## City's hands tied by law, AG on taking bids

The Hereford City Commission would much rather award a bid to a local business when possible, but commissioners can't break the law, City Manager Darwin McGill said Monday.

McGill defended the commission's action after citizen complaints and a **Hereford Brand** editorial criticized the City for awarding the contract for a pickup last week to an Amarillo dealer when the difference in low bid and the local dealer's bid was just \$37.10.

The state law provides for competitive bidding and states the contract must go to the lowest

responsible bidder. All other things being equal, the bid must go to the low bidder. "Whether we like it or not, that means even if it's a difference of one cent," said McGill.

The city manager referred to an Attorney General's opinion (H-1086) which concludes that "a city or county may not reject a low bid solely because the bidder is not a local merchant or businessman."

In the AG opinion, the following statement regarding competitive bidding was made by the Court of Civil Appeals: "Its purpose is to stimulate competition, prevent favoritism and secure the best work and materials at the lowest practica-

ble price, for the best interests and benefit of the taxpayers and the property owners. There can be no competitive bidding in a legal sense where the terms of the letting of the contract prevent or restrict competition, favor a contractor or material-man."

Bids may not necessarily go to the low bidder if they do not meet specifications or if other evaluations determine that the low bidder is not responsible. However, in the case of the vehicles, McGill pointed out that the city does not have to go to Amarillo for new vehicle warranty service. "It must be provided by the local authorized dealer."

McGill said the city commission always eyes bids for any evaluation that would permit the bid to be let to a local firm. "We also service all our vehicles here after the warranty expires." The city manager produced records which showed the city spent last year in excess of \$10,000 with one local dealer, \$8,000 with another, and \$6,000 with the third. The city also purchased four police cars from one dealer and a pickup from another last year on low bids.

"I know the law and I don't want to put myself or the commission in a position of violating the bidding procedures," said McGill. He also pointed out that a new law, effective Sept. 1, 1989, makes it a Class B misdemeanor to "circumvent the competitive bidding requirements by any means."

If a taxpayer seeks an injunction on a bid contract and a city or county official or employee is convicted of avoiding competitive bidding, it results in immediate removal of the person from office or employment.

Also, for four years after the final conviction, the person is ineligible to: be a candidate for a public office in Texas; be appointed to a public office; be employed by the government he/she was working when the violation occurred; or receive any compensation from a contract with that government.

## CHOF studies Kerrville site

A study committee for the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center visited Kerrville Saturday to learn more about a proposal to move the museum to that city.

Kerrville officials approached Hall of Fame directors in January about including the CHOF museum in a 4C Complex Center, which would include the Cowboy Artists of America Museum, the National Comanche Museum, and the Cowgirl Hall of Fame, along with a 10,000- to 15,000-seat coliseum.

They also toured some major businesses in Kerrville.

Other committee members who made the visit were Formby, Donald Hicks, board chairman; Roland Saul, Ron Weishaar, and Jackie Hammett. Study-group members Betty Drake, Joan Coupe and Bill Allen did not attend.

H.E. Miller, president of the 4C Complex Committee and former Hereford resident, said the project has been in the planning for several years. "Having the Cowgirl Hall of Fame located here next to the Cowboy Artist of America Museum, a major Indian museum and a coliseum that is unique in design and function would be very beneficial to its longterm survival."

The estimated \$50 to \$60 million complex will be paid for with grants, fundraisers and gifts, according to Miller. He said the committee's concept was to have the entire complex paid for when it opens. He added that Kerrville "has an abundance of talent and money we can call on to develop these types of projects."

Margaret Formby, CHOF president, said the study committee will meet Friday to discuss what is best for the future of the museum. "There are many steps to be made and much discussion and deliberation before any decision can be made."

Roger Eades, chairman of the study committee, said the group visited the site of the proposed complex in Kerrville after being welcomed by the mayor, chamber of commerce and museum officials.

## County takes Plains bid

Plains Insurance Agency was awarded the bid for the county's insurance needs Monday by the Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Court.

Sheriff Joe Brown said that he would wait for more budget money because he wants to buy a patrol car.

Water is leaking into the library's basement. Commissioner Austin Rose is in charge of investigating the problem and getting it fixed.

## Mandela welcomed back to Soweto

SOWETO, South Africa (AP) - Throngs of wildly cheering and singing blacks gave Nelson Mandela a hero's welcome today as he returned to his hometown after 27 years in prison for taking up arms against white-minority rule.

Joy rocked the huge soccer stadium as Mandela walked in, waving and smiling at the ecstatic crowd of at least 120,000 people. For most in the frenzied crowd, it was their first sight of the man most blacks consider their leader.

"Mandela. Mandela," the crowd roared as he slowly walked around the field, flanked by top leaders of his African National Congress and other anti-apartheid groups. Thousands of screaming people shot their fists into the air and danced as Mandela passed them, returning the clenched fist salute. "God bless Africa," the crowd sang in rolling cadences as Mandela stood on a podium set up at one end of the field. Mandela, 71, raised his fist in the air and joined in the anthem of the anti-apartheid movement.

"I am so happy. I am proud because how long have we been waiting for Nelson Mandela. We are near to get what we are hoping for - freedom," said spectator Tebello Pooe in broken English.

The event was not televised live in South Africa, as Mandela's release Sunday had been.

## Survey finds fidelity is in

NEW YORK (AP) - This just in for Valentine's Day: nine of 10 people in a survey claimed they had never been unfaithful, and four of five said they would marry the same person again, given the chance.

The Gallup survey, commissioned by Psychology Today and two television shows, King World's Inside Edition and ABC's Home Show, was released Monday.

Three of four respondents said their spouse is their best friend, and 64 percent said their marriage was "very happy."

Pollsters contacted 657 randomly selected, married men and women nationwide shortly before Christmas. The margin of error was plus or minus 4 percentage points.

The report on the findings, by the Rev. Andrew M. Greeley and T. George Harris, called the widespread belief that married people are often unfaithful an example of "pluralistic ignorance - erroneous, cognitive beliefs shaped by some individuals about other individuals."

The report also put forth the theory "the availability of divorce for those who are unhappy has increased the average level of happiness in the pool of couples who remain married."

The survey attributed marital happiness primarily to three factors:

communication; cooperation in housework, child rearing and respect of each other's work; and romance. For instance:

-71 percent said they're trying very hard to improve their marriage.

-55 percent of male respondents and 47 percent of female strongly believe their spouse is romantic.

-39 percent said they work very hard to improve their sex life.

-53 percent of women respondents and 47 percent of men strongly agreed that their spouse is a skilled lover.

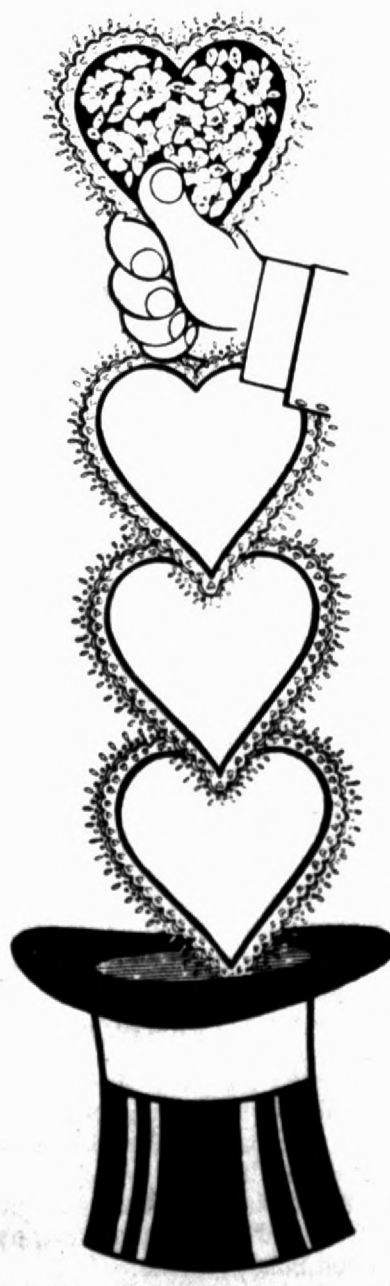
-32 percent of women and 26 percent of men said their spouse is imaginative about sex.

The survey found so much bliss in America that 10 percent of the respondents agreed strongly their spouse is sometimes "like a god" to them. Eighteen percent of women agreed at least somewhat with the statement - and 37 percent of men did.

Other findings:  
-81 percent of men and 72 percent of women strongly believe their spouse is good looking.

-82 percent believe their spouse is good with children, and 63 percent strongly disagree that children take the fun out of marriage.

-70 percent disagree that as "the years go on, much of the fun goes out of marriage."



## MEANWHILE... Ivana, Donald Trump bickering after split

NEW YORK (AP) - He built a billion-dollar empire of hotels and real estate, owns a casino and an airline that bear his name, and wrote a best seller called "The Art of the Deal."

But the art of making a marriage work appears to have eluded Donald Trump. He and his wife, Ivana, have split after nearly 13 years of marriage - proving once again that money can't buy you love.

In fact, money is a source of contention between the two, despite a prenuptial agreement under which she was to get custody of their three children, the Greenwich, Conn., mansion, and \$25 million.

Trump, 43, is worth considerably more - \$1.7 billion to \$4 billion, depending on who's counting.

Ivana's lawyer, Michael Kennedy, issued a statement Monday saying: "We do not consider the so-called prenuptial agreement to be serious. It will have no relevance to a court because it is unconscionable and fraudulent."

In response, Donald's spokesman said: "The prenuptial agreement signed by Donald and Ivana Trump is a long and detailed document which covers all aspects and is 100 percent enforceable in courts of law. The agreement they have was updated approximately two years ago. Prior to that, this agreement has been updated on numerous other occasions throughout the years."

While lawyers and image-makers battle it out with press releases, tabloids and TV stations - always enamored of the tuxedoed Trump and the bejeweled, begowned Ivana - lap it up.

The New York Post today reported that Donald locked Ivana out of her office Monday at the Plaza Hotel.

The Post, citing unidentified sources, also reported that some of Ivana's jewelry is missing.

Trump had given her the jobs of running the Plaza and the Trump Castle in Atlantic City, N.J., for a salary, as he put it, of "One dollar plus all the dresses she can buy."

It was not clear whether Ivana, a former Czechoslovakian ski racer and sometime model who turns 41 next week, will continue with her hotel work.

### World/National

**MOSCOW** - In its revolutionary new platform, the ruling Communist Party throws Marxist economic theory to the wind by abandoning private property, backing a strong presidency that would further erode the party's power, and declaring itself in favor of a bill of rights to protect the individual against abuses by the state.

**WASHINGTON** - President Bush is hailing "solid progress" on arms talks but standing firm on his troop cut proposal despite Mikhail S. Gorbachev's contention that it would leave the Soviet Union outmanned in Europe.

**WASHINGTON** - The Bush administration, trying to meet a tight deadline for a new trade agreement with the Soviet Union, is coming under growing pressure to relax restrictions on the sale of high technology products to Eastern Europe.

**JOHANNESBURG, South Africa** - After two days of waiting, tens of thousands of people are expected to fill a Soweto soccer stadium and give a hero's welcome to Nelson Mandela, who spends the night in an undisclosed location.

**BONN, West Germany** - The leaders of the two German states begin a crucial series of closed-door talks on how and when unification should occur. The pace of unity and questions over military allegiances could lead to major disputes.

**NEW YORK** - The government reportedly moved in to deal with a financial crisis by the investment firm Drexel Burnham, whose meteoric growth and criminal behavior helped characterize Wall Street in the 1980s.

**SELMA, Ala.** - Black students who paralyzed public education in this landmark city of the civil rights movement ended their five-day sit-in, allowing schools that had been shut down almost a week to reopen today. But the racial turmoil seems far from being resolved.

**WASHINGTON** - George Bush is no stranger to danger in Colombia. Eight years ago, as vice president, he escaped an apparent assassination plot in which a load of dynamite was buried under the lone runway at the Bogota international airport.

**HOUSTON** - Jurors in the longest civil trial in Harris County history cleared a chemical company of any liability in a lawsuit brought by homeowners contending the company dumped dangerous materials near their neighborhood.

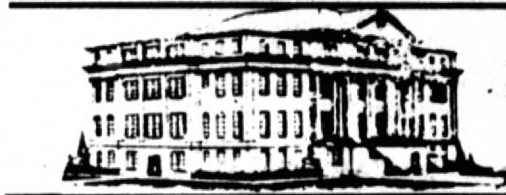

## Duggan sentenced

Dorman Duggan, 43, of Hereford was fined \$500 and given a probated sentence on Feb. 7 after pleading guilty to criminal trespass in connection with a May 17, 1989 anti-abortion protest in Lubbock.

Lubbock County Court-at-Law Judge Will Dodson gave Duggan a 180-day sentence and probated it for 180 days. That means Duggan will not have to serve jail time if he maintains the terms of his probation.

Duggan was one of 29 people arrested during the protest in front a Lubbock clinic.

Duggan told the court he did not intend to be arrested when he went to Lubbock for the protest, but felt compelled to join in after his arrival.

Prosecutor Denise Williams told the court that duggan broke the law and came from out of town to do it.

## Stalin's 'purgues'

**MOSCOW (AP)** - The KGB secret police said in a report today that three-quarters of a million citizens were shot to death as enemies of the Soviet state from 1930 to 1953, the years of Stalinist terror.

The figure does not include the millions who died in labor camps and prisons or in the famines instigated by Stalin during his collectivization of agriculture, but it represented the first time the KGB has given any figure for the number of Stalin's victims.

Many Western sources say more than 10 million people were killed in Stalin's reign of terror.

Under President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's reforms, government commissions and the KGB have been ordered to find the truth about Stalin's terror and rehabilitate those who were sentenced.

Gorbachev's KGB director, Vladimir A. Kryuchkov, has vowed to never again permit the KGB to be involved in the terror its predecessors unleashed on the Soviet public.

The official Tass news agency quoted a KGB committee as saying a review of its archives determined that 3,778,234 people had been sentenced for counter-revolutionary or crimes against the state from 1930 to 1953, the year Stalin died.

It said 786,098 of them, including many top state and party leaders, scientists, military leaders and cultural figures, had been shot to death.

Feel Good About You

Feeling well is important to us in accepting and making the best use of the challenges and opportunities of life; but it is even more important that we "feel good" about ourselves, that we have a good self-image. It is very important that "you feel good about you". This cannot be accomplished by the use of artificial stimuli, and you must not permit it to be contingent upon how others feel about you. In fact, when "you feel good about you" others are more likely to feel good

about you. To a great extent, others take you at your own estimate.

The better you feel about you, the better you are likely to feel about others; about your work; about your life situation; and about everything else. This does not mean that everything is as it should be, or as you wish things to be; however, it does mean that you can make your life effective and enjoyable.

Unfortunately, some of the good principles taught in our culture are not taught with the correct balance. When "you feel good about you", you have not rejected the prohibition against selfishness, you have not ceased to care about others, you have not

become arrogant, or boastful, or obnoxious to other people. In fact, you will have become more desirable and useful. "To learn how to be good to oneself is often more difficult than learning how to be good to others." - J. Liebman. The basic truth is, if you are not good to yourself, you are not likely to be good to others.

To "feel good about you", you accept yourself but continue your best efforts to make indicated improvements; you are diligent in wise control of speech and action; you make sure that your expectations are reasonable; you are fully aware of and thankful for your blessings; and you do not measure yourself by others.

The Rebels held a 25-11 lead at the end of the first quarter behind 10 points from Joseph Schneiderjan.

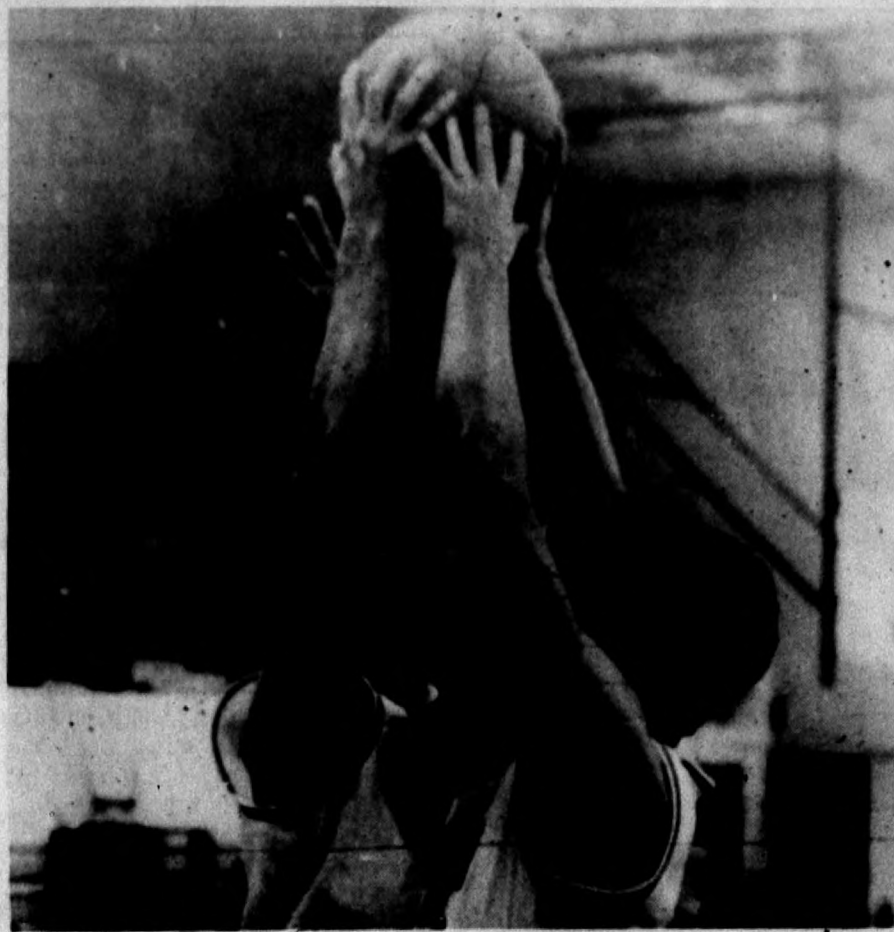
Tascosa opened the second period by scoring the first eight points and built the margin to 28 while outscoring the Herd 23-10 in the period for a 48-21 halftime advantage.

The only people to be allowed at the game will be officials, players, coaches, school administrators and reporters.

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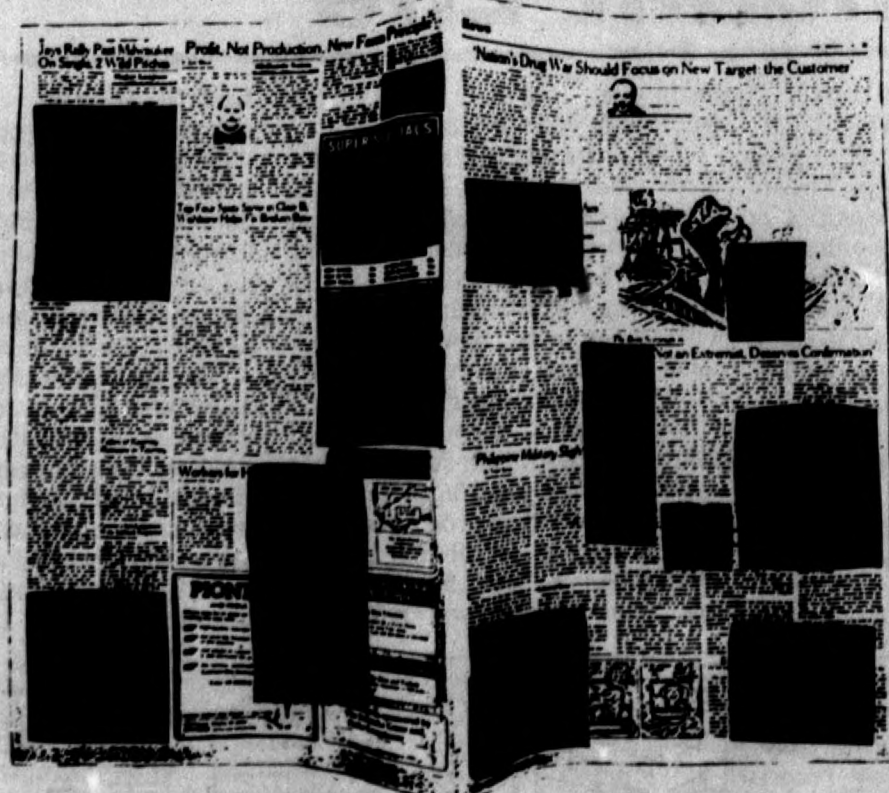

Arizona State ended Texas' four-game win streak with a 6-3 victory in

the opener of their weekend series, but Texas rebounded with 11-4 and 9-5 victories.

HEIDELBERG, West Germany (AP) - Despite a broken right thumb that will keep her from playing tennis for about six weeks, Steffi Graf says she will be back in time to continue her quest for a second Grand Slam.

Graf, the world's top-ranked woman player, learned on Monday that surgery won't be required on the thumb, which was injured when she fell last week while on skis, apparently trying to evade photographers at the Swiss resort of St. Moritz. During her convalescence, she will be unable to swing a racket for about six weeks.

She was in St. Moritz for filming of a bit part in a movie.

After conferring with doctors at the Heidelberg University Hospital, where she was examined last Thursday, Graf said she thinks she will be ready to play in the French Open starting May 28.

Graf has withdrawn from two tournaments in Florida next month, the Florida Virginia Slims and the Players International.

"I'll be staying in Heidelberg for treatment of my injury," she said, and will use the enforced break from tennis as a vacation. Her agent said she will fulfill all her sponsor commitments during her absence from the court.

"What we would like to do is have her concentrate solely on her tennis when she comes back and have her non-court interests taken care of by that time," said Phil de Picciotto, Graf's representative at Advantage International in Washington, D.C.

Graf opened her bid for her second Grand Slam last month by winning her third Australian Open title.

In 1988, she swept the Australian, French, Wimbledon and U.S. Open titles to become the first player since Margaret Court in 1970 to achieve the Grand Slam. Last year, Graf was upset in the French final by Spain's Arantxa Sanchez but won the other three titles.

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# Villanova keeps hold on Syracuse

With a 14-12 record, Villanova probably won't be invited to the NCAA Tournament. But if the Wildcats can arrange to meet Syracuse in the finals of the Big East tourney, they may wind up with an automatic bid.

Little more than a month after handing Syracuse its first defeat of the season and ending the Orangemen's six-week reign as the nation's No. 1-ranked team, Villanova, which hasn't been in the Top 25 this season, stunned the nation's No. 4 team again with a 60-56 victory Monday night.

Chris Walker made a 3-pointer with 1:11 to play, then hit the first of two free throws for a 58-56 lead with 12.2 seconds left. Lance Miller sealed the

victory with a pair of free throws to snap a six-game winning streak for Syracuse (18-4, 8-4 Big East).

"It really wasn't a planned shot," Walker said of his game-winning basket. "I really didn't want a 3-pointer, but the guys left me open. Billy (Owens) stayed in and I just took the shot."

In other Top 25 games, it was No. 6 Duke 102, Stetson 67; No. 7 UNLV 69, Fresno State 64; No. 14 La Salle 93, St. Joseph's 76 and No. 21 Michigan State 80, Iowa 70.

Although Walker scored the key points down the stretch, the big man for Villanova (14-12, 6-7) was Rodney Taylor, who came off the bench to score 17 points and grab 10 of the Wildcats' 20 offensive rebounds.

Villanova trailed 29-25 at halftime, shooting only 28 percent to Syracuse's 39 percent. For the game, the Wildcats shot only 32 percent to 38 percent for the Orangemen but made 23 of 35 free throws while Syracuse made eight of 16.

Greg Woodard had 14 points and Walker 10 for Villanova. Derrick Coleman had 18, Owens 17 and Stephen Thompson 13 for Syracuse. No. 6 Duke 102, Stetson 67.

Duke reached the 20-victory mark for the seventh consecutive season as Alaa Abdelnaby scored 18 points and Christian Laettner added 17.

Stetson kept pace for a while, taking a four-point lead midway through the first half and trailing 44-37 at the intermission. But the Blue Devils took

control early in the second half and blew the game open despite the loss of leading scorer Phil Henderson, who sprained his left ankle in the first half and may be out for as long as a week.

With Henderson out, freshman Bill McCaffery scored all 12 of his points in the first 10 minutes of the second half to help Duke open a 72-52 lead.

Duke had two other players in double figures - Robert Brickley and Brian Davis with 13 apiece. Stetson was led by Frank Ireland's 13 points.

No. 7 UNLV 69, Fresno St. 64.

Larry Johnson scored 23 points and David Butler added 22 for the Runnin' Rebels, who trailed most of the first half and traded leads in the second half.

UNLV led 63-61 with 1:52 remaining and Johnson, Anderson Hunt and Barry Young made baskets in the final 1:30 to nail down the victory. Tod Bernard had 16 points and Wilbert Hooker and Dave Barnett 13 each for Fresno State.

UNLV starting guard Greg Anthony was carried from the court with a broken jaw with 13:41 remaining in the first half after crashing to the floor while driving for the basket. Reserve guard Stacey Cvijanovich separated a shoulder and Butler sprained a knee.

No. 14 La Salle 93, St. Joseph's 76. Lionel Simmons moved into seventh place on the NCAA career scoring list despite a season-low 12 points but Doug Overton scored 26,

reserve Bobby Johnson added a season-high 24 and La Salle rallied in the final 12 minutes.

St. Joseph's led 59-52 with 11:48 left and 65-63 with 6:41 to go. La Salle then went on a 20-2 run.

Simmons' 12 points gave him 2,919 for his career.

No. 21 Michigan State 80, Iowa 70. Kirk Manns tied his Big Ten record of eight 3-point baskets and scored 30 points as Michigan State won its fourth consecutive game. The Spartans scored 10 of the final 12 points of the first half for a 34-26 lead and began the second half with a 9-2 spurt.

Manns, shooting 47 percent this season from 3-point range, made eight of 13.

## Sixteen schools appeal new UIL district assignments

AUSTIN (AP) - Sixteen schools have appealed recent district assignments to the University Interscholastic League District Assignment and Review Board, which scheduled a Tuesday meeting.

Each school will have 15 minutes to appeal district assignments announced Feb. 1 by the UIL.

None of the 16 schools, including five Class 5A schools, have asked to change conferences. Travel is the reason given by most schools for wanting to change districts.

If a school wins an appeal from the six-member committee, the district it would leave or the district it would enter can appeal that decision Feb. 20.

The 5A schools that have asked to change districts include San Antonio Southwest, San Antonio Southside, Houston Forest Brook and Houston Smiley.

Also, Pflugerville, which was elevated from 4A to 5A, has asked to be moved into the six-member Austin district and out of a district that would have the Panthers traveling as far as Waco.

## Sides mum about talks

NEW YORK (AP) - Something's going on in the baseball negotiations, but what?

Donald Fehr, the players' union head, wasn't saying after Monday's 45-minute session. Chuck O'Connor, chief negotiator for the owners, wasn't talking about it, either.

The sides were, for them, strangely quiet about what transpired. From the tone of their respective statements, something did happen.

"I'm not going to characterize it," Fehr said.

"I'm not going to characterize it, either," O'Connor said.

Commissioner Fay Vincent joined Monday's talks, the 20th session since negotiations began Nov. 28. He had talked with the parties in three

meetings last week.

"He'll be part of the solution," O'Connor said. "At this time, the commissioner is a part of the process. I guess he would characterize his role, as would I, as full-time."

Whatever happened, Fehr didn't seem impressed.

"It's my impression we're where we were yesterday and the day before and the day before," he said. "But I didn't expect any breakthroughs today."

There's almost no chance spring training will start on time Thursday, when pitchers, catchers and injured players could begin reporting voluntarily. Management's Player Relations Committee said on Jan. 9 that camps would not open until

agreement is reached with the union on a new contract.

Another meeting was scheduled today.

"It is now an almost virtual certainty it will happen," Fehr said of the owners' planned lockout. "It's not my impression that the situation has changed at all."

"I don't have any reason to disagree with Don as far as logistics go," O'Connor said. "I have no reason to believe this can be settled quickly, but I am always optimistic when we're talking."

Fehr sounded less than optimistic. He said most players had stopped attending the bargaining sessions because they thought they were "a colossal waste of time."

Monday's session was to have been held in secret, with no press briefing.

But reporters staked out at the offices of the union and of the PRC, and it was decided the sides would speak after the session, which was held at a hotel across the street from the PRC.

"I think the 45 minutes was what both sides needed," O'Connor said. "The tenor remains business-like and civil."

O'Connor, ever the optimist, said that camps could begin to fill with players very soon after an agreement was reached.

"There are players who live near the camps and could be ready to go," he said.

## Ask Dr. Lamb

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** I read your HEALTH LETTER on Gaseous Distention. I had some tests run the other day and I found out why I was having severe pain in the right chest for the last 10 years. You were right. I have a spastic colon.

Now I need your advice on what to eat and how to care for this. My doc has put me on two medications to help heal it, but he didn't tell me what else to do to take care of it - diet or what kinds of food to eat while it is healing?

**DEAR READER:** You don't really have anything to heal. If you have an irritable bowel problem, you need to do what you can to stop the muscles in the colon from periodically going into a spasm. In a sense these are muscle cramps. They can cause frequent small bowel movements, diarrhea or constipation. Gaseous distention occurs because the gas that accumulates in the colon cannot be released.

The distended colon or the muscle spasms can cause pain in the abdomen or the chest - on either the right or left side. This condition is quite common and is often related to a person's diet and other habits. That is part of what the current concept of including more bulk in the diet is about. It is thought that this provides bulk in the colon and prevents overcontraction of the colon muscles to move a small undigested food residue along for elimination.

You need to look at your diet in terms of things that cause irritation. Milk intolerance is often a factor. Intolerance to various foods may be the underlying problem. Sometimes people learn what these foods are from repeated painful experiences and learn to avoid them.

Excess alcohol, coffee (with and without caffeine) and tea for others may cause spasms. I have discussed the role of foods and diet in Special Report 73, Irritable Bowel and Constipation, which I'm sending you to add to what you learned from the report on gaseous distention. Regular exercise, not smoking, eliminating nervous tension and even measures to train your bowel are also important in managing the irritable bowel syndrome.

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** I realize that frying in lard or animal shortening is bad for your cholesterol level. But what of non-meat foods such as fish, seafood, french fries and vegetables fried in cholesterol-free oil such as soya oil or peanut oil? Are they safe

or safer, even though they have been fried?

**DEAR READER:** Fried food is greasy food, whether it is fried meat or fried vegetables. For that reason fried foods are high in calories and can contribute to being overweight.

Too many calories, regardless of which kind, can cause your body to produce excess cholesterol. Frying in fats that are high in saturated fats is particularly bad as the excess saturated fats cause your body to produce LDL cholesterol which increases your risk of fatty-cholesterol deposits. So if you must fry, avoid the lard and the "vegetable oils" that are coconut oil, palm oil or palm kernel oil, even though these "vegetable oils" contain no cholesterol. Soybean oil and other oils low in saturated fat are preferable.

Incidentally, fish and shellfish belong to the meat group. They are just not red meat. If you want to limit the fat in your diet, or limit your calories, follow the three B's: bake, broil or boil - don't fry.

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** Will you explain how a person knows he has AIDS? Does she have a discharge or itch or have a rash or hurt in the vagina? Of all the magazines and papers I have read or what I have heard on TV no one has ever said or explained how it works or how you know if you have it. Explain how the beast of the East works and is it contagious from man to woman or woman to man and is anyone ever cured of it? Will it come back if it is cured?

**DEAR READER:** Sometimes the obvious is not stated and that leaves people confused. Most people infected with the AIDS virus do not know it in the early stages of the infection. That is one reason it is so dangerous. There is no way you can know if a potential sexual partner is infected or a carrier of the virus. That is why blood tests are essential in making the diagnosis.

The virus destroys the immune system so that people are susceptible to diseases they would normally not have, such as one form of pneumonia. The manifestations of AIDS may be the occurrence of some other disease.

The main way AIDS is transmitted in the United States is through sexual activity with someone who is infected with the AIDS virus - usually man to man and much less commonly from woman to man or man to woman. The other common method of spread is from the use of infected needles, such as by those who use intravenous drugs. Everyone should know very well how AIDS is transmitted for their own protection, and they should know you can have the virus and have no symptoms for years. You need to read Special Report 61, Sex and AIDS, which I'm sending you to clarify this. I would like to add that you can't get AIDS from someone who is not infected with the virus regardless of what your sexual habits might be. And you don't get AIDS from casual contact or even kissing.

At present there is no known cure for AIDS, only some promising medicines to control the virus for an undetermined period of time.

#### RASPBERRY SWIRL COFFEE RING

- 2 cups Bisquick baking mix
  - 1/2 cup sour cream
  - 3 tablespoons milk
  - 1/4 cup raspberry preserves
  - 1-3rd cup finely chopped nuts
  - Raspberry Glaze (recipe below)
- Heat oven to 400 degrees F. Grease a cookie sheet. Mix baking mix, sour cream and milk until dough forms. Gently smooth dough into a ball on a cloth-covered surface dusted with baking mix. Knead 10 times.

Roll into a 12-by-9-inch rectangle. Spread with the preserves; sprinkle with nuts. Roll up tightly, beginning at the 12-inch side. Seal well by pinching the edge of the dough into roll. Cut roll into twelve 1-inch slices. Place cut sides down in the shape of a heart on a greased cookie sheet. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Let stand 5 minutes; remove from pan. Cool on wire rack 20 minutes; drizzle with Raspberry Glaze. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

**Raspberry Glaze:** Mix 2-3rds cup powdered sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoons raspberry preserves, a few drops of vanilla or rum extract and 2 to 3 teaspoons of milk until smooth and of desired consistency. (Recipe from: General Mills)

#### NICK MALGIERI'S HAZELNUT TART

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 3 tablespoons cocoa
- 1/4 cup sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 4 tablespoons butter, chilled
- 1 egg
- Chocolate-hazelnut filling:
- 2 cups whole hazelnuts
- 6 tablespoons butter
- 1-3rd cup cocoa
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- Pinch of salt
- 2 tablespoons dark rum (optional)

To mix the dough, sift the dry ingredients together to combine them and eliminate any lumps. Rub in the butter and moisten with the egg and about 1 teaspoon water, if needed, as for sweet pastry dough. Shape into a disk, wrap and refrigerate.

For the filling, place the hazelnuts on a baking pan and toast at 350

degrees F for about 10 minutes or until the skin is loose and comes off easily. Rub the hazelnuts in a towel to remove the skins. Pick the hazelnuts from the flakes of skin, rubbing any to which the skin still adheres to loose it. Chop the hazelnuts coarsely, with a knife or food processor.

Melt the butter in a small saucepan and sift in the cocoa. Stir until smooth. Combine the corn syrup and sugar in a small saucepan. Bring to a full rolling boil over medium heat. Remove from heat and stir in the cocoa-butter mixture.

Beat the eggs and salt with the rum. Gradually beat in the cocoa mixture, taking care not to overbeat.

To assemble the tart, roll the dough on a floured surface to a disk 1/8-inch thick. Line an 11-inch, removable-bottom tart pan with the dough, trimming away the excess. Stir the chopped hazelnuts into the filling and pour the filling into the pan. Bake at 350 degrees F about 40 minutes, until the filling is set and the crust is baked through. Keep the tart loosely covered at room temperature. Makes one 10-inch tart. (Recipe from: Nick Malgieri, pastry chef, Peter Kump's Cooking School, New York City)

#### FUDGEY MICROWAVE BROWNIE PIE

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1-3rd cup cocoa
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chopped macadamia nuts (optional)

**Raspberry Sauce (recipe below)**  
Frozen vanilla yogurt  
Line a 9-inch microwave-safe pie plate with plastic wrap. In a small mixer bowl beat eggs; blend in sugar, butter and vanilla. Combine flour, cocoa and salt; stir in egg mixture. Stir in nuts, if desired. Pour batter into prepared pan. Microwave on medium (50 percent power) for 6 minutes. Rotate one-quarter turn. Microwave on high (100 power) 2 to 4 minutes or until top begins to dry; moist spots will remain around edges. Place plate on counter top. Cover with foil; let stand, covered, until completely cool. Cut into wedges; serve with frozen yogurt and raspberry sauce. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

**Raspberry sauce:** In food processor bowl or blender container, puree one 10-ounce package of frozen raspberries in light syrup, thawed. Strain through a fine sieve; discard seeds. Makes about 1 cup sauce.

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## Celebrate Valentine's Day with chocolate

NEW YORK (AP) - White chocolate, once considered a rare delicacy, can now be found in your local supermarket.

Marty Friedman, editor of New Product News, says white chocolate will be the "hot" chocolate for the 1990s. He lists white chocolate as one of the top 15 new food trends.

Unlike milk or dark chocolate, white chocolate does not contain the cocoa part of the bean; it is therefore not classified as chocolate in the United States. Instead, cocoa butter, milk solids, sugar and vanilla are the key ingredients in most white chocolate products.

White chocolate can be used in mousses, truffles, cheesecakes and fillings. It complements desserts that are spicy or slightly citrus in flavor.

"Glorious Chocolate," a new cookbook by Mary Goodbody and the editors of Chocolatier magazine (Simon & Schuster, \$29.95) contains white chocolate recipes for ice cream, cookies, muffins, cheesecakes and ganache.

Both Goodbody and Faye Levy, author of "Chocolate Sensations" (HP Books, \$25), caution consumers to make sure that the white chocolate products they buy contain cocoa butter, not palm oil or vegetable shortening.

The best method for melting and tempering white chocolate requires a hot water bath. Water is boiled in a large pan while the chocolate is finely chopped and placed in a metal mixing bowl. The heat is then turned off under the water, and the bowl of white chocolate is placed in the hot water. The chocolate is stirred constantly as it melts.

Nestle Foods, which introduced its first white chocolate product in the United States in 1984, has three white chocolate recipes for Valentine's Day:

### ALPINE WHITE MOUSSE

Two 6-ounce packages white chocolate baking bars, chopped  
1/4 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
3 egg whites  
1/4 teaspoon salt

1 cup heavy or whipping cream  
Combine baking bars and milk in a metal mixing bowl over hot (not boiling) water; stir until baking bars are melted and mixture is smooth. Stir in vanilla extract. Transfer mixture to large bowl; set aside 15 minutes.

In medium mixer bowl, combine egg whites and salt; beat until stiff peaks form. Gently fold egg whites into chocolate mixture.

In medium mixer bowl, beat cream until stiff peaks form. Gently fold into egg white mixture. Spoon mousse into individual serving dishes. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Makes 8 servings.

### RASPBERRY MOUSSE

1 1/2 cups fresh or frozen thawed raspberries, puréed  
One 6-ounce package white chocolate baking bars, chopped  
1/2 stick butter, softened  
1/2 cup sugar  
3 egg yolks  
1 cup heavy or whipping cream  
1/2 cup sugar

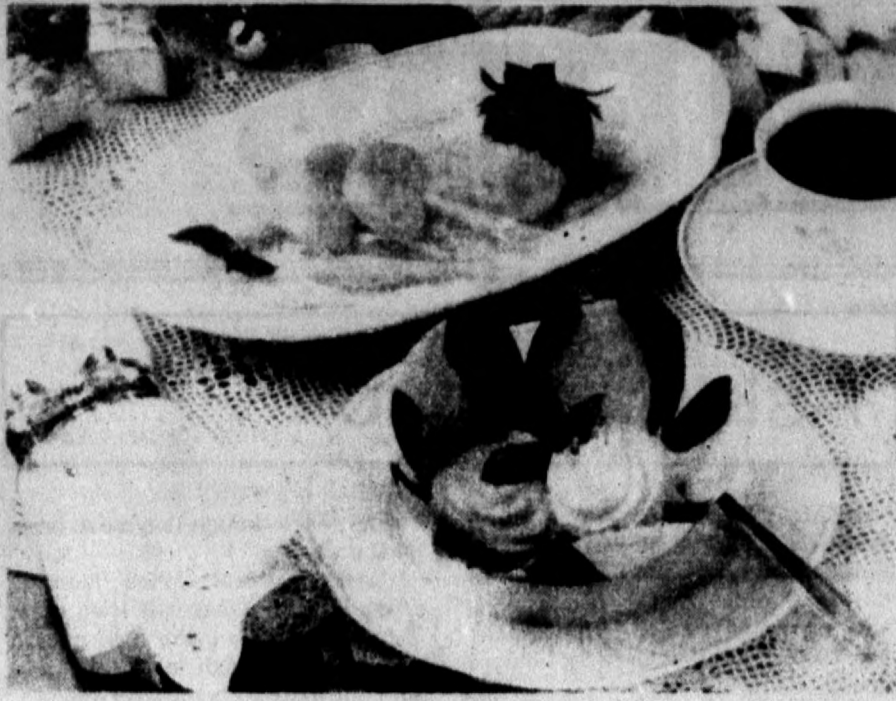
Press raspberry puree through a sieve to remove seeds. Combine baking bars, raspberry puree, butter and 1/2 cup sugar in a metal mixing bowl over simmering water; stir until baking bars, butter and sugar are melted and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat; stir in egg yolks. Transfer to small bowl and refrigerate until chilled, about 30 minutes.

In medium bowl, beat cream and remaining 1/2 cup sugar until stiff peaks form. Gently fold raspberry mixture into whipped cream. Spoon mousse into individual serving dishes. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Makes 8 servings.

### ALPINE WHITE DIPPED FRUIT

One 6-ounce package white chocolate baking bars  
1 teaspoon vegetable shortening  
Fresh fruit, such as strawberries, orange sections

Combine white chocolate baking bars and vegetable shortening in a metal mixing bowl over hot (not boiling) water. Stir until baking bars are melted and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat, but keep over warm water. Dip fruit into chocolate mixture; shaking off excess. Place on foil-lined cookie sheet; refrigerate until set, about 10 to 15 minutes. Gently loosen fruit from foil with metal spatula. Makes about 1/2 cup dip.
