Rain and hail in Hereford Monday afternoon brought a total of .55 of an inch of moisture to bring some help to yards and gardens...

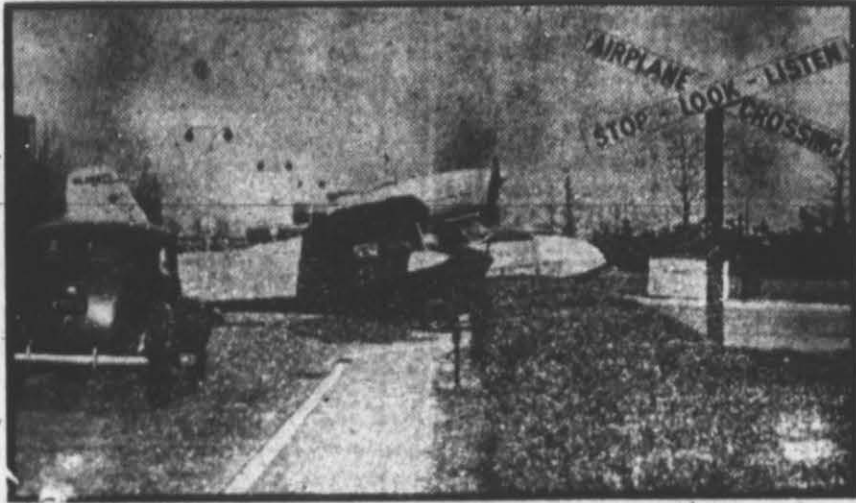
The fall was spotted, stopping just a few miles out of Hereford on the South and bringing only light sprinkles in the territory to the southwest.

Lieutenant Foster, bombardier on a Flying Fortress, was shot down over Germany last summer and was liberated when General Patton's 3rd Army took over the prison camp where he was stationed.

Fresh Water Clam Turns Up in Irrigation Ditch To Back Geology Theory

According to the geologists, vast underground rivers circulate under the flat plains of the Panhandle, and last week Ernie Neff, working at an irrigation well on the Gugenheim place, twelve miles northeast of Hereford, found some evidence to back up the theory.

For in the irrigation ditch Neff found a live, fresh water clam—a specimen two inches wide and three and a quarter inches long. The well on the Gugenheim place has been in operation only four or five months and the theory is that the clam was pumped up from one of those underground rivers.

CHDA Suggests Use of Vitamin C in Canning

Despite a short fruit crop in this immediate locality, much fruit will be canned by Deaf Smith County housewives this summer and Miss Sadie Lee Oliver this week suggested the use of Vitamin C tablets to prevent the loss of color and flavor in home-canned peaches, pears and plums.

Vitamin C (ascorbic acid) acts against oxygen and so prevents the unpleasant darkening and change of flavor in fruit at the top of the jar where it comes in contact with air.

Ranchers May Take Advantage of Dam Building Program

An opportunity for local farmers and ranchers to take advantage of the tank and dam construction provisions of the conservation program was offered this week when announcement was made at the local AAA office that a crew equipped with special dirt-moving machinery is now at work in the county.

Construction of tanks and dams has been held up because of the lack of manpower and machinery, but farmers and ranchers who desire to start such conservation projects may now make arrangements for the work by contacting the local AAA office.

Capture of German General Marks War's Climax for Hartman

Sgt. George (Jiggs) Hartman found a real climax to his experiences in the war in Europe when he captured a two-star German general in a small village in the Alps, about 150 miles from the city of Mannheim.

According to Sgt. Hartman's letter, he was "flushing out houses," looking for soldiers when he went into a house and "found this old boy reclining in a nice soft chair, taking it easy."

Hartman admits that he was quite surprised—and so was the general, who had no idea that the Americans were in miles of his Alpine hide-out.

Sgt. Hartman is a member of a cavalry reconnaissance squad, and says that on the day he bagged the general, his troop alone took 5,000 prisoners.

Ollie Callaway Receives Discharge on Points

Ollie Callaway arrived home last Wednesday after receiving his discharge from the Army on the point system.

Callaway, who had been in service for four and one-half years, spent two and a half years in the Pacific combat area. His campaign record includes most of the early "island-hopping" combats of the Asiatic-Pacific theatre.

Hereford Girls Describe Life of Army Nurses in Bomb-Shattered Manila

Alma and Margaret Paetzold, lieutenants in the Army Nurse Corps, worked under constant fire for almost two weeks after their arrival at Manila during the height of the battle for the Philippine capital, and they are now stationed at an Army Hospital located at what was once the swankiest race track in the Islands.

According to a United Press dispatch describing conditions when the first hospital unit moved in, the race track was one of the few structures in Manila not blasted into rubble, but the grandstand roof had been bombed and gaping holes still show.

By Mar. 13, the racing plant had been sufficiently repaired to receive 250 battle patients, and the improvised hospital—now one of the finest General Hospitals in the Pacific—today accommodates 1,500 patients who are cared for by an expert staff of 140 medical officers and nurses and 580 enlisted personnel.

Bond Buying Lags As Mighty 7th Enters Final Lap

Sales of Series E bonds now amount to more than 65 per cent of the 7th War Loan Quota, Bond Chairman Robert L. Thompson announced this week, stating that E bond sales amount to \$164,193.75 with \$86,806.25 still to be sold to meet the \$250,000 goal.

Total bond sales amount to \$227,730.17, with a balance of \$152,269.83 still due to reach the \$380,000 quota; and though the sales look large, Chairman Thompson points out that the 7th War Loan is now entering its final phase and it will take a spirited last-minute spurt of bond-buying to put Deaf Smith County over the top on all quotas in the next 21 days.

The Vacation Bible School of the First Baptist Church which has been in session for the past two weeks will close with its commencement program at 8:30 Friday night. To date 164 have enrolled in the school and the attendance has averaged 132 for the past seven days.

Govt. Loan Rates On Oats Announced

Although the oat crop, like other small grain crops, has fallen victim to the drought, there will be some grain harvested in the county and the AAA office this week announced the 1945 oat loan and purchase program which will be of interest to some farmers in the area.

The rate for Deaf Smith County is 52 cents a bushel on farm-stored oats and 45 cents on warehouse-stored. Applications will be handled at the AAA office in the same manner as wheat loans.

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Estimates on the Deaf Smith County wheat harvest this week ranged all the way from 800,000 to one and one-half million bushels; and as combine and machinery repairs were being completed, observers stated that cutting would probably take place in more fields than was originally thought.

County Agent A. R. Bateman believes that the average yield on dry-laid fields will run around seven and a half bushels to the acre, but says that, even more than usual, the yields are unpredictable until the combines actually start rolling.

On irrigated farms, Bateman says that the yield will probably run from 20 to 40 bushels to the acre, with most averages running in the 20 to 25 bushel class. Chiefkan wheat, a variety not popular with bakers and which at one time drew penalties on the market, is standing the drought better than other varieties, Bateman says, and adds that the proper use of conservation practices is paying real dividends this year, as fields which were summer-fallowed are sure to produce the best wheat in the county.

Concerning dry land wheat yields, the county agent states that as much as 30 bushels to the acre may be made on adjoining sections owned by J. A. Pitman, Albert Zinsler and Jess Ritter, 16 miles west of Hereford. Rain last September, a few light showers during the spring, plus the use of fallowing, account for the good wheat on these farms, Bateman says.

LEGAL NOTICE

S. J. R. No. 3
A JOINT RESOLUTION
PROPOSING AN amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 5. SECTION 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be

eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

SEC. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members;"

majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

SEC. 3 The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

If it appears from the returns of said election that a

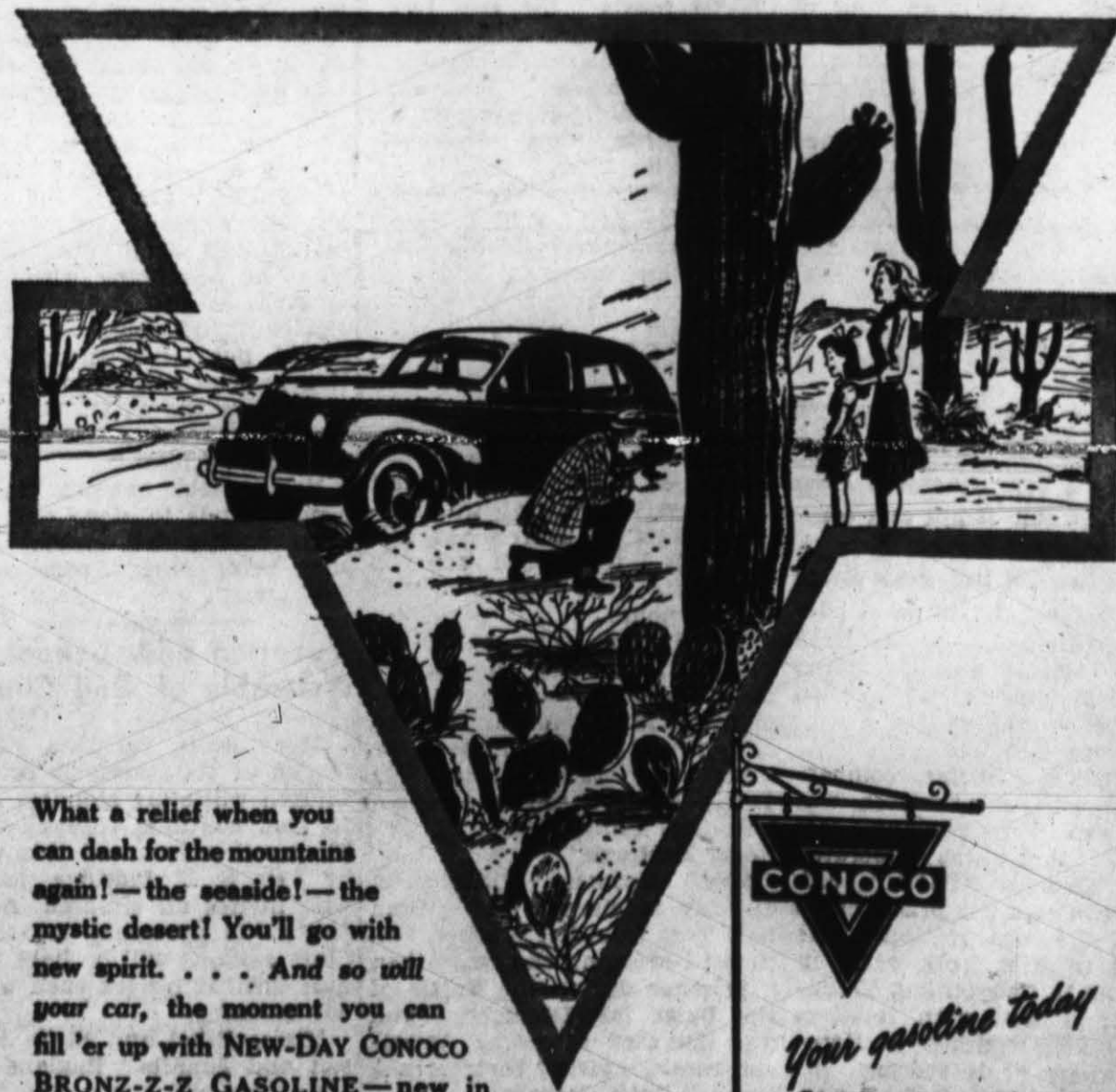

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or

called session."
SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."
EACH voter shall mark out

one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.
SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
SEC. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

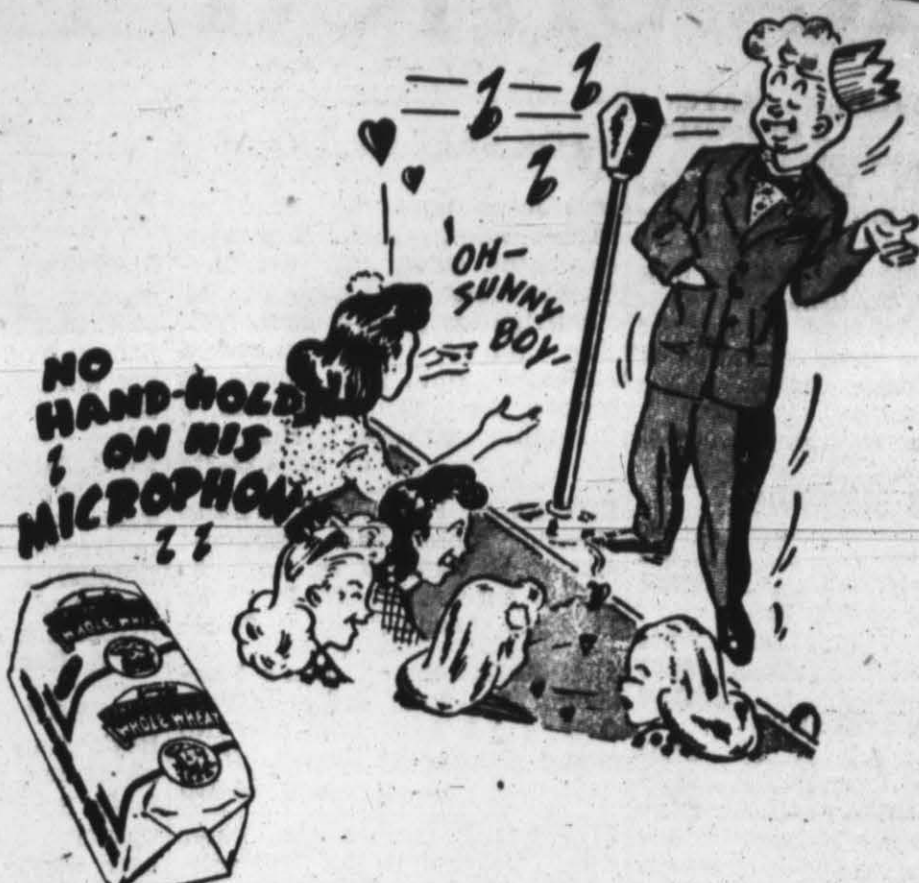

LEGAL NOTICE

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

PROPOSING an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"SECTION 2A. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state, during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, and provided further, that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of any provision of subsection "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

"FOR the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

THOSE OPPOSED to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"AGAINST THE amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States

Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted

for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

SEC. 4. There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application, for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over One (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal Funds; and, provided further that the total amount of

money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 25th day of August, 1945, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause: "For the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"Against the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of funds of the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such publication and election.

Board Cites Top Price on Fryers

Housewives were reminded today by E. H. Norton, Chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board, that poultry is under ceiling prices and that they should check these prices when they buy.

In Deaf Smith County, live broilers and fryers, under four pounds, must sell for no more than 39 cents per pound in store Groups I and II, and 38 cents in Groups III and IV. Broilers and fryers under two and one-half pounds, sold drawn—that is, with head and feet off, entrails out, and plucked—must sell for no more than 60 cents per pound in all Group stores.

In addition to broilers and fryers, roasters, roosters and hens also have maximum prices. Mr. Norton said, "Grocers are required to post their ceiling price list, so watch for them when you buy."

Mr. Norton also pointed out that person-to-person sales have the same ceiling price as Group I stores.

Miss Lucy Reed's "Green Thumb" Successful With Three Separate Gardens

The fruit crop at the Dr. G. W. Heard place this year consists of two peaches and a few pears, but all the vagaries of a particularly temperamental Panhandle spring have not been able to prevent Miss Lucy Reed, Mrs. Heard's sister, from having her customary good garden.

As a matter of fact, if you want to be strictly accurate about it, there are three separate gardens, says Miss Lucy, pointing out that she has one separate tomato garden, which this year boasts 80 plants of three different varieties.

The carrots, which are of the improved Coreless type, are now large enough to eat, and the English peas also are ready for serving. For lunch Monday, the Heards had asparagus, peas and carrots, lettuce and beets from Miss Lucy's gardens.

The small, early spring garden, which is sheltered by the house and trees, has tasty greens, mustard, radishes, lettuce and spinach.

Always interested in new varieties, Miss Lucy this year has planted a peach melon, using seed given to her by her niece, Mrs. George G. Heard. And her family is relying on her "green thumb" to bring the new plant through to successful production.

Automobile Tax Stamps On Sale at Post Office

The new \$5.00 Automobile Use Tax Stamps were placed on sale last Saturday at the post office, and the law requires that the stamp be displayed on every vehicle in use on the highways by July 1, it was announced this week by Postmaster J. R. Lipscomb.

Both cash and jail penalties may be inflicted for failure to pay this tax, Lipscomb said. The stamp should be displayed in a prominent place on the motor vehicle and if at all possible on the windshield.

Motorists are advised to keep a separate record of the serial number which appears on each stamp and to write on the back of the stamp the make, model, serial number and State license number of the vehicle.
