STEER HEREFORD MAN GAVE WILL ROGERS IS SOLD

Geronimo, renamed "Old Jim," the Texas Longhorn steer that G. Hill sent to Will Rogers in 1934, recently was sold to a group of men in Los Angeles for 30 cents a pound. The animal was donated by Mrs. Rogers and money for the sale was given the Salvation Army for an orphans' home.

At the time Geronimo was sold he weighed 2,310 pounds, but at the time Hill sent him. to Rogers he had a top weight of 3,000 pounds and was considered probably the world's largest steer. He has been shown at the Tri-State and other fairs in this section of the country.

Hill sent Geronimo to the West Coast with a load of cattled in December, 1934, and instructed Pete Engle, who accompanied the shipment, to look Will up and present him the steer. The Associated Press sent picture of the animal to its newspapers throughout world at the time of the sale, and Hill has received a number of clippings from different papers that have reproduced it.






