In Reading and Arithmetic Given Intermediate Grades Here

Report cards were issued to the chilnoon. The report cards are prepared for the inspection of the parents and the pupils, their primary purpose being to keep the parents informed as to the standing of their children from month to month. Since so few parents find the time and inclination to visit the schools, the report card is the only means used by many parents to keep in touch with the work done by their children. If the report card is not satisfactory, the teacher, the principal or the superintendent should be consulted, unless the cause can be determined by the parent. Conferences between parents and teachers that are prompted by a desire to help the children can not do any harm and may possibly do much good.




