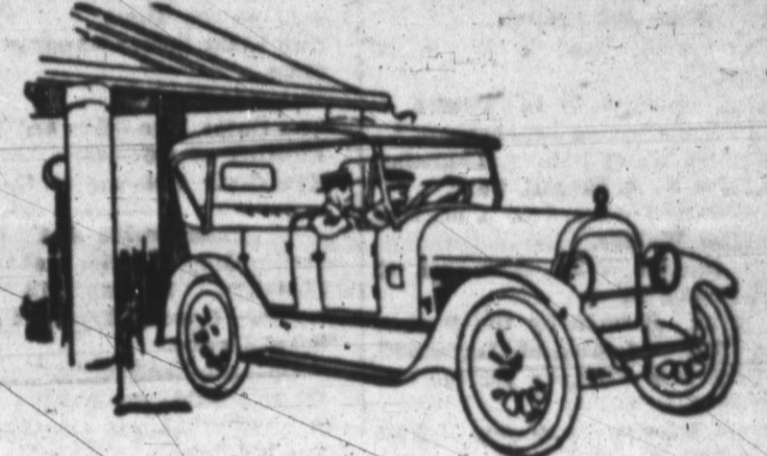
Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Simpson returned home Monday. They had been with Mr. Simpson's mother, who had a serious accident Thursday, since Friday.

Ain't it queer?

International Sunday School Lesson
Simon Peter
Peter, the fisherman, becomes a fisher of men. His very name means stone. He was quick, impulsive and sometimes given to extremes, but Christ was able to see in him such elements which when rightly cemented were the making of him. He became the great loyal, epistle and one of the strongest figures in the early Christian era.
One time his faith in Jesus was so strong he was able to walk on the water and again he became so weak he thrice denied his Lord.
In Peter we can more clearly visualize our own personality—its virtues and defects. Despite his many failings and shortcomings he was always able to rise above them and triumph in the end—a master of self.
Called From Fishing
Peter first lived at Bethsaida, moving to Capernaum later where Jesus for a short period of his ministry made his home with him.

We know he was married and that his mother-in-law lived with them. Active and energetic he was a man deeply interested in public affairs. He and his brother, Andrew, were among the first to become disciples of Christ. They met Jesus at a baptizing where John was preaching. John had pointed the Propheted One out to them as he was walking along. Several months elapsed before they again had occasion to meet Him. It was then on the shores of the sea of Galilee, while they were fishing that Jesus invited them to leave their business and follow Him.

Intimate Conference
Later when Jesus came to the coasts of Caesarea Philippi, while in conference with His disciples concerning His identity, He asked them: "Whom do you say that I the Son of Man am?" And they answered: "Some say that Thou art John the Baptist; some Elias; and others Jeremias or one of the prophets."
While public opinion proclaimed him a great man, none as yet accepted Him as the Messiah. With feeling, the kind one friend confides in another. He again addresses His disciples: "But whom say ye that I am?"
Simon Peter, spokesman, regardless of public opinion but in all sincerity of conviction answers Him: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God."
Christ's Commendation
Peter was human, but because of his intense love for his Master he was able to discern great spiritual truths—here was the Messiah—the Propheted One. In words of commendation Christ speaks to Peter: "Blessed art thou, Simon, son of Jonah."
Peter, the stone, the man of quality, fundamental and lasting was first to confess the Diety of Christ. "And the Diety of Christ is the rock foundation of the Christian church; the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."
The New Era
From that time, after His disciples had had a deeper conception of His divine mission, Jesus began to instruct them as to how he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things. The tragedy of this was that he was to suffer of the elders, chief priests and scribes, the very elect—His chosen people.
He was to be killed, but on the third day rise again. This last statement was beyond their comprehension. That He was to be killed was unbelievable and Peter, who so loved Jesus, began to rebuke Him. Perceiving that Peter was minding too much the things that are carnal, Christ quickly reproved him.
While a few moments before Peter had confessed Him to be the Christ he still cherished the idea of a temporal kingdom to be set up in Jerusalem, with Jesus as King. That, instead, death awaited Him was indeed a shock to all.
In later years Peter came to a full understanding concerning the suffering of Jesus. To save life one must give of life. Peter, too, died a martyr, under the persecution of Nero, for a cause.
Proof of Love
The proof of our love for our fellowman is our devotion and service to our fellowman.
So when Jesus and His disciples had dined, He asked Peter: "Simon, lovest thou me more than these?" Peter answered: "Yea, Lord, Thou knowest that I love Thee." Christ said: "Feed my lambs." The second time Jesus asked the question. Again Peter answered: "Yea, Lord, Thou knowest that I love Thee." Christ said: "Feed my sheep." Then for the third time this question was asked, Peter was grieved somewhat but answered in the affirmative. Christ said: "Feed my sheep—my flock—my followers. This was Peter's mission. During his pastoral life he earnestly and carefully instructed and guarded the little band of early Christians. Silver and gold had he none, but such as he had he gave in abundance—words of inspiration—words of courage and service faithful and true. No amount of persecution, nor imprisonment could deter the life work of this great man, preacher, missionary and writer.
