## SALE OF CHAUTAUQUA SEASON TICKETS PROGRESSING VIGOROUSLY WITH SEVERAL TEAMS OF MEN AND GIRLS IN THE FIELD

### FARMERS DAY ON MAY 21 INTERESTING SPECIALTY

The drive for the sale of season tickets to the forth-coming Chautauqua, beginning May 21, started in earnest Wednesday and Thursday, and now several teams of men, as well as of Girl Scouts, are scouring the city placing the pasteboards. Two teams of business men consisting of A. M. Jones and D. F. Ashbrook, Jonathan Pittman and Clifford Acker, were hard at work Friday morning and at noon reported a very good response to their efforts. The ticket sales will be continued until the date for the opening.

The people of Hereford as a whole have shown by past experience that they appreciate the chautauqua and will support it. In years where the ticket organization is not very "punchy" the sale of season pasteboards has dragged and usually the guarantors have to dig up a small deficit, usually not enough to hurt anyone. But it has always been realized that it was possible to sell enough tickets in advance to cover the guarantee and carry the insurance against rain, and this year the committee is determined to handle the matter in a business-like way and sell those tickets in a business-like manner in advance.

Miss Virginia Koogle, advance agent was in Hereford Thursday and aided the local committees with suggestions. She called especial attention to the first lecture on the opening day, Homer C. Boblitt, on the subject, "Is Farming a Business?" Miss Koogle says this is a "dirt farmer" talk and one that should attract every farmer and his wife in this territory.

The chautauqua program this year looks to be the best in the history of the Redpath-Horner history and with the fine crop prospects ahead of this country it is believed the people will be in a frame of mind to turn their thoughts to things higher and better and worth while for one week.

### Senior Play Pronounced Best of Kind Seen Here

"Probably the best local talent play yet shown here," seemed to be the verdict of every one who was fortunate enough to witness the Senior Class annual play entitled "The Thread of Destiny" presented at the Star Theatre in matinee and at night Thursday. The house was packed to the limit long before the curtain went up, chairs were put in the aisles, and standing room was at a premium in the back of the house. Keen appreciation of the play and of the individual work of the characters was expressed on all sides by the audience. Miss Millicent Griffith, superintendent, made a short introductory talk before the first act.

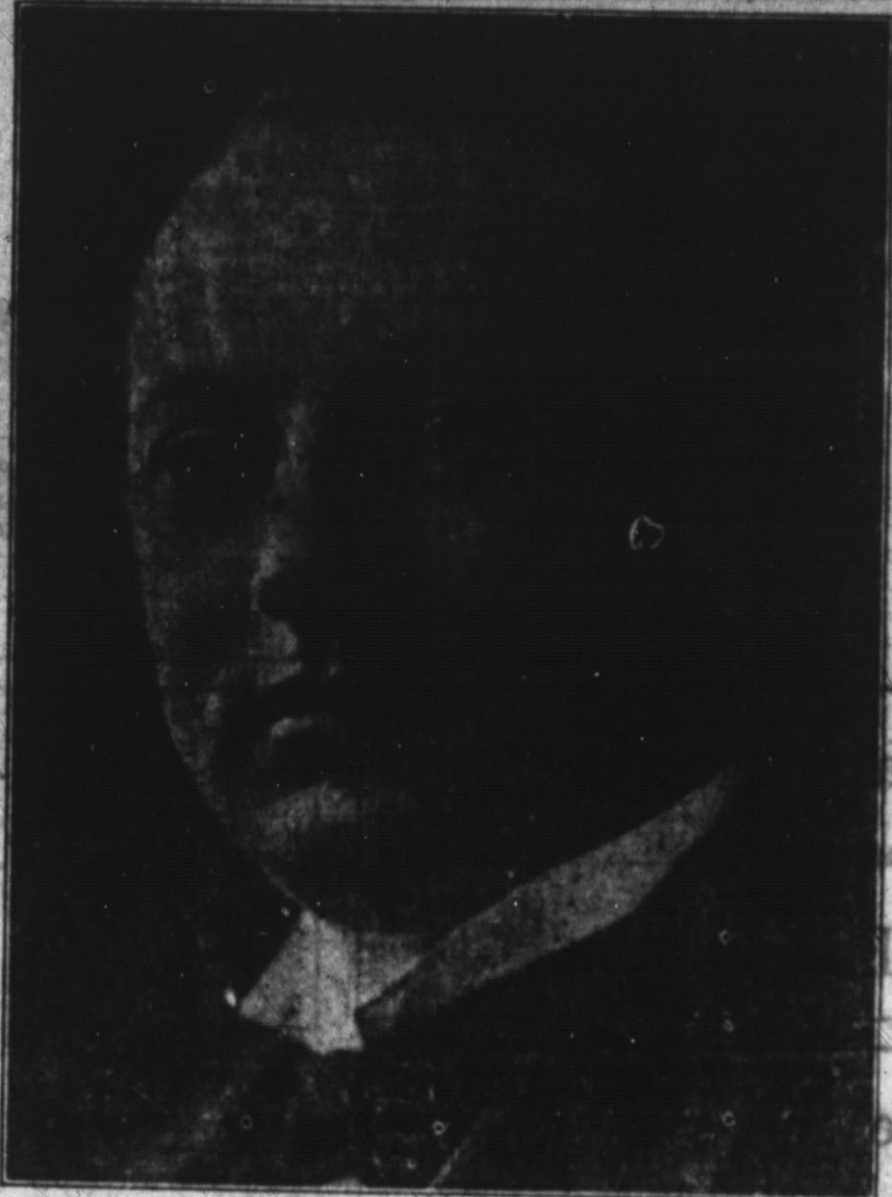
### Castro County Lady Dies; Is Buried at Dimmitt

Brack Williams is the first champion of the Hereford Golf Club. Brack won that enviable title in the Stroke Contest by defeating Virgil Cunning in the final 92 to 98. With this match the stroke practice contest ended and the club now enters upon its first real Tournament.

The first step in the Tournament is the qualifying round to determine the playing status of the men and four final scores have been reported to secretary Homer Fox to date, as follows: W. R. Steckman 97, Brack Williams 104, J. H. Pittman 105, Arch Collins 106, Ralph Barnett 156, Rev. J. R. Sharp 113, and Mac Pittman 93, Homer Fox 85.

Two features of these matches are the high score made by the champion Brack Williams, and the low score made by Homer Fox. The club secretary played the best eighteen holes in his golf history while the champion had an off day and placed himself in Class B, where he does not really belong.

Upon the completion of the various qualifying matches the players will be paired by classes according to scores made in the round and the Tournament will begin in dead earnest.

### Test of Fire is Good For Man's Moral Fibre!

The Rev. Paul J. Merrill of the Christian church runs a little tabloid sermon in his church pamphlet each Sunday. Nearly all are good to read and all are good to follow. The one to be used next Sunday could probably be entitled, "Tempered by Fire," and brings out a thought that appeals so that it is reproduced below:

#### LITTLE SERMON NO. TWO

Mr. T. Jefferson and others briefly listed the inalienable human rights as three: life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. There is a fourth: the right to make one's own mistakes.

Nowhere is the deep wisdom and justice of the Creator more apparent than in his so arranging the universe that a man can do his own sinning. We cannot understand this. We are so dazzled by ideals that we cannot see that the supreme privilege of freedom is the freedom to do wrong. Take that away, and man becomes non-moral. Virtue is of account only in one who might have chosen vice.

We learn more by our own mistake than by any other means. Let a man always succeed and he will always remain a child, ignorant, egotistic, unsympathetic, and cruel. It is because the king can do no wrong that the king usually has the worst of a peannet. Our growth, character, enjoyment of life come from our mistakes. A child that is not permitted to fall will never learn to walk; for walking is a succession of falls.

In our eagerness to make our children successful we rob them of the very foundation of success, which is failure; for the true success is what is left after a hundred failures. We are so anxious to have them happy that we take from them the key to happiness, which is the privilege of making themselves and others miserable.

I want the right to burn my own fingers; bump my own head, eat indigestible food, and do the whole range of silly and senseless things. Only when I am at perfect liberty to scar, scratch, smash, and ruin my life, only then am I capable of triumph, power, and goodness.

It is very important to be trained in morality; it is also important to be trained in liberty.

### Wagner Has Kind Of Cow That Pays Her Way Monthly

A cow that will produce two and a half pounds of butterfat daily is a very valuable asset to any farmer and brings him in around \$50 per month gross income. That's the kind of cow Jacob Wagner owns. Mr. Wagner lives nine miles south and nine miles east of Hereford.

The cow, a coming four-year-old, is a half Holstein and a half Durham, with her second calf. She is yielding forty-eight pounds of milk daily and Mr. Wagner's test at the Hereford Produce this week showed it to be high in butter fat content.

Mr. Wagner says that the cow's mother is almost as good as she is. The mother has had five calves, all heifers, and this cow's two calves have both been heifers. As a consequence every member of Mr. Wagner's family has a better calf as a starter in the dairy business.

### Paul Guthrie is Honor Student in University

Austin, Texas, May 10.—Out of 3,022 students in the College of Arts and Sciences of the University of Texas during the winter term, 351 have been commended for scholastic merit. These students have been listed on an honor roll of distinguished students, divided into five groups, according to their rating. 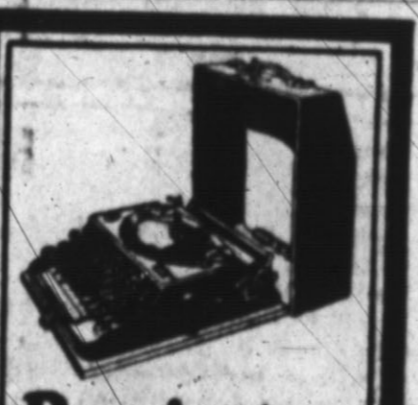

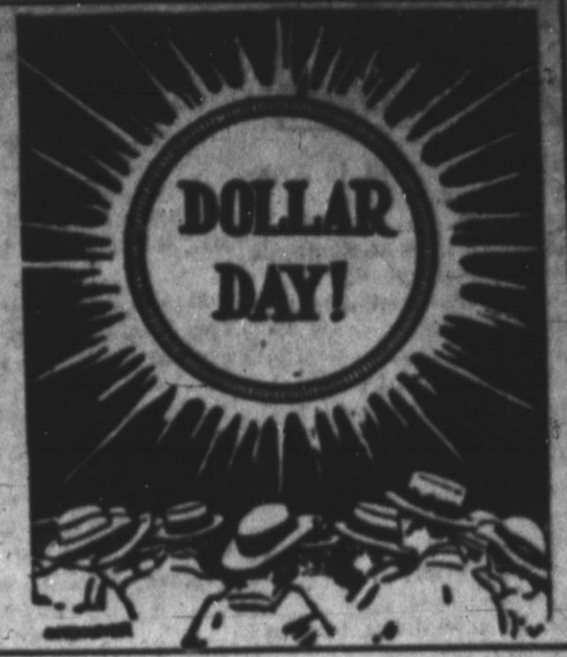
