## CITY TICKET TO BE ELECTED TUESDAY

PRESENT COMMISSION NAMED IN PETITION FILED

### A GREAT RECORD

Faithful Service Deserving Of Complimentary Vote On Tuesday

(An Editorial)

On next Tuesday, April 4, the voters of the city of Hereford will be called upon to select three men as City Commissioners for the ensuing two years. Under the law a form of petition carrying the names of the men desired, certified to by a notary public and filed with the Mayor is necessary. Five per cent of the qualified voters of the city at the last general election must sign this petition.

Such a petition was circulated this week and signed by many more than the required legal number of tax payers. The petition has been filed with the Mayor and the election ordered for Tuesday. Al Miller has been designated as judge. Unless another like petition carrying different nominees for the three positions should be filed it is presumed that the first one filed will prevail as the official ballot next Tuesday. This petition carries the names of the present incumbents, Mayor Knight and D. F. Ashbrook and Homer Wilkinson.

As long as there are two American voters left with ballots to cast and as long as public officials are elected under our present system there will always be a minority opposition to any official or set of officials. No elected official heard of yet has been able to please all the people all the time in all things that arise. There is undoubtedly a minority opposition in Hereford to the present Commission. There would be such an opposition to any three men picked from the population. In fact, students of good government concur in the opinion that opposition is healthful to the public good and a necessary stimulant to more efficient and direct effort by those holding public office.

While some criticism is heard at times of the conduct of the city government, so far as The Brand has heard there is not enough of this sentiment prevailing to bring any opposition ticket into the Tuesday election. To those who have given thought to the difficulties and sacrifices of municipal service the splendid work of the present commissioners in the past is receiving its just measure of praise and support. Mayor Knight has given a large share of his time and his trained legal mind to many years of efficient service for Hereford, and given it unselfishly. Very few men could be found who would devote as much intelligent thought to his community's affairs as Judge Knight has contributed to Hereford. The lion's share of the credit for Hereford's present modern municipal improvements, the envy of the average small town in the Panhandle, goes to him without question. He has had a vision for the future for Hereford and has conducted the affairs of the city to the end that that vision should be fulfilled and the work of today dovetail into the accomplishments of tomorrow.

In our opinion, Hereford owes Judge W. M. Knight an unusually large complimentary vote for reelection next Tuesday in return for the unusually large payments he has made on the community debt that every man owes to the town in which he lives.

Mr. Ashbrook, while not in service as long as the Mayor, has served with signal devotion for many years, and Homer Wilkinson, though just completing a portion of one term, has demonstrated his fitness, capacity and willingness to carry his share of the burden of office.

The Brand does not owe these gentlemen a cent, but does feel it owes this public acknowledgment of work faithfully performed and sincerely hopes all three are honored next Tuesday by the largest vote yet given in Hereford for a board of commissioners.

The school trustees ticket, selected by a committee appointed at last week's mass meeting and announced in Tuesday's Brand, has been altered slightly since that time owing to the fact that John L. Wilson, nominated to take the place made vacant by the declination of Jas. A. Hughes, asked the committee to select some one else in his stead, as he would be unable to serve. Consequently another meeting of the committee was held and C. J. Paddock nominated to the vacant place on the ballot to be voted on next Saturday.

Of these nominees three, Messrs. Miller, Parker and Oberthier, were members last term. Holdover members of the board of trustees appeared before the mass meeting last week and earnestly requested that the retiring members be re-nominated owing to the fact that entire harmony now prevails, each member has a special work to perform, and a plan of work started has not yet been completed.

Members of the committee Thursday heard a complaint that the method of selecting the trustees is wrong, the statement being made that it would have been better to nominate six or eight and select the four highest by ballot on Saturday. This complaint was met with the statement that the only way to ascertain public sentiment on such matters in advance is through a meeting of the voters, where a plan of action may be worked out. This was done last Friday. The Brand carried a notice of this meeting for three weeks in advance. The mass meeting is the battle ground of divergent ideas, is free to every citizen, and a majority is the deciding factor. Not a single objection to the plan of selecting four names was voiced last Friday. If anyone objected to the plan, or had another one, the time and place to present both was at the mass meeting.

There is considerable interest in the election Saturday and an unusually heavy vote is anticipated.

**Why Stock Judging Should be Taught in West Texas Schools**

Mr. Phillips of the Canyon Normal makes the following statement about the teaching of live stock in West Texas Schools.

As a county agent in Texas, I have had many fathers to tell me that their great problem was to get their boys to like the farm. I have always asked what has been done to make the boy like the farm and have always gotten about the same reply, viz. that the boys have been well fed, clothed, and kept busy as long as possible. Many fathers have told me that they have tried to educate their sons, but that the

boys would not accept their efforts in this direction.

Again and again we hear that our schools do not fit the boys for the life that they are going to live. Then we are told that the things given students must be things that the child likes to do. Therefore, I suggest that we teach in our city and rural schools Live Stock Judging. I have my first West Texas son to tell me that he does not like to know more about stock. It is as natural for a boy to want to put his hands on a pretty Hereford calf and feel its quality as it is for him to eat strawberries. Stock Judging in the public school has done more than any half a dozen things to keep boys in school and keep them satisfied.

The other day at White Deer a mother told me the story of the boy who would not go to school and the boy who she asked the teacher a year ago to whip for running away. She said that the Agricultural Stock Judging work had absolutely kept her son in school and kept him satisfied. I asked one of the teachers about the boy in ques-

tion and he replied, "That boy has read Henry's Feeds and Feeding Twice."

The time for parents to wake up and see that which is taught in our schools is what our children need has arrived. The fact is it has been here some time. However, let us all see to it that West Texas boys get an opportunity to study livestock.

The State and Federal Government will pay all of the salary of a full time agricultural teacher except \$1,050, provided the teacher gets \$2,400 for eleven months work. The agricultural teacher has to visit his students and work with them in the summer and for this reason is paid for eleven months. If the Agricultural teacher teaches other subjects half time he will cost, on the above sal-

ary, the local school \$1,725. Advantages are many where a school has an agricultural teacher. First, it puts another man in the High School. Second, discipline is better, third, better care is taken of athletics, stockmen and ranchmen become more interested in the school; fifth, it solves the overgrown boy problem, and links the school to home life. The greatest argument is that every West Texas school that has tried it has kept the work.

**Feather-Eating Fowls**

The reason that fowls eat feathers is due to the fact that they are after certain classes of foods which they need but are not getting, says Harry Emberton, head of the Poultry Department of the A. and M. College. This class of food is represented by any form of milk, tankage, meat scraps, cottonseed meal, peanut meal, or alfalfa pasturage. If one or more of the above feeds are furnished them in sufficient quantities they will get over this habit.
