Financial Condition of County Good and Sinking Funds Already Accumulated and Provided For at Present Tax Rate Will Be Ample to Retire Bonds

Now that the Commissioners' Court has ordered an election for a bond issue of \$50,000 for the establishment of a county hospital, it is opportune to look Basketball Game now being paid by the property owners of the county and to see just what, if any, additional burden a tax of five cents on the \$100.00 for the establishment of a hospital will be. into the financial condition of the county, and to Jearn the amount of taxes

A careful examination of the finances of the county discloses the gratifying fact that a tax of five cents on the \$100.00 for the establishment of a county hospital can be levied without increasing the amount of taxes that are now being levied. This is because the finances of this county are in such good condition that this hospital tax can be levied in lieu of an equal amount here tofore levied for other purposes which can now be dispensed with.

In order to make this clear it is necessary to understand some provisions of

The Commissioners' Court of this county can tevy taxes for only four purposes and the maximum amount which can be levied for each purpose is fixed by the Constitution of Texas.

First: It can levy a tax for the general expenses of running the county of twenty-five cents on the \$100.00, and no more.

Second: It can levy a road and bridge tax of fifteen cents on the \$100.00,

Third: It can levy a jury tax of fifteen cents on the \$100.00, and no more. Fourth: It can levy an improvement tax not exceeding twenty-five cents on ery. No other taxes can be levied by the Commissioners Court of any county Texas except by vote of the people.

For the year 1923 the Commissioners Court has levied a tax of twenty-five Number Social Affairs cents for the running expenses of the county.

The county has also built up another sinking fund with which to take care of the old jail bonds amounting to \$3,419.74. To increase this sinking fund to \$4,000 will require only \$589.36. Now consider how much money this improvement tax of twenty cents on

So it is seen that the improvement tax of twenty cents already levied for the year 1922 will pay the interest on the court house debt and \$7,000 on the principal; it will wipe out entirely the old court house bonds and the jati bonds; it will pay one of the warrants due in April, 1924, for the recent repairs made on the jall and leave a balance in the fund of \$1,419.31.

Thus it is seen that the improvement tax already levied for 1923 will so reduce the indebtedness of the county in 1924 that the same improvement tax Father Mrs. G. 


