One farmer says his silo day. had investigated the former administration to cut his feed bill to less than half such extent that it would not sanction a return what it formerly was and milk to that system, adding that while the costs of production increased also. administration were lower, that little investigation had been made to dettermine whether or not relief was granted to only those persons who were entitled to relief. Williams said that the federal government would pay the cost of administering the relief money leaving the state funds free to go 100 percent to those in need.

The statement that the federal government is willing to pay the cost of administering the relief money is one that will be welcomed by Knox County and others of like size. Under the present system a part of the cost of disbursing the relief money is borne by the county. The secretary is paid \$12 a week out of the county funds.

Inasmuch as the purpos eof voting state bonds was to relieve the counties and cities of the strain of charity, the use of county funds for this purpose is inconsistant with the wishes of those who voted for the state bond issue.

Because the people of the county are paying duplicate taxes, taxes to the federal government for the federal unemployment money, and state taxes to retire the bond issue for the same purpose, it is not their desire to be further taxed by the county for this work.

Under the old system of disbursing federal funds, the cost of secretary hire was only about \$4.50 a week and paid out of federal funds as it should be. With county finances in the shape they now are, and with the vast amount of federal and state funds to be used for the express purpose of aiding the unemployed, it is rediculous that the county should be called on to bear this expense.

PAY THE MERCHANTS

Because people in Benjamin are mainly old timers that have lived here since the days when the cattle industry was the only one, they demand of the merchants a service which merchants in other places do not extend their customers-liberal credit. In the old days people paid their bills once a year when they sold the cattle. They still expect longer credit that fifteen or thirty days. But heyt further expect merchandise to be sold here as cheaply as the cash merchants. It can't be done. Pay the local merchants an dthey can sell their goods as cheap or cheaper than the other merchants.


