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## Aspin recommends letting gays in military

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Les Aspin is recommending allowing homosexuals to serve in the military as long as they don't declare their sexual orientation, sources in the gay community say.

Aspin told White House officials Tuesday that "this is as far as the Joint Chiefs will go" on the matter, said the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The sources said they received their information from senior Defense Department officials.

President Clinton will have the final say on the proposal and the White House could have an announcement by week's end. The president faces possible strong congressional opposition to any policy change that lacks the backing of the military.

Aspin's recommendation would allow gay men and lesbians to serve as long as they keep their sexual orientation private, a version of the "don't ask, don't tell" policy put forth by Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the Senate Armed Services Committee chairman and a leading proponent of the 50-year ban on gays serving openly in the military.

Homosexuals would be barred from making public or private declarations of their orientation, the sources said. The policy would allow some latitude for gay service men and women to confide in close friends.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff voted two weeks ago for a policy that retains the current statement that "homosexuality is incompatible with military service." Aspin's policy would include a variation that describes homosexual conduct as incompatible with military service but recognizes that gay people have served honorably and will do so in the future.

Those who make a public declaration of their homosexuality would be forced out of the service,

and military investigators would have the authority to pursue allegations about homosexual acts because there would be no proposed change to the Uniform Code of Military Justice that makes sodomy unlawful, the sources said.

Reps. Barney Frank and Gerry Studds, D-Mass., the two acknowledged homosexuals in Congress, were briefed at the White House on Tuesday on Aspin's recommendation.

Defense Department officials refused to describe Aspin's recommendation. "It's a presidential decision," Capt. Michael Doubleday, a department spokesman, told a Pentagon news briefing Tuesday.

Clinton said during his presidential campaign he would lift the ban. The military and members of Congress resisted in January when the president attempted to move forward on an executive order implementing the change.

Instead, Clinton was forced to back down and adopt a compromise in which recruits were no longer questioned about their sexual orientation and formal discharges for homosexuality were temporarily suspended pending the policy review.

That interim policy, adopted by Congress in early February, expires on Thursday, the same day with an executive order on how to lift the ban.

Reports of Aspin's recommendation drew an angry response from leaders in the gay community.

"This issue returns again to President Clinton. He has a stark and simple choice - adhere to principle or capitulation to bigotry inside and outside the Defense Department," said Thomas Stoddard, head of the Campaign for Military Service, an amalgam of groups working to end the ban.

## Cost of living stays stable during June

WASHINGTON (AP) - The cost of living was unchanged in June, held back by falling fruit and vegetable prices, the government said today, reporting the best inflation news in more than two years.

It was the first month without an increase in the Consumer Price Index since March 1991, at the low point of the recession, and followed a tiny seasonally adjusted 0.1 percent gain in May, the Labor Department said.

Today's report, on top of Tuesday's news that wholesale prices fell 0.3 percent last month, squelched any lingering suspicions among economists that inflation was set to accelerate this year.

It also puts off, at least until late this year, the possibility that the Federal Reserve would nudge short-term interest rates higher, economists believe.

That would be welcomed by the Clinton administration, which is counting on low interest rates to keep the federal budget deficit at the same time that higher taxes to reduce the federal budget going will be crimping growth.

The June report was even better than anticipated by economists, who were predicting a gain of 0.1 percent or 0.2 percent.

Prices had jumped 0.5 percent in January and again through a worrisome increase, 0.4 percent, in April, sending jitters through the bond market. But economists said the latest two inflation reports are evidence that the earlier reports were aberrations.

With both economic growth and demand sluggish, retailers have little leeway to push prices higher, they said.

## City's June sales tax check nearly \$49,000

Hereford's July sales tax rebate check will be \$48,628—a 1.4 percent increase over the same time a year ago. The rebate is for the 1 percent sales tax collected in May and reported to the State Comptroller's office in June.

At the same time, Deaf Smith County will receive a check for \$27,029 on its one-half percent sales tax for the same period. This is a 10.7 percent increase over last year.

The City's total for the year is \$385,521—an increase of 1.5 percent over last year. The year-to-date total for the county is \$198,804—an increase of 2.4 percent over the same period of a year ago.

Comptroller John Sharp an-

nounced this week that a total of \$111.4 million in sales tax rebates were delivered to 977 Texas cities and 108 counties. This was a 6.9 percent increase over last year's payments.

One of the larger increases in the Panhandle was at Pampa, which now has a 2 percent sales tax. Pampa's rebate of \$180,495 is 80.4 percent greater than last year. Amarillo, also at 2 percent, gets a check for \$2.1 million—an increase of 5.3 percent.

Other checks in the area include Borger \$163,740 (plus 2.7%); Dumas \$56,764 (plus 5%); Perryton \$40,403 (plus 2.1%); Canyon \$32,649 (plus 1.3%); Dalhart \$31,829 (plus 4.1%); Dimmitt \$21,811 (plus 1.5%).

## Death toll in Japan quake hits 99; 100 still missing after 7.8 tremor

OKUSHIRI, Japan (AP) - The toll from Japan's deadliest earthquake in years climbed to 99 today as hopes faded of finding survivors in the rubble of burned homes, sunken cars and a collapsed hotel. Nearly 100 people are missing, the National Police Agency said.

More aftershocks today rocked northern Japan, where tidal waves generated by Monday's quake swept scores of cars out to sea. Six fresh shocks were recorded this morning; the initial quake measured 7.8 on the Richter scale.

The earthquake revived the long-running debate about the state of Japan's emergency preparedness. The country is the world's most earthquake-prone, rattled by about 1,000 tremors a year.

"It's about time for (the government) to make a serious commitment to take the initiative in building a nation with basic disaster-prevention

programs," said the Nihon Keizai, Japan's leading financial newspaper.

Added the national Asahi newspaper: "Even though it is difficult to forecast natural disasters, we can minimize the damage wrought by them."

Japan's Meteorological Agency broadcast tsunami warnings within five minutes after the quake hit Monday night, but many victims had no time to reach higher ground.

Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa, facing parliamentary elections in four days, flew to this northern island today to inspect the damage.

Clad in a khaki jacket and military-style cap, he toured the site of the ruined Yoyoso hotel, which was crushed by a landslide and was believed to have people buried inside.

"This is extremely painful," the Kyodo News Service quoted Miyazawa as saying. "Representing the government, I would like to do as much

as I can."

The earthquake was centered 30 miles under the Sea of Japan, about 50 miles west of Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost main island.

Okushiri, a tiny island 30 miles southwest of the epicenter, took the brunt of the tremor, which matched a 7.8 quake in January that was the strongest to hit Japan in 15 years.

Most of the deaths Monday occurred on Okushiri. In fishing communities, bereft villagers searched for missing relatives, while others huddled in the collapsed remnants of their homes.

The wreckage was strewn with twisted buses, overturned cars and family photographs.

Villagers carrying sticks and blankets formed shore patrols to look for bodies.

Thousands left homeless by the quake took refuge in temporary shelters. In the island town of Aonae, many residents slept in their cars.

The island was without running water

or electricity, and officials were bringing in drinking water and other supplies by boat today.

In shock, people poked through a vast field of smoldering rubble that had been a neighborhood of 600 homes in Aonae.

"I never had much, but what I had, I lost it all," said Fujiharu Hatsuzuka, a 67-year-old squid fisherman, walking around a pile of smoking ashes that had been his wooden house.

Police said 73 people were injured in the quake and resulting fires and tidal waves that hit as far away as South Korea and Russia. In all, 284 houses were destroyed by tidal waves, and about 300 houses were burned in fires triggered by the quake.

In the coastal town of Esashi, frogmen searched for people trapped in dozens of cars that were swept into the harbor. Cranes mounted on barges hauled cars and debris out of the bay.

## Law will expand toll-free calling areas

SUDAN, Texas (AP) - By car, it's a short distance from Sudan to any neighboring Lamb County town.

By phone, it's long distance. So if you call Littlefield - the county seat, just 15 miles from Sudan - you'll pay. Even calls to Ameron eight miles away would show up on your bill.

But Sudan and an untold number

of other towns stand to benefit from a state law effective Sept. 1 that widens toll-free telephone calling areas.

"In many, many communities ... people can't reach their doctors or they can't reach a hospital or organize a Little League team or call their school" without long-distance charges, said Austin attorney Jim Boyle, a member of the group Texas Communities for Expanded Local

Calling Areas, which will meet Friday in Lubbock.

"Schools and hospitals have consolidated, and calling patterns have changed, but calling scopes have not."

A bill approved last session by the Legislature allows expansion of calling areas under certain criteria: The telephone exchange must serve a non-metropolitan area; the expansion must win 70-percent support in an election called by petition; and the Public Utility Commission must approve.

Telephone exchanges up to 22 miles apart could be linked.

The catch? Phone companies will be allowed to charge \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line each month in an exchange that expands.

That's a small price, though, for frequent phone users like Gwenna Gore.

Mrs. Gore lives in the Sudan school district and on the Sudan main route, but 12 miles outside the West Texas town where she works as city clerk. Her calls to Sudan are long distance.

The fear of pricey phone bills often forces some inconveniences - like driving to town to talk to her

sister in person, she said.

"It's always a concern in the back of your mind that you're running up the phone bill," Mrs. Gore said.

Meanwhile, this summer, attorneys and analysts in PUC's telephone division are writing the rules to implement the law. Many details still aren't settled.

Perhaps the murkiest ground surrounds the 22-mile issue: Does the mileage run from city limit to city limit, or between telephone offices? And are the miles counted by air or road?

"The analysis that the PUC needs to perform is ongoing," said Guillermo Garcia, director of public information for the commission. "We are not in the position to tell the pluses and negatives right now."

Tim Raven, president of the Texas Telephone Association, said the bill won Gov. Ann Richards' signature in a format his industry "can work with in a positive way."

Boyle expects the law to help many schools and local governments burdened by expensive calls to areas they serve.

"Long distance has been a real handicap to those communities," Boyle said. "This is an effort to bring fairness to rural areas."

## Officials refuse to disclose killer Meza's whereabouts

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas officials have refused to disclose the whereabouts of Raul Meza, citing an exemption to the state law that requires the disclosure of public records.

Dan Guerra, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice's pardons and paroles division, said Tuesday the agency does not have to say where Meza is because the Open Records Act exempts certain investigation records maintained by law enforcement agencies.

He said the agency will request an

opinion by Texas Attorney General Dan Morales on whether they can keep Meza's location confidential.

Meza, 32, remains under state supervision but has been released from prison after serving 11 years for the rape and strangulation death of 8-year-old Kendra Page of Austin.

Previous attempts to place him in Uvalde, El Paso County, Wichita Falls, San Antonio and a Mineral Wells halfway house, where he left Saturday morning, each were met with local outrage.

## Volunteers fighting to keep Iowa water plant from flooding again

Volunteers working under floodlights piled sandbags around the Des Moines Water Works overnight for fear another watershed would undo efforts to get the treatment plant running again for some 250,000 Iowans.

Downpours swelled the raging Mississippi River and its tributaries across the flood-ravaged Midwest on Tuesday.

"I give up," said Randy Shields, whose home was flooded by the Raccoon River in West Des Moines. "I got up this morning and it had gone down pretty good. And then, boom."

President Clinton declared 222 Midwest counties - including the entire state of Iowa - and the city of St. Louis disaster areas, opening the door to grants, low-interest loans and other federal aid.

The president cut short a visit to Hawaii to tour the flood-stricken region today.

Late Tuesday military helicopters delivered about 100,000 sandbags to protect the Des Moines water plant from rising floodwaters caused by at least an inch of rain in the morning. Hundreds of volunteers sandbagged.

Floodwaters knocked out the plant on Sunday, contaminating its filters and pumps. Until the plant is repaired and disinfected, some 250,000 people are relying on bottled water distributed at 60 centers in and around the city.

Water Works officials said running water for showers and toilets should be available by the weekend, but clean drinking water is a month away.

L.D. McMullen, manager of the plant, said it should resume pumping water by Sunday - "unless we are washed out a second time." The chance of rain was put at 20 percent

today and 30 percent this evening and Thursday.

Heavy rain also fell Tuesday in saturated parts of Kansas and Nebraska. Wood River, Neb., got 3.3 inches of rain, and an inch fell in just six minutes at Apollon, south of Omaha, the National Weather Service said. Adel, Iowa, about 20 miles west of Des Moines, reported 1.75 inches in 20 minutes.

About 3,500 people in West Des Moines and Des Moines were urged to evacuate after the rain swelled the Raccoon River. Most obeyed.

"We're hoping and praying these rains slow down a little bit," said Mayor Kenny Carr of Eddyville, Iowa, about 60 miles southeast of Des Moines. "The water is at the top of the levee now. It's an especially scary situation."

The flooding has been blamed for at least 21 deaths, 13 in Missouri. Damage has been put in the billions. About 6,500 National Guardsmen were on duty in Iowa, Illinois and Missouri, where more than 30,000 people have been flooded out of their homes.

The flooding and the loss of the treatment plant brought Des Moines to a standstill. Businesses closed. Hotels were emptied. Hospitals canceled non-emergency surgery. People slogging through the filthy floodwaters were urged to get tetanus shots.

Residents collected rainwater and left town for showers. Richard Vohs, Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad's spokesman, went out into the rain for a shower. "We have a very secluded back yard," he said.

The Pentagon is providing the stricken region with at least 1,000 life vests, drinking water and millions of sandbags. Businesses and individuals around the country sent bottled water, food and pre-mixed baby formula.

**UNDATED** - Rain and more rain threatened efforts to restore drinking water in the Des Moines, Iowa, area. "Mother Nature did not deal us a very favorable hand today," West Des Moines Mayor Dino Rodish said.

**OKUSHIRI, Japan** - Frogmen grimly search for bodies in dozens of cars that were swept into the sea, and weeping relatives clutching flowers wait for boats to take them to quake-devastated Okushiri island off Japan's northern coast. The tumbler, the deadliest in a decade, killed at least 79 people, most on Okushiri.

# Senator claims files were destroyed

## Krueger staff accused of 'scorched earth policy'

**DALLAS (AP)** - The staff of former U.S. Sen. Bob Krueger "followed a scorched earth policy by a retreating army" in vacating state offices after Krueger's June 5 loss to Kay Bailey Hutchison, an aide to Mrs. Hutchison says.

At least 700 of an estimated 1,500 constituent files that were in Krueger's state offices in Austin, Dallas and Houston are now missing, said David Beckwith, a spokesman for Mrs. Hutchison.

Beckwith said the Krueger staff turned over barely functioning local offices. Case work involving constituents is done primarily in the state offices, he noted.

"Not being able to put our hands on these files puts us in a real jam. It makes us look ineffective and stupid," Beckwith said.

Mike McKay, who was Krueger's state coordinator, denied any wrongdoing by the Krueger camp. He said he left case records intact in Austin and that the Dallas and Houston offices were ordered to do the same.

McKay said he loaded filing cabinets in Austin with pending casework before Mrs. Hutchison's staff assumed that office.

"The instructions were explicit to all the Texas offices. All pending cases were to be left in order. There is absolutely no truth whatsoever that any cases that were pending were not turned over," McKay said.

The Dallas Morning News described one constituent, John Woodworth of Dallas as being moved to tears after learning that an 11-year chronicle of his life was missing.

Woodworth, an Army veteran, has fought a long battle with the Department of Veteran Affairs for college benefits. He had enlisted the help of Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and his successor, Krueger.

When he made further inquiry with Mrs. Hutchison's office in Dallas, he was told there was no record of his case. No one seems to know what happened to his documents.

"It never occurred to me that my file would not be found," Woodworth said. "This has caused me so much

pain and grief. This information is absolutely vital to make a valid case on my behalf. How can she represent me when she doesn't know my past history?"

Beckwith said the missing files have cost Mrs. Hutchison's staff countless hours and credibility.

"We obviously can't be sure what happened, but the overall pattern is consistent and very suspicious. If their intent was to make us look inept, they succeeded," Beckwith said.

The Dallas Morning News quoted McKay in its early Wednesday editions as saying last week: "This is a puzzle. All of the files should be there. If they can't find the files ... that is very strange."

Krueger officials say they mailed more than 1,500 letters informing constituents of the file transfers.

In the letter, dated June 8, Krueger said: "In an effort to be of continuing service, I am leaving your file with Ms. Hutchison so that she may continue to follow your case."

The files included a variety of constituent appeals for the senator's

help, some more than a decade old, but still active. They include requests on Social Security, Internal Revenue Service, immigration, and dealings with other federal agencies.

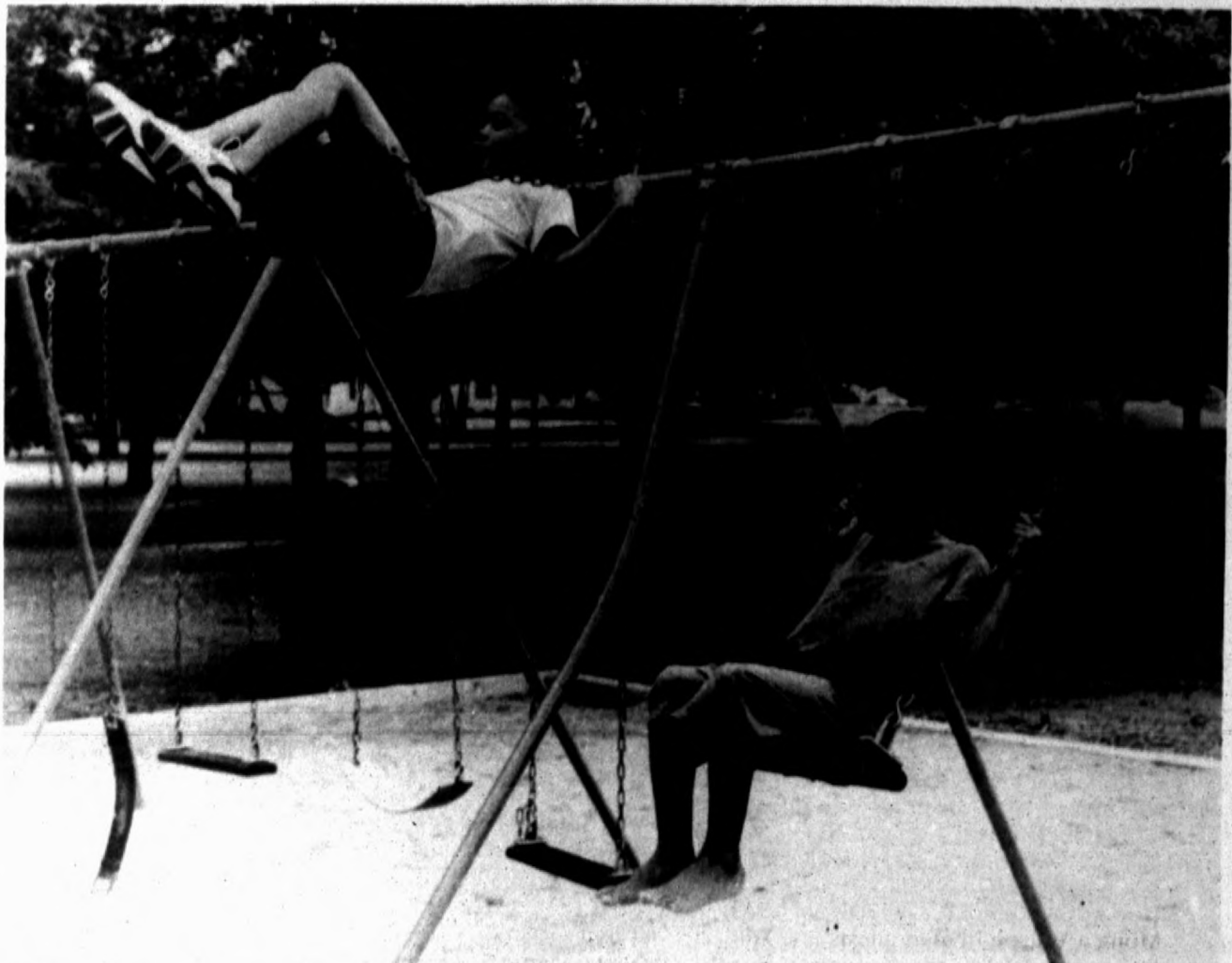
Beckwith said an inventory accounted for only about 800 case files in the Austin, Dallas and Houston offices.

The dispute has left the Hutchison staff embarrassed and many constituents bewildered.

"When people call in, I look for their file. Most often, I return to the phone saying I can't find any record of their case," said Carolyn Kobey, a caseworker in Mrs. Hutchison's Dallas office.

Because of news reports of friction between the Hutchison and Krueger camps during the transition, McKay wrote a letter to the editor of The Dallas Morning News.

In the letter, published on July 7, McKay called the transition a period of "friendly cooperation" and said all pending files "were left clearly marked, organized and current."

# Autopsies indicate three cultists died in initial Davidian assault

**WACO, Texas (AP)** - Three Branch Davidians died during the initial assault on Mount Carmel after being shot at point-blank range, according to newly released autopsy reports.

Surviving Branch Davidians disputed the findings, which were interpreted by some as suggesting that the three killed themselves or were killed by other members of the cult, rather than by federal agents.

The gunbattle resulted from agents attempt to arrest leader David Koresh, for possession of automatic weapons. Five Branch Davidians and four Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents died in the Feb. 28 assault on the compound 10 miles east of Waco.

The latest autopsies, which were released Tuesday by Justice of the Peace James Collier of Mart, were performed by the Tarrant County medical examiner's office.

Reports on the autopsies said: -- Perry Jones, 64, the father of Koresh's legal wife, Rachel, was killed by a bullet from a gun inserted into his mouth;

-- Peter Hipsman, 27, in addition to other bullet wounds, suffered wounds from a gun placed at the back and side of his head;

-- and Winston Blake, 28, a native of Great Britain, died from a shot fired at close range behind his right ear.

A trace analysis on the palate of

Jones showed the presence of gunpowder, the autopsy report said.

"A gun was stuck in his mouth, according to the autopsy," Collier said. "Whether or not he did it or someone else did, I don't know. This happened on the first day of the shootout. I don't know why he would shoot himself."

Collier added, "This is all going to be a puzzle for years, I'm sure."

Branch Davidian Rita Riddle, who left the compound after the shootout and before the April 19 fire that destroyed Mount Carmel, ridiculed the autopsy.

"That's a bunch of bull," she said. "Perry was shot through the stomach in the initial raid."

Ms. Riddle said she did not see Jones shot.

She was upstairs at the compound, and Jones was in a hallway downstairs, Ms. Riddle said. He was killed by bullets piercing the walls, she said.

"If he had been shot in the head, he would have died immediately," she said. "I could hear Perry screaming from upstairs. Something is not right. I don't have any idea what they're trying to do."

Ms. Riddle, though saying she was skeptical of the autopsy reports, noted that ATF agents entered the compound during the raid and might have shot the Branch Davidians at close range.

ATF officials were unavailable for

comment, but Collier said he doesn't believe ATF agents shot the cult members at such close range.

"An ATF officer putting his gun against someone's head and pulling the trigger, I have problems thinking that," he said.

Autopsy reports also were issued for two other Davidians said to have died on the day of the assault, Peter Gent, 24, and Jaydean Wendel, 34.

ATF officials had said Gent was shot by a sniper while on a water tower.

The autopsies said Gent, Hipsman and Wendel were killed with hollow-point bullets, which expand on impact and do a great deal of tissue damage.

Collier said that after Jones' wife, Mary, told him that the Davidians had said he was shot in the stomach, he had the medical examiner's office perform another autopsy.

"They came up with the same information as before," Collier said.

Hipsman, according to the autopsy, died of multiple gunshot wounds to the head. He was also shot in the chest. The autopsy report said "dark sooty material" was found in one head wound and that a bullet wound to the side of the head also showed traces of gunpowder.

Blake was shot at close range behind the right ear, according to the autopsy, which said traces of gunpowder were found in the skin.

# Emergency worker helps victims

**DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)** - Donna Boetel-Baker is the answer lady, trying to calm a city flooded with water and worries.

Sandbag volunteers? She'll tell you where to go. Need a shower? She has a list of spots. No water to drink? She'll set up the delivery.

In her drier days, Mrs. Boetel-Baker is the city clerk. This week, she's a one-woman rescue squad working out of a high school cafeteria, zipping through thousands of calls at a hot line set up to help this city cope with its crisis.

"We have virtually shut down," Mrs. Boetel-Baker said Tuesday

during one of her 15-hour shifts. "Every major business is closed. There's no transit. There's one road linking the north and south of the city."

Des Moines has a dilemma: There's too much water where it shouldn't be and none where it needs to be - faucets and toilets.

Today, the capital city entered its fourth day of water woes. The trouble began Sunday when the Raccoon River surged over the 15-foot levees and sandbag dikes protecting the Des Moines Water Works, contaminating filters and pumps.

About 250,000 people have empty

taps and are depending on tens of thousands of gallons of bottled water available at about 60 distribution sites.

Officials estimate Des Moines' flooding will cost \$253 million. Business and home losses account for more than half that. Levee repairs alone will cost \$75 million.

President Clinton was to get a look at the devastation during a visit to the city today. He has declared the entire state a disaster area. Iowa's flood losses are expected to top \$1 billion.

Hospitals canceled non-emergency surgery. Dialysis patients were rerouted.

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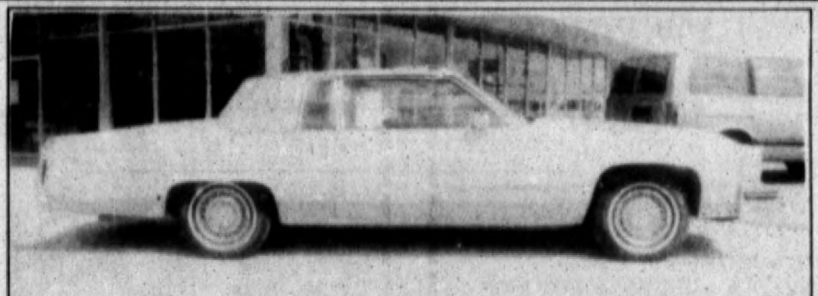


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

## Federal officials can't explain Allison's crash

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) - NASCAR star Davey Allison, piloting his new helicopter with an old friend at his side, maneuvered the roaring machine within inches of the ground.

Everything looked normal. But suddenly things went fatally wrong. Suddenly, without any sign of trouble from the cockpit, the chopper shot upward, rocking side to side like a wobbly boat on a stormy sea. It started spinning wildly toward the ground.

The helicopter hit a barbed wire-covered fence and slammed into the pavement on its left side - the pilot's side. By the time the crumpled wreckage came to rest in the infield at the Talladega Superspeedway, Allison was unconscious.

Allison, 32, died Tuesday of massive head injuries suffered in the crash Monday afternoon. His passenger, longtime family friend Red Farmer, remained hospitalized but was expected to recover from his injuries, which included broken ribs and a fracture collarbone.

Federal officials said it could take as long as a year before the National Transportation Safety Board makes a final ruling on what caused the accident.

But investigators and Farmer painted a chilling tale of the final flight of Allison, described by friends as an aviation fanatic fascinated with his latest acquisition - the Hughes 369-HS helicopter.

Allison and Farmer had eaten lunch at a restaurant near Birmingham before deciding to fly 50 miles east to Talladega. They planned to watch the son of another member of the "Alabama Gang," Neil Bonnett, test a car.

Rolf Sasser, an NTSB investigator piecing together the events of the crash, told a news conference that Allison pointed the four-passenger helicopter toward a landing in a fenced-in parking lot adjoining the

track's infield media center.

In addition to watching out for the nearly 12-foot-high chain-link fence encircling the 108-foot-by-284-foot lot, Allison had to worry about overhead power lines. Sasser said Allison's intended landing zone was just 25 feet from the wires.

Witnesses told investigators the helicopter came within 1 foot of the ground - maybe as close as 6 inches - before the landing went awry.

"It shot up in the air and started going crazy, and the next thing I knew we were crashing upside down," Farmer told The Birmingham News in an interview from his hospital bed. "It was still climbing when it started those crazy gyrations. I don't know how high we were, but we hit the ground hard."

Sasser said the engine was still running as rescuers tried to free Allison.

"In fact, they had a hard time shutting it down," he said.

The shattered helicopter remained at the track Tuesday afternoon as Sasser took the media on a tour of the crash site.

Barbed wire was wrapped around the helicopter's tail rotor, which was separated from the fuselage. Two foot controls were broken off in front of the left front seat, where Allison was sitting.

Sasser said an initial review did not reveal any mechanical problems with the helicopter, which Allison bought less than a month ago. Allison received his pilot's license in April 1987 and was certified to fly helicopters a year ago, said a spokeswoman with the Federal Aviation Administration.

Sasser would not comment on whether Allison should have tried to land in the parking lot. "I can't speculate or draw conclusions on the evidence," he said.

But speedway president Mike Helton said the parking lot was "not a standard helicopter landing area."

"Nobody even knew he was coming," Helton said.

## 14-15 Ruth All-Stars fall 13-year-olds get rained out

Hereford's 14- and 15-year-old Babe Ruth All-Stars lost the opening game of the regional tournament 3-2 to Canyon Tuesday in Plainview. Canyon scored two runs in the second inning and one in the fourth, said Hereford coach Richard Perez. Canyon made the three run lead hold up, allowing Hereford to score single runs in the fifth and sixth.

John Marty Galan started the game for Hereford and pitched four innings. Sonny Perez pitched the final three. They'll play at 8 tonight against the loser of Tuesday's second game.

Hereford's 13-year-old All-Stars were scheduled to play Tuesday in Canyon, but the game was rained out. If the fields are dry, they'll play Plainview 2 tonight.

Hereford, with one loss in the double-elimination tournament, needs two wins tonight to win the tournament. Plainview hasn't lost yet, and could clinch the championship with a win over Hereford in the first game.

## Falcons hit by early injuries; Raiders say goodbye to Golic

The Atlanta Falcons haven't even started contact drills and already two starters have been lost to injuries.

Doctors on Tuesday disclosed that defensive end Mike Gann has torn cartilage in his left knee. He joins right cornerback Melvin Jenkins, who suffered a stress fracture of the fifth metatarsal bone of his right foot on Monday.

Both players are scheduled to have surgery today and could miss at least six weeks.

"It just makes us sick," said team president Taylor Smith.

Jenkins, a sixth-year player, was the projected starter while Deion Sanders completes the baseball season with the Atlanta Braves.

Coach Jerry Glanville said it was unlikely Jenkins, scheduled for surgery on Wednesday, would return before October, although the player said he hoped to be back for the team's opener on Sept. 5.

Los Angeles Raiders

The Los Angeles Raiders have officially said farewell to 14-year defensive tackle Bob Golic, who announced his retirement.

Golic, who played the last four seasons with the Raiders, came to training camp to announce his retirement at the age of 35. Golic was originally drafted in the second round by the New England Patriots in 1979. He later played for the Cleveland Browns before moving to the Raiders as a Plan B free agent in 1989.

"It was obviously a situation where they were trying to get the younger guys more playing time," said Golic, who played in only one game in the second half of last season. "But I'd been fooling myself trying to convince myself it wasn't time to move on."

Golic said he has a role in a television situation comedy and hopes for work as a football broadcaster in the future.

The Raiders signed defensive back

James Trapp, a third-round pick; linebacker Greg Bickert, a seventh-round pick; and running back Greg Robinson, an eighth-round pick. All but two of the Raiders' six draft choices have signed.

San Francisco 49ers

The 49ers signed a quarterback, but it wasn't Steve Young.

Elvis Grbac, the team's eighth-round draft pick out of Michigan, signed a two-year contract. Terms were not disclosed.

Young, last season's leading passer and MVP, has never missed a day of training camp because of contract problems and has said he doesn't want to start now.

League rules prohibit unsigned players from participating in camp, and Young's agent, Leigh Steinberg, has said that the two sides still must resolve significant differences. Young earned \$2.5 million last season and Steinberg is seeking a package that would more than double Young's salary.

He is scheduled to report to training camp in Rocklin by tonight, along with rookies and some veterans and free agents. The team will hold its first workout on Thursday.

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## Swoopes, Kieschnick honored as top athletes of year in SWC

DALLAS (AP) - A media panel on Tuesday selected Texas pitcher Brooks Kieschnick and Texas Tech basketball star Sheryl Swoopes as the 1993 Southwest Conference Athletes of the Year.

Swoopes, who scored an NCAA-record 47 points in the NCAA tournament final, was also named the SWC Player of the Year for the second time in two seasons.

During the tournament, she set seven other records and tied two more to lead the Lady Raiders (31-3) to their first-ever national championship.

Swoopes, from Brownfield, scored in double digits in each of the Lady Raiders' 34 games and set a conference record by scoring 53 points in the SWC tournament final.

She was the MVP in five tournaments, including the NCAA final four, and scored 30 or more points nine times this season. She topped the 40-point mark three times.

In addition to the SWC award, Swoopes was named player of the year by USA Today, Sports Illustrat-

ed, Women's Basketball Service, Newspaper Enterprise Association, U.S. Basketball Writers Association and others.

Kieschnick, Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America's pick as Player of the Year, was picked as the best male athlete in the conference after he led the Longhorns to a 51-16 record.

He posted 16 victories and hit 19 home runs and 81 RBIs.

Kieschnick's 16-4 mark helped Texas to the College World Series where they were eliminated after a one-run loss to Oklahoma State. Kieschnick also won his third-straight SWC Player of the Year award.

The Chicago Cubs picked Kieschnick, who also plays first base and outfield, with the 10th overall pick in the first round of major league draft.

Kieschnick, from Corpus Christi, was voted Outstanding Player in the SWC Tournament, and won the American Baseball Coaches Association Dick Howser Player of the Year Award.

# Baltimore fans boo AL win in All-Star Game

BALTIMORE (AP) - It might have been the strangest ending in the history of the All-Star game. The ninth inning had nothing to do with a dramatic home run or an incredible catch. It was all about the fans at Camden Yards and their feelings toward the rival Toronto Blue Jays.

Six of the seven Toronto players helped the American League beat the National League 9-3 Tuesday night. The home crowd should have been happy, but instead they spent much of the night booing AL manager Cito Gaston and his Blue Jays.

Toronto reliever Duane Ward entered the game in the ninth to a

chorus of boos. The fans wanted to see Orioles right-hander Mike Mussina close out the game.

The boos got even louder when Gaston left his ace reliever in to get the last out of the game as Mussina continued to warm up in the bullpen.

Ward closed it with a strikeout - his second of the inning - and the booing got even louder. The reliever walked a few steps off the mound and stopped. Everyone seemed uncertain.

No one on the AL team ran to congratulate Ward - or each other. They heard the final score on the public address system and ran for the safety of the clubhouse.

Weird.

"I don't know why they bood us," Toronto outfielder Devon White said. "If it was the fact that there were seven Blue Jays, we were world champions or we were a division rival, there is nothing you can do about it but have a good time. Cito did a good job getting everyone in the game. I was happy that the Blue Jays did a good job and that we won."

Toronto second baseman Roberto Alomar tied the score 2-all in the third inning with a home run, White scored a run and drove in another with a double, Joe Carter had a single and Ward tossed perfect relief. Even former Blue Jays pitcher Jimmy Key

got into the act.

In the starting introductions, Gaston and all four Toronto players in the starting lineup were jeered.

That seemed to be just a friendly little jab, but by the end the boos were clearly landing on the Blue Jays' chins.

"I was voted in by the fans," an almost defensive Alomar said. "I came here with my teammates to win. If they want to boo us it's no big deal to me."

Maybe things would have been different if Mussina was in the game at the finish. The fans chanted "We want Mike, We Want Mike!" and rooted for the NL to get something going against Ward.

"I'm disappointed," Orioles vice president Frank Robinson said. "No excuse for actions like that. It should be we're all one team ... no reason to act like that."

Gaston said he didn't use Mussina

because the pitcher was rested and might have been needed if the game went into extra innings.

Detroit manager Sparky Anderson, a coach on the AL team, actually thought Gaston did the Orioles a big favor.

"Now they can pitch a rested Mussina on Thursday," Anderson said. "These two teams are fighting for first place, but fans also think they know how to manage better."

For his part, Mussina wanted to be in the game. "Sure I'm disappointed. He did what he thought he had to do to win the game."

One player who is always cheered - no matter where - is All-Star MVP Kirby Puckett. He had a home run and a double.

The AL clinched its sixth straight All-Star game by scoring three runs in the fifth inning off loser John Burkett and three more in the sixth.

With the Blue Jays bringing seven

players to the game and the Atlanta Braves five, it seemed a little like another 1992 World Series game. The result was the same, too.

Right fielder David Justice made an error to help the NL build a run in the fifth, and Steve Avery and John Smoltz had their problems, too. Avery gave up three unearned runs in the fifth and two wild pitches by Smoltz allowed two runs to score in the sixth.

"I can't accept losing," Tony Gwynn of the Padres said. "Granted it's an All-Star game and a showcase, but it doesn't matter. I want to win."

The AL, meanwhile, got great relief pitching from Randy Johnson, winner Jack McDowell, Key, Jeff Montgomery, Rick Aguilera and, of course, Ward.

Starter Mark Langston gave up a two-run homer in the first inning to Gary Sheffield. But Puckett got the AL going with his homer in the second off NL starter Terry Mulholland.

## Camden Yards was part of show

BALTIMORE (AP) - First the ball didn't bounce, then it bounced too much. Camden Yards' odd quirks made the difference in the American League's 9-3 victory Tuesday night in the All-Star game.

"It's a great park," Atlanta's Steve Avery said after giving up three unearned runs. "It's a little touch of the old field."

Except the old field never had walls that made baseballs stick like velcro. A hit getting caught under your neighbor's porch is one thing. A ball getting stuck in the middle of the fence during the All-Star game is like finding weeds on Centre Court at Wimbledon.

"I've never seen a ball like that," said Los Angeles manager Tommy Lasorda, a part of the Dodgers' organization for 44 years.

The score was tied 2-all in the fifth inning before things started to get goofy. Ivan Rodriguez of Texas lined a pitch from San Francisco's John Burkett over the head of Barry Bonds

in left. The Giants outfielder and his three-time Gold Glove waited for the carom, hoping to keep Rodriguez on first. But the ball got stuck in a seam of the padding.

Rodriguez, the youngest all-star at age 21, didn't even see his hilarious hit until a television replay. He kept his head down as he ran up the line until he heard first-base coach Johnny Oates, the Baltimore Orioles' manager.

"Just keep going! Just keep going! It's a double!" Oates screamed.

Rodriguez wound up on second by the time Bonds got the fence to retrieve its prize. Toronto's Roberto Alomar bounced out to second, and pinch-hitter Albert Belle of Cleveland lined a single to right that started a sequence in which David Justice seemed to confuse the NL all-stars with the Bad News Bears.

Rodriguez scored the go-ahead run on the play, and Justice missed the rolling ball for an error that allowed Belle to take second.

"It just took a bad bounce at the last moment," the Atlanta outfielder said.

Seattle's Ken Griffey Jr. hit another single to right. If you can't catch it the first time, you may as well throw it away the second time.

Justice's heave sailed past Philadelphia first baseman John Kruk as Belle scored and Griffey took second on the throw.

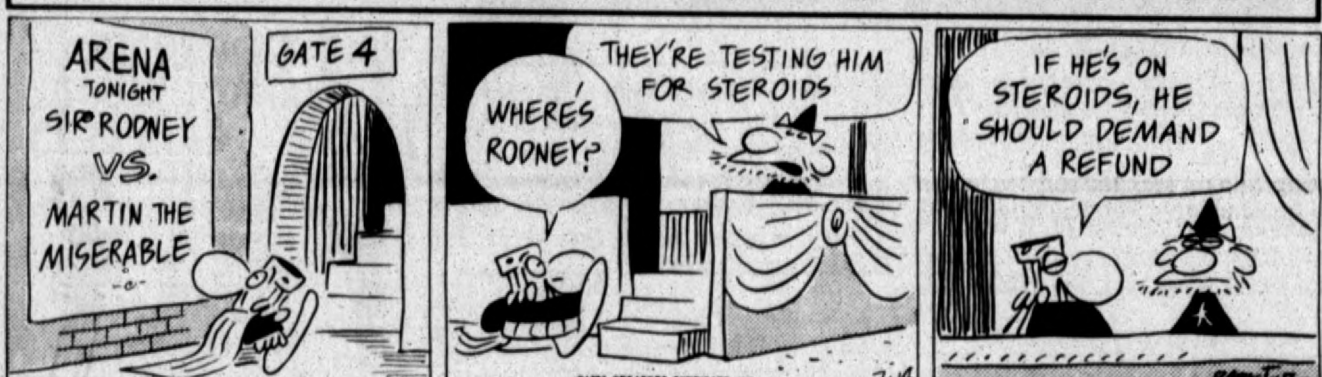
"I wasn't trying to throw home," Justice said. "I was trying to hit the cutoff man."

He wasn't even close. After Toronto's Joe Carter struck out and Detroit's Cecil Fielder was hit by a pitch, Kirby Puckett doubled up the gap in left, and suddenly it was 5-2.

A wall that behaved like glue led to an inning in which the NL became unglued. That's part of the reason why Camden Yards is baseball's best new stadium in seven decades. On a night of stars, the ballpark shined brightest.

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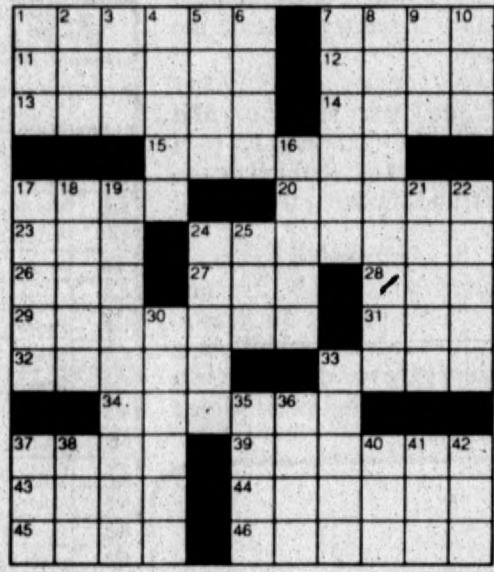

**AUSTIN** — Martha Whitehead, former mayor of Longview, was sworn in last week as Texas' 24th state treasurer, succeeding Kay Bailey Hutchison who was elected to the U.S. Senate.  
Whitehead, 58, said she would consider transferring some treasury functions to other agencies if she is satisfied they could perform the tasks better.  
But the East Texas Democrat said she would call for shifting some investment management duties of other agencies to her office.  
"We're going to make the case that we can manage investment better than other agencies, and we are going to be very aggressive about that," said Whitehead.  
Gov. Ann Richards conducted the swearing-in ceremony in the House chamber.  
**Deputy Treasurer Named**  
After Whitehead was sworn in, state Board of Insurance member Paul Williams resigned his post to become deputy treasurer.  
Williams, a longtime aide to Gov. Richards, was appointed to a six-year term on the Insurance Board less than five months ago.  
He has held the job of deputy treasurer before, when Richards was state treasurer.  
When Richards was elected governor, Williams served as her executive assistant and then chief of staff before she named him to the

**Insurance Board.**  
Under legislation passed this past session, the three-member Insurance Board will be dissolved Sept. 1, 1994. The state insurance department will then be run by a commissioner.  
Williams, a native of Temple, is a graduate of Baylor University. He is a certified public accountant.  
Whitehead said she has begun raising money for the 1994 election campaign. "I view a job well done as being elected in 1994," she said.  
**School Finance Appeal**  
More than 100 property-poor school districts attempting to halt a new school finance law filed an appeal last week with the Texas Supreme Court.  
The appeal asks the high court to overrule a trial judge who denied the school districts a June hearing on the new law, which is set to take effect Sept. 1.  
The law gives property-rich school districts several options for sharing their wealth with property-poor ones.  
Meanwhile, a U.S. Department of Justice pre-cleared the new school finance law, according to Secretary of State John Hannah.  
The new law was submitted to the department because of provisions that could affect voting.  
Stephen Rosenbaum, chief of the agency's voting section, said in a letter that Attorney General Janet Reno is not objecting to the changes made by the law. But he noted that failure to object does not bar future court challenges.  
**Bribery Trial Begins**  
The racketeering and bribery trial of former U.S. Rep. Albert Bustamante got under way last week in San Antonio.  
"You're about to learn the story about a former congressman who was on the take," prosecutor Jackie Bennett told jurors.  
Bennett began the attack by calling a retired Air Force general, who testified that Bustamante threatened him while trying to land a government food service contract for friends.

Bustamante, 59, a Democrat, lost his 23rd Congressional District seat to Republican Henry Bonilla amid publicity about the federal investigation.  
Bustamante's wife, Rebecca, an attorney, is on trial charged with aiding and abetting her husband.  
**Insurance Chief Search**  
The state has launched a nationwide search for a commissioner of insurance.  
"This is one of the top insurance regulatory jobs in the nation, and we intend to recruit 'the best and brightest' to fill it," Gov. Richards said.  
Under a recently passed law, the State Board of Insurance will be abolished and the commissioner will become Texas' top insurance regulator.  
The Legislature has authorized a commissioner's salary of as much as \$150,000.  
**Waste Dump Suit**  
Alert Citizens for Environmental Safety has filed a second lawsuit to block the state's plans to build a low-level radioactive waste dump in West Texas.  
ACES spokesman Roy Griffin said the district court suit is meant to complement a federal lawsuit filed last month.  
Griffin said the organization wants to ensure "that the governor and the Legislature are held responsible for the actions they've taken."  
The Legislature voted in 1991 to put the dump in Hudspeth County. But residents say the action is illegal because there was no chance for them to voice their opposition.  
**Other Highlights**  
■ Texas children will receive free immunizations this month as part of a campaign launched last week by Gov. Richards and state Health Commissioner David Smith. The Legislature authorized an additional \$17 million for immunizations.

## Bustamante prosecutor targets delinquent tax collection scheme

**SAN ANTONIO (AP)** - A former school superintendent who testified against attorney Rebecca Bustamante says taking the witness stand for the prosecution was "one of the most painful things I've ever done in my life."  
Herbert Harper Jr., former superintendent of South San Antonio School District, testified Tuesday he didn't recall Mrs. Bustamante negotiating with the district about a delinquent tax collection contract before it was awarded in 1985.  
But defense attorneys in the federal trial of Albert and Rebecca Bustamante attempted to show Harper's memory is faulty.  
Federal prosecutors claim Mrs. Bustamante, wife of then-congressman Albert Bustamante, did no work for more than \$275,000 she received from delinquent tax contracts with the San Antonio law firm Heard Goggan Blair & Williams, where she works.  
The contracts in question include initial three-year collection agreements and two renewals with the school district and the city of San Antonio.  
Prosecutors allege the money was an "illegal gratuity" paid to the congressman through Mrs. Bustamante.  
"They're liars," Albert Bustamante said during a court recess. "They just completely ruined me. They ruined my family, also."  
Bustamante, who lost his re-election bid last year after eight years in Congress, is charged in a 10-count indictment alleging he received \$344,000 in illegal schemes. Mrs. Bustamante is charged in seven counts with aiding and abetting her husband.  
Harper testified about a letter

dated November 1984 from Mrs. Bustamante's law firm that mentioned an earlier conversation about Mrs. Bustamante obtaining the district's delinquent tax collection contract.  
Prosecutor Jackie Bennett, who in opening statements dubbed the letter "bogus," called an FBI witness to testify tests were inconclusive on when the letter from Mrs. Bustamante's firm was written.  
Harper said he didn't remember the conversation in the letter and didn't recall an earlier school board meeting at which members discussed hiring a new tax collection attorney.  
Defense attorneys played a tape from the meeting at which the matter was discussed, though prosecutors argued over whether the board members were talking about tax collection or delinquent tax collection.  
Harper, who said he had known Mrs. Bustamante since about 1970 and that she worked in the school district as a teacher and administrator until 1980, described her as an "extremely honorable" person.  
"One of the most painful things

I've ever done in my life is sit here today and testify against Rebecca," said Harper, who said federal agents interviewed him several times.  
Earlier Tuesday, Lowell Denton, who was city attorney then worked for Heard Goggan Blair & Williams when the school district and city tax contracts were renewed in 1988, said he lobbied with other lawyers for the renewals.  
"I don't personally remember working with Rebecca Bustamante on that process," Denton said.  
The firm's lead lawyer Oliver Heard issued a memo dated June 1988 stating Mrs. Bustamante had helped renew the South San Antonio School District contract, testimony showed.  
"I would assume when I read that she was involved in that process," said Denton, during cross-examination by defense attorney Tony Canales.  
If convicted, Bustamante faces up to 56 years in prison, plus fines of up to \$250,000 on each of the 10 counts. Mrs. Bustamante could get two years in prison and up to \$250,000 in fines on each of the seven counts.

## Anti-abortion protesters arrested at D-FW clinics

**DALLAS (AP)** - The national founder of Operation Rescue says "it's a given" that abortion will someday be ruled illegal throughout the United States but admonished Christians to insist on more than that.  
Randall Terry praised the efforts of anti-abortion protesters in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, 13 of whom were arrested Tuesday during their protests of two clinics, but said they must press on.  
Terry delivered a 45-minute sermon Tuesday night before about 300 people at the Metroplex Chapel in Euless, where pro-life supporters have been rallying nightly.  
Church groups from Arkansas and Oklahoma were at the meeting and said they would join today's protests in Dallas.  
Flip Benham, Operation Rescue's Dallas leader, introduced Terry at Tuesday night's church gathering. But first, he urged followers to bring themselves, family members, friends and neighbors in downtown Dallas at 11:30 a.m. today for a "cemetery of the innocents" ceremony at City Hall Plaza.

There's nothing bad about righteous intolerance, Terry said, urging Christians to seek a government based upon the Ten Commandments.  
Christians should aggressively combat not only abortion, he said, but all forms of immoral activity and leadership - including but not limited to pornography, sex and violence in movies and television and greater acceptance and rights for gays and lesbians.  
Anti-abortion protests began Friday night in Dallas-Fort Worth and several other U.S. cities as part of Operation Rescue's 10-day "Cities of Refuge" campaign. The group's aim is to shut down abortion clinics.
