Present equipment on the location includes an elevator grader, a power shovel, crusher and a fleet of dump trucks. All of the machinery, except the crusher, has been set up and is now in operation. Contractors stated that work was progressing rapidly at the present time.

To Start West End.

Actual placement of caliche is scheduled to begin on the west end of the project at the Casho county line. As the work con-finues back east along the road, two more locations for pits will be established.

Contractors estimated that the work should be completed within a period of 90 to 100 days, and opened around August 1, 1937. More machinery is expected here within a few days, and around May 1, the arrival of additional employees is expected to further crowd housing conditions here.
