Hart giving up presidential bid

DENVER (AP) — Gary Hart, once the man to beat in 1988, is giving up his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination today, aides say, his hopes for the White House destroyed by a firestorm of controversy over his personal life.

Only 26 days after Hart officially entered the contest, all that remained for the former Colorado senator was a final meeting with the press to make his withdrawal official.

"That's the word," said Rodger

McDaniel, Hart's Wyoming campaign manager. "It's pretty shocking to me. I suspect it's pretty shocking to Gary Hart."

Officially, Hart's top aides were silent on the reason for the announcement today in Denver. But sources said campaign manager Bill Dixon and other aides spent Thursday on the telephone with supporters, warning them of the stunningly abrupt end to the effort.

The Washington Post reported in

today's editions that Hart made his decision after the paper presented his staff with "documented evidence of a recent liaison between Hart and a Washington woman with whom he had had a long-term relationship."

The Post quoted a senior Hart aide as saying the Post's information "accelerated the inevitable" withdrawal of Hart from the race.

In Denver, Hart spent 15 minutes talking to supporters at his headquarters. Dixon, interviewed by the

Denver Post, said, "What happened last night may well have accelerated Sen. Hart's decision to protect his family," referring to Hart's learning that other news reports were planned about his personal life, "but I don't think that was the reason for his making this decision."

Describing Hart's visit to the headquarters, Dixon said, "Gary thanked everyone and said the campaign was never about his being elected president so much as it was about a cause

and the future direction of this country, and he asked us all to carry on regardless of what his decision is tomorrow and I think everybody up there is going to carry on."

The departure of the one-time front-runner will scramble the contest, with each of the remaining eight Democratic hopefuls looking to turn the chaos quickly to his own advantage.

It was just six days ago that he (See HART, Page 2)

Clements renews no-new-taxes pledge



AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements, under fire from Republicans who feared he had retreated on his no-new-taxes pledge, today renewed his support for a \$2.9 billion lid on additional state tax revenue, aides said.

Between meetings with House Speaker Gib Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Clements said he has decided against broadening the sales tax base to include untaxed services. On Wednesday, he had said such a plan could raise more money than the \$2.9 billion limit he set on Feb. 4.

But after emerging from Lewis' office today, Clements declared: "We're not going to expand the base."

Clements insisted his earlier state-

ment that he was "being flexible" on the tax question was misinterpreted to mean he had changed his mind about new taxes.

"I haven't changed my mind. I want to make it absolutely clear to you people, I've only now made a decision. We're not going to expand the base," he said.

Hilary Doran, Clements' chief of staff, said Clements now has decided to veto "any tax bill with an expansion of the base."

"He's returned to his cap of \$2.9 billion on the revenue stream," Doran said.

Doran said Clements might allow state spending for 1988-89 to exceed the \$36.9 billion "bottom line" he set earlier, but the additional money

would have to come from non-tax sources such as a state lottery.

Clements' latest statements followed two days of meeting with Republican lawmakers who had fought higher state spending. Many of them were angered by the governor's "flexibility" statements.

In addition, the Texas Republican Party had urged the governor to hold the line.

"The undersigned strongly commend and encourage those Republican state representatives who continue to stand firm against, repeat, against any tax increase," said a resolution the Republican Par-

DOE, Battelle workers moving into local offices

Department of Energy employees and sub-contractors are moving into their new Hereford offices this week. DOE and general sub-contractor Parsons-Redpath are sharing offices at 110 North 25 Mile Ave. in what local residents knew as a one-time bowling alley.

Building owner Henry Reid, of HCR Real Estate Company, leased the site to DOE and hired renovation crews to work around the clock to convert the old bowling alley into offices which meet the specified requirements of the government division responsible for site characterization studies related to the possible placement of a nuclear waste repository in farmland north of town.

Battelle Corporation is locating its Hereford base on west highway 60 in what was Barrick Furniture and Appliance store. Loren Barrick remains owner of the building which has been let on a temporary lease to the sub-contracting company responsible for much of the technical data which will be required in the site characterization process.

The owners of the buildings were winners of a competitive bidding process in which they were the low bidders for nine month leases with optional renewal. Because of the short period of time the companies have to move into offices and begin operations to meet with DOE requirements Parsons-Redpath and Battelle employees have been placed in these offices pending accepting bids for permanent office space.

Financial obligation for the renovation of the buildings were the responsibility of the respective owners. Reid estimates he has spent upwards of \$100,000 upgrading his property but expects the investment to pay off through the current lease and any future businesses interested in leasing the office space.

The companies themselves were responsible for furnishing the offices with equipment and it is this area which has caused some strife between the big-time business people who have government regulations they are required to follow and the local businessmen who were disqualified by restrictions on an office furniture contract.

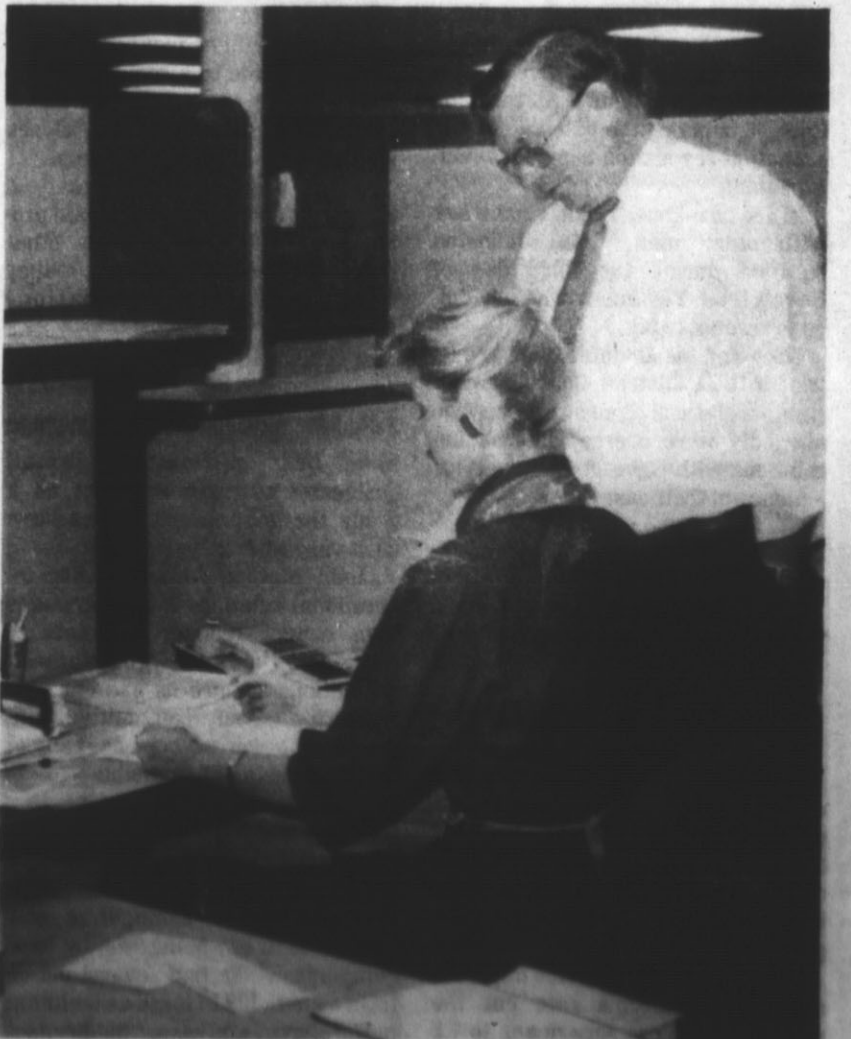
Battelle's manager of contracts and procurements, Ken Schmader, feels he has done everything possible to give local businesses a fair opportunity to bid for his company's supplies. Schmader points out that a disproportionate amount of money, per capita, has been spent in Hereford.

City Commissioner Tom Legate, who is a representative on the Waste Deposit Impact Committee feels that the contract in question placed unreasonable restrictions on local business by giving them a time frame of only a few days to respond with a bid and by making a requirement that the company the contract be awarded to provide references in which they had placed a large number of office service equipment in the past.

"My concern is to be assured locals won't be cut out of the bidding process by restrictions," says Legate who has voiced his concern to local Battelle and DOE employees. Legate says that in his own mind the time requirements and the reference requirements were unreasonable.

One local business office equipment sales manager stated that though initially in agreement with Legate's assessment they have since decided the time involved to install the sophisticated equipment would

Secord likely to face indictment, says senator

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retired Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord, portrayed in three days of testimony as an aggressive manager of the Iran-Contra arms deals, will almost certainly be indicted as a result of what he has told Congress, according to a member of the Senate investigating panel.

Secord faced more tough questioning from members of the House and Senate committees when he came back for a fourth day at the witness table today.

Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., a former chief justice of his state's Supreme Court, said enough questions were raised in Thursday's grilling about possible lawbreaking in the sale of U.S. weapons to Iran and diversion of payments to the Nicaraguan Contras to haul Secord into court.

"I don't think there's any question that his testimony today will cause his indictment," Heflin said in an interview after the nearly six hours of questioning. "It will of necessity mean the special prosecutor will bring an indictment."

A jury ultimately will have to decide whether Secord evaded taxes on money he controlled in the deals, violated a congressional ban on Contra aid, defrauded the taxpayers or helped wage war against a country with which the United States is at peace, Heflin said.

"I think there's such a conflict between the interpretation of the facts," he said. "He's either a Dr. Jekyll or a Mr. Hyde. We have got a clear jury case."

But others thought Secord survived the intense questioning by chief Senate committee lawyer Arthur I.

Liman and by members of the two panels in relatively good shape.

"I think he handled them quite well," said Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah. "There is always something somebody can question. But he's a straight shooter."

Among the issues brought out during Thursday's questioning was distribution of money by Secord's business partner, Albert Hakim, into several Swiss bank accounts. Some of the transfers appeared intended for Secord, said Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., who urged Secord to sign a release that would let investigators obtain the bank records needed to find out where the money went.

Secord declined to do so immediately, but said he was inclined to sign and would decide within a few days.

Clements signs drinking ban

AUSTIN (AP) — With the stroke of a pen, Gov. Bill Clements is putting the brakes on drinking while driving.

Clements, who says he's never hoisted a drink while behind the wheel, Thursday signed into law a bill that prohibits drinking while driving.

"I think it's been long overdue. I'm delighted to see it go on the books," Clements said after putting his signature on the legislation sponsored by Sen. Bill Sarpalius, D-Amarillo.

The new law, which takes effect Aug. 31, will not extend to passengers in the vehicle, lawmakers said.

Clements said he believes the measure will reduce highway fatalities.

"Alcohol and automobiles can be a volatile combination. The combination has resulted in deaths, wasted lives and destruction. There is no argument against a measure that seeks to end this unnecessary misery," Clements said.

Current Texas law prohibits driving while intoxicated, but it does not prohibit drinking while driving.

In a report to the Legislature written last year, the House Liquor Regulation Committee said many states have open-container bans.

In addition, 27 Texas municipalities had open-container ordinances. But those had come under question with an attorney general's opinion which said the state's alcoholic beverage code is the exclusive law on transportation and possession of alcoholic beverages, the report said.

The bill signed Thursday was supported by several groups, including Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

\$11 billion spent on child care

WASHINGTON (AP) — Child care costs Americans billions of dollars each year, and problems such as the inability to find a baby sitter disrupt the jobs of 450,000 parents a month, a government study shows.

Some 5.9 percent of employed mothers using child care other than schools reported that they or their husbands lost time from work monthly because of problems with their child care arrangements, the Census Bureau reported Thursday. That would add up to an estimated 450,000 parents a month with baby-sitting or other child-care problems.

Even so, American families spend an estimated \$11.1 billion annually on child care, according to the survey of 19,000 households taken in the winter of 1984-85.

The study, "Who's Minding the Kids," was designed to measure the extent of child-care services used by employed mothers across the nation.

It found that 5.3 million families with employed mothers pay for child care, at an average cost of \$40.33 a week. That includes family arrangements in which some money is paid to a relative to watch the children, as well as baby sitters and professional day-care services.

Of the 7.7 million women using some type of child care service — whether paid for or not — those most often facing work disruptions had their child cared for at the home of another person — 7.8 percent. Professional day care centers had the fewest problems, 1.3 percent. The women were asked whether they or their husband had lost time from work in the month prior to the interview because of problems with their child-care arrangements.

Judge questioned about his sex life

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A woman who had a case pending before State District Judge Tom testified she was told she could get favorable treatment in exchange for sex, but then turned down the offer.

Tyda Jo Johnston, 25, a tools saleswoman, testified Thursday she was encouraged last year to meet with Cave or one of his co-defendants, bail bondsman Dorsey Adams and attorney Ronald Aultman.

Ms. Johnston said Cave placed her on probation after a drug arrest in 1984. When she was arrested in January for a drug violation and feared her probation would be revoked, she said she consulted attorney Aultman.

Before that meeting, Adams posted her bond on the drug charge and suggested "I could give a little rendezvous" with him, Aultman or Cave to enhance the outcome of her probation revocation hearing, which is pending.

"I let him know I didn't have sex with older men," Ms. Johnston testified during the third day of Cave's trial. Testimony was scheduled to resume today.

Cave and his co-defendants are on trial in U.S. District Court for civil rights violations against women who allegedly were coerced into sexual relations with Cave in exchange for leniency in their cases.

Under questioning by defense attorneys, Ms. Johnston said neither Cave nor Aultman had propositioned her, and admitted to using amphetamines and cocaine during the time of her conversations with Adams.

Dedria Nelson, a 23-year-old prostitute who frequently visited Cave's court, testified Wednesday she had sex with Cave and James McEntire, the chief prosecutor in Cave's district.

Thursday on the witness stand, McEntire criticized Cave's alleged familiarity with women under court supervision and accused the judge of giving them favorable treatment.

Minutes later, however, McEntire, was testifying about his own encounter with Ms. Nelson.

McEntire said he met her in a bar, gave her a ride to a motel, but contrary to the woman's testimony Wednesday, did not have oral sex with her on the seat of his pickup.

Asked whether the 57-year-old Cave treated "attractive female probationers" differently than other defendants, McEntire said, "they didn't get (their probation) revoked."

have been difficult for small businesses to meet and that as a whole the government offices have been very fair.

Linda McClain, manager for institutional relations for DOE, states "We cannot restrict contracts to Hereford because government regulations require us and our contractors to seek competitive contracts. However we hope as many of the contracts as possible go to Hereford business."

Stating the DOE has made a commitment to Hereford, McClain lists the recent building leases as evidence of the competitive contracts which are being won by local companies. "We had several out-of-town owners bid to lease us buildings in Hereford," she says, "but because the bids from Hereford people were lower they won."

McClain added that local business may benefit from workshops which are being planned to provide assistance in understanding the government procurement process and to give guidance on how to bid government contracts.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The abrupt withdrawal of front-runner Gary Hart from the Democratic presidential race transforms the contest into a struggle among seven politicians little known outside their own areas and another candidate that few think can win the nomination.

Only the Rev. Jesse Jackson can claim a significant national following.

The others? They are names like Babbitt, Biden, Clinton, Dukakis, Gephardt, Gore and Simon.

Until this disastrous week, Hart was running significantly ahead of all his rivals in the polls. It was the

former Colorado senator against the field. The race was his to lose, and he lost it more swiftly than anyone could have imagined.

Now, according to his Wyoming campaign manager, Rodger McDaniel, Hart will announce today in Denver he is pulling out.

So, the second tier of candidates

becomes the first tier until some one or two can break away.

But Hart's departure also opens the door for new entrants, including some who had decided this probably wasn't their year.

If any of the contenders could claim front-runner status upon Hart's departure it would be Jackson. His support among black voters — the largest group in the Democratic camp — surprised the political establishment in 1984 when he finished third behind Walter F. Mondale and Hart in the Democratic race.

But Jackson's race and his political position to the left of where Democratic leaders think the party ought to be makes him a very long shot for the nomination.

Most prominent among those who decided against running was Gov. Mario Cuomo of New York, and he insisted Thursday he would not change his mind.

Hart's withdrawal "has nothing to do with me," said Cuomo. "The reasons I chose not to run have nothing to do with Gary Hart, have nothing to do with my position in the polls; they have nothing to do with whether or not I could win."

Cuomo's reluctance won't still the voices eager to get the New York governor into the race.

Sen. Sam Nunn of Georgia, another politician who drew prominent mention as a potential candidate, put his plans on hold last winter and said he would re-examine the situation this summer. He's certain to find the situation dramatically changed from February.

Of the announced candidates, Gov. Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts is well known in neighboring New Hampshire, the site of the first primary.

A poll of 400 likely New Hampshire primary voters conducted for The Boston Herald and WBZ-TV said Thursday that Hart, who was tied with Dukakis a week ago at 32 percent each, had fallen behind Dukakis 27 percent to 17 percent.

But Dukakis' disadvantage may be the high expectations for him in New Hampshire, a state with a notoriously contrary electorate and a history of being unkind to Massachusetts politicians.

Former Gov. Bruce Babbitt of Arizona recently gambled by committing \$250,000 on television advertising in Iowa, the state that leads off the Democratic process with precinct caucuses eight days before the New Hampshire primary.

Hart campaign was staggered by a story in The Miami Herald, saying he had entertained a 29-year-old model overnight in his Washington townhouse. Both Hart and the woman, Donna Rice of Miami, denied they were having an affair, but they admitted they also had made an overnight cruise aboard a yacht to a Caribbean island in March. There, Hart said, they slept on separate boats.

Hart subsequently refused to answer questions about whether he had ever committed adultery.

Criticism of Hart grew as skepticism about his version of events overshadowed questions about the completeness and correctness of the newspaper's story.

His standing in the polls — where his No. 1 position had not been threatened by the pack of long shot hopefuls — began to drop. And Democrats began to question whether he could continue in the race.

"He's obviously seriously wounded, and I believe it's fatal," said Wisconsin Senate Majority Leader Joseph Stroh before word of Hart's decision spread. Stroh is a Hart supporter in 1984.

Even early in the week, as Hart struggled to continue the campaign, he spoke of the end.

ty Officials Committee sent to lawmakers.

"Keep the faith and keep your word to the citizens of Texas," said the resolution signed by eight Republicans, including GOP Chairman George Strake and GOP National Committee members Fran Chiles of Fort Worth and Ernest Angelo of Midland.

John Weaver, Texas GOP director, said the resolution also was aimed at Clements. "We want to hear from the governor if he's in favor of raising taxes above \$2.9 billion or not," Weaver told the Austin American-Statesman.

Clements and legislative leaders have been conferring all week over the budget impasse. The House has passed a \$39.4 billion two-year budget and the Senate approved a \$39.9 billion plan, both requiring more taxes than Clements had said he would approve.

GOP lawmakers were adamant that the Republican governor stand firm against additional taxes.

Rep. Randy Pennington, R-Houston, who was among GOP

lawmakers to meet with Clements Thursday, said the governor would be breaking his word to voters if he approves a larger tax increase.

"In the meeting this morning, he said he was exploring all options. Of course, we've heard all that garbage before," Pennington said.

"We all reminded him he made a promise to the people of this state. It was, as far as we were concerned, a covenant with the people of this state, and that we expect him to abide by that. That's why he was elected.

"The political reality is that if he turns on those people, then he will go down in history as one of the worst governors this state has ever had," Pennington said.

Rep. Mike Toomey, R-Houston, said he doesn't object to Clements listening to the options, but he acknowledged that Clements' earlier hard-line talk against taxes had put the governor in a tough spot.

"He is in a box. If he doesn't do that, he's branded as an inflexible old codger. And if he does it, he's branded as abandoning his position," Toomey said.

THE SAC FLY RULE
NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball's sacrifice fly rule has been changed a number of times since its inception in the early part of the 20th century. In 1908, the rule was instituted and stated that a runner must score on a fly ball for it to be considered a sacrifice. In 1926, it was changed to read that he only had to advance a base. In 1939, it reverted to a situation where the base runner must score. In 1940, the rule was taken out completely. Then, in 1954, it was reinstated to give credit for a sacrifice, meaning no time at bat, if a runner scored.

The cork center was not added to the official major-league baseball until 1910.

Cut Seattle's lead to 2-1 in series

Rockets down SuperSonics, 102-84

SEATTLE (AP) — Akeem Olajuwon and the Houston Rockets delivered an emphatic answer to the Seattle SuperSonics' hopes for a sweep of their NBA second-round playoff series.

There won't be one. With the 7-foot Olajuwon leading the way with a dominating performance of 33 points, 11 rebounds and four blocked shots, the Rockets breezed to a 102-84 victory Thursday night in game three of the best-of-seven series. Olajuwon had 22 points in the opening half as Houston built up a 23-point lead and Seattle never could recover.

"We'd won five straight and we realized it couldn't go on forever," said the Sonics' Tom Chambers.

So the series, which the Sonics hoped to end Saturday afternoon in Seattle, is now 2-1 in Seattle's favor. The series will go back to Houston for game five Tuesday night.

And by the way the Rockets played Thursday night, the Sonics have to be worried.

"I'm very pleased," said Houston Coach Bill Fitch. "Any time you're down 2-0, you never know what to expect, especially with the way Seattle has been playing."

The Rockets won the game with a stifling defense in the opening half, building a 56-33 halftime lead. The Sonics scored just 13 points in the second quarter.

The 33 points was the lowest total for a single half by the Sonics in their playoff history.

Olajuwon was a sparkling 14 of 20 from the floor while Sonics' playoff hero Dale Ellis was held to 12 points, 20 below his scoring average in the first two games against Houston. Ellis was just 5 of 19 from the floor, including 1 of 5 from three-point range.

Chambers led the Sonics with 24 points but was only 10 of 22 from the

field.

"We took the Sonics' inside game and they were cold in their outside shooting," said Olajuwon.

Olajuwon had 26 and 27 points in Houston's first two playoff losses in Texas.

"I was pleased with my game tonight but, emotionally, I don't get up or down one way or the other," he said.

Ralph Sampson, the other half of Houston's celebrated Twin Towers, chipped in with 18 points and seven rebounds. Olajuwon scored 14 points and Sampson 11 in the first quarter as the Rockets built a 29-20 lead.

"Seattle was bound to cool off," said Sampson. "It was just a matter of time."

The Sonics finished off the heavily favored Dallas Mavericks with three straight victories to take their opening playoff series 3-1 and then won the first two games of the Houston series for a season-high five consecutive triumphs.

Sonics Coach Bernie Bickerstaff said he thinks Houston's lopsided triumph would be beneficial to his team. Seattle lost the first game of the Dallas series 151-129.

"I think this loss is going to bring us down to earth," he said. "We can't be overconfident after this one. But we have to come out and play with a lot more intensity on Saturday."

Fitch and the Rockets reached the NBA finals last season, losing in six games to the Boston Celtics after getting past the Los Angeles Lakers in the Western Conference finals.

Houston beat Portland 3-1 in its

opening playoff series this season.

"We have to come back with the same kind of intensity Saturday," said Fitch. "I thought we showed a lot of heart tonight. I think Saturday's game could be our toughest game of the whole season."

Ellis and Kevin Williams of the Sonics were arrested and jailed in Houston early last Sunday after game one of the series following an altercation in a Houston nightclub. Ellis said he wanted to sweep the Rockets because of his arrest.

"We have to give Houston a lot of credit," said Williams. "They made adjustments to our traps and closed off the passing lanes."

Seattle's Xavier McDaniel also had a poor performance, scoring just 12 points on six-for-15 shooting from the floor.

And the Sonics' center tandem of Clemon Johnson and Alton Lister had a total of four points and six rebounds.

"This win gives us a different attitude," said Fitch. "We should have a little more confidence."
