LOOKING UP LAW ON SUBJECT

COMPLAINT

Being Made Over Unsportsman-like Tactics in Seining Stream

Recently strong protests have been volced in this community over the afpeople in seining the Tierra Blanco for bass and perch. Local fishermen are unanimons in condemning a practice which they declare is growing and will ultimately result in destroying the best fishing grounds in the Panhandle of Texas and will deprive Hereford of one of the most valuable natural assets she роннениев.

It is pointed out by these enthusiasts that the Tierra Blanco is a magnet for the campers and fish-hungry tourists of many states, who come here annually to the little stream in search of pleasare and relaxation. Its advertising value is beyond measure. Besides att this, they point out, the seining practice is unlawful. Therefore they have gone to the county attorney, Owen P. Smith, and asked him to look up the w on the subject. And here's what

Agt. 923 ff. It shall be unlawful for Raymond Hawkins any ferson to take or eaten fish in the public tresh water rivers, creeks, lakes, bayous, gools, lagoons or tanks of this State, by any other means than by the meshes of which are three inches inches square, or by a minnow seine of Raymond is carrying a nice line of more than twenty feet in length; and it creeks, lakes, bayous, pools, lagoons or tanks of this State any net or other device or trap for taking or catching hish other than a set or drag net or seine the meshes of which are less than four inches square. Any person violating any provision of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined any sum not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars. (Acts of

1919, 36th Legislature). Art. 923 fff. Use of metallic nets prohibited. Pensity fine not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00.

Art. 923 ffff. Provides that Fish, Game and Oyster Commissioner mag close any waters against the use of any kind of nets or seines any time he thinks it necessary to profeet and conserve the fish. But before closing such waters he must post notices to such effect two weeks prior to cosing at three places in proximity to the waters to be closed.

Art. 923 p. All fresh water rivers and streams are declared for the purposes of this act to be fresh water streams and rivers to their mouths.

Art. 923 q. Provides No seine or net. of any character, or artificial balt, except a minnow seine not exceeding 20 feet in length, shall be used in the public fresh waters of the State during the months of March and April; penalty not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 fine.

Art. 907. Catching, taking or killing fish in any fresh water streams in the State by use of explosives or polson. prohibited. Penalty: Fine not under \$25.00 no more than \$200.00 and by confinement in County jail not less than 30 days for more than 90 days.

Art. 872 cc. All bass less than 11 inches in length caught in any many ner whatsoever in fresh water streams shall be immediately returned to the

Art. 870. Fishing in private owned lakes or pools with seines without consent of owner punishable not less than \$19.00 por more than \$100.00.


