The new revised Rural Aid law provides \$6,000,000 or a part thereof for the entire state during 1933-35 for the purpose of promoting public school interests of rural districts and equalizing the educational opportunities afforded by the Recovery Act state to all children of scholastic age living in small and financially weak districts. 





Notice of Proposed MENDMENT Constitution of Texas S. J. R. No. 3

BR IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE




