

## CARLOAD OF COTTON SEED FROM SWISHER COUNTY IS RECEIVED HERE ON MONDAY

ACALA SEED, ACCLIMATED IN SWISHER, TO BE SOLD TO FARMERS AT COST BY HEREFORD CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. 810 BUSHELS

## PLANTING SEED PRICES ARE RISING

Tulia Says Cannot Furnish Them at Same Price Hereafter. All Indications Point to Fact That Planters Should Secure Seed Now and be Sure of Supply When Needed

What is said to be the first carload of cotton seed ever received in Hereford arrived here Monday from Tulia, consigned to the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, and will be unloaded and stored this week, afterwards being sold at cost to the farmers of this community who intend to plant some cotton acreage the coming year.

The seed will be stored in a warehouse belonging to Homer Wilkinson and will be retailed by the firm of Jones & McLean, who have offered to undertake this work for the good of the community, without charge for their services. As soon as the cost is figured up the price per bushel will be announced and the sale of the seed begun.

The seed is of the Acala variety and was purchased through the Tulia Chamber of Commerce. The Tulia people purchased a carload last year direct from the company that produced this variety, and the Tulia cotton this summer was exceedingly well in a dry year. The Hereford committee felt that in view of this showing, the fact that this cotton opens early and that it had been acclimated by one year in this section, it was the best seed that could be obtained for use here next year.

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"We will not be able to furnish any more of these seed at the same price as this car. The farmers here are waiting from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel for what they have left. And I found it no easy job to get this car at this price."

There is just 810 bushels of this seed on hand and with the constantly growing list of acreage there will not be enough to go around, in all probability. So the men who mean business and want the best seed under the circumstances should make application at once to Jones & McLean for the seed they need. There is no question but that those who delay the purchase of their seed will have to pay a higher price later on.

## C. O. LEE IS NOW LISTENING IN ON EVERYTHING GOING

The latest single listing made to date occurred this week when the firm of Sears & Powell of Lubbock authorized 400 acres. These people will operate the Will Gilbreath place west of Hereford.

The more acreage secured the easier it will be to secure that gin. A lot of people have been heard to declare that they intend to plant some cotton but won't list it. If everybody took that point of view there would be no gin here in 1923.

## Signal Honor Given Mayor Knight by His Friends

Splendid Stag Dinner by Mr. And Mrs. Edgar A. Johnson

A rare tribute by his closest friends to his sterling worth as a man and to his unselfish public service through the years to his community was paid Mayor William M. Knight Monday evening at his home with Mr. and Mrs. Edgar A. Johnson. The dinner, a stag affair, was tendered the Mayor by Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, with whom he has made his home for many years, and some twenty of the Hereford attorneys and other business men with whom he has been most closely associated here were accorded the privilege of a dinner fit for the Gods, an unusual social hour, and the opportunity to do honor to Hereford's outstanding citizen.

Mrs. Johnson, a famous cook, was assisted by Mrs. Homer Wilkinson, another celebrated exponent of the culinary art. Between them they prepared an indescribably good five course dinner in a kitchen which its admirers have called a "Food Laboratory—not an ordinary kitchen." The spacious dining room and long table were decorated in a color scheme of red and white. A Jerusalem Cherry tree, in full bloom, so far as known, the only one of its species in Hereford, graced the center of the table. Guests were presented with the largest and rarest of Carnations as favors. Name cards were placed at each plate. The arrangements and setting were perfect and dovetailed exactly into the harmony of the occasion.

Judge Jno. P. Slaton officiated as emcee with all his well-known ease and quiet directness of after dinner leadership. E. B. Black asked divine benediction upon the meal and the occasion, after which Judge Slaton briefly outlined the reason for the gathering and called upon G. A. F. Parker to tell what he knew about the most important of the evening. Mr. Parker, who was a friend of Mayor Knight years ago in Bosque county, recited a string of humorous anecdotes and stories involving the early history of Judge Knight that kept the others in an uproar for many minutes. Among others, he recounted a story of a political campaign in which Judge Knight was elected to the office of prosecuting attorney for Bosque county. In a job debate his opponent, a native-born son, apparently captured the audience with the statement that Judge Knight was a Yankee from New Hampshire, while he, the speaker, was born and reared in Bosque county and had never been outside its borders. However, Judge Knight turned the tables and won the victory by cleverly agreeing that he was from New Hampshire but that he had sense enough to stick out his chest and not on earth and above Mexico. Another bit was the story of how the speaker and Judge Knight were drinking at the same place and were waiting on at table by a self-willed but very efficient negro waiter. The negro was arrested for horse-stealing and the two friends agreed they could not afford to lose such a gem of a waiter, so decided to add him. Judge Knight acted as attorney and Mr. Parker as witness, and between them they freed the waiter. Next morning at breakfast the waiter remarked to Mr. Parker: "Boss, I see shore proud of the way you were?" Mr. Parker explained, solemnly, that the only testimony he had offered was that the negro was full-witted and therefore not responsible for his act.

Carl Gilliland spoke on the subject, "The Meanest and Crookedest Lawyers I have Known." W. H. Russell talked of "Our Neighboring Lawyers," W. E. Dameron paid tribute to "Our Civic Mayor," and Eli Dunlap fell the honor of speaking of "Our Host." The toasts were all brimming with a spirit of brotherly homage to the man with whom the speakers have labored long and earnestly in community, church, economic and personal teamwork and teamed with admiration for a man who, perhaps more than any other, has paid the largest share of his debt to the community in which he lives. The speakers stressed the point that Judge Knight has sacrificed his own personal fortunes for years to devote his endeavors to making Hereford a better place in which to live.

There was a call for the guest of the occasion and, rising to the occasion, Judge Knight spoke briefly and with evident deep feeling. He stated that he came to Hereford in 1907 and shortly afterwards took up his abode with Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, with whom he has resided since and to whom he expressed his gratitude for the pleasure and honor of the occasion. "He admitted that the Mayor's office had cost him much in dollars and cents but that a natural liking for civic work and his desire to contribute something to his community had held him to his task.
