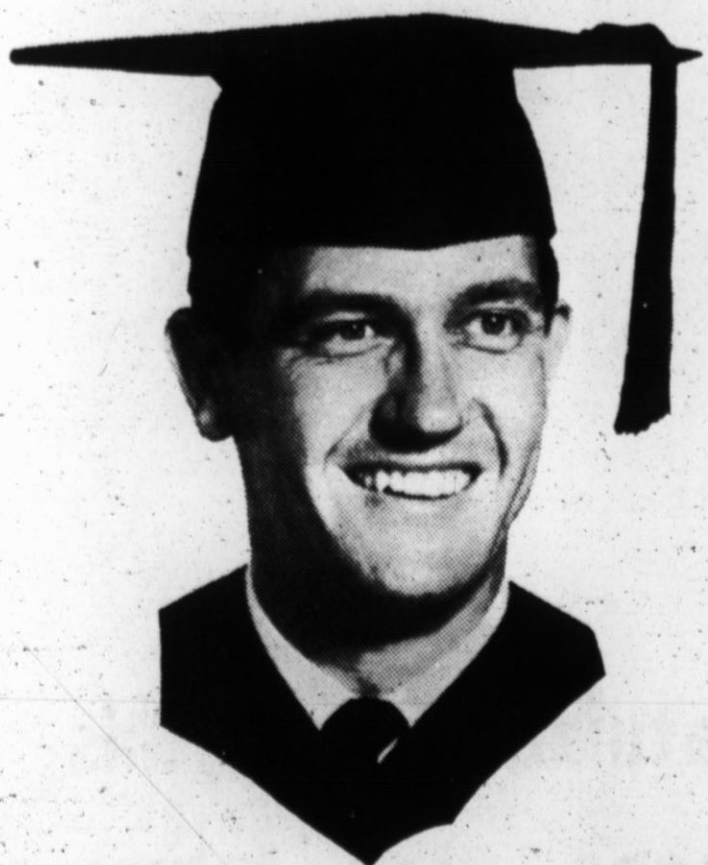
