Highway Here Major Project for Panhandle Shortest Wheat

NEW FEDERAL GRANTS TO BE USED IN PAVING 60 IN COUNTY

The proposed improvements are asphalt surface on caliche.

From Hereford east to the Randail county line, a distance of 14.4 miles, the topping can be put on the asphalt and the job completed for \$93,000. West of the city to the Castro county line, six and one-half miles, the job will cost \$61,750. There is no caliche laid on the road west of Hereford. Grain men estimate the crop of the county at possibly 100,000 bushels, about half enough for seed in a normal planting year. This is the shortest crop since the county went in for wheat on a mandain to town. Those who have fair wheat started off binding their wheat started off binding their wheat and using combines only after it ripened fully. The binders were used to get the grain cut as early as possible to avoid the hail hazard.

Grain men estimate the crop of the county at possibly 100,000 bushels, about half enough for seed in a normal planting year.






