## Union Revival, Christian Church, Starts Sunday, June 10

### WANTS CLEAN MORAL YOUNG MEN, ONLY

MAJOR TELLS BUSINESS MEN CLASS OF MEN GUARDS NEED

### ON RIGHT TRACK

New Officers Work for Personnel Attractive To Town

Major N. E. Bannister, representing the Adjutant General of the State and the commanding general of the Thirty Sixth Division, addressed the regular weekly meeting of the business men at lunch at the Stockmen's Cafe Monday. Major Bannister is here to spend several days assisting Captain Robert Elliott and Lieutenants Cliff Acker and Buford Farmer in shaping up the affairs of Company E of the National Guard and explained the present situation and the future outlook for the company Monday in concise, forceful and understandable language that made a hit with the diners.

Bolled down, the Major stated that in the past the local company had not measured up to the standards demanded by the national defense act, the adjutant general's office, the commander of the division, or of the people of Hereford but that now, under the leadership of the three young officers named above, there was a determined effort being made to enlist the company to the minimum of fifty required by law, provided that fifty men of the right kind of material could be interested, otherwise the company would be mustered out. He called attention to the dates for the annual encampment at Austin, July 16-30, and said that the company must number fifty, with thirty-nine attending camp, by that date or the company would be disbanded.

Concerning the advantages to be derived from maintaining the company here Major Bannister called attention to the fact that Uncle Sam would spend around \$5,000 annually here for pay, equipment, etc., to the fine physical training any boy would receive from the experience, and made a simple statement of the duty of every American to be prepared for defense in case of war. The speaker emphasized the fact that the government and state wanted a company here that stood for law enforcement, for sobriety, for morality, and one that the best women in the town could mingle and associate with socially. Otherwise, said the Major, there will be no company.

He appealed to the business men present to support the local officers in organizing that kind of a company, one that the entire town can be proud of, and invited anyone interested to attend the weekly drill and inspection on Wednesday night at the Armory.

President Wilkinson, in responding, told Mr. Bannister that the Chamber of Commerce had already gone on record as standing squarely behind that kind of a company and that the business men would unquestionably aid in any possible way in making the company a successful one.

The proposed discussion of the hospital puzzle was deferred to some future date. Routine matters passing through the office of the secretary were reported. ### Bug Man Hurried to Rescue But Bugs Were Absent

Government Man States Local Crops are Better Than Average

E. E. Russell, field entomologist for the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, stationed at Gainsville, Texas, came in Monday morning. Mr. Russell stated that a local farmer had wired the Department at Washington that the bugs were destroying the crops in this section and appealed for aid. Wherefore the Washington office wired Mr. Russell to come here at once and help in stopping the outbreak.

Mr. Russell was surprised to find that there were no bugs working here, beyond the usual quots that works every year, and was taken out to look of wheat and other small grain crops by Troy Womble. Upon his return Mr. Russell reported that the bugs were not doing any material damage and that the only trouble he found was some bad wheat caused probably from dry weather. He said this country's crops looked to the best, and in the best condition, of any he had seen on the trip here and that the people of this country should congratulate themselves on the outlook.

Tuesday morning Mr. Russell went out to the Hereford Nursery with G. A. F. Parker and expressed surprise and appreciation of the record fruit crop he found growing there. He started south in his car Tuesday afternoon.

### Here's Sure Shot For Dandelions—But be Careful!

The University of Wisconsin reports the discovery of an effective treatment for killing dandelions. The remedy is a simple spray made by dissolving 300 sulphate—commonly called "copperas" or "green vitriol"—in water at the rate of two pounds per gallon. Spray first in May, again in June and a third time in the fall. A gallon of spray should treat 800 square feet of lawn.

Care should be exercised, however, in getting the proportions exactly right, as too strong a solution has been known to kill the grass as well as the dandelions.

### TIMELY RAIN HOLDS CROPS FOR A TIME

THREE TENTHS IN CITY BUT HEAVIER OVER OTHER PARTS

### IS GENERAL, TOO

Reports Indicate That the Whole Panhandle is Given Wetting

With the small grain crops just at the stage where they had to have it, the heavens clouded up fiercely Monday afternoon and in the late afternoon, ushered in with a fierce gust of wind, a light rain began to fall. It continued slowly during the first part of the night but did not amount to near as much as the promise given by the clouds. The official register showed three-tenths of an inch Tuesday morning in Hereford.

From reports coming from all directions the rain was general over this territory from New Mexico to Amarillo and from the Rock Island to below Dimmitt. It rained hard west up to within two miles this side of the Wagner place, and from that point on into Hereford it was light. While not enough by any manner of means, it came just in the nick of time and extended another ten days grace to the small grain farmers of this section.

The sky was bright Tuesday but there were indications on the horizon that more may come any minute. The Amarillo News of Tuesday morning had the following to say about the rain over the Panhandle:

General heavy rains fell throughout the Panhandle early last night. An inch and a half fell in Amarillo in the form of almost a cloudburst at 6 o'clock, while precipitation ranging from one-half to an inch was reported from nearly every Panhandle town.

The rain was heaviest in Amarillo and to the north, the South Plains section receiving but light showers, however heavy rains fell in that territory Sunday and Sunday night.

The moisture is sufficient to guarantee a fair wheat crop. Grain will mature during the next two and three weeks on the precipitation received last night, and those in position to know, claim a fair yield will be harvested. In some localities it will be above normal.

The streets of Amarillo were flooded by the downpour received there. Pedestrians were troubled to get from one curb to another for an hour or longer as in parts of the city the streets resembled rivers.

Rails of the street car system were washed apart at Seventh and Jackson Streets and traffic was delayed for an hour.

So deep was the water at Sixth and Fillmore Streets, in front of the News office, that a half dozen automobiles were unable to ford the intersection and were stalled.

Points west in the Dalhart-Texico region reported one-half to three-quarters of an inch. Panhandle had an inch, Pampa the same amount, Miami three-quarters of an inch, Canadian a half inch. Higgins reported a "good shower" and points south and east reported fair rains.
