DILLEHAY TALKS

New School Superintendent Asks for Cooperation in Starting Work

Another dandy good weekly luncheon was held by the Chamber of Commerce at the Cordova Hotel Monday, a capacity crowd being present. And it was a stalling, joking, good-natured bunch from start to finish. There was the usual spirit of good natured fun that has characterized these luncheons from the beginning and it was a laugh from start to finish.

For instance Messrs Black and Parker were seated side by side. Mr. Parker kept Mr. Black busy passing the chicken pie and finally gravely acknowledged the excellent service he got with the compliment that "the Blacks always were good waiters!" Mr. Black never batted an eye but bided his time. After everyone else had finished Mr. Parker called attention to the fact that Mr. Black was still eating. "Why," defended Mr. Black, "you see I have been waiting on the table—that's why I am behind."

G. B. Overton, new proprietor of the Star Theatre, told of the opening of the house of amusement for daily pictures and asked the cooperation of the citizenship. He wound up with a funny story at the expense of his father, who sat nearby, whereupon Dr. Overton said that the crowd need not be surprised to hear the whacks of his razor stop after the meeting.

E. C. Eubanks of the Western National Bank, made the report for the three committees who attended the annual convention of the Texas-New Mexico Highway association at Springer, N. M., last week. The other committees were D. E. Ashbrook and L. Baskin. Mr. Eubanks gave a clear and concise history of the highway association, of the meeting, and urged the united local support for the new road, the shortest line to the great park playgrounds of New Mexico and Colorado.

Professor Dillehay, new school superintendent, made his maiden speech before a Hereford audience and made a pleasing impression. He said he had been attracted by the neat and homelike appearance of the city which led him to believe that people who inhabit such a town must be good people with whom to live. Ireland was appointed a committee of one to get the crowd together and all were urged to go if possible and help make a good showing for Hereford.

Judge Kerr of Dimmitt was asked for a talk and made a pleasant and friendly address upon the close relations existing between the people of Castro and Deaf Smith counties and the good will and fellowship that is felt on both sides of the county line for the people who live on the other side. The Judge's talk bristled with kindly feeling and cooperation and met an instant and hearty response from every man present.

Chairman Homer Wilkinson announced that he was celebrating his thirty-ninth birthday with this dinner, and then proceeded to pass around the cigars. Incidentally, he mentioned the fact that he had been born in Arkansas whereupon Dr. Overton congratulated him heartily upon his nerve in allowing such information to leak out, and the bunch adjourned until next Monday, when the dinner will be held at the Stockmen's Cafe. FISH SEINING IS REGULATED BY LAW

COUNTY ATTORNEY IS LOOKING UP LAW ON SUBJECT

BIG COMPLAINT

Being Made Over Unsportsman-like Tactics in Seining Stream

Recently strong protests have been voiced in this community over the alleged unsportsman-like work of some people in seining the Tierra Blanco for bass and perch. Local fishermen are unanimous in condemning a practice which they declare is growing and will ultimately result in destroying the best fishing grounds in the Panhandle of Texas and will deprive Hereford of one of the most valuable natural assets she possesses.

It is pointed out by these enthusiasts that the Tierra Blanco is a magnet for the campers and fish-hungry tourists of many states, who come here annually to the little stream in search of pleasure and relaxation. Its advertising value is beyond measure. Besides all this, they point out, the seining practice is unlawful. Therefore they have gone to the county attorney, Owen P. Smith, and asked him to look up the law on the subject. And here's what Mr. Smith has found in the statutes: Art. 923 ff. It shall be unlawful for any person to take or catch fish in the public fresh water rivers, creeks, lakes, bays, pools, lagoons or tanks of this State, by any other means than by the ordinary hook and line or trout line, or by a set or drag net or seine, the meshes of which are three inches square or trammel net the meshes of any part of which are less than three inches square, or by a minnow seine of more than twenty feet in length; and it shall be unlawful for any person to place in the public fresh water rivers, creeks, lakes, bays, pools, lagoons or tanks of this State any net or other device or trap for taking or catching fish other than a set or drag net or seine the meshes of which are less than four inches square. Any person violating any provision of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined any sum not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars. (Acts of 1919, 36th Legislature).

Art. 923 ff. Use of metallic nets prohibited. Penalty fine not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00. Art. 923 ff. Provides that Fish, Game and Oyster Commissioner may close any waters against the use of any kind of nets or seines any time he thinks it necessary to protect and conserve the fish. But before closing such waters he must post notices to such effect two weeks prior to closing at three places in proximity to the waters to be closed. Art. 923 p. All fresh water rivers and streams are declared for the purposes of this act to be fresh water streams and rivers to their mouths. Art. 923 q. Provides No seine or net of any character, or artificial bait, except a minnow seine not exceeding 20 feet in length, shall be used in the public fresh waters of the State during the months of March and April; penalty not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 fine.

Art. 907. Catching, taking or killing fish in any fresh water streams in the State by use of explosives or poison prohibited. Penalty: Fine not under \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00 and by confinement in County Jail not less than 30 days nor more than 90 days. Art. 972 cc. All bass less than 11 inches in length caught in any manner whatsoever in fresh water streams shall be immediately returned to the water.

Art. 870. Fishing in private owned lakes or pools with seines without consent of owner punishable not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00.
