A joint session of the County Commissioners and the City Commissioners was held Monday, and more meetings are to come, on the problem of the construction of the new bridge and fill across the Tierra Blanco at the foot of Main street. The city line runs right up to the bridge, and the big fill to the north will fall within the jurisdiction of the city. The officials are conferring on an equitable way of apportioning the expense and of letting one contract for all the work to save expense. It was stated after Monday's session that an agreement to that effect will be reached shortly.

W. D. Howren, engineer, was here Monday and Tuesday, assisting the city commissioners in estimating the extent of the work. Meanwhile construction foreman Chapman of the Austin Bros. Bridge Co., has a crew hard at work on preliminaries, constructing concrete forms, etc., and is actively pushing things.

The local fishing season is in full swing and many fish of remarkable size are being brought in almost daily, but the king-pin of them all to date, and one that probably establishes the local record was the one that French Thurmond exhibited last week. This monster weighed eight pounds and one ounce and was caught not very far from Hereford.

Local fishermen say that the fish this year seem to be larger than usual on the average and that some records will be smashed before the season is over.

### Marksmen Invited to "Tune Up" For State Shoot at Amarillo by Participating in Local Shoot June 14-15

The Hereford Gun Club is now busy issuing catalogues describing their third annual registered shoot, June 14 and 15, which is advertised as a preliminary to the State Championship Tournament to be held at Amarillo June 16-17-18-19. A large number of folders containing details of the event have been prepared and are being mailed out to all the gun clubs in the state and in this part of the country. President J. J. Clark and Secretary Virgil Canning state that they are receiving telegrams and letters from marksmen as far south as Houston, Texas, asking for information.

The Hereford club officials figure that the State shoot at Amarillo will draw a large crowd of sportsmen from all over the country. Most of them will come long distances and will probably come a day or so early in order to acquaint themselves with the country, the climate, and to condition their nerves for the big test. Therefore the Hereford club is advising these men in their advertising matter that they can "tune up" beautifully at Hereford for the state shoot; that it is only fifty

miles away, with the same kind of climate, and a good road between; that they can camp and fish here, too. If they choose, and get their shooting eyes sharpened to a hair by participating in the Hereford shoot just a day ahead of the Amarillo affair.

On Thursday, June 14, a Merchandise Shoot will be held here beginning at 1:00 p. m., using 100 unregistered targets. Four events will be shot, of 25 targets each, with merchandise prizes on each event divided "Jack Rabbit System."

The main event will be on Friday, June 15 and will consist of 250 registered targets, beginning at 9:00 a. m. There are nine events with cash prizes, consisting of 200 10-yard singles and 25 pairs. Rules of the Amateur Trap-shooting Association will govern the tournament.

Preparations are being made to entertain a goodly number of shooters from a distance as well as squads from nearby Gun Clubs and local gunners are practicing hard to hold up their end of the best competitive marksmanship development.

### PROMOTER OF A PROPOSED RAILROAD ACROSS PLAINS ADDRESSES BUSINESS MEN

COLONEL C. H. POWELL OF CHICAGO GIVES OUTLINE OF PROJECT HE HAS BEEN WORKING ON FOR FOUR YEARS

### MUST SHOW NECESSITY FOR ROAD

Has Compiled Statistics at Great Expense to get Interstate Commerce Commission to Issue Permit. Does not Ask Bonus but Finances Plan by Increased Values

Colonel C. H. Powell of Chicago, promoter of the proposed Panhandle, Texas and Gulf railroad, from Tucumcari, N. M., to Fort Worth, was an unexpected visitor here Monday and made an address at the business men's luncheon held at the Gordon Hotel. Colonel Powell's address was on the proposed railroad which would run from the mouth of the Red River to the Gulf of Mexico, a distance of 1,000 miles. He stated that he had been working on the project for four years and had compiled statistics at a great expense to get the Interstate Commerce Commission to issue a permit. He stated that he did not ask a bonus but that he would finance the plan by increased values.

route which entails heavy expense and a great deal of work. Colonel Powell stated that he had secured all the data and would soon file formal application for permission to build the line. He advised the Hereford people to compile their facts and figures and file them with him. He said that Powell's charges for building the line would be largely met by the increase in value of the land which would be coming beyond it, and by the directness of the route through here and through some other point.

His method of financing is unique in a way. He proposes to sell securities based on the acreage affected by the line and will ask for a bonus of \$100 per acre from landowners who sell this land. The theory is that the rise in the value of the land by the coming of the road will not only pay the bonus asked but good profits to the landowners in addition.

Following the luncheon Col. Powell was shown over the city by a committee and was especially pleased with the Landrum Nursery, where he saw everything literally burdened with fruit, and with the McDonald irrigation farm. He promised to return at an early date and bring his data with him for the more complete information of the local people.

Mr. Kincaid also made a short talk at the luncheon, his subject being the value of a county agent to any county. He said that the county agent in Swisher county was a fixture and doing splendid work for the upbuilding of the farmers. He said the estimate was that the agent cost each farmer in the county just an even forty-five cents per year, and no more. He strongly urged the adoption of the county agent system in Swisher county.

### Lee Satterwhite Helps Straighten Gas Tax Mess

Last week petitions to Representative Lee Satterwhite and Senator Bledsoe were circulated by local oil men protesting against the new state law governing taxes on gasoline sales and the Hereford Chamber of Commerce wired both these gentlemen to that effect. The following letter from Mr. Satterwhite shows that the protest from all over the state are having their effect and that legislation is contemplated which will give the oil station men some relief.

"House of Representatives, State of Texas, Austin, May 24, 1923.  
"Hereford Chamber of Commerce, Hereford, Texas.

"Gentlemen:  
"I have your telegram of recent date with reference to the situation of the levying of one cent per gallon on gasoline.

"This is to advise you that the law is being amended so as to make collections apply only one time. At present, however, all retail dealers are required to make reports to the Comptroller showing the number of gallons sold during the previous month, and to remit one cent per gallon on all sales made for the month. According to blanks sent out by the Comptroller, all first reports must be made for April sales, and the penalty for failure to make this report has been extended until the first of June. In other words, reports for April sales will have until the first of June without the penalty being imposed.

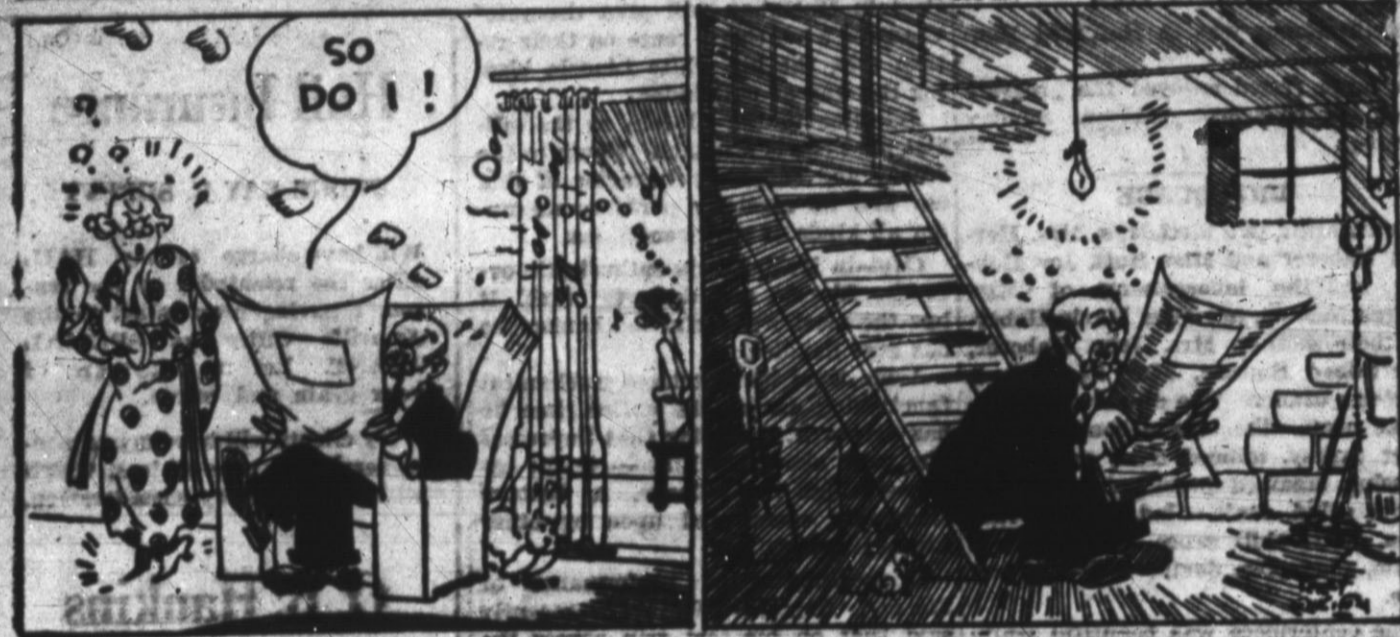
