The Brazos River Bill, which came before the lawmakers for their consideration, was passed in the Seante by a ma

The seven million dollars which the legislature was called on to appropriate, or to allow certain counties to retain over a twenty year period to be used as the basis of obtaining a loan from the Federal government with which to build the dams on the Brazos River, would have virtually solved the unemployment problem in the Brazos district, which comprises been cumulativ
It is in view of another called session of the 43 rd Legislature in the immediate future that the Seymour meeting has been called.
Before going into a discussion of the benefits, both local and state wide which will accrue from the passage of the Brazos River Bill, it would be well to review briefly the provisions of the bill. It provides for the organization of a reclamation of the Brazos River. Twelve or fourteen major dams will be built which together will impound 31-2 mililon acre feet water Finances with which to construct the improvements are to be got from the state and the federal governments. In the state's case the legislature was called upon to allow ten counties to retain their taxes for twenty years as a basis of getting the federal loan. The total sum was slightly more than seven from the public works administration, mailly As appropriation tly as a donation to aid in unemployment would finance the balance of the deal. To be eligible for a public works appropriation, the state must put up some of the money. The loan secured from the federal government would be paid back out of the money accrued from the sale of the water impounded: for irrigation purposes, for municipal water consumption, stock consumption, and for power.
