





# WEST TEXAS READY FOR THE DECENTRALIZATION OF BUSINESS

The people of this country learned from their recent experiences which made it necessary to declare a nation-wide bank holiday that it is a waste of time to discuss the merits and demerits of the unit bank, the branch bank, the group bank, the big bank and the little bank. As a result of the events of the past few weeks the public knows that the big bank, and the so-called liquid bank is in the same class as the frozen asset bank when the people generally decide to keep their own money and start a run on banks. Neither the size of the bank nor diversification of investment, nor the two combined, can keep the banks open when millions of depositors decide to keep their own money. The nation-wide bank holiday has made both the banker and the depositor realize that the policy of the bankers in the past with respect to saying to the public that a depositor, who as a rule never deposited anything but checks, could get the amount of his deposit in currency on demand, is all wrong. The bank holiday has made both the banker and the depositor realize that money is intended to be used solely as a medium of exchange and as such must not under any circumstances be hoarded. The public fully realizes today that all banking, like all business transactions, must be bottomed wholly upon the confidence of the public in the soundness of the banking system and business methods.

## Banks Sound In the Plains Country.

According to the best information available at this time, out of approximately 6,891 Federal Reserve Member Banks in the United States, 5,342 were re-opened prior to March 25th, or about 77 per cent.

In Texas there are approximately 529 Federal Reserve Member Banks and 516 opened prior to March 25th, or about 95 per cent, which was 18 per cent higher than the general average of the Federal Reserve Member Bank in the United States.

There were approximately 12,432 non-member banks operating in the United States before the bank holiday and approximately 10,570 re-opened prior to March 25th, or about 85 per cent; although some of the non-member banks were under restrictions. While in Texas there were approximately 535 non-member banks and 534 were re-opened, although some were under restrictions, prior to March 25th, or approximately 100 per cent.

In towns supplied by the Plains Division of the Texas Utilities Company with electric service, out of 18 Federal Reserve Member Banks 18 have re-opened, or 100 per cent.

In the Plains Division of the Texas Utilities Company there were 23 non-member banks operating before the bank holiday and 21 re-opened prior to March 21st, 16 without restrictions, and 5 under certain restrictions. The two banks that have not

re-opened will, according to reports at this date, be re-opened within the next few days.

In the towns supplied with electric service by the Southwestern Public Service Company located in the Panhandle of West Texas, out of 7 Federal Reserve Member Banks 6 have re-opened. There were 7 non-member banks operated in the territory supplied by the Southwestern Public Service Company before the bank holiday and 7 have re-opened, or 100 per cent.

According to the most reliable information obtainable the banks operated in the Plains Country above referred to have all shown substantial increases in deposits since the bank holiday. The average increase in deposits since the holiday in the above banks is conservatively estimated to be approximately 5 per cent.

The above comparison of the banking conditions in the Plains territory supplied with electric service by Texas Utilities Company and Southwestern Public Service Company clearly shows that the banking and business conditions in West Texas are as sound as can be found in any section in the United States.

## The World Is In The Throes Of A New Birth

AROUND the WORLD

IN THE PAST SEVEN DAYS

Thursday, March 30. The Finance Committee of the French Chamber of Deputies in effect blocks move for immediate payment of the \$19,000,000 war debt installment to the United States. Senate vets surprised drys and put over proposition removing all limitations now imposed on doctors in issuing liquor prescriptions for medicinal purposes. Chinese pirates abduct four foreign officers, all believed to be British. In Rome, Italy, police are holding a man who has confessed that he intended taking the life of Mussolini. Wednesday, March 29. A British airplane crashed near Essen, killing 15 persons, every one on board the vessel. W. A. Flowers, Dallas, and Harry Scott, both American, reported lost in jungles of Nicaragua following disappearance of their airplane in which they were attempting to fly to Puerto Cabezas. Tuesday, March 28. Jewish merchants, it is said, are being made to suffer losses from various political parties in Germany each of which threaten boycotts on goods offered for sale. Discussions in Washington in connection with war debts bring statement from French side that he believes France intends to pay. President Roosevelt kills Federal Farm Board, this board being merged and lost with other agricultural credit organizations. Chinese authorities issue statement expressing belief that Japan fully intends to occupy Peiping. Mrs. Jimmie Walker, wife of ex-Mayor Jimmie Walker of New York City, granted divorce in Florida courts. Soviet Russia refuses bail for three British subjects held for sabotage. Monday, March 27. French Minister to United States announces intention to work for better understanding between the two nations. China refuses to deal directly with Japan in Jehol dispute, thus leaving the matter directly up to the League of Nations. Fifteen years ago Italian troops captured 18 Russians and since that time the Russians have been guests of Italy, doing nothing and living on the fat of the land. Now Italy wonders how they may be disposed of or put to work. Thrown on top of a railway bus standing in the outskirts of Belfast, Ireland, a bomb injures four persons. Over in Italy there is a bit of excitement caused by Premier Mussolini's request that his country deliver in good condition a total of 17,000,000 babies within the next ten years. Prizes varied and attractive are being offered as special inducements to carry out the decree. Confronted with the Government's assurance that 32 beer is non-intoxicating, Texas legislature goes to work to make its sale legal, very much in the manner in which other soft-drinks are dispensed in Texas. Sunday, March 26. After serving 16 years in prison, Tom Mooney granted a new opportunity to acquit himself of charges of having bombed a Preparedness Parade in San Francisco in 1916, in which 10 persons were killed and 40 injured. At Fargo, Oklahoma, a blast from an exploding still killed seven persons who were asleep in the house at the time. Near Oakland, California, an airplane plunged into a residence, killing 13 people. According to Speaker Rainey, the depression is due to come to an official end in June. German prisons open for newspaper men to see that prisoners, recently reported executed, are neither dead or mistreated, according to reports.

The Essentials Of Farm Legislation

From an Address of CONGRESSMAN MARVIN JONES Delivered over Columbia Network Saturday Evening, March 18, 1933. The beginning of the new Administration is a turning point in our country's history. After passing through a trial by fire, the American people are getting the national viewpoint. Selfish forms are being discarded and individuals are beginning to realize that their own interests are bound up with the nation's welfare. The most important step just now in the farm program is to have an adjustment and refinancing of farm mortgages. A program is being worked out, and action should be had as early as practicable. It is hoped that it may be broad enough to relieve the tremendous emergency in this regard. The republic is anchored in the farm homes of America. Nothing is of greater importance than to save these homes from foreclosure and to preserve the happy firesides that have been bulwarks of national safety. The farm problem, however, is so complicated and involves so many different commodities that no one method can be depended upon to bring full relief. Methods must be devised to raise the price levels of farm commodities. These low price levels have almost destroyed farm purchases, and the stagnation thus produced has had in turn paralyzing effect upon industry. The President has shown his understanding of national problems by urging emergency action for agriculture as one of the primary steps in his immediate program. He realizes the importance of the farm problem and has turned his attention in that direction. It is his intention to try "an untrod path" in an effort to avoid the difficulties which will result if another year of planting gets under way before something is done. The relief measure which he advocates is admittedly an experiment. While I am not in accord with some of its provisions, I am supporting it because we must have action in these troubled times. This emergency legislation may be able to relieve immediate conditions while the groundwork is being laid for the thorough, long-range program which must be instituted if agriculture is to rise once again to the level with other industries where it deserves to be. In addition to the adjustment and refinancing of farm mortgages other phases of the permanent farm program involve adjustment of trade barriers, the correction of freight rate discriminations, the curbing of excessive speculation in farm commodities, an adequate currency on a sound basis, and the

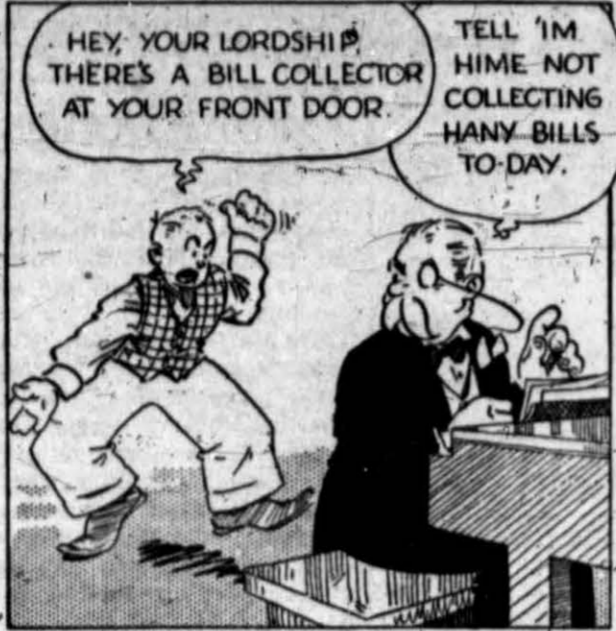
