excavating the channel, great care will be exercised to clean out the existing springs to promote a maximum flow from these springs. The present lay-out of the golf course will be improved as much as possible and foot bridges will be placed across the channel where neces sary. The city water mains will be extended to provide artificial irrigation for trees and grass on portions of the tract that are not subject to natural sub-irrigation. A large pavilion would be built near the proposed wharf and boat houses. It is proposed that this project, when completed, will provide a beautiful and useful park

and play-ground for the people,

Project No. 2.

To build and equip a city natitorium and civic center on land owned by the city on the north side and adjacent to the Lake Park. The structure to be of Spanish design, one story frame, stuccoed, with a large court or veranda. The building would contain a standard size concrete indoor swimming pool, lin-ed with tile, and provided with modern heating equipment, also dressing and locker rooms with shower baths. American Legion club and reading rooms and kitchen. The veramin would be available for and concerts and various open alc gatherings.
