School Board Thinks Split **TaxesUnwise**

The school board of the Hereford independent school district is of the opinion that it would be unwise to postpone payment of half of the taxes to August 1. Ninety per cent of the total taxes will be needed by the close of school, says the board, and failure to get the money by the third week in May would put a burden on the board by forcing them to borrow money at not less than eight or ten per cent.

The members of the board are in favor of getting the legislature to split the payment of taxes, making due dates fall on December 1 and June 1.

Tree trimming is a science, he says, and he proposes that property owners might help out some in the labor situation by hiring help to put their trees in shape for spring and summer growth.

High trimming of trees throws the growth upward so that the tree finally becomes top-heavy, Mr. Gregg said, and in this country the stiff winds are bound to do heavy damage to both fruit and shade trees that have been improperly pruned.



January 11, 1931.

THE CHILDHOOD OF JESUS

Luke 2:40-52


