Hereford to join SSC procurement

The Hereford City Commission has adopted a resolution to do its part in attracting the Department of Energy's Super-Conductor Super-Collider project to the Texas Panhandle.

Commissioners Monday night heard a report from Mike Carr, Chamber of Commerce exec, on meetings held with other panhandle area towns planning on how to lure the \$3-6 billion construction of the SSC to a site near Happy in the vicinity of the Arney community.

Amarillo's Chamber has been soliciting money and in-kind dona-

tions to help procure the project and has requested that Deaf Smith County find about \$2 million in cash, goods or services for part of a proposal to be submitted by mid-May. The top part of the Panhandle will compete with another site near Reese AFB in Lubbock and many others across the nation. The Amarillo site would have a border about 5 miles from Hereford.

DOE seeks at least 16,000 acres of land on which 7,800 acres would be buildings.

Commissioners discussed offers

the city could make and determined that effluent water from the waste water treatment plant would be a possible gift for the proposal.

Commissioner Emory Brownlow reminded the panel that this commission could not commit a later panel or the taxpayers to something like that. The commission unanimously adopted the resolution to support the pursuit of the SSC and unanimously voted to say that the city would consider the provision of effluent water should the project move to the area.

Commissioners also heard a report from Charlie Ruiz on the Amistad

Housing project. The item was tabled so that Ruiz could bring more information.

Objections to the housing location were expressed by the Hereford Day Care board, represented by president Boyd Foster. He said he had no argument that more housing is needed, but he had concerns about the location near the day care center on Norton Street.

Street problems in the area could cause a safety problem and a disruption of day care center traffic since there is no through street to the south or the west. All traffic would move on Norton and unpaved roads.

He also mentioned possible problems with vandalism of playground equipment being used by children from the housing project. He said that the center has been in that

neighborhood for 16 years and has only had two petty crime problems in the past five years.

After an executive session of about 30 minutes, the commissioners all voted for the city attorney Earnest Langley to proceed with litigation against Ed Wuerflein for violation of building permit codes.

All commissioners except Bud Eades were present.

Clements promises no new tax

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements, vowing not to cut education or human services expenditures, promised to ax a budget proposal higher than his own plan.

Clements kicked off his 17-city austerity tour on Monday with stops in Laredo and Harlingen, pledging he would not sign a budget above \$36.9 billion.

"In the last year and a half, the people of Texas made it clear to me they understand we can restrain spending without cutting essential services, even if they don't know the line-item detail of the budget," Clements said.

The state faces a projected \$5.8 billion deficit for 1988-89, but Clements said taxes was not the answer to balancing state spending.

At both stops he said taxes would discourage businesses from relocating to the state, which would hurt the unemployed.

farmers who soon must secure credit for their 1987 crop production," Rep. Ed Jones, D-Tenn., said Monday in a letter to Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng.

Jones, chairman of the credit subcommittee, said an additional \$542.5 million should be made available by Lyng through powers granted to him under the 1985 farm law. It enables the secretary to transfer 25 percent of funds available for Farmers Home Administration loan guarantees to direct loans.

That still would leave nearly \$1 billion for loan guarantees, Jones said.

"As the time for spring planting approaches, thousands of farmers across the nation are facing the very real possibility that they will not obtain sufficient credit to finance their operations this year," Jones said.

He issued a statement saying that FmHA had "virtually exhausted" April-June operating loan accounts by April 17 in 21 states. It identified the states as Alabama, California, Georgia, Idaho, Louisiana, Maine, Minnesota, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming.

Lyng was on a visit to Japan. FmHA spokesman Marlyn Aycock said he could not respond to the Jones letter, but he acknowledged that "direct funds are being used up in places," adding that "we have a lot of guarantee authority."

He said that, under the program in

which FmHA guarantees 90 percent of bank loans to farmers, 635 loans totaling \$57.5 million have been made thus far this year compared to \$50 for \$43 million in the same period last year.

"Our position is that we have the lending authority to take care of them," Aycock said.

Jones said in his letter, however, that FmHA has made "commendable progress" in using the loan guarantee program in some states. But he said the record in other states falls short of expectations.

"For a variety of reasons, FmHA's loan guarantee program simply is not working in too many areas of the country and farmers cannot afford the consequences of this failing experiment," Jones said.

House Speaker predicts approval of two arms control proposals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House will approve two arms control proposals this week despite Reagan administration fears that they will hamper U.S.-Soviet negotiations and the possibility that an arms agreement is "quite near," says Speaker Jim Wright.

The Texas Democrat, who returned Monday night from meetings with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev and other high-ranking officials, said "we have the impression that they are quite near to an accord," referring to both nations.

Wright said "there seems to be the best opportunity that has existed, probably since the Russian revolution (in 1917), to bring about an arms control agreement."

However, Wright said "it will be my guess that the House will pass" the restrictions when it considers a spending bill later this week.

Wright made his remarks at Andrews Air Force Base after he and 13 other congressmen returned from a six-day stay in the Soviet Union.

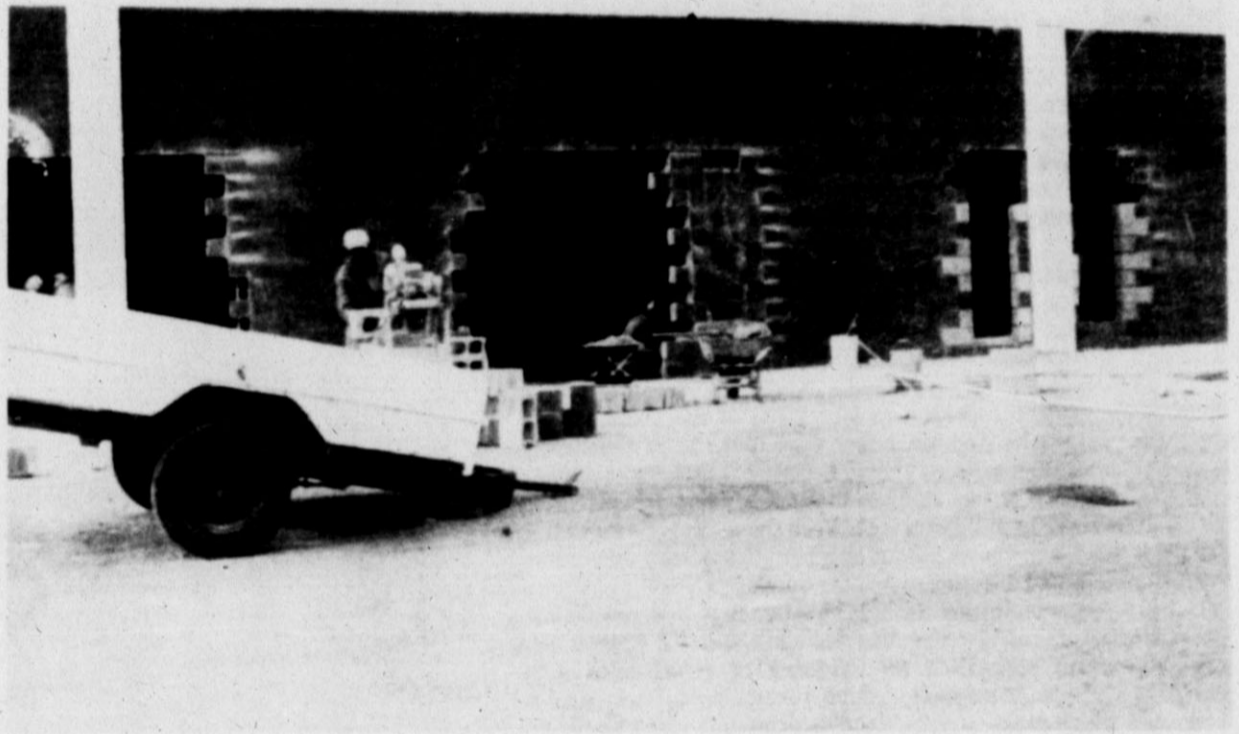
During that time, Secretary of State George P. Shultz traveled to Moscow to meet with Soviet leaders. Shultz has since returned amid optimistic assessments in both countries that an agreement may be near to eliminate medium- and short-range nuclear weapons from Europe.

Meanwhile, high-level NATO officials gathered here this week to plot western nuclear strategy and discuss the new Soviet proposal. The informal talks among the 16 members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization were scheduled before last week's developments.

The arms control restrictions are expected to be considered by the Democratic-controlled House later this week as it takes up a bill appropriating \$11 billion in the current fiscal year for a variety of government programs.

The bill includes a pair of arms control proposals added by the Appropriations Committee.

One would require the United States to comply with the unratified SALT II treaty that Reagan says will no longer guide his decisions on which long-range atomic weapons to

Rural home burglarized

Deaf Smith County sheriff's deputies are still counting the estimate on a home north of Hereford that was burglarized at some time during the last eight months while the residents were gone.

The date of the burglary is unknown and deputies have so far tallied a loss of \$3,250 since investigation began Monday.

Deputies also are investigating the theft of saddles and padlocks north of town. Juveniles are involved.

Also under investigation is a stolen pickup taken Saturday from the Tri-State Chemical yard which was found in Amarillo. Missing from the pickup is a shotgun. Deputies report the pickup was unlocked with the keys in it.

Other reports filed were for family disturbances, assault, hot check problems and criminal mischief at the Oldham County Country Club golf course.

Hereford youth dies in park accident in Amarillo

A Hereford teen-age boy died Sunday in Amarillo when a restraining bar in a roller coaster ride gave way, hurling him about 10 feet in the air, officials said.

An autopsy was ordered on the body of Miguel Perez, 15. Amarillo police say the accident at Wonderland Park was under investigation by the state and the park's insurance company.

The boy's family had prepared to enjoy a cookout Sunday afternoon when Miguel begged to be allowed back on the Zyklon ride, said Angie Perez, the child's mother.

"He asked me, 'Mama, can I ride the coaster one more time? Just one more?'" Ms. Perez said through tears.

Ms. Perez said she agreed reluctantly to her son's request and that she and her younger son, Marcelo, watched Miguel board the last car of the Zyklon, also known as the Big Coaster.

Marcelo said that as the ride was coming to an end, he saw the bar that restrained his brother fly up and Miguel fall.

Amarillo Medical Services were called at 6:05 p.m. and an ambulance arrived at 6:10 at Wonderland, but an AMS spokesman said there was nothing the emergency workers could do for the teen.

Wonderland operator Paul Borchardt said the restraining bar is put

He said he regretted the accident but that the rides are safe.

"Our own children have ridden this ride this weekend, so we know the rides are mechanically safe," Borchardt said.

The Zyklon, a multi-car train that rides along red tracks, is one of three roller coaster-type rides at the park. The Cyclone has one car and the Texas Tornado has red cars on large, white painted loops.

"The Zyklon has been in the park 12 years and has had only first-aid type accidents. We inspect it every day," he said.

Perez was a native of Hereford and attended Stanton Junior High where he had been a member of Vocational Opportunity Clubs of Texas. Stanton counselor Sharon Holmes said Perez was a "good hard worker" in his general mechanics class and that had led him to a hobby of working on cars.

"Many students said they would miss him," she said about the quiet boy.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marcelo Perez of the home; two brothers, Marcello Jr. and Moses, both of the home; and his grandparents, Lorenza Perez of Hereford and Falomena Moreno of Dalhart.

Man 'holds up' his hold-up

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — A man who needed \$300 to pay for his pistol decided to get the money by using the weapon to rob a convenience store, police say.

The man was arrested inside the store because he held up the hold-up when customers walked into the store, officers said.

Clay Douglas Sanders, 24, of Abilene, was being held today in lieu of \$7,500 bond on a charge of aggravated robbery, according to Justice of the Peace Clarence Collins.

Assistant District Attorney Melissa Annis said the man went to an Allsup's convenience store Monday in an attempt to get money to pay for the pistol because he knew the store's clerk.

He asked the clerk to give him the money, but instead the clerk suggested the robber sell his truck to raise cash, Annis said.

The robber didn't like the suggestion. "It's serious enough to rob somebody, but not serious enough to go without transportation," the clerk quoted the man as saying.

The robber then showed the clerk he had a gun stuffed in his belt and threatened to use it if the clerk didn't give him money, Annis said.

Three men came into the store before the clerk opened the cash register and the man waited for the men to leave before he renewed his demand for money. This gave the clerk time to trip a silent alarm.

Two more customers came in and the man again delayed completing the robbery. Police arrived before the clerk could finish taking the money out of the cash register.

Evidence of deer cross-breeding found

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — White-tailed deer and mule deer are cross-breeding in West Texas, providing evidence of mating between two species of large mammals in the wild, researchers say.

"We're working now to find out just how widespread this phenomenon is," said Dr. Steve Carr of Texas A&M University. "It's important to understand as genetics is an important factor in wildlife biology."

Researchers under Carr's direction examined mitochondrial DNA from over 100 deer, including herds of white-tails and mule deer in West Texas. During the research, white-tailed deer from South Carolina and mule deer from California were also examined, Carr said.

During the project, researchers found that at one Pecos county ranch, the white-tailed and mule deer were found to be genetically identical, Carr said.

"The significance of this study is that nobody has demonstrated natural hybridization of this scale between these kinds of animals," Carr said. "Our hypothesis is that hybridization occurs most often between white-tailed does and mule deer bucks."

"The simplest way to look for hybridization is to find genetic differences between the species involved, and then to look at the suspected hybrid population for evidence of genes from both species," Carr said. "Mitochondrial DNA is inherited solely from the mother, which makes it possible to determine the direction of interbreeding between species."

Witness against Lonetree recants

WASHINGTON (AP) — A witness who was expected to testify against Sgt. Clayton J. Lonetree in the Marine guard espionage scandal has recanted his testimony, according to a defense attorney.

Michael V. Stuhff, the attorney, said Monday he had been notified by Marine prosecutors last week that a man identified as Cpl. Robert Williams had withdrawn a statement given to investigators earlier suggesting wrongdoing by Lonetree at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. Stuhff, who described the development as "curious," said it provided additional evidence of heavy-handed conduct by investigators and undermined the prosecution's case.

Williams has recanted his statement and told the prosecutors that he was tricked or coerced into making that statement," Stuhff said in a telephone interview.

That is the same thing that happened with (Cpl. Arnold) Bracy," he said, referring to the second Marine arrested in the case. "We don't believe they have a case."

Lonetree and Bracy allegedly became sexually involved with Soviet women. The Marine Corps has charged the two with espionage, alleging they allowed Soviet agents to roam the embassy building late at night on numerous occasions last year.

Will tariffs spur protectionist action?

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House officials are suggesting that the Japanese must patch up their trade differences with the United States or risk giving impetus to a growing protectionist sentiment in Congress.

On the eve of President Reagan's meeting with former Japanese Foreign Minister Shintaro Abe, Vice President George Bush and Chief of Staff Howard H. Baker said they doubted the Japanese could win any quick reversal of the president's decision to impose \$300 million in punitive tariffs on Japanese electronic products.

Abe, a personal emissary of Japanese Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone, came to Washington with the dual purpose of getting the tariffs lifted and setting up Nakasone's visit here next week. The former Japanese foreign minister met with Bush Monday, then told reporters that "we should settle the matter through friendly talks, not through confrontation or sanctions or reprisals."

But Baker, talking to reporters accompanying Reagan back to Washington aboard Air Force One on Monday, said that Reagan's April 30 meeting with Nakasone "ought to be more than just a friendship meeting."

Administration officials are concerned about the growing possibility that an amendment to trade legislation before the House, sponsored by Rep. Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., will get enacted by the Congress.

The Gephardt amendment would require the government to take punitive action against Japan and other countries judged to have excess trade surpluses with the United States by virtue of unfair trading practices.

Linnas en route to Soviet Union

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Karl Linnas, who faces a death sentence in the Soviet Union on charges he supervised the killings of 12,000 prisoners at a Nazi death camp, landed at Prague airport this morning en route to Moscow.

Linnas, 67, accused U.S. officials of murder as officials in New York put him aboard Czechoslovak Airlines Flight 001, which left John F. Kennedy International Airport for Prague just after 8 p.m. Monday.

"What they are doing right now is murder and kidnapping," the retired surveyor shouted as he was led into a police office at Kennedy. The Supreme Court and the Justice Department refused to block his deportation.

The Czechoslovak plane's captain, Ivan Denkovic, said Linnas tried to jump out of the car that drove him up to the plane at Kennedy, but was restrained. He spent most of the flight asleep, Denkovic said.

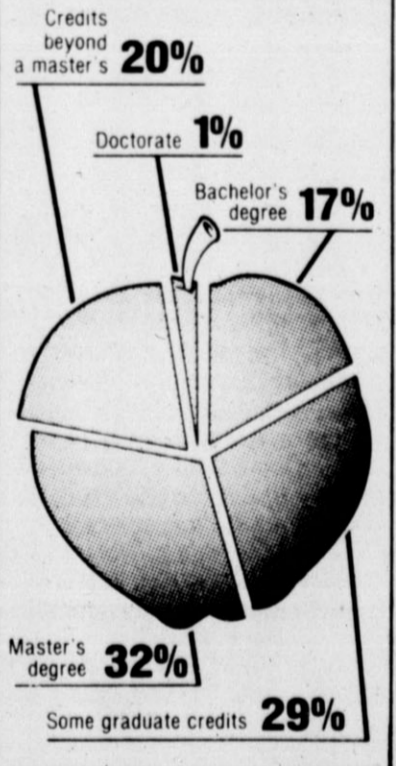

The honorees are Bobby Aranda, associate of technology degree in building trades; and Juan Degollado, associate of technology degree in electronics.

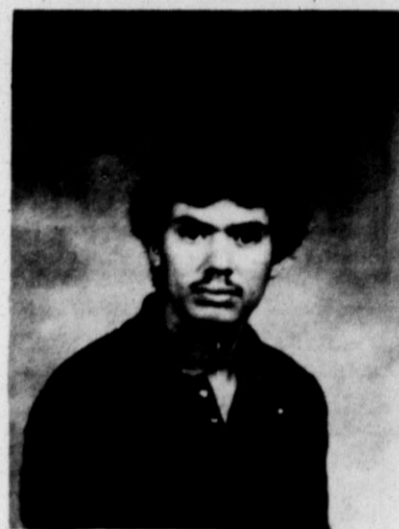
Wayland's 77th Spring Commencement is slated for Saturday, April 25, at 10 a.m. in Herral Memorial Auditorium.

Today is the signup deadline for the first annual Hereford YMCA "Spring Fever Volleyball Tournament," which will be held Thursday through Saturday this week.

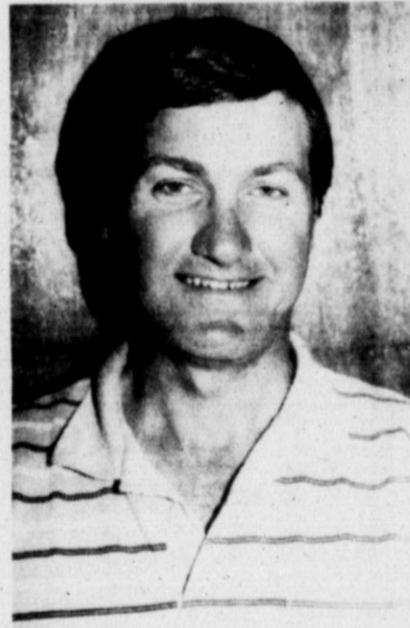

New players in the major league and minor league will be drafted. Players who are in the same league as last year will play on the teams they played with last season.

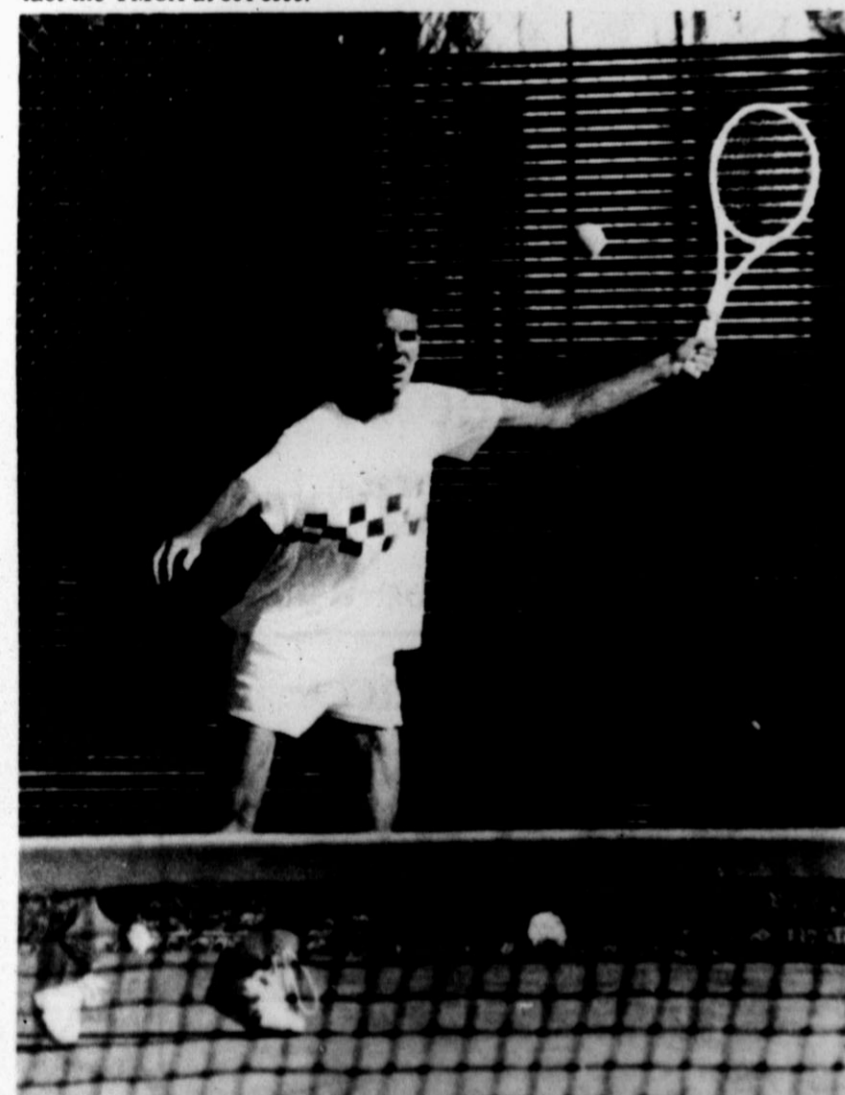
Players for all Babe Ruth League team players will be drafted Friday.

Girls may also sign up this week for the T-ball league and softball league.

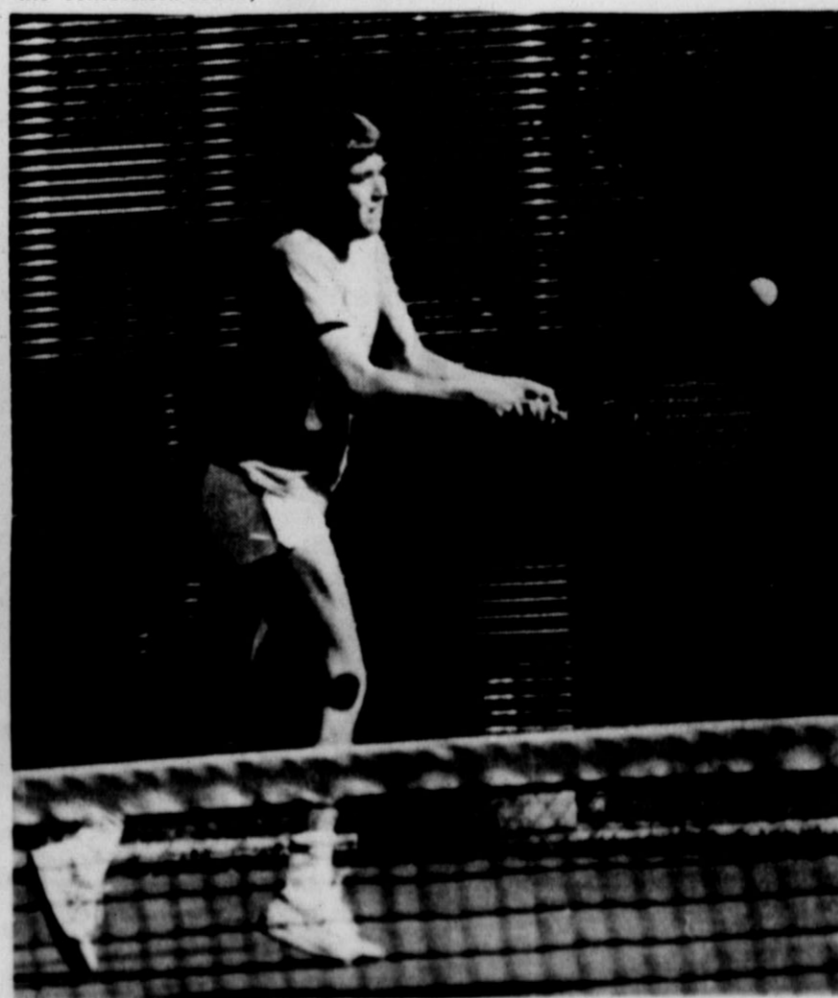

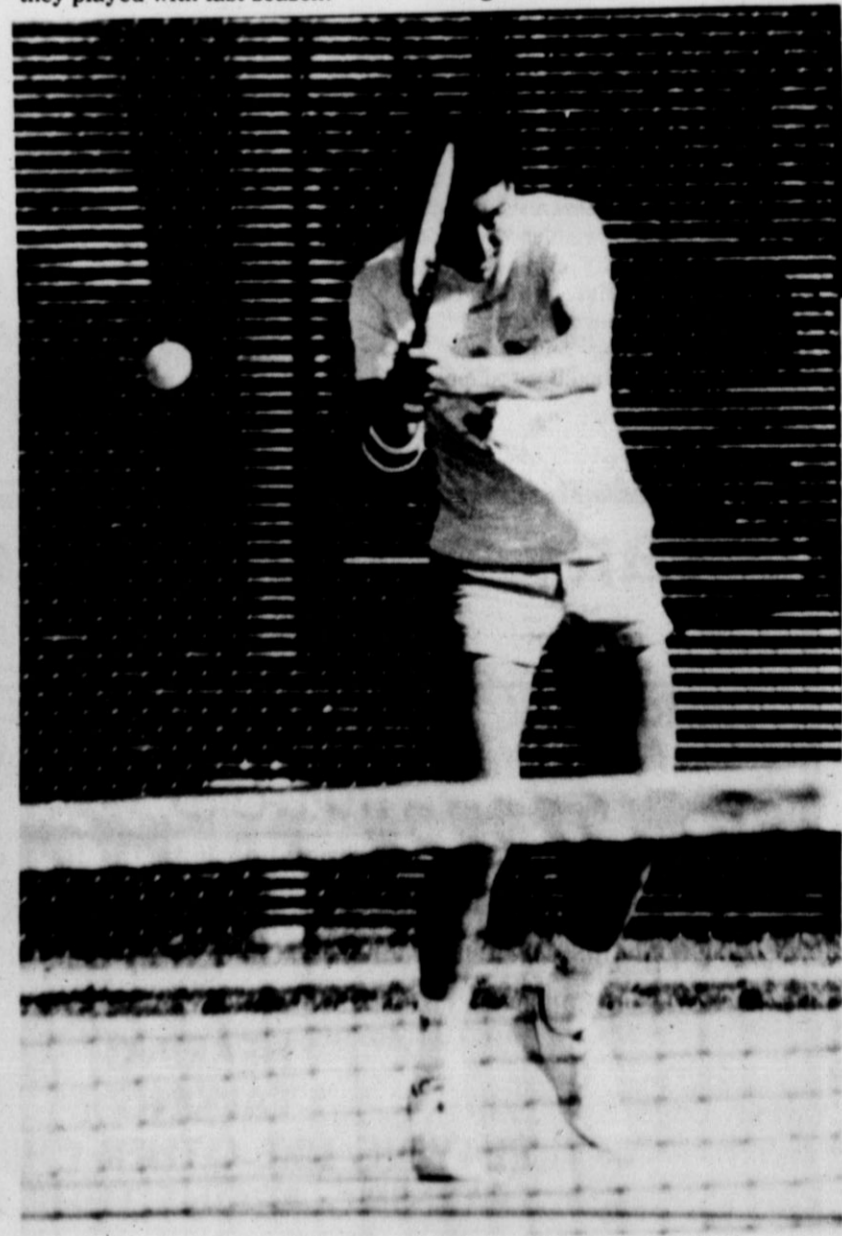

HHS boys finish in 3rd place

Hereford High School's boys' golf team, which was in second place going into the final two District 1-4A rounds, struggled last week and fell to third place, failing to earn a regional tournament berth.

Hereford was ahead of Pampa by 13 strokes going into Friday's district round at Pampa. Hereford's score for the first five rounds was 1,588, and Pampa's total was 1,601.

The Pampa team, playing in familiar territory, shot a 309 compared to a 322 by Hereford to move into a second place tie in the district standings.

On Saturday in the Borger round, Hereford shot a team score of 322, 10 strokes more than Pampa, and Pampa emerged in second place in the final standings behind Canyon. Hereford's final total is 2,242, compared to 2,232 for Pampa.

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Many crossing over from movies to television

NEW YORK (AP) — Charlton Heston says there just aren't many good roles for "grown-ups" in today's teen-dominated movies. Alan Arkin says his agent told him the "us against them" conflict between film and television had ended.

Movie producers Richard Zanuck and David Brown wanted the "immediacy" of television. Director Robert Altman was having trouble getting a new movie made, but ABC's offer to direct one-hour dramas meant getting on the air within weeks.

With fewer movies being made and at increasingly higher costs, more and more film types are turning to the small screen, where a constant

need for more material means not waiting — and the number of viewers tuned in each night dwarfs that of fans in movie theaters.

Not only are film people coming to television, but when they arrive, they often find the material rather familiar. "Gung Ho," "Starman" and "Nothing in Common" are series this season. "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" and "Peggy Sue Got Married" are being adapted for next season.

"Perfect Strangers" was inspired by Bronson Pinchot's bit part in "Beverly Hills Cop." "Beverly Hills Buntz" is the tentative title of a possible spinoff from "Hill Street Blues."

Producer Zev Braun has moved to television from theatrical-release films. His pilot "Tour of Duty" is bound to be compared to "Platoon," though Braun said the TV show was sold to CBS before "Platoon" was released last year.

"The success of 'Platoon' doesn't hurt," he said in a telephone interview. "The audience's interest is piqued. 'Platoon' has proven ... that it (the Vietnam War) is no longer verboten. People are interested in it."

Zanuck and Brown have produced numerous movies, including "Jaws," and are teaming with writer Peter Benchley on a "Jaws"-inspired television pilot, "Barrington."

"We wanted, really, the activity and immediacy of television," Zanuck said in a telephone interview from location on Long Island. "We've been doing movies all our lives, and we plan to continue. But the pace is slowed down in the whole process of movie-making, whereas with television, where there are air dates to be met, you get answers very quickly."

Altman finished directing the first of two television adaptations of Harold Pinter plays last month. "The Dumb Waiter" will air next month. Meanwhile, he despairs of getting his theatrical film sequel, "Nashville, Nashville," to the screen because of the complexities of big-budget movie deals.

"They (ABC) are giving me the opportunity to do these short plays," Altman said in a telephone interview. "They run about an hour. You wouldn't be able to do them as theatricals. Nobody's going to give you the money to do an hour movie."

Barry Levinson, director of the movies "Diner" and "Tin Men," developed a sitcom for Arkin, a series television debut for both. Arkin said in an interview he did "Harry" because "my agent told me the lines have broken down. It's no

longer us against them." "The Ellen Burstyn Show," an early, unsuccessful sitcom, was that film star's first foray into TV.

Joseph Bologna, a movie actor, is starring in the NBC series, "Rags to Riches." Blair Brown, best known for her film work, such as "Continental Divide," is making her series television debut in "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd."

George C. Scott hasn't done a television series since "East Side, West Side" two decades ago. He will be in "Mr. President" for the Fox Broadcasting Co.

Burt Young of "Roomies" is best known as Sylvester Stallone's brother-in-law in the "Rocky" movies. "Roomies" was inspired by the movie "Back to School."

Michael Murphy, a frequent supporting player in Woody Allen movies, did the series "Hard Copy." Harry Hamlin ("Clash of the Titans" and "Making Love") is in "L.A. Law."

Wilford Brimley ("Cocoon," "The Natural") got his own series, "Our House."

George Segal's sitcom, "Take Five," didn't last long, but gave him a taste of series television for the first time. The show was from the makers of the movies "Splash" and

"Night Shift." Jack Lemmon "graduated" from television in the early 1950s, but he'll be back on the small screen next season in an NBC mini-series.

Heston, one of America's best-known movie actors, took a role on the ABC night-time soap "The Colbys."

"I suppose I've made three or four films, certainly three that have been seen by as many individuals as any," Heston said in a recent interview.

"Every night, every week in 'Colbys,' which is not even a top-rated show, in terms of the audience, more people see it than saw 'Ben Hur' in theaters," he said. "The size of the audience is enormous."

TENNIS ELBOW

ATLANTA (AP) — "Tennis elbow" is not a true form of arthritis since the joint itself is not generally involved, says the Arthritis Foundation.

Rather, it is a name given to several painful conditions in the region of the elbow, which are usually caused by repeated physical stress, such as pitching a baseball or hitting a backhand in tennis. The pain is usually due to small tears in the ligaments connecting the two bones of the forearm at the elbow.

"Tennis elbow" usually clears up if the elbow is rested, although complete healing may take several months.
