Army to Sell Property At Clovis Camp

All improvements and property situated at Camp William C. Reid, Clovis, N. M., will be sold on Dec. 30, it was announced this week by Brig. Gen. E. H. Marks, division engineer, Southwestern Division of Army Engineers. General Marks stated that Camp Reid, a railroad battalion training camp, "was no longer needed and has been declared surplus" by the War Department.

Principal improvements to be sold consist of 73 buildings of "theater of operations" type construction. Property items consist of a large number of gas unit heaters of all types, lighting fixtures, electric refrigerators, mess tables, kitchen ranges and water coolers. Also to be sold are the power, light, sewer and water and gas distribution systems.





Junior Red Cross Has 100% Membership in Schools

Reporting 100 per cent membership in the Junior Red Cross in Deaf Smith County schools, Mrs. Clyde Cave, Junior Red Cross Chairman, this week outlined the activities sponsored by the organization and reported on the way in which Junior Red Cross funds are allocated.

There are three principal purposes for which money is used, Mrs. Cave said, pointing out that fifty cents from each room in the schools goes toward financing enrollment in the organization. The remainder of the money is divided into a fund to finance local projects and one to finance national and international activities of the Junior Red Cross.

Among the local projects are the purchase of materials for

the production of scrap books and hospital service items made by the members. The local chapter also buys a Christmas tree and decorations for the service club at the P. O. W. camp and in connection with this it is announced that high school representatives will decorate the tree at 2:30 o'clock, Sunday afternoon, Dec. 17; and anyone wishing to donate decorations may leave them at the Red Cross office in the courthouse. Other local projects will be decided on later.

The international activities of Junior Red Cross, have been greatly expanded since the beginning of the War, and \$300,000 has been given through the National Children's Fund for relief of children in War Zones. Of this total, \$91,000 went to establish and equip 35 war nurseries and four convalescent homes for children under five years of age living in the bombed areas of Great Britain.

Clothing, books and toys have also been sent to English evacuees. Fifty thousand packages of hard candy as well as gift boxes containing an average of 12 articles each were sent as Christmas gifts for them. Aid has been sent to Russia in the form of \$10,000 for the purchase of shoes for war orphans; Vitamin B-1 concentrates to combat beriberi were sent to Chinese children and other medical supplies have also been sent.

Food and clothing have been sent to Greece and shipments

to France, Holland and Belgium include children's clothing, bed linens and such food items as evaporated milk, concentrated soups, chocolate, powdered cocoa and prepared baby food.

To the children evacuated from Reykjavik, Iceland to safer country districts for the summer months were sent garden tools, toys, candy and other miscellaneous items; and clothing, shoes, bedding and medicines have been delivered to child victims of the invasion of Poland. Five thousand dollars was recently appropriated for the purchase of basic educational materials for Polish children who are being resettled in East Africa.

Petroleum Administration for War has announced that gasoline demand is running 89,300 barrels per day over allocation for the first half of the current quarter. "The trend is seriously unfavorable when you recognize that normally the average declines in the colder period of this quarter. Our weather has been favorable this year and it is doubtful that the most unfavorable weather will cut consumption to the point that we will be within our allocation at the end of the quarter," Fonville explained.

Instructions to Local Boards pointed out that due to the extreme shortage of gasoline and the great demand for it by the armed forces, it is necessary that every Gasoline Panel follow regulations exactly and make every possible attempt to stay within the allocation for the District.



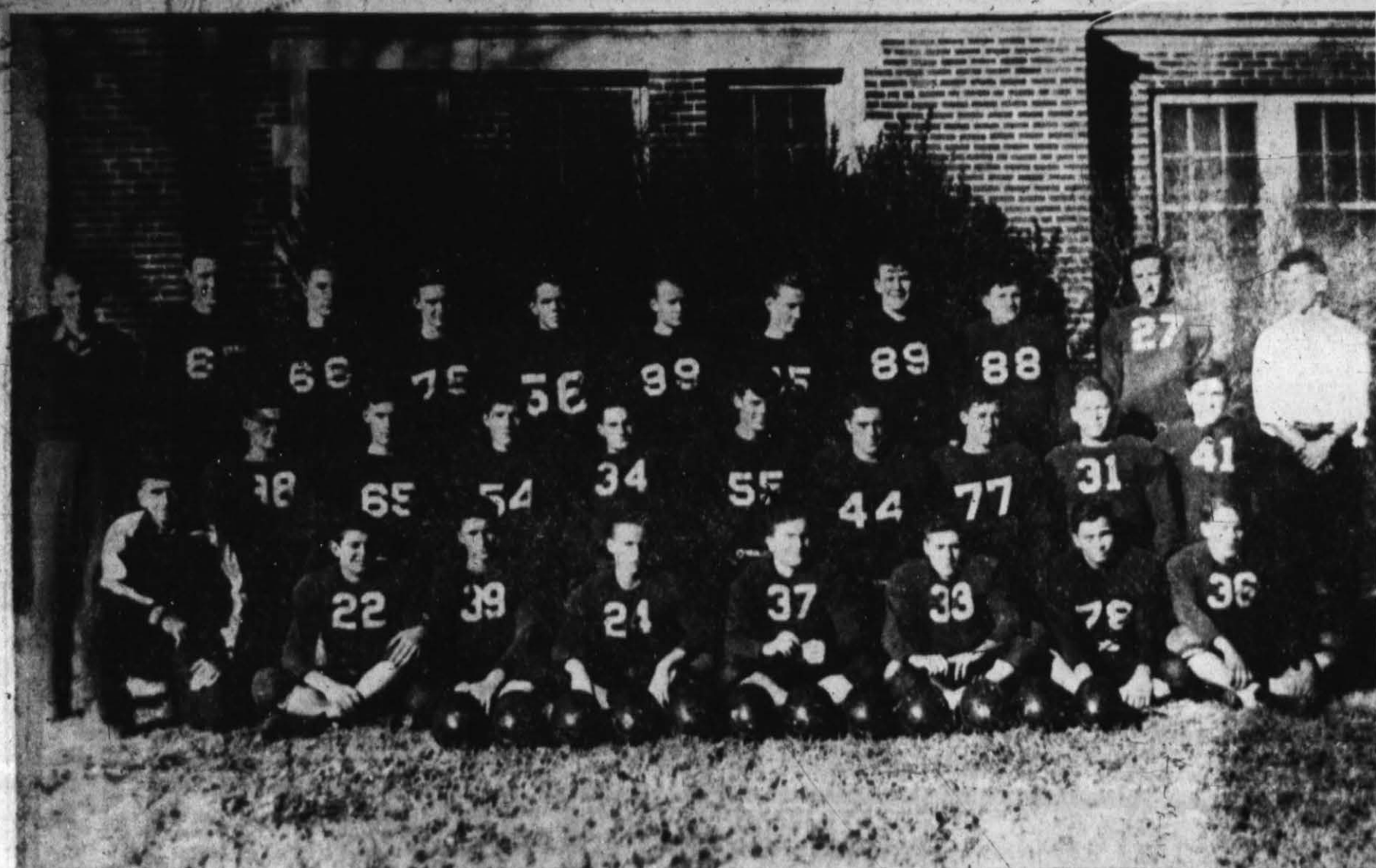

Hereford bowed out for district football honors last Friday when the Whitefaces tumbled before a powerful Phillips Blackhawk offensive to lose the game 27 to 0. The Whitefaces were outwheeled and outplayed and made no offensive show until late in the last quarter when they plowed to within two yards of the Blackhawk goal; but they put on a hard-fighting defensive to stop at least three other serious scoring threats by their opponents.

The Blackhawk victory got under way early in the first quarter, after they punted out almost to the Hereford goal line and the Hereford return put the ball on the Phillips 30 and the Blackhawks made a steady march down the field, with Hopper taking the ball over and Williams' kick good for the extra point. Seven more points were added to the Blackhawk tally just before the half with Eldridge scoring the second touchdown.

Scoring honors came to Phillips again with the stubborn Whitefaces unable to cope with the solid Phillips line and plunging, passing backfield. Hopper made the third score of the

game with the extra point again good; a pass received by Hopper was good for the fourth Phillips score with no extra point on the last tally.

The Whitefaces made a serious scoring threat late in the last period with a pass from Davis to Sowell good for a long gain and the running of Reeves' accounting for Hereford ground gains.

But despite the top heavy score, the Whitefaces proved no pushover and showed their spirit when they refused to stop a hard defensive fight, even when the Blackhawks had the game sewed up. The Hereford line fought hard with Hopson, Phillips, Manjeot and Lookingbill—playing good defensive games; and Halfback Billy London came from behind the line time and again to stop Phillips ball carriers.

Altogether, Hereford fans can be proud of the Whiteface 1944 record and know that this year's wearers of the Maroon and White have tacked up a good record for sportsmanship and hard-hitting, clean, football. And this is as good a place as any to make our apologies to

C. W. Reeves for failure to give him credit for snagging that decisive extra point in the Friona game two weeks ago. Red, a regular backfield man last year, was moved into the line this fall to add weight and experience which have been a decisive factor in the Whiteface victories; but he got his backfield spot back again at Friona, and carried it with honor to run the ball over for that extra point and to account for important gains throughout a nip and tuck grid battle.
