### Demonstration Agent Arrives Here Tuesday

CLUB DELEGATES WILL MEET SATURDAY IN COURT HOUSE

Miss Sadie Lee Oliver arrived here Tuesday to assume duties of Home Demonstration Agent in Deaf Smith County.

Her offices are located on the ground floor of the court house, and she stated that she will be in her office all of this week and will be glad to meet any ladies of this section who are interested in home demonstration work.

"Delegates and councilmen of each community will attend a meeting at the court house at 2:30, Saturday afternoon in the county court room," Miss Oliver said, "and at this time detailed plans will be made for demonstration work in this county."

During the remainder of the month of May, clubs will study landscaping and yard improvement, Miss Oliver said. Landscape models are being furnished the local office from Texas State College for Women at Denton, and will be used in study of this phase of demonstration work. During June the clubs will stress "Home Food Supply."

Miss Oliver comes to Hereford from Canadian, where she has just completed four years as Home Demonstration agent of Hemphill County, and is one of the best qualified agents in the Extension Service today.

Prior to entering the field as an extension agent, she was for 14 years an instructor at Texas State College for Women (CIA) at Denton, and in the department of Rural Arts was engaged in training women for service as Home Demonstration agents in Texas. She is a graduate of TSCW, and took her Master's degree from Ohio State University.

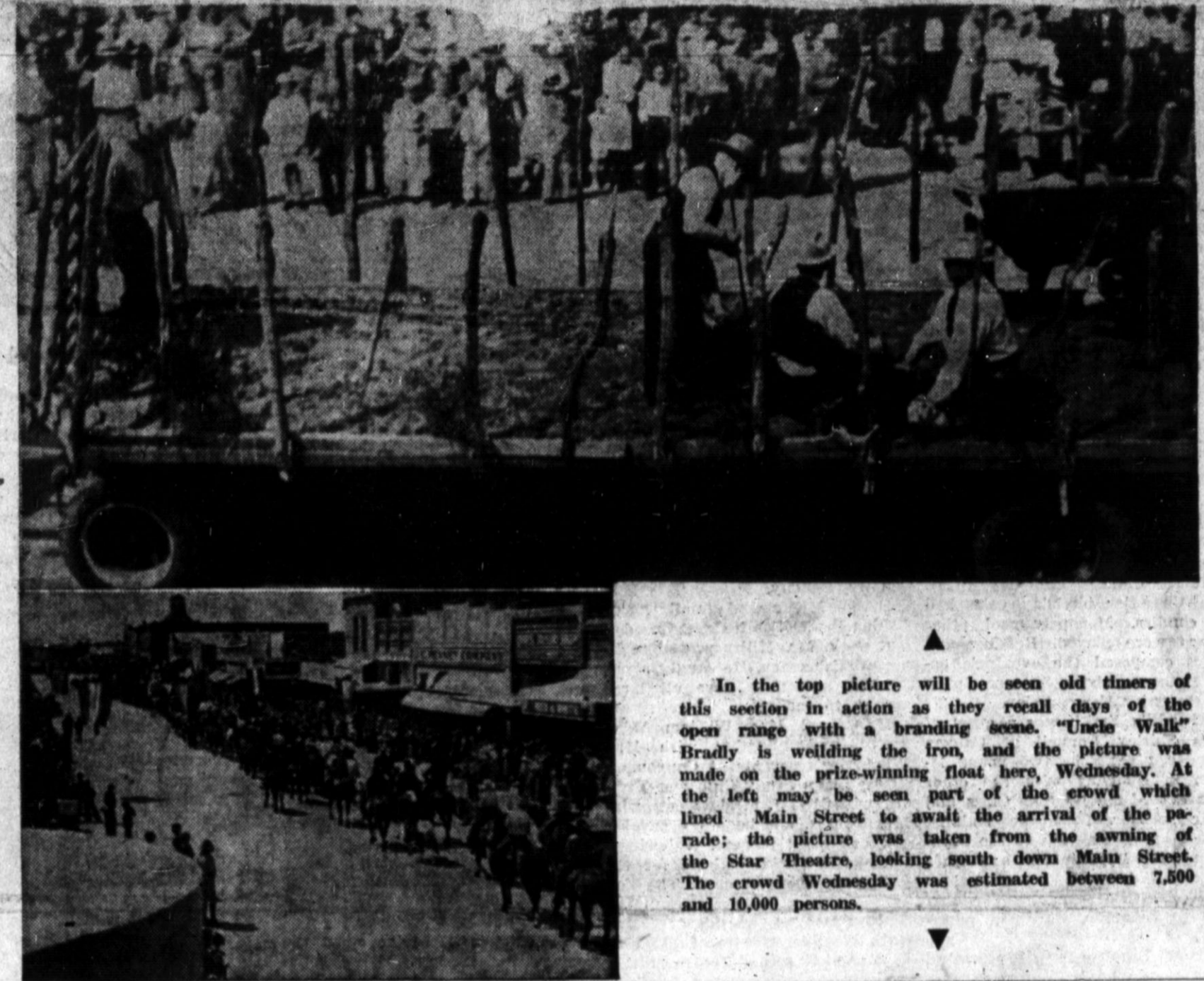

### Pioneers Swap Yarns Of Open Range County

PARADE AND FIDDLERS CONTEST CREATE WIDE INTEREST

With an estimated attendance of between 7,500 and 10,000 persons, Hereford Wednesday observed its fortieth birthday with one of the largest pioneer celebrations in the history of this county. Organized delegations from Amarillo, Dalhart, and Clovis came here for the occasion, which started Wednesday morning with a gigantic parade and closed Wednesday night with two dances.

Pioneer Day officially opened with registration in the Buckner building and at the Star Theatre at 10 o'clock; registration continued throughout the day in both places. The Pioneer Museum was open without charge from 10 o'clock until 4 o'clock, and more complete description of which will be found under picture on this page.

Headlining the morning entertainment was the parade, which featured pioneer scenes, commercial and club floats, cowboys and cowgirls, and machinery.

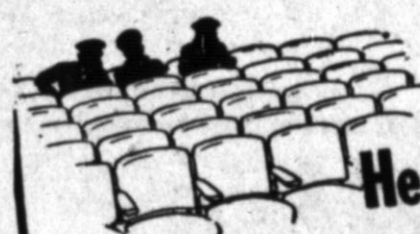
