T. W. Galloway departed Sunday for Mineral Wells, Texas, on a business trip.

School was dismissed here on Tuesday last week and as a result of the three days vacation several of our teachers ate Thanksgiving dinner at their homes. Misses Brown and Rose went to their homes near Canyon. Miss Clements visited her home near Lubbock and Prof. Daugherty visited in Canyon. Prof. and Mrs. Buckner remained in Friona and Mr. Goodwine remained at home.

Mrs. Peyton was returned to the sanitarium at Hereford Friday morning. She had been at home only a few days from that institution where she had her tonsils removed the previous week. A hemorrhage set in about one o'clock Friday morning which refused to yield to home treatment until a physician arrived from Hereford on the morning train. 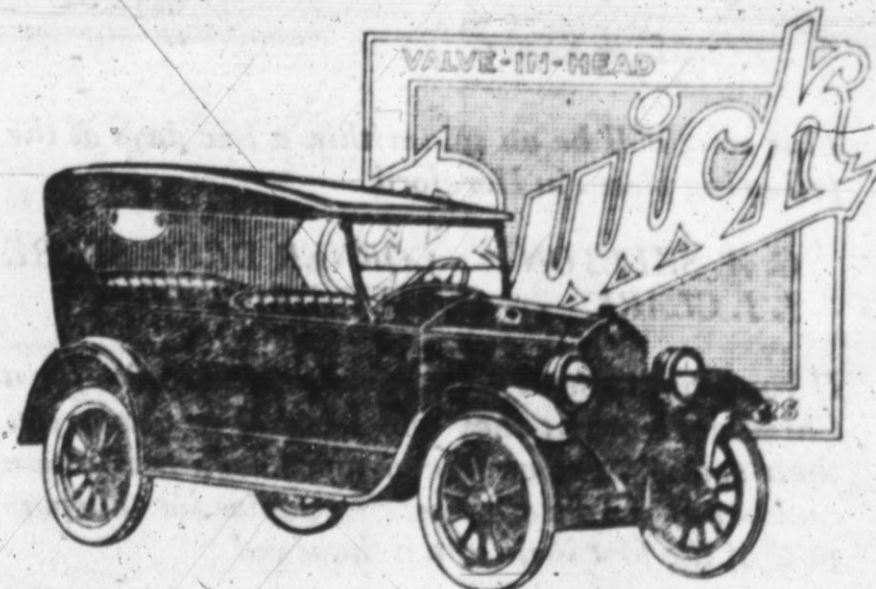
