## SPILL FROM MILL TOWER IS SERIOUS

### G. W. CASSELS FALLS 32 FEET AND HAS BROKEN LEG

### 2x4 GAVE AWAY

### Bone Ends Slipped Past Each Other and Leg Was Shortened

G. W. Cassels, aged 60, resident of West Hereford, fell about thirty-two feet from the tower of his windmill just before seven o'clock Monday morning and sustained injuries which make his recovery doubtful. His left leg was broken about three or four inches above the knee and the bone ends slipped past each other, shortening the limb about four inches. He struck the tower in falling and the bulk of his weight probably descended upon his left knee. The concussion caused his left hip to swell to an extent that at first caused the belief that the hip had been unjointed, but examination proved this theory to be unfounded.

Mr. Cassels, who has been working at Spearman of late and only reached home last week, was repairing the sucker-rod in his windmill, assisted by his son, Malcolm. The young man was inside the lower holding the rod while his father stood with his head and shoulders partly through the trap in the platform. A two-by-four frame piece in the platform gave way, precipitating him downward.

The sufferer was carried to the sanitarium by W. T. Smith and a consultation of all the physicians in town was held. The bones were set and Tuesday he was reported to be resting as well as could be expected under the circumstances.

Mr. Cassels is attended by his wife and son. A son-in-law, Will Anderson of Happy, Texas with his family, arrived Monday. Two other sons-in-law, Guy Smith, of Huntington, Tenn., and J. Hall of Martin, Texas, have been notified of the accident.

### FOUNDATION LAID FOR BETTER WORK IN THE FUTURE

### 1,000 GOAL PASSED

### Last Sunday in Sunday School Drive. Was Fine Meeting

Approximately twenty-five conversions and fifty reconsecrations and reclaimations was the actual net results of the big union revival of the Methodist, Christian and Presbyterian churches which closed with the service Sunday night, but in a broader view of the meeting the outstanding feature was the splendid spirit of cooperation and fellowship between the congregations participating. This week the Missionary School by the Joint Missionary societies is starting something brand new in Hereford. Monday's attendance and interest was flattering and it is believed the week will complete another chapter of successful work for the Master, in Hereford.

## GIN MATTER THOROUGHLY TALKED OVER

### DECIDED TO BEGIN TO NEGOTIATE WITH GIN PEOPLE

### DAMAGE SLIGHT

### Plantings Hurt in Spots but Experience Says Quick Recovery

Discussion of the proposed cotton gin for Hereford engaged the attention of the business men at luncheon at the Stockmen's Cafe last Monday. The matter was brought to a head through the fact that one element believes the time is getting short for negotiations for the gin and for its erection in time to handle the fall crop while another element thought it best to wait until the farmers had time to clean out the fields following the recent heavy rains and allow the cotton that had been hard hit to recuperate and show what it will do before inviting an inspection.

Both viewpoints were thoroughly aired at the luncheon and it was finally voted to instruct the secretary to take up the matter of an inspection of the local crop with prospective gin men. That is, to make dates ahead for the near future and pave the way for active work soon. Reports on the condition of the crop at this time indicated that while the unusual rains and hail had damaged it in spots more or less there is still lots of cotton in this country and the recovery of that hurt will surprise those not familiar with the plant's amazing vitality and recuperative powers.

T. Ed Williams, undertaker of Muskogee, Okla., and a member of the Muskogee Chamber of Commerce, who was passing through to California, joined the diners and made a short address. Among other interesting things he said that the main money crop in his section was Irish potatoes. Next Monday the meeting will be held at the City Cafe. Those present Monday were: Doug Fox, D. L. ## A. E. Chamness Reports Oil Fields Prospering

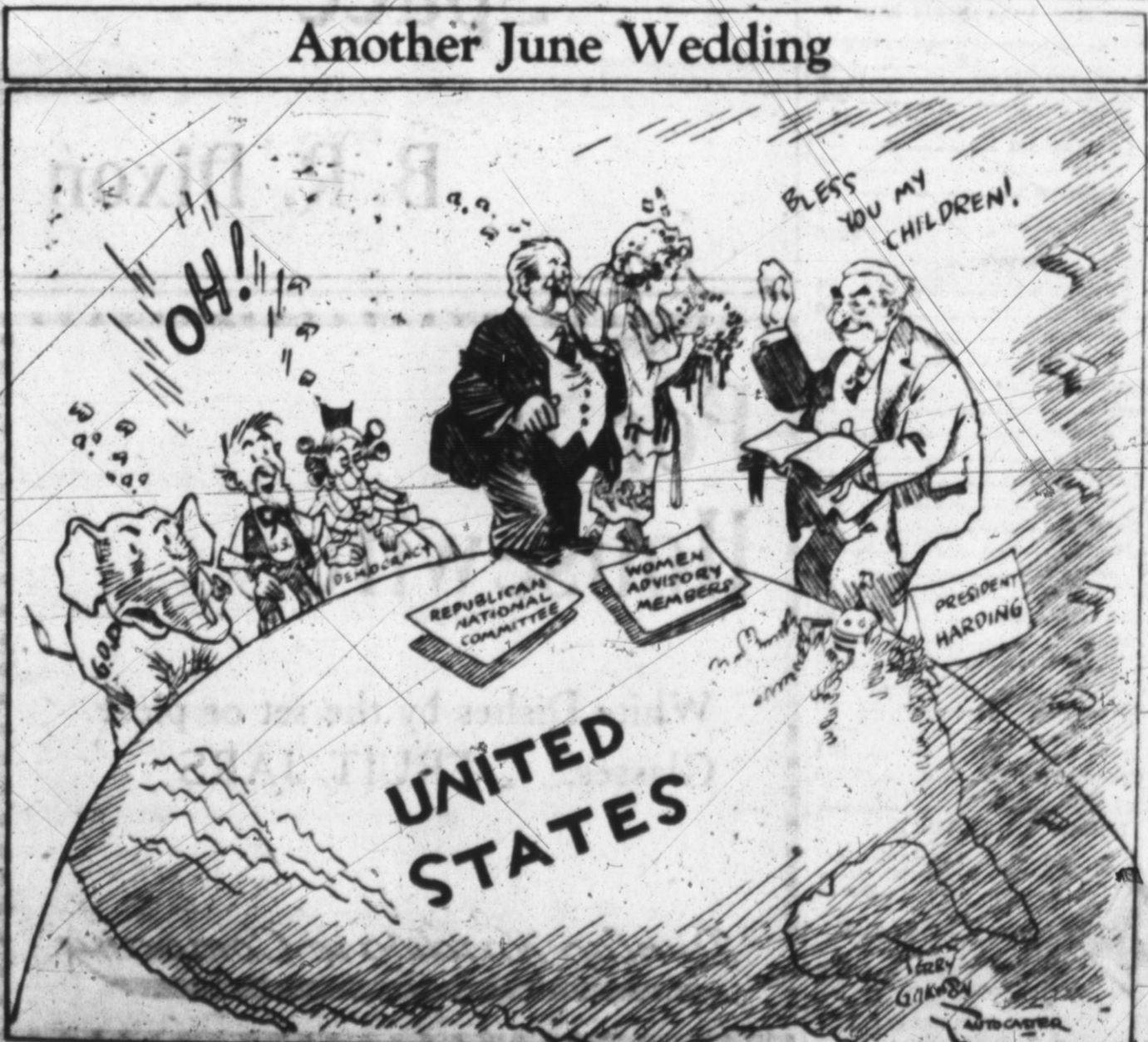

Provided, also that save for the State highway system, in all other respects, Counties shall have the right to build, construct and maintain roads, turnpikes, and bridges within their respective boundaries and the Constitutional provisions relating thereto are not qualified or repealed by reason hereof.

The Legislature, at any Regular or Special Session, is authorized and directed to pass and enact all appropriate legislation necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose and intent of these Articles.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1923, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and Laws of the State. Said election, shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT": "For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways."  
"Against the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the Amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution

of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through them, the words, "For the amendment to Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

SEC. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16**

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which relates to taxation and revenues, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, directing the Legislature to provide for the construction, operation and maintenance, under State control, of a State system of public highways; providing for an election for the ratification or rejection of amendment herein proposed, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That there be submitted to the people of Texas, for ratification or rejection at a special election provided for herein an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending said Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

SECTION 9a. The Legislature is authorized and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout

the State to be under the control of the State; and in order that the State may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities the establishment and maintenance of such system of highways, the Legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes, in addition of those permitted for other purposes in the Constitution, but such an ad valorem tax shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of this State as provided for hereinafter in this Section.

When said system shall have been designated and taken over for the State as provided in Section A hereof, the Legislature is authorized to make provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have been theretofore constructed by the Counties in the
