



CENTRAL SCHOOL WILL BE **REBUILT; TO REMODEL** HIGH SCHOOL

Approval of Hereford's application to PWA for \$50,000 with which to rebuild Central school and improve the high school was announced last Friday in Washington. The money will come from PWA, \$22,500 as an outright gift, and the remainder as a loan. To secure the loan, voters of the independent school district will be called upon to pass a bond election. Bonds will be for a long term and interest will be four per cent. at least two per cent cheaper than rates available from regular sources.

Rittenberry and Carder of Amarillo, architects, have the plans prepared. Gilliland and Witherspoon, local attorneys, are handling the legal work.

Construction will start as soon as possible. A communication from the state PWA office urged all possible speed in getting under way. The project has five months for completion.





Amendments Are Explained By Secretary of State By Gerald Mann, Secretary of State

The Texas Constitution at the present time provides that the State is without authority to furnish free text books to other than public schools. Proposed Amendment number seven on the ballot for the August 24 election would permit the state to supply free textbooks to all schools, private and parochial. Such textbooks, it is presumed, to be the same as used in the public schools.

Advocates of this Amendment state that this would entail no additional expense because the State now purchases more books than are necessary. However, this point is merely one of the claims made and has not been substantiated by the Secretary of State. Adyocates point out that they pay taxes to support public schools bug that if they choose to send their children to private or paroschools the least the State chial can do is to supply the textbooks

free. Probably the most important nd less publicized provision of his Amendment is the fact that it proposes to rewrite Section 5 of Article Seven of the Constitution so as to permit the apportionment of school funds on some other basis than scholastic population. For many years there has been

considerable agitation in certain quarters to abolish the "school census" or scholastic population system of apportioning school funds and substitute in lieu thereof the "average attendance" basis or some other basis. The Legislature would determine just how this was to be done, if this Amendment is adopted.

If adopted this proposed Amendmeet Number Seven would mean tect: (1) that the State would furnish free textbooks to pupils in all the schools of Texas; and (2) that a new basis for apportioning school funds other than the scholastic census basis, could be set up.



rt them, but it t and if the legislature votes pensions to all whom they can under the provisions of this amendment, the cost to the taxpayers of Texas would be more than \$40,000,000 a year-ten times as much as the state now appropriates for all of its charitable institutions combined.

INDER THE PROVISIONS of this amendment, every session of the legislature could change the amount of pensions to be paid, and like-wise, those eligible to receive them. It would make the payment of old age pensions a political issue every two years. The conscientious legislator would be constantly harassed by the demagogue advocating opening the doors wide and giving a pension to all, whether they needed it or not.

IN VIEW OF THE FACT that our public schools and our public roads now get 82 per cent of all the money spent by the State. we know that these services would have to be cut almost in half if the legislature were to appropriate out of existing revenue anything like \$40,000,000 for old age pensions.

THE DEBT OF LOCAL units of government is I . Texas now amounts to approximately \$700,000-, 000. This money has been expended largely an amendment which would expand the taxing power of Texas to the tune of \$40,000,000 a

vear.

SALES TAX is a tax on poverty; it is a tax on meat, bread and clothes. But this seems to be the source from which many people who are ardent advocates of old age pensions expect to get the money. The average man needs no more taxes on his cost of living; the average business can carry no more taxes on its payroll.

F WE ARE to have pensions, let us give them on a basis of need, and not on a basis of politics. Let's vote this amendment down, and if old age pensions are to be paid, we can later adopt an amendment to the Constitution which will guarantee that this pension will go to those who needed it, and to them only.

WE HAVE LIVED under the Bill of Rights and . under the Constitution of This state for many years. It has protected us in times of stress. It is, therefore, a safe rule to follow when there is doubt on a Constitutional amendment, to vote "No".
