

At a recent press conference Secretary of Agriculture Wallace solemnly warned the wheat farmers of the United States not to rush into expansion of production because of war prices. Memories of what happened to American farmers as a result of expansion during the World War make the sec-

retary's warning a timely one.

During that conflict Europe needed more foodstuffs and found itself with less manpower available for agricultural production. The American farmer found agricultural demands leaping forward also because prosperity at home augmented corn, cattle, hogs and cotton; in Dallas staff get so high in the domestic demand. Higher prices did not deter purchasing. Over 60 million acres of wheat were harvested in 1915, and over 73 million in 1919. The farmer was expanding into poorer land and cultivating his good land more intensively, going into debt to finance his expansion.

The end of the war did not immediately restrict agricultural demands. Europe needed time to get back to prewar output, and Russia was temporarily in a state of economic collapse. It was not long, however, before foreign demand dropped to normal, leaving the farmers with huge surplus crops and a mass of debt. The full force of the postwar depression was felt in agricultural prices in 1921. The AAA constituting only the last step in a long line of efforts to salvage the wreck, has had an acknowledged measure of success-Whatever program had been made is sure to be lost if the farmers once more accept war as a signal for unlimited expansion .- Amarillo News.

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

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


