More than 50 miles of highway are to be built in Deaf Smith county, with work to begin immediately. The roads are to be built as an emergency relief measure and will take the place of other federal and state relief work.

Construction is to be on Highway 33, both east and west of Hereford, as well as through the city, and Highway 143, better known as 25-Mile Avenue.

Local labor is to be used as far as possible, and the work will do away with all unemployment in the county.







Octane number is a measurement of the anti-knock quality of to Texas. motor fuel; the higher the octane number the greater the anti-knock characteristic. In other words, a gasoline of 70 octane, which is top rating in the regular price class. will not knock on hills or during sharp acceleration, while a gasoline of 65 octane or less will:

What seems to be arousing the curosity of most motorists is the reason for the use of the word octane. It's all the fault of the technologists-the research enginlines in the many refinery laboratories throughout the country, Mr. Starks says.

After trying out many testing gels to which gasoline might be ompared for absence of knock. scientists finally agreed on a mixture of octane and heptane, two pure hydrocarbons which burn like gasoline. Octane won't knock; heptane makes a motor sound like a riveting machine. As the proportion of octane to heptane in the testing fuel varies, so does the amount of knock vary.

The gasoline motorists buy is tested in a one cylinder motor under conditions which simulate those of actual automobile operation. The test engine is equipped with dials to show the force of de tonation, or knock, and to record temperature conditions. If the gasoline knocks just like testing fuel composed of 50 per cent octane, 50 per cent heptane, then the anti-knock rating of that gasoline is called 50 octane. If the gasoline's detonation is the same as that of a 70 per cent octane-30 per cent heptane mixture, the gasoline is 70 octane, which is just right for modern high-compression motors, according to automotive engineers.







### Dawn Farmer Uses Kerosene On Seed

W. W. Wimberley, farmer about mile northwest of Dawn, is a firm believer in the use of common kerosene on seed wheat for protection against the wheat worm pest. Most farmers think kerosene will destroy the germ in the seed and render it unfit for planting. Mr. that he has planted all varieties of grain, even seed in the garden, with better results. His method of applying kerosene to wheat seed is done by spreading it on a canvas and adding just enough kerosene to moisten the wheat, then cover with another canvas and let fumigate for several hours.






