Only 2 Per Cent of Men Called to Colors Seek Nonhazardous Positions

When men called under the selective service law reach the cantonments they are given, so far as practicable, their choice of Army service. Infantry is most often preferred, artillery second, engineer divisions are third in popularity, and quartermaster work fourth.

Investigations so far made by the committee on classification of personnel in the Army, which has the matter in charge, prove that only 2 per cent of the men attempt to secure non-hazardous positions.

Postmaster General Inaugurates Censorship of International Mail

A censor's label on all envelopes does not imply that the writer or the addressee is under suspicion, but that its examination is thought necessary in safeguarding the Government's interests.

Under authority of the trading with the enemy act, censorship of international mail has been established by the Postmaster General. The work will be conducted at New York, the Canal Zone, Porto Rico and other places where it may be necessary.

2,000 Inspectors Work to Protect Meat Supply for Soldiers and Sailors

All meats and meat products for the Army and Navy are obtained only from inspected establishments and bear the Government stamp "Inspected and Passed." This stamp means that every step in the process of preparing the meat has been under the constant supervision of trained inspectors. At the camps all products are re-inspected and laboratory analysis made to show that the foods have not been unduly injured by tampering.

Throughout the country there are 2,000 inspectors engaged in this work.

"Lightless nights" are planned by the Fuel Administration as an additional measure for saving coal.

The number of men now being served by American Red Cross canteens in France is more than 15,000 a day.

Gasoline production in the United States has increased from 35,000,000 to 70,000,000 barrels a year since 1914.

Base Hospitals for Work in France Take Full Equipment

A base hospital, several of which are already in operation overseas, consists of the people and material necessary to establish and operate a hospital without asking outside assistance except the provision of shelter. This usually means a deserted hotel, an empty village, a group of huts or a number of large and small tents.

The personnel of one hospital which is fully organized and waiting to be sent to France includes 24 physicians and surgeons, nearly all of whom are now on active duty at cantonments or hospitals in preparation for their future work. The nurses number 65, all having passed rigid examinations. There are 6 women stenographers and bookkeepers. Of the 153 enlisted men 65 are orderlies or male nurses, and the remaining 88 are clerks, bookkeepers, mechanics, and skilled laborers. The base hospital is a little world in itself and must have cooks, butchers, bakers, carpenters, engineers, etc.

The equipment for this one unit cost \$140,000.

Crops in Territories Increased to Aid Food Conditions Here

In Porto Rico, which formerly imported thousands of dollars worth of beans annually from the mainland, this product is now being exported. Part of the war emergency work of the Department of Agriculture has been to assist the Territories to become less dependent upon the mainland of this country for their supply of food. The Alaska stations have greatly increased the areas sown to grain and are able to meet increased demands for seed grain. The Guiana station is disturbing large quantities of seeds and plants for cultivation by the natives, and Hawaii has materially increased its production of food crops.

Public Lands to Be Opened for Cultivation in 1918 to Increase Food Supply

Hundreds of thousands of acres of lands in the United States, hitherto unutilized, may be placed under cultivation during 1918.

An inquiry by the Department of the Interior shows that approximately 600,000 acres on various reclamation projects and an area of Indian lands almost as large are susceptible of cultivation.

The war has called back into service nearly 500 retired officers of the Navy and 138 former officers who resigned to enter civil life, including 22 rear admirals, 18 commodores, and 34 captains.

Retail dealers of insecticides are exempt from the licensing regulations covering trade in white arsenic and arsenic insecticides. The only companies required to obtain licenses are wholesalers and jobbers.

Camp Travis, Texas, Dec. 24.—Experience of thousands of members of the National Army upon reporting for duty at Camp Travis has developed some "don'ts" that may be timely for the second contingent of men selected to serve their country.

Don't overload with underwear, socks, shirts, etc. Uncle Sam issues underwear and socks and you must wear the kind issued, so that your other articles will have to be disposed of or returned to your home.

Three bath towels and as many face towels is more than enough. Don't bring a half dozen of each or more. They will be in your way.

Don't wear a good hat or one that you want to keep. It is well to bring your shaving and toilet articles. A soap box is almost necessary.

Get a "housewife" or some needles, Olive Drab thread and a few lachlor buttons for underwear, etc.

Bed clothes will not be needed. Bed sack, blankets and quilts are issued by the Government.

ABOUT THOSE CHILDREN OF YOURS

One word to the women of America who live peaceful lives in happy homes.

Let us draw a picture for you of a scene at Evian, in France. Six hundred and eighty Belgian children are leaving a train—thin, sickly, from four to twelve years of age—children of men who refused to work for the Germans.

Another picture—it appeared in the illustrated papers recently. It showed an English widow with her eight children and the wording underneath ran as follows: "If the mother recovers from her injuries she will have six less mouths to feed—a bomb smashed their poor little home to pieces."

Would you care to think of such scenes as are described in these words: "All along the Piave River (in Italy) last night we could hear the screams of women in the hands of the Germans?"

Proposals to save coal by closing schools in Northern and Central States during January and February have not been met with favor by the Fuel Administration.

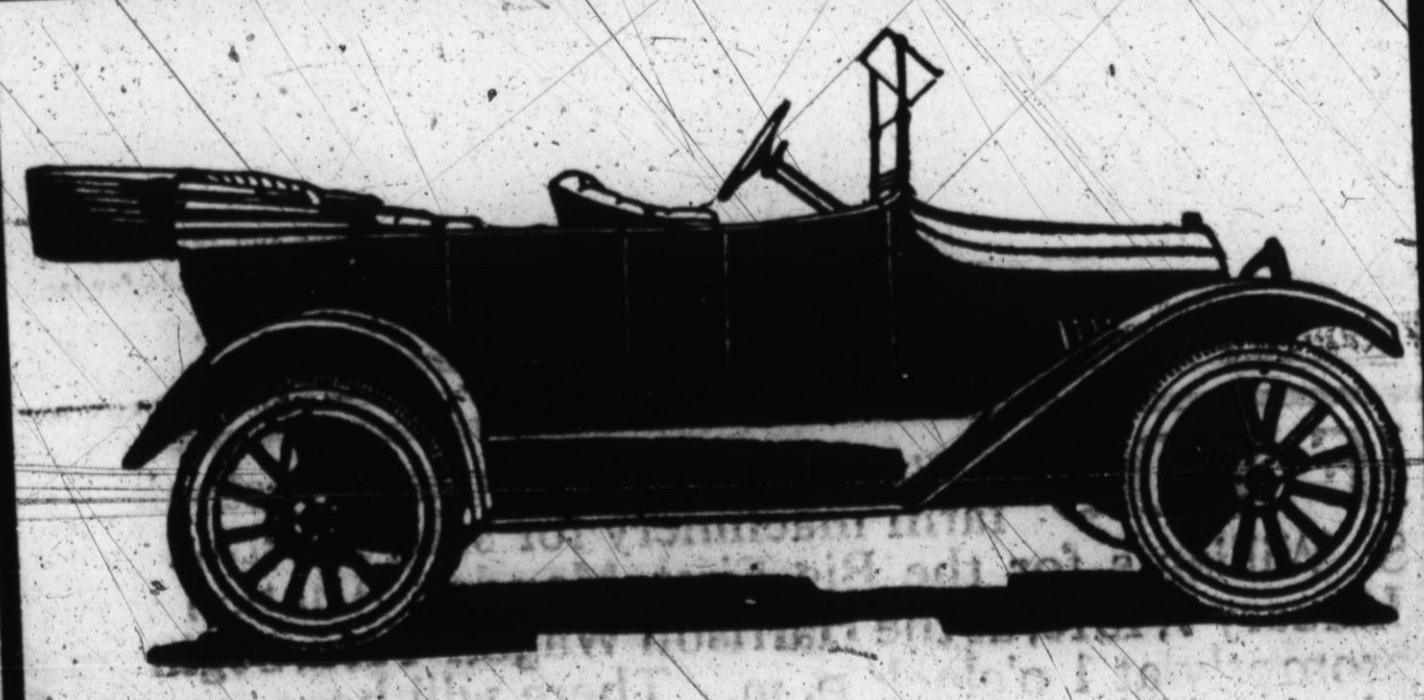

ARCH COLLINS IS MARRIED XMAS DAY

Announcement has been made of the marriage, on Christmas Day, at the home of the bride's parents in Cleburne, Texas, of Arch Collins of Hereford and Miss Loretta Milam.

The groom is a son of Mrs. R. Collins of Hereford, and brother of Mrs. R. T. Evans. The bride formerly was a teacher in the Hereford public schools and numbers her Hereford friends by the score.

The newly-weds will go to New Orleans on the honeymoon trip, and will be at home in Hereford after the first of March, 1918.

The latest official figures put the number of enlisted men in the army of the United States at one million three hundred and sixty thousand.

Most of them are still in the training camps. Many of them are not yet equipped with arms, and are still in the process of being drilled.

But there are 1,380,000 of them already trained, and the biggest fact is that the army is growing with the approach of 1918.

To lead them there are over 80,000 officers. When the graduates of the second training camp get their first orders, the number will be over 100,000.

The whole military establishment, with the marine and the auxiliary forces, has in numbers a million and a half.

Since 1905, in the nation and a half of the United States, there has been a great increase in the number of American boys who have been brought into the Federal Army in the Civil War.

It is the hope of the Allies that another new force, ten to twelve times as great, will be fought in the fourth year of the war to insure victory.

If it is not enough, America has the men and the machinery to make a greater effort.

tal engaged at any one time was reached in the last year of the war. On March 31st, 1865, the Union Army comprised 980,000 men.

For the Spanish War an army of 275,000 was raised. Only 60,000 saw service.

The present American Army is the largest army force the Western Hemisphere has ever seen - unless the Round Bayliffers were more numerous and pugnacious than we have any reason to believe they were.

When Great Britain entered the war it was with a much smaller army. The First Expeditionary Force numbered hardly a hundred thousand.

The Kaiser called it a contemptible little army. Yet without his work at Mons, he had thousands of men, and the encouragement they brought to the French, were enough to avert defeat in the first year of the war.

It is the hope of the Allies that another new force, ten to twelve times as great, will be fought in the fourth year of the war to insure victory.

If it is not enough, America has the men and the machinery to make a greater effort.
