Saddam pledges cooperation, UN officials are skeptical

UNITED NATIONS (AP) - Saddam Hussein has pledged cooperation with a new U.N. nuclear inspection team, but skeptical Security Council ambassadors are considering ways to guarantee Iraqi compliance.

Spurred by the threat of U.S. military action, the Iraqi president said the U.N. team due in Baghdad today would receive a complete accounting of all his nuclear sites and immediate access to them.

Saddam on Friday promised "prompt and unimpeded access will be ensured to the locations and items

designated for inspection ... in addition to guaranteeing the security and safety of members of the inspection team."

Iraqi Ambassador Abdul Amir al-Anbari said the list would be given to the inspectors in Baghdad on Sunday evening or Monday.

The White House said Friday that if Iraq violates the Persian Gulf War cease-fire agreement by hiding its nuclear sites, U.S. military force could be used to enforce compliance.

Saddam's declaration came in a reply sent to a request for full cooperation made Thursday by Secretary-General Javier Perez de

Cuellar.

Three times last week, Iraqi soldiers denied U.N. nuclear inspectors access to trucks loaded with equipment believed to be a crude device for enriching uranium to weapons-grade quality.

On the last inspection attempt on June 28, near the town of Fallujah, Iraqi troops fired over the heads of the U.N. inspectors to run them off.

The Security Council met privately Friday to hear a report on the incidents and on the talks that three top U.N. officials had with senior Iraqi officials who pledged their

government's full cooperation.

"We've heard that many times before," said the acting U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, Alexander Watson. "The proof of the pudding is in the eating."

The acting British ambassador, Thomas Richardson, said Saddam's statement left several major problems unresolved.

"What has happened to this missing material? ... The production of a list by the Iraqi authorities of items which might have been destroyed and which might or might not have been the same material that the inspection team saw on the 28th was simply not adequate," he said.

Rolf Ekeus, the executive chairman of the U.N. Special Commission to dismantle Iraq's weapons of mass destruction, told the Security Council that Baghdad claimed to have destroyed some nuclear equipment because it might have been banned under the Security Council's cease-fire resolution.

Hans Blix, the director-general of the International Atomic Energy Agency, saw some of the destroyed equipment on July 2.

"The large pieces of equipment which were thus inspected were related to nuclear research and could not have had relevance for the production of weapons-useable material," Ekeus reported. "No meaningful explanation was given why they had been destroyed."

The council planned to meet again Monday after it sees how fully Iraq cooperates with the U.N. inspection team.

Gulf citizens warned of tropical storm

Residents of the lower Texas coast have been warned to prepare for a potential tropical storm strengthening over the warm waters of the western Gulf of Mexico.

The system, born Friday as a tropical depression with 30 mph winds, would be named Bob if peak winds reached 39 mph and it was designated a tropical storm. Bob would become a hurricane if top winds reached 74 mph.

Late Friday night, the poorly defined depression was located at 23.3 degrees north latitude and 97.0 degrees west longitude, or about 180 miles south-southeast of

Brownsville, forecasters said. The system was churning slowly to the west at 5 mph.

A tropical storm watch was posted for the lower Texas coast from Baffin Bay to the mouth of the Rio Grande and for the Mexican coast south to Tampico.

Forecasters said squalls in the Gulf would intensify during the weekend and torrential rain could deluge the Lower Rio Grande Valley. If the storm hits the Mexican coast, counter-clockwise rotation would pound the Texas coast above the landfall site.

For Bryant there was never a doubt that Coke is real thing

HEREFORD (AP) - For John David Bryant there was never any doubt that Coke was the real thing.

His wife, Beverly, wasn't always so sure.

On their honeymoon 15 years ago, Bryant spent most of their fun money on Coca-Cola antiques - signs, posters, clocks - anything with the cola's famous scripted white letters. "I kept waiting for nice dinners and nights out on the town, but it just didn't happen," Beverly said.

After returning from the honeymoon and realizing her husband's fascination with the carbonated drink was not going to fizzle, she decided she could share his fervent desire to collect Coke antiques or "end the marriage right there," she said jokingly.

Today, nearly every room in the Bryant's home contains some of the thousands of pieces of Coke memorabilia worth upwards of \$25,000 that the couple and their three children have gathered from all over the country.

The living room houses a 1930s radio shaped as a 2-foot-high Coke bottle. The kitchen contains a 1940s Coke machine, one of several in the collection. And sprinkled throughout the house is everything from a Coke cash register and calendars to Coke ice tongs.

"I tell my wife it's a good investment," said Bryant, who began his collecting fascination with coins

as a child. "But she knows me better and always responds, 'Yea, but you would never sell any of it.'"

Collecting experts say the value of antique Coca-Cola memorabilia has soared because it is becoming increasingly more difficult to find.

"The number of Coca-Cola collectors worldwide has increased so much over the past four years that a lot of the finer collectibles just can not be found," said Richard Mix of Atlanta, who publishes a price guide for antique Coke bottles.

"The fascination seems to come from Coke's ability to transcend the world. It's everywhere."

Raymond Merced, who sells Coke antiques at Back Pages in New York City, said his supply is going fast.

"Prices have gone through the roof with the increased demand, but our items are still selling," Merced said. "We are having a hard time finding items to get for our store."

Merced said the attraction comes from the generations that grew up with Coke.

"It's been one of the most popular drinks since the early 1900s," he said. "Coke did things like create special advertising during World War II and that kind of stuff takes people back in time."

Bryant said he simply "fell in love with the white scripted letters" of the carbonated drink.

Dozens of signs line the walls of Bryant's office at the Lone Star Agency, an insurance and real estate firm in Hereford.

Summer classes to begin

Classes will begin at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday at West Central Intermediate School for students, kindergarten through sixth grade, registered for summer school in Hereford Independent School District.

Registration was conducted earlier for the classes which will meet from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon, Monday through Friday each week.

Transportation is the responsibility of parents although shuttle service will be available from other campuses.

Summer food service will be provided Monday through Thursday at 12 noon at West Central. Shuttle buses will return students to pickup locations at 12:30 p.m.

School officials remind that students are expected to attend summer classes daily.

County budget to be adopted

A budget for operating Deaf Smith County will get a final look Monday by commissioners before they vote to spend more than \$3.8 million on general operations of the county.

Adoption of the budget and setting the tax rate to fund it should take little time since commissioners already have conducted public meetings on those items.

And, they have voted to increase taxes, overall, by some 14 percent. However, the tax rate will not change. Property owners who experienced no re-appraisal or made improvements should see no increase in their tax bills.

Besides the general operations budget, the commission also will consider adoption of a road and bridge budget of approximately \$808,000.

Financing the expenditures will come, in part, from the ad valorem taxes levied at the rate of 46.97 cents per \$100.

The budget will become effective Oct. 1.

Other business on the agenda for the 9 a.m. meeting will be consideration of a contract for the juvenile peace officer, consideration of asking for bids for a new car for the sheriff's department and approving polling places for constitutional election in August.

Organization of a new education unit is scheduled Tuesday when the Deaf Smith County Education District Board of Trustees meets at 6 p.m. in the Hereford Independent School District administration building.

The agenda for the organizational meeting of the Deaf Smith County Education District will begin with trustees taking the oath of office and continues with election of a chairperson, vice chairperson and recording secretary.

HISD faces Tuesday agenda

Trustees of Hereford Independent School District will have their regular monthly meeting Tuesday, beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the HISD administration building. The lengthy agenda includes reports from various school-related groups, selection of a school depository, consideration of a contract for a juvenile probation officer and an alternative school proposal.

Bucy quits as financial chief for collider

DALLAS (AP) - The head of the state commission in charge of raising money for an \$8.3 billion superconducting super collider has resigned, saying the project has serious funding troubles.

As chairman of the Texas National Research Laboratory Commission, J. Fred Bucy had tried to raise the state's \$1 billion funding share.

But, he said, he fears a shortfall in contributions from foreign governments and Congress will kill the 53-mile super collider project completely.

Fort Worth officer charged following brutal assault

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A police officer who was captured on videotape beating a man in his custody was charged with assault with a deadly weapon and was suspended with pay pending the case's outcome.

Officer Edward James Parnell III was charged with assault with a deadly weapon Friday, two days after he was videotaped beating a car theft suspect with a baton.

Parnell, who declined to make a statement to police on the advice of

"It's not beyond salvation, but it's getting close," Bucy said.

Special interests studying record of court nominee

WASHINGTON (AP) - Although battle lines over the Supreme Court nomination of Clarence Thomas are beginning to form, many interest groups are taking a wait-and-see approach before deciding how hard to fight.

Liberal interest groups, facing long odds and uncertainty over just what is at stake, say their strategy now is mainly to take a searching look at the record of the conservative black judge.

"There may be a real fight. I'm not making any predictions," said Nan Aron of the liberal Alliance for Justice. But, she conceded, "Some groups are ready to throw in the towel now."

Conservatives are hoping President Bush has put his opponents in a bind by picking as Thurgood Marshall's successor a black nominee with a compelling rags-to-riches background. They are quick to support Thomas but uncertain about how hard the Senate confirmation struggle will be.

The National Abortion Rights Action League is anticipating a tough contest and is trying to give liberals ammunition to oppose Thomas.

NARAL executive director Kate Michelman called a news conference Tuesday to reveal evidence that Thomas may oppose the high court's 1973 ruling in Roe vs. Wade that legalized abortion.

She cited a 1987 speech in which Thomas praised an essay that attacked the 1973 decision.

Calling the speech to the conservative Heritage Foundation "a smoking gun," Michelman said, the remarks could undermine Thomas' nomination.

"Unless Judge Thomas explicitly... recognizes that the Constitution protects the fundamental right to

privacy, including the right to choose, the Senate should reject this nominee," she said.

The NARAL strategy is intended to embolden members of the Senate Judiciary Committee who were reluctant to press David H. Souter, Bush's first high court nominee, for specific answers on abortion.

Souter, with no public record on the issue, had a relatively easy time last year in ducking those questions. He won Senate confirmation by a vote of 90-9.

The model for an all-out confirmation battle is the 1987 nomination of Robert H. Bork by President Reagan. Bork, an outspoken conservative with an extensive record, was defeated by a liberal-led campaign that accused him of rigid opposition to the rights of women and minorities.

Both sides say a similar fight over Thomas's nomination is unlikely.

With conservatives already firmly in control of the court, there is little inclination for liberals to mount a costly campaign against him.

Dr. Benjamin L. Hooks, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said "We will review (Thomas') record just as closely as if he were not an African-American."

"If his record is too bad, I just can't support him," Hooks said. "On the other hand, if it's a mixed or spotted record, I would have to consider it closely."

The Senate Judiciary Committee is expected to hold hearings on the Thomas nomination in September, giving critics ample time to research his record. The time gap will also help conservative interest groups mount a defense.

Thomas Jipping of the conservative Coalitions for America said he expects Thomas will be confirmed.

Soviets pass law to attract investments

MOSCOW (AP) - Two weeks before President Mikhail S. Gorbachev heads to London to seek Western aid, the Soviet legislature has approved a law aimed at attracting more foreign investment.

The law approved Friday strengthens legal guarantees and exempts businesses with substantial foreign investments from import duties and export taxes.

The measure approved by the Supreme Soviet provides the legal groundwork for Gorbachev's plans to revamp the economy with Western

aid, investment and management know-how.

It gives foreign investors equal legal rights with Soviet citizens and allows new businesses to be created with 100-percent foreign ownership, the official Tass news agency reported.

Gorbachev can now present the law to Western leaders as proof he is serious about reform. He'll get that chance at the July 15-17 summit of the Group of Seven most industrialized nations in London.

In Pomp and Circumstances you will meet Lizzie Desmond and the man she loves, Adam Thome. Adam's title, Earl of Pontefract, is both a blessing and a curse. It is because of his elevation to wealth and power that he is forced into a loveless marriage. Adam and Lizzie are further separated when Adam must travel to India to avenge the death of his grandfather. As a young woman abandoned and alone Lizzie fights for survival by becoming the wife of a dashing American. When she comes to America, Lizzie is horrified by the institution of slavery that exists in her new home, and begins a struggle to change the injustice she

sees. Has man's devastation of the seas created a creature up from the deep. A beast so enormous and insatiable that it will keep killing unless it is destroyed?

An Occasion Of Sin by Andrew M. Greeley is his most "affecting and provocative" book to date. Dashing Chicago prelate John Cardinal McGlynn is martyred after his death in Nicaragua. McGlynn dies in the arms of his beautiful companion Marbeth Quinlan with his last words "God, how I love you." Two years later McGlynn is being considered for canonization, but there are troubling questions about the Cardinal's suitability for sainthood. Guest Editorial

Open records

Although the Open Records Act has been in effect in Texas for quite some time, there are still public officials who believe that they can hide certain records safe from prying eyes.

This cannot be done in this state.

The Open Records Act became law in 1973 as part of the reaction to the Sharpstown scandal where the Texas Speaker of the House became involved in real estate deals which were illegal.

This law requires that all information collected, assembled or maintained by or for government bodies in Texas is "public information" and available to the public with only certain exceptions.

This means that material put on file by any government body is available to inspection by the public. The law provides that a charge may be made for providing copies of this material but all of it is available.

This also means that any citizen can go to a county clerk's office or district clerk's office and ask to see any material which has been accepted and filed for public record.

Those whose names appear in these public records may not especially want other people to inspect various documents, but the law is clear, public records are open records.

The purpose of the law is to make available to people full and complete information about the affairs of their government. It is true that very few private citizens make the effort to dig into these public records. They leave that up to the news media and expect the news media to keep them informed.

The late Price Daniel Jr., who was Speaker of the House when the Open Records Act and the Open Meetings Act were enacted into law, has to be given credit for lifting the lid of secrecy in Texas on the way government officials conduct the public's business.

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

Dallas Times Herald on Supreme Court nominee

Twice in his presidency, George Bush has had the honor of nominating a justice to the nation's highest court. And twice now, his selections have raised serious questions about the motives of the nominator and the qualifications of the nominee.

In announcing his choice of Clarence Thomas, black federal appeals court judge, to the Supreme Court to replace retiring Justice Thurgood Marshall, President Bush was brief and blunt: "He is," the president said, "the best person for this position."

Perhaps.

At the very least Judge Thomas has a more visible record than the president's last pick, David Souter. And, although the president bristled when it was suggested he had appointed Judge Thomas because of his race, it is significant that a minority was appointed to replace the court's first and only black justice.

But race alone does not a good justice make. And Judge Thomas' record, visible though it may be, may not be all that viable for a position of such stature and importance...

Whether he will eventually be confirmed remains to be seen. First he must survive the confirmation sessions, which, if the initial reactions are any indication, could be painfully partisan.

Ideally, of course, it should not matter what color Judge Thomas is, nor should it matter what his political or ideological persuasions are. What should matter is whether he has the knowledge and ability to sit as a jurist on our highest court - whether he is indeed the best person for the job.

The Dallas Morning News on Supreme Court nominee

It is said that the finest steel is tempered in the hottest fires. If true, Judge Clarence Thomas, President Bush's nominee for the U.S. Supreme Court, is a man of fine steel. A child of poverty reared by grandparents in a tenement lacking indoor plumbing, Judge Thomas, through strength of character and with the devoted help of his grandparents, has constructed for himself an exemplary life, a life that raises a standard to which future generations of Americans may repair.

Like the man he has been chosen to succeed, Justice Thurgood Marshall, Judge Thomas is black. Like Justice Marshall, he rose through great personal effort and in the face of obstacles that would have thwarted lesser men. Unlike Justice Marshall, Judge Thomas has developed a view of life and law that places greater emphasis on individual effort, individual responsibility and the sanctity of law above race. These beliefs have led him to oppose quotas and other affirmative action tools that grew out of the civil rights movement of the 1960s...

While some might take issue with that philosophy, any detractors will find it difficult to take issue with Judge Thomas' legal abilities, his mental strength, his character or his judicial temperament...

Many will find the stark contrast with Justice Marshall offensive. The goals of these two men, however, are not so different. They both believe deeply in justice. However different the roads they would take to attain that justice, President Bush has clearly found a nominee whose character, integrity and intellect equal those of Justice Marshall.

El Paso Herald-Post on Supreme Court inmates decision

Supreme Court justices have been rightly concerned with the caseload overwhelming federal appeals courts. But in their zeal to lighten the burden, they should take care not to make bad law.

In a 6-3 decision, the court sharply curtailed the ability of state prison inmates to appeal their convictions to federal courts. Any violation of state rules governing appeals, the court said, could disqualify an inmate from requesting that federal judges review his conviction.

We sympathize with the majority's argument that federal courts have an obligation to respect state rules. But in many such appeals, the stakes are high. Capital cases are matters of life and death. The death row inmate in the (case decided by the court) had the misfortune of using an attorney who missed the state deadline for filing his appeal by three days.

That infraction seems slight when weighed against the consequences the court now forces upon it. The court has already limited these federal appeals to one per petitioner. It should have granted inmates latitude to ensure they have access at least to that one appeal.

Houston Chronicle on Police Searches

People should be secure against unreasonable police searches. We always thought that was one of those precious constitutional rights which separated Americans from people in authoritarian nations.

That is why the recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling giving police the power to board buses and search the bags of consenting passengers, without any probable cause or a warrant to justify a search, seems terribly wrong to us.

Such searches are intimidating by their very nature. They are an intrusion into an individual's rights of privacy whether they result in the finding of drugs or merely the embarrassment of having police rummaging through one's dirty laundry.

We believe very few passengers would feel comfortable or even safe from possible police abuse in refusing to comply. In this case, the man claimed the officers never told him he could decline to cooperate.

Honest citizens should have no reason to fear police. We thought the Constitution guaranteed that. Unfortunately, this decision strikes at the heart of the Fourth Amendment and it opens the door for police misconduct.

San Antonio Express-News on NCAA rules

The public perception of college athletics clearly nettles officials at the NCAA. It should, for the image is of schools supposedly dedicated to higher learning transformed into a vast commercial combine, cynically exploiting for entertainment and profit under-educated athletes whose schooling is of secondary concern.

The danger for NCAA officials is that in countering this perception they overreact, and deprive deserving young people of the wholesome advantages that college athletics, at their best, impart...

This week the NCAA President's Commission recommended tightening the reforms, but now they are a bit too tight for comfort...

It is ironic that these new standards raise the admission criteria for student athletes above those required for non-athletes freshmen at most colleges...

Its (the NCAA's) vigor in purifying college athletics is commendable, but care must be taken that the interests of student athletes, first and foremost, are protected, too. The proposed rules fail in that regard.

San Antonio Light on foreign ownership of American land

Remember how foreigners were going to buy up all of America if they weren't somehow stopped? First the Arabs in the 1970s, then the Japanese in the 1980s?

It didn't happen. Didn't come close to happening, as a matter of fact.

A massive study of the nation's non-agricultural real estate by Arthur Andersen & Co. released last week showed that foreigners own a grand total of 0.05 percent of the nation's \$8.77 trillion worth of non-farm land.

In short, while some shuffling will no doubt occur, the United States is today - and will continue to be - owned almost totally by Americans and their institutions...

The United States is a huge, wealthy nation (despite its Third World federal budget policy) and foreigners are not going to steal the country, take it away or buy it up.

The Houston Post on Ending U.S. Supervision of State Prisons

A report that state Attorney General Dan Morales filed a motion to eliminate federal supervision of the Texas prison system was good news. Way to go, Dan! But even under the best of circumstances it won't result in any immediate relief for Harris County, which has the largest backlog of state inmates in its county jail.

What Morales is doing will help our county a great deal - which is more than his predecessor, Jim Mattox, ever did. But what we need is quicker relief, if possible.

Both (criminal justice board members Mamie Moore) Procter and (Sen. Gene) Green need to be raising the roof over the Harris County allocation as well as the factors used to determine it. Our county gets back 7 percent more parolees than it sends up inmates. Also, it has more than 30 percent of the total number of halfway houses in the state.

These factors don't set well with taxpaying citizens who long ago realized parolees are responsible for too many violent crimes around our parts. Local voters in the last gubernatorial election should be concerned that things haven't changed much after they provided the new governor, Ann Richards with a county-wide 20,000-vote margin over her opponent.

Why doesn't the governor realize she could repay the favor she obviously owed us by taking a more active role in helping to solve Harris County's inmate woes?

She could start by having the criminal justice board consider the factors that most affect our county, the high numbers of parolees and halfway house residents who come here, only to commit more crimes.

Corpus Christi Caller-Times

The Texas legislators' overly generous retirement plan for themselves endangers the tax-exempt status of pension plans for all state employees. The plan passed in the last session allows a legislator to retire with benefits of at least \$1,526 a month - more than two and a half times the \$620 legislators receive a month in pay.

That violates the IRS rule, which says that if benefits in excess of 100 percent of salary are given to even one employee, the entire pension system of a state is subject to lose its IRS code.

Now comes Sen. Lloyd Bentsen with a damage-control bill that would exempt public pension systems from the IRS code. Not surprisingly, Texas legislators have been writing Bentsen in support of his bill.

There is a better way to solve this problem. Rather than fixing it at the federal level, and in doing so getting the Texas legislators off the hook, this issue should be added to the upcoming special session and the legislators should go back and take away those overly generous retirement benefits.

The retirement benefits provision for lawmakers was added in a backdoor maneuver to a bill on state employee benefits by a Lubbock legislator, Rep. Nolan Robnett. This legislator is 50 years old, has 14 years in the legislature, and is now eligible to retire and receive \$1,526 a month for life.

This amendment should never have been passed nor allowed to become law. And now that it is a threat to the non-exempt tax status of the retirement benefits of all public employees of Texas, it should be revoked. Many Texas legislators will face re-election next year and they should remember that their self-serving actions, like this extravagant retirement plan, are being judged by an increasingly skeptical public.

Monterey tags Hereford, 10-1

Monterey scored in every inning but the seventh, beating Hereford 10-3 in a West Texas Summer Baseball League game Friday at Whiteface Field.

The hard-hitting Monterey team, losers of only three of its 11 games, scored single runs in the first, fourth and fifth; scored two runs each in the second and third; and scored three times in the sixth. By the first time Hereford scored—a single run in the fourth—Monterey had already scored six.

Hereford, now 0-12, had some bad luck early, when even their good plays couldn't keep Monterey from scoring. For example, with a Monterey runner on third in the second inning, the batter hit a fly ball to deep second base. Vince Castillo, playing second but normally a catcher, couldn't make a tough over-the-shoulder catch, but picked up the ball on one bounce and threw a strike to home. The runner at third had already started for home and beat the ball. He took catcher Russ Watts' legs out from under him, but Watts nearly caught the ball—he knocked it down while flying horizontally.

Hereford hitters had trouble just making contact with the fastball of Monterey starter Tony Gonzales. He had seven strikeouts in four innings, and his replacement, Isaac Lee, struck out four batters in three innings.

Hereford only got four hits. Watts was 2-for-3 with two singles, and he

reached on an error the third time. Andy Kalka, who pitched the game, and Jerry Rincon each added a single.

Three of those hits came in the fourth, when Hereford scored its first run. Rincon led off with a bloop over first base, and was replaced on the bases by Tab Hathaway on a fielder's choice. Hathaway went to second on Watts line shot into center field, and both advanced a base on Kalka's hit, which fell just in front of the left fielder.

All three advanced a base—Hathaway scored—on Gonzales' wild pitch. Fonzie Enriquez walked to reload the bases, but the rally was stopped when Monterey first baseman Chris Sheffield made a sliding catch of Shama Hernandez' foul pop, catching the ball just before sliding into the fence.

In the sixth, Hereford scored twice without a hit. Castillo led off with a walk and went to second when the Monterey third baseman misplayed Watts' hard grounder. Both moved up a base on Lee's wild pitch. Next, Kalka hit a high sacrifice fly to right field, plating Castillo and sending Watts to third. Watts scored on Enriquez' grounder to shortstop. The shortstop booted that ball, as well as Richard Sanderson's grounder later in the inning, but there was no more scoring.

Hereford's next game is Tuesday, when they host Plainview at 6 p.m. at Whiteface Field.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — On the day of the big servers, a pair of German buddies came up aces.

Davis Cup teammates Boris Becker and Michael Stich moved into the Wimbledon men's final by boomeranging their way to semifinal victories on Friday.

Becker had 13 aces and never lost his serve in a 6-4, 7-6, 7-5 defeat of unseeded American David Wheaton. Becker advanced to his fourth straight Wimbledon final.

The victory moved Becker back into the No. 1 world ranking, knocking Stefan Edberg to No. 2. Becker, who was top-ranked for three weeks after winning the Australian Open in January, will stay No. 1 even if he loses Sunday's final.

Stich boomed 64 service winners, including eight aces, as he ousted

defending champion Edberg in a match that featured three tie-breakers.

Stich won 4-6, 7-6, 7-6, 7-6, taking advantage of Edberg's mistakes in the first two tie-breakers.

The Becker-Stich match will be the first all-German men's final at Wimbledon and the first men's final between compatriots since John McEnroe defeated Jimmy Connors in 1984.

Another German is in today's women's final. Top seed Steffi Graf was to seek her third Wimbledon crown against Gabriela Sabatini of Argentina.

Becker and Stich exchanged high fives after Stich's victory over Edberg in the opening semifinal, but Becker said their relationship will make the final more difficult.

Edberg was the biggest loser of the day—he lost his title, his top ranking and the chance for a fourth straight final against Becker. About the only thing he didn't lose was his serve.

"I didn't drop a service game today but I still lost the match, which is sort of very strange," he said. "I played a few bad shots at some

important times. That was the whole story of the match."

"It's not easy because we know each other so well. We have played a lot together," Becker said. "It's much easier to play somebody you hate."

Becker saved 10 break points by coming up with big serves at key moments against Wheaton, who had defeated Ivan Lendl and Andre Agassi on his way to the semifinals.

"I basically felt like I outplayed him today," Wheaton said. "I was the one with all the chances and the break points, and he came up with some shots when he needed to."

"I didn't quite convert when I should have," he added. "It's amazing that I lost that match in

Rangers' scout gets dream job

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Ever since he was a boy learning the game in Puerto Rican sandlots with broomsticks for bats and bottlecaps for balls, Orlando Gomez has had a special place in his heart for baseball.

It's a shame it took the major leagues 27 years to find a place for him.

Twenty-seven years is a long time to ask a man to flail away in the minor leagues. To drag the wife and six kids from town to town and back again. As a player, a coach, a scout, a confidant and father figure whose children had to sell peanuts and popcorn at the ballpark just to make ends meet.

He started many a young man on his way to a major league career as a scout and saved many more as a coach. Perseverance, he would preach. Stick with it. You've got talent. Things will work out.

It was that same dogged determination that kept him going. As a catcher, Gomez played in nine different cities in 13 years in the minor-league systems of the New York Yankees and the Oakland Athletics.

He had eight stops as a minor league manager, not counting the places he played, coached, managed and scouted in Puerto Rico.

Every year he would tell his wife, Nylsa, that this would be his last season. Nylsa, who often cooked, washed clothes, sewed buttons, shopped for groceries and helped Latin players with their English, would never believe him. He loved the game too much.

In January, they were preparing for another year at Class A Gastonia, S.C., when Texas Rangers manager Bobby Valentine called.

Valentine needed a bullpen coach to help his catchers, especially 19-year-old rookie phenom Ivan Rodriguez, whom Gomez coached at Gastonia.

"Our scout in Puerto Rico, Omar Minaya, and I were traveling in Puerto Rico in the off-season and Omar spoke so highly of Orlando that I just had to get to meet him and observe him," Valentine says. "And, once I did, I knew he was just the guy

I needed on this team. We hadn't had a catching coach since Joe Ferguson left."

Not lost on Valentine was the fact that Gomez, who signed Ruben Sierra and Jose Guzman, had a knack for easing Latin players' transition from the Spanish-speaking Caribbean islands to the major leagues.

And the Rangers' Latin-filled lineup lacked a Latin coach and confidant. The Rangers thought Gomez was the perfect man for the job.

"I only wish they had thought that when I was a young man," Gomez says. "But now I'm here. This is what I've always wanted."

As a counsel and friend to the players, especially the young Latinas who are still learning English, Gomez "solves a lot of things that we never even know about," says Rangers general manager Tom Grieve.

"I talk to them a lot," Gomez says. "I say a lot of things quietly and privately that nobody else needs to know."

Ruben Sierra says he wishes Gomez had been here for him during his first few seasons.

"It's good for Ivan and Juan Gonzalez to have him here because they're young and still learning, and Orlando can really help them understand their roles and what's needed," Sierra said. "I never had that, I had to do it on my own."

Rafael Palmeiro says Gomez "keeps us going hard. If he sees that one of us is struggling, he'll offer to help. Not just for the Latin players, but for anybody."

Nothing about Gomez has changed from his minor league days. Except his uniform number. He wore No. 23 for 27 years, but turned it down when he joined the Rangers, knowing that was the number Guzman wore.

Guzman had been released in the spring, but Gomez had talked him into signing a minor league contract. He was trying to come back after two seasons of rehabilitation from a partially torn right rotator cuff.

"I told them that Guzman would be back, so keep it," Gomez says. "I'll wear 13."

"He's more than a coach," says Guzman, who made it back as Gomez predicted and is wearing No. 23 in tribute to his friend.

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Mr. Robinson really sells

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Like most advertising honchos from big-name firms, Bob Dorfman and Nova Lanktree get a bit excited when discussing David Robinson.

Hearing Dorfman and Lanktree talk about Robinson is like listening to Siskel and Ebert discuss the acting skills of Meryl Streep or Robert DeNiro. Their words are touched with emotion and admiration.

To people like Dorfman - a senior copy writer for the San Francisco-based advertising firm of Foote, Cone, and Belding - and Nova Lanktree - director of the Chicago-based Burns Sports Celebrity Center - Robinson is a dream come true, a high-visibility professional athlete who is eloquent, personable and handsome.

Those qualities have made him one of the most sought-after spokesman in pro sports. Already he has gained an untold amount of national exposure, pitching products for Nike Inc., Franklin Sports Industry Inc., and Casio Inc.

And locally, Robinson has made some well-received commercials for First Gibraltar Savings.

"Right now, it is very wide open as to how far he can go with his endorsements," Lanktree said. "There are not too many limits on him. If he keeps playing the way he is playing and conducting himself the way he has been off the court, there is no reason he couldn't be as visible as a Michael Jordan or a Magic Johnson."

"I describe him as the next big thing. I like to call him the NBA's Renaissance Man," said Dorfman, sounding a lot like Spurs vice president Bob Bass after the Spurs announced they would use their first-round draft pick in 1987 to draft the 7-foot-1 center from the U.S. Naval Academy.

Now, four years after the Spurs drafted Robinson, the multi-talented "Admiral" has earned a place not only among the NBA's elite on the court, but also what the president of NBA Properties calls the elite off the court.

"Yes, we consider him in the most elite group along with the Jordans, the Magics, the Birds, the Barkleys," NBA properties president Rick Welts said. "We agree with the prediction Pat Riley made recently on NBC that the 1990s would be his decade."

"There really isn't anyone we are more excited about than David. He is going to be very important to the league. The Operation Prom Night commercials (drinking-and-driving spots) he did for us recently have been very well received nationally. Hopefully, he can do more of those types of commercials, but it will be up to him."

So what makes Robinson so special to Welts and Dorfman and all

the others who can make a buck or two by linking San Antonio's "Edge" to their product?

Dorfman believes it's a combination of Robinson's unbelievable athletic skills and his ease before the camera.

"First things first. You are appreciated for your talent on the court and that kind of rubs off to your potential for endorsements," Dorfman said. "He has no problems there because he is such a great athlete. But the camera also loves him. He also has decent looks and the fact that he is a Navy man helps him. I often said he could be a recruiter for the military in any future war."

When it comes to getting endorsement contracts, Welts and Lanktree said Robinson's off-court behavior is as important as his play on the court.

"He is so well-rounded," Lanktree said. "Pro athletes seem to be trying to take their jobs as role models seriously these days and David is certainly an exemplary role model."

"I think it's the combination of his talent and the way he chooses to conduct his public life," Welts said.

"I think he is going to be a wonderful role model for kids. He has a combination of personality and talent that makes him a very articulate spokesman for the league."

And a very articulate spokesman for the three companies - Nike, Franklin and Casio - that have Robinson under contract to promote their products.

His Mister Robinson Neighborhood commercials for Nike are now part of American pop culture and have television devotees waiting in anticipation for the newest release. In just two years, Robinson and Nike have collaborated on 13 commercials.

"The commercials he has done for us have been really great," Nike public-relations manager Melinda Gable said. "The Mister Robinson's Neighborhood fits him to a T. He is a nice guy by nature. We have gotten a lot of positive feedback on all of them."

Gable said Nike hopes its relationship with Robinson will be a long one.

"We want him to be with us for the rest of his career," Gable said. "He is a great person to work with. When we pick athletes, we don't want just a talking head. We want someone like David, a great role model both on and off the court. He has a stellar reputation and we couldn't be more pleased to have him represent us."

Randy Hicks, vice president of First Gibraltar Bank, echoed Gable's comments.

"We are terrifically pleased with what David has done for us," Hicks said via telephone from Dallas. "We took him on as our spokesperson shortly after we acquired the San Antonio bank in March of 1990. I can't say enough

positive things about what he has done for our bank in San Antonio. It's great just having his name linked with our bank."

Hicks said First Gibraltar is currently negotiating future spots with Robinson.

Like Dorfman, Gable believes Robinson's ability to "shoot" commercials also makes him a desired pitch man.

"He has been fantastic to work with," Gable said. "He is a genuine nice person and that comes across in our commercials. There have been a lot of demands on him time, but I can say that I have never seen him turn down a request for an autograph."

But Robinson will turn down requests for his services. His agent, Jeff Austin of Washington D.C.-based Advantage International Inc., said he is very selective when choosing a product to endorse.

Helping Robinson pick his spots are his parents, Ambrose and Freda, who, along with David's cousin Aldridge Mitchell, make up The Robinson Group, which helps David choose appearances and endorsements, as well as answering mail and personal requests.

"David could have received a lot more endorsements if he didn't value his time as much," Ambrose Robinson said. "I would imagine he would be as big as Michael if he didn't value his time. All of these endorsements take time. Shooting a commercial sometimes takes a week. Each time he makes a commercial for Nike it takes three days. I would guess that Michael spends about 100 days a year working on endorsements. David spends about 28."

Like the members of The Robinson Group, Austin is very selective and wary of David being manipulated.

"David wants to avoid clutter," Austin said. "He doesn't want to hawk 10 different products. He doesn't want the value of his endorsement to go down because of overuse."

But, most of all, Robinson doesn't want to endorse products or companies that don't fit his image. He even recently turned down an offer from an underwear company.

"I look to companies which are reputable, are willing to give back to the community and help me get my messages across about the positive things in life," Robinson told the Express-News in a recent interview.

"I try to be myself. I'm not different than any other person at this point in my life. I want to present as positive a kind of image as possible."

The Spurs, of course, love the

attention Robinson brings the team through his commercials.

According to the NBA, the Spurs were ranked 22nd in the 25-team league in merchandise sales for the 1988-89 season, the campaign before Robinson's arrival. As of November 1990, the Spurs were ranked sixth in the 27-team league in the same category.

Bookbinder said the Spurs are pleased with the amount and quality of the work Robinson has done for the franchise.

"I think David has gone above and beyond the call of duty," Bookbinder said. "His cooperation has been superior. You couldn't ask for more. But we do try to balance the off-court activities to keep him focused on the game."

Robinson also likes to focus on charitable organizations. He is involved with several groups including Youth Alternatives Inc., Boys and Girls Clubs of San Antonio and the I Have A Dream Foundation.

He also buys tickets for each home game for 50 youngsters to sit in "Mr. Robinson's Neighborhood" in the Arena's upper deck, sponsored by Nike.

Hendricks brothers reign over sports agent world

HOUSTON (AP) - Randy Hendricks, half of Houston's monolithic sports agent team, took a trip to Rome in 1989, visited the ancient ruins and read about a chariot racer from the good old days, circa 100 B.C.

"He was the Cy Young of chariot racers," said Hendricks. "He dominated his era. They estimated he earned \$4 million to \$5 million by today's standards."

If that chariot racer were here now, chances are Randy Hendricks, and brother, Alan, would be his agents.

Together they form Hendricks Sports Management, whose tentacles stretch throughout baseball, from the mound at Boston's Fenway Park to the outfield at Seattle's Kingdome. They represent 10 percent of the 650 major leaguers.

"When we got in the business only about 10 players had agents," said Randy Hendricks. "Now, there's only about 10 or 15 who don't."

Alan, 48, and Ray, 45, employ 20 people at their firm, which also is involved in real estate.

The telephone rang in the conference room of their office at Cypress Forest. Tom Grieve, general manager of the Texas Rangers, was calling. The Rangers had just acquired pitcher Calvin Schiraldi, a client, from the Astros organization.

"I can't wait to tell Schiraldi he's going to the big leagues," said Alan, with the enthusiasm of a Little Leaguer.

The Hendrickses began in the business in 1970, when the only millionaires in sports were the owners. Their first client, University of Houston receiver Elmo Wright, signed a three-year contract with the Kansas City Chiefs for a whopping \$135,000.

"You tell (players today) we've been in the business since the average baseball salary was \$60,000 and the minimum was \$13,000, and they look at you like you've flown in from Mars," said Alan.

In February, the brothers negotiated a \$21.5 million, four-year contract for Roger Clemens, which made him the highest paid player in baseball history. Where have you gone Joe DiMaggio?

Imagine the Hendrickses representing a Roger Maris after his 61-homer season, or Ted Williams after hitting .406, or Denny McLain after winning 31 games.

"You're talking \$30 million for five years, guaranteed," said Randy. Just sign on the dotted line.

Is there a limit to these salaries?

Television money may have peaked when CBS signed a \$1.06 billion contract and ESPN signed for

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\$400 million. ESPN would like to continue televising baseball after the 1993 season, but not at that price.

"Because CBS has lost money, everybody has predicted doom and gloom," said Randy, accustomed to owners pleading poverty. "The game has never been more popular, the revenues never higher. Ownership is like Chicken Little predicting the sky is falling."

"Every time they cut a new deal, whether it's the NBA, NFL or you name it, the TV rights go up," said Alan, predicting more international television revenue in the future. "I think you'll see a globalization of all sports. Look at the attendance of the (World League of American Football) in Europe, and that's a yawner in America."

General managers generally regard agents with the same affection they have for New York cab drivers. The Hendrickses have earned respect.

"For agents, they're at the top of the list," said Bob Watson, assistant general manager of the Astros. "Basically, they're honest. They're tough, but they're fair. You don't mind that."

Negotiations can get nasty, an area where Randy seems to thrive.

"I started in this business at 25," he said. "I had a lot of teams try to intimidate me, try to run me out of the business. I was a gunslinger. Now I'm a statesman. There's some pretty crisp words that fly in that room."

Dick Wagner, the abrasive former general manager of the Astros, went eye-to-eye with the Hendrickses on several occasions.

Alan, the more jovial of the brothers, takes a softer approach, effectively balancing Randy. "What sets us apart (as agents) is there's two of us," said Alan.

If a team can afford to pay a player more money, bet on the Hendrickses to know exactly how much.

"It's fair to say the other side knows we come (to the table) armed," said Randy.

Case study.

"The Pirates announced they lost \$7 million in 1990," he said. "Break out the violins. They wrote off their entire collusion payment of \$10.7 million (as a business expense) in 1990. They didn't pay one dime of it last year. You can come up with a \$5 million profit (for the Pirates) fairly easily. We make it our business to study those numbers."

The Hendrickses boast a 10-4 record in arbitration cases, well above the 45 percent victories for all players. They are 3-0 vs. the Pirates, winning twice for Doug Drabek and once for John Smiley. Drabek, last year's Cy Young winner, will earn \$3.35 million this year, thanks to Alan and Randy.

"I believe they're out for the player's best interests," said Alan Ashby, a former Astros catcher and now a sportscaster in Houston. "I had a feeling they were friends as opposed to being just agents."

The Hendrickses, attending a real estate meeting in Cleveland in the early 1970s, met several members of the Indians. The players invited them to spring training. Outfielder John Lowenstein was the first to sign and within a year 15 more joined, including Ashby, then with the Indians.

Other clients include Cincinnati's Norm Charlton, Kansas City's Mark Davis, Seattle's Jay Buhner and the Astros' Mike Scott, Eric Anthony, Darryl Kile, Jim Clancy and Mike Capel. A few football players remain in the portfolio, though the Hendrickses decided about 1980 to concentrate on baseball.

Many of their more prosperous players are pitchers, which is no coincidence.

"When you're the pitcher, you're the king," said Randy, who pitched in amateur leagues as a kid. He still plays slow-pitch softball.

Randy, with a satellite dish in his back yard, will watch two to three games a night on his 8-foot TV screen.

"I watch like a scout," he said.

"I've called players and told them they're tipping their pitches, or it looks like they've closed their stance. I've talked the philosophy of pitching with Roger Clemens for hours."

Alan, who travels more than Randy, sees more games in person.

"I'm convinced the players would play just as hard if you move the decimal point one place to the left," said Alan.

Tired of the cold, the Hendrickses migrated from Shawnee Mission, Kan., for college, attending the University of Houston. They got to know Wright and Cougars fullback Robert Newhouse, their first two clients.

"It's not always, 'Get the most you can,'" said Randy. "It's nurturing relationships with our client and the club."

It's taking care of business, the Hendricks way.

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
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


HOME FIRE

Dear Heloise: I am responding to the reader who had been taking clothes to the dry cleaner for years and as a result had a number of extra hangers. The reader was wondering what to do with all these extras.

A number of months ago my husband and I were victims of a house fire. Not all our clothes were destroyed, but in the short time between when the insurance company inspected the damage and we actually started to clean and rebuild, every metal hanger in the house rusted.

The one thing we could have used were hangers. It's such an odd item, no one thought of them.

So contact your local fire department or look in your local newspaper to locate a family which has recently been the victim of a house fire. Hangers are not a necessity, but when all your hangers have been destroyed or rusted, such a donation is surely welcome. — Hope Allen, Salt Lake City, Utah

In a case like this, your dry cleaner may sell you hangers at a very reasonable price. Why not ask. — Heloise

Send a money- or time-saving hint to Heloise, P.O. Box 795000, San Antonio TX 78279. I can't answer your letter personally but will use the best hints received in my column.

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Who is eligible for the program?

fee(\$250), warehouse fee, servicer review fee(\$75), credit report, appraisal, title insurance and tax service.

Where are loans being made?

Lending institutions may make loans for residences located in a number of locations in Texas, including the following counties: Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, and Wheeler. In addition, the cities of Booker, Darrouzett, Follett and Perryton are included in the program.




Turrubiates commissioned recently

ALL-SEASON GLASSES

Just as some people choose to buy all-season tires for their car so they don't have to have snow tires put on in the winter, many people who wear eyeglasses prefer to have photochromatic lenses that serve as sunglasses, too, switching automatically from light to dark to light again. The lenses contain millions of light-sensitive crystals that react to both visible and ultraviolet light. They turn dark in sunlight and then clear when the wearer goes indoors. It takes about a minute for the change to take place. It takes only a little while to get used to these "miracle" lenses, and most wearers are delighted with their convenience. They can be used for most prescriptions, even bifocals. One caveat: If you're going to spend a lot of time on the beach or the ski slopes, it's wise to have an extra pair of special-purpose lenses that block even more ultraviolet light.

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
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Mazurek, Leonard exchange vows

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

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

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

The Wrong Reasons

The desire to own a business is as American as apple pie. Much of this country's wealth and standard of living can be attributed to our desire for personal and financial independence. Most of us dream of having our own shop, store or business. We occupy many pleasant hours contemplating what we would do if our name was on the door.

Unfortunatey, many businesses are started for the wrong reasons. You should closely examine your motives for starting a new venture. If any of your reasons are like those included in this column, you may want to think twice.

Wrong Reasons No. 1

"I want to make a lot of money right away." This is not a good reason to start a business. Most new businesses do not produce quick cash or even short-term wealth. Don't expect to get rich quick. Typically, it takes several years of steady,

managed growth to produce much more than a living from a small business. Many of America's greatest success stories came about after years of frustration and failure. That is the good news.

The bad news is that most new businesses end in failure. Depending on whose statistics you believe, between 50 and 80 percent of all businesses started this year will fail before their fifth birthday.

Therefore, it is wise to consider any new venture carefully. You should prepare a detailed plan to guide your venture. Preparing three-year financial projections with income and cash flow statements will help you determine how much money you'll need. Careful planning will increase your odds of success.

More Wrong Reasons

"I want to start my own business so I can have more time to spend with my family." Most small businesses require a huge commitment of time. You will have even less time to spend with your family.

According to the National Federation of Independent Businesses, many entrepreneurs work 60 to 80 hours per week. The typical worker employed by someone else puts in only 40 to 48 hours per week. So, if you're average, you'll lose another 12 to 40 hours of family time per week.

Another wrong reason to start your own business is because you hate your present job or because you can't get along with your boss. This may be a good reason to find another job. However,

it is a wrong reason to go out on your own.

Every job has its adverse elements. It may appear that owning a business is glamorous and exciting. However, don't forget the typical business owner usually cleans the bathrooms, vacuums the floors, keeps the books and dusts the inventory. These chores are neither glamorous nor exciting.

Starting your own business doesn't mean you are your own boss. In fact, you have many bosses when you are self-employed. We call them customers. If you don't conduct your business in the way they want, they take their business elsewhere. This results in a very direct cut in your paycheck.

Another wrong reason for venturing out on your own business is because you have a "great idea for a new project." The patent office houses millions of "great ideas" that nobody wanted.

Before you start a business based on your new idea, do a little market research. Is there really a need for this product or service? What will potential customers pay for it? How much will it cost to produce? How can you market the product?

Air Force nurse has ties to Hereford

EASTERN SAUDI ARABIA—No wailing sirens pierce the air as wounded are whisked to the hospital. No long hallways gleaming with waxed floors or quiet corridors exist in the medical facility. No public address systems with nervous voices frantically call doctors to the emergency room.

This emergency room consists of

several sandstorm-blown tents on a flight line, 15 miles from the Iraqi border. With the war comes the unwavering knowledge there will be weary and wounded troops, even long after the fighting has ended.

Ever since the days of MASH, the world seems to have shared a fascination with military medical units. These units have "Florence Nightingales" and "Marcus Welbys"

who turn a pained expression into more of a smile.

The angel of mercy in this case is Air Force Airman 1st Class Monica T. Funkhouser, granddaughter of Antonio and Maria Cantu of Hereford.

Assigned to the 32nd Aeromedical Evacuation Group at Kelly Air Force Base, her unit arrived in Saudi Arabia on Jan. 16 to work in a Mobile Air

Staging Facility (MASF).

"I was trained to be an active part of MASF," said Funkhouser. "We received patients from the front lines and shipped them out as soon as possible. We kept them stabilized and ready to go."

"I worked as a medical administrator to make sure patients had their paperwork completed. I didn't get to do too much paperwork since the ground war went so fast."

The fireworks of SCUD missiles, artillery fire and tank rounds raged around the MASF. Now, the hardships include the oil wells burning just miles away and the sandstorms covering everything in a

brown mist. The hardships extended beyond patients to the medical attendants as well.

"I arrived in Saudi Arabia on the eve of my birthday," Funkhouser said. "It was the most traumatic experience of my life. We landed in the middle of nowhere at night. I was a new medic and I didn't know what to expect. Living in tents wasn't all

that bad. I learned I had to adapt to my environment quickly."

Still, the memories of the war will be more realistic than scenes from an award-winning comedy-drama.

"When I go home, I'm going to feel a sense of relief," she said. "I'm extremely proud to know I helped out in some way. This will be something to tell my children someday."

Indeed, Galway does his work with an enviable relish, performing classical and popular music by composers from Johann Bach to John Denver. When he is not in concert or in the recording studio, he teaches master classes, works on books about flute-playing or relaxes with one or another of his disciples. (They get together for the weekend and — what else? — play the flute.) He says no piece of music ever gets stale to him, betraying his secret in the very words he uses to describe his gift: "I can make a piece fresh every time I play with it. I always enjoy the turn of phrase, or the moment of sadness, or the moment of great elation."

As the world's pre-eminent flutist, Galway can perform anywhere he likes, but he chooses his concert schedule carefully. "Mostly I play in places I like. If you do a hundred concerts a year, like I do, and you consider it like a hundred dinners, and you thought, 'I'm only going to get a hundred,' you'd go to the best restaurants. And people will tell you, 'There's a good Italian restaurant here,' but you know darn well that the best Italian restaurants are in Italy." The comparison is no accident; Galway seems to enjoy playing his flute with the same gusto as his more tactile pleasures — eating, drinking or smoking a pipe or cigar.

This summer, as usual, Galway's itinerary includes a stop at Lincoln Center's Mostly Mozart Festival, where he made his New York debut

some 13 years ago. "It's always a pleasure," he says, "to go back to New York and play for these people who were the first to promote me in America. And then, of course, the New York audience is wild, I'll tell you. You really have to know your onions when you sit down to play for them."

The Festival's silver-anniversary season inaugural airs Wednesday, July 10, over most Public Broadcasting affiliates. Appearing with Galway and the Mostly Mozart Orchestra, led by conductor Gerard Schwarz, is pianist Andre Watts, who will play Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 9.

Galway has chosen Mozart's Flute Concerto in G for the occasion. "It's the first one (of two) that Mozart wrote, and it really is a flute concerto beyond any shadow of a doubt. I think Mozart was more thoughtful about it and he spent a lot of time — like 10 minutes — writing it," he concludes, with a giggle.

"I commissioned a flute concerto from a young British composer, David Heath. He writes a lot of jazzy things, and he opened up the concerto with this alto flute motif.

"And that's an interesting thing," Galway adds, "because I don't have a gold alto flute, so I just ordered one, gold keys and all.

"(The debut of the Heath concerto) is coming up in about 18 months. I'm waiting for the flute to get made. Actually, I'm waiting for the flutemaker to pick himself up off the floor. Nobody ever ordered a flute like this before."


And, it can be said, nobody ever played a flute like this before, either.

HBO looks at baseball's Golden Age

Archival footage is featured

Before the days of multimillion-dollar player contracts, before the emergence of television and mass exposure, baseball and those who played it captured the American imagination. Through the Depression and World War II, players like Dizzy Dean, Lou Gehrig and Ted Williams kept spirits alive simply by chasing a ball between two chalk lines.

Thanks to the discovery of more than 40 hours of film (much of it found in attics, trunks, etc.), including color footage of Babe Ruth and Jackie Robinson, HBO and Black Canyon Productions have recaptured that time in *When It Was a Game*, debuting Monday, July 8, on HBO.

The documentary takes fans back to the days of grass fields, when the Braves were in Boston and the A's in Philadelphia. It visits ballparks like Ebbets Field and Comiskey Park and offers highlights of the 1938 World

Series, played within the ivy-covered walls of Wrigley Field. More than 40 Hall of Famers are represented in this look at the national pastime (roughly, from the 1930s to the '50s), and actors James Earl Jones, Jason Robards and Roy Scheider contribute readings from historic baseball lore.

The show offers historical perspective on the game, beginning with the hard-nosed, Depression-era play of the St. Louis Cardinals' famed Gas House Gang, and recalls President Roosevelt's assessment that "They shouldn't quit playing just because there's a war going on." It also recounts the post-War boom and now-classic battles between the New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox teams of the late 1940s.

However, the documentary spends little time chronicling the most important event in the history of American sports: integration. Players like Robinson, Roy Campanella, Willie Mays and Satchel Paige are seen, but there is no

footage of the old Negro Leagues and only passing reference to the high unpopularity of Branch Rickey's bold (if overdue) decision to bring Robinson into the Major Leagues. These memories, too, belong to baseball's "Golden Age."



Fred Dryer pursued athletics before beginning acting hunt



Q: *My husband and I are great fans of Fred Dryer, star of Hunter. What can you tell us about him? We know he was a football player, but nothing else. We also liked Dee Dee McCall much better than any of his other leading ladies.* —Mrs. T.W. Taylor, Prescott, Ariz.

A: Fred Dryer was born July 6, 1946, and raised in the Los Angeles suburb of Hawthorne. He began his athletic career as a baseball pitcher in high school, and only turned to football when his throwing arm collapsed. He went on to play at San Diego State and was signed by the New York Giants in 1969. In 1972 he was traded to the Rams, and in 1981 Dryer was abruptly dropped from their roster after a

contract dispute. But several seasons before he was dropped by the Rams, he had set his sights on television. He had approached NBC for a chance to do some sports broadcasting and was advised to try acting. He then began studying with acting coach Nina Foch and decided in 1982 that he really wanted to be an actor. Since beginning his acting career he has appeared in numerous television movies and guest-starred on many series. His feature films include *Cannonball Run* and a starring role in *Death Before Dishonor*. He has also directed numerous episodes of *Hunter*. Divorced, he has one daughter and resides in an apartment in Los Angeles.

information I can on James Arness — about his family and what he is doing now. I would also like to know his birthdate. —Bonnie M., New York

A: James Arness has the unique distinction of having starred in the longest-running dramatic series on network television. For 20 years (1955-1975) he was Matt Dillon on *Gunsmoke*. He was born May 26, 1923, in Minneapolis. He fought in World War II as a combat infantryman and was wounded at Anzio in 1943. After the war he drifted to Hollywood, picking up odd jobs and bit parts in films. His friend and mentor, John Wayne, recommended him for the role of Matt Dillon. All during the series' long run, Arness was known as a loner. "Aloneness," he is quoted as saying, "is absolutely essential to my life." A divorce from his wife of many years in 1963 and the suicide of his daughter in 1975 were both borne silently. Since *Gunsmoke* he has made few appearances on television, but he recently appeared as an older Marshall Dillon in *Gunsmoke: The Last Apache*.

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

Letterman makes late-night TV varsity


As "the world's most dangerous band" plays, David Letterman appears on stage. He mugs for the camera, adjusts his tie and checks his hair in the monitor. They laugh and moan and sympathize and so begins another *Late Night With David Letterman*.

Letterman was born in Indianapolis on April 12, 1947. Even as a child he wanted to be on either radio or television. While a student at Ball State University, he got a summer job as a replacement announcer at an Indianapolis television station. Following graduation, he worked at WLWI-TV as host of a Saturday morning children's show and late-night movie, weatherman and news anchor. After a year as a radio talk-show host, he moved to Los Angeles in 1975. While there, he made his stand-up comedy debut at the famous Comedy Store nightclub.

He made his network debut as a member of the cast of *Mary*, a comedy-variety show featuring Mary Tyler Moore. Although *Mary* left the air after only three episodes, Letterman made a strong impression and was invited to be a guest on *The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson*. Eventually, Letterman became one of the show's guest hosts and Carson's heir apparent.

In 1980, NBC made Letterman the host of a short-lived morning program, *The David Letterman Show*, which earned Letterman his first two Emmy Awards.

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Conductor John Williams leads the Boston Pops Orchestra in another *Evening at Pops*, Sunday on PBS.

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

Baseball feud takes All-Star break

Like a dysfunctional family at Christmas, the American and National Leagues will try to put aside their differences Tuesday night, July 9, when they meet on CBS in the 62nd Major League Baseball All-Star Game.

Team owners in the two leagues have barely been on speaking terms since last month, when baseball commissioner Fay Vincent showed clear bias toward the National League by ruling that the American League must provide 50 percent of the players for new franchises in Miami and Denver while getting only 25 percent of the \$95 million expected to be paid by each of the expansion cities.

There hasn't been any love lost between the two leagues since the Boston Red Sox of the upstart American League stunned the Pittsburgh Pirates of the firmly-established National League in the first World Series back in 1904. The next year John T. Brush, owner of the NL champion Giants, refused to play the AL Champion Red Sox, calling the junior circuit a "bunch of minor leaguers," and the bad blood began to flow. It wasn't until almost 30 years later that a Chicago newspaper devised the All-Star Game as a way of determining which league had better overall talent.

The American League won that first meeting, but the National League holds a commanding 37-23-1 lead in the series.



(1990) Starring Jeremy Irons, Glenn Close and Ron Silver.

Jeremy Irons is Claus von Bulow, the real-life socialite convicted of trying to murder his wife, Sunny (Glenn Close). Barbet Schroeder's film picks up the case with the appeal, handled by Harvard law professor, Alan M. Dershowitz (Ron Silver).

Essentially a legal drama, the movie is also a vivid, witty picture of life among the very rich. Jeremy Irons

gives a mannered, edgy performance in what has been correctly called, "an invigorating American comedy about class and, most important, the possibility of justice in the American criminal court scene."

Perhaps because of their vast wealth and wasted lives, it is hard to take the socialites seriously. Even Mr. Dershowitz justifies his time and energy defending von Bulow by claiming that the fees he earns will pay for the defense of two innocent, poor blacks charged with murder. It's specious justification at

best.

What the public might be better told is that, although von Bulow was found innocent in his second trial, Sunny's children successfully sued von Bulow in civil court and used that money to establish the national Victim's Rights program. However, on whatever level you choose to view the film, it is an interesting glimpse into the life of the very rich - as well as into the life of an ultra left-wing CLU-type lawyer. Mr. Irons, who won an Oscar for his performance, well-deserved the Academy Award. Rated R.

Three Boxes

Errol Flynn fans, and fans of classic swashbucklers, have chastised this column for not recommending (along with *The Adventures of Robin Hood*) Flynn's immortal . . .

CAPTAIN BLOOD: (1935) Also starring Olivia de Havilland and Basil Rathbone. Errol Flynn gives a smashing debut performance as Peter Blood, a 17th century Irish

doctor sent into slavery by James II for aiding a wounded rebel. Blood escapes from his prison to become a feared pirate leader.

All the elements are here: Michael Curtiz's lean direction, the beautiful, excellent Olivia de Havilland, Erich Wolfgang Korngold's stirring musical score. (Were musical scores better when they were written in the heads of composers than committed to paper, than now, when they come from computer key boards? Or, do they just seem better?) and the inimitable Basil Rathbone, as a French pirate who fights to the death with Flynn on a beach.

Rent this one - it's "they-don't-make-'em-like-they-used-to" fun. Not rated. Would be a PG-13.
