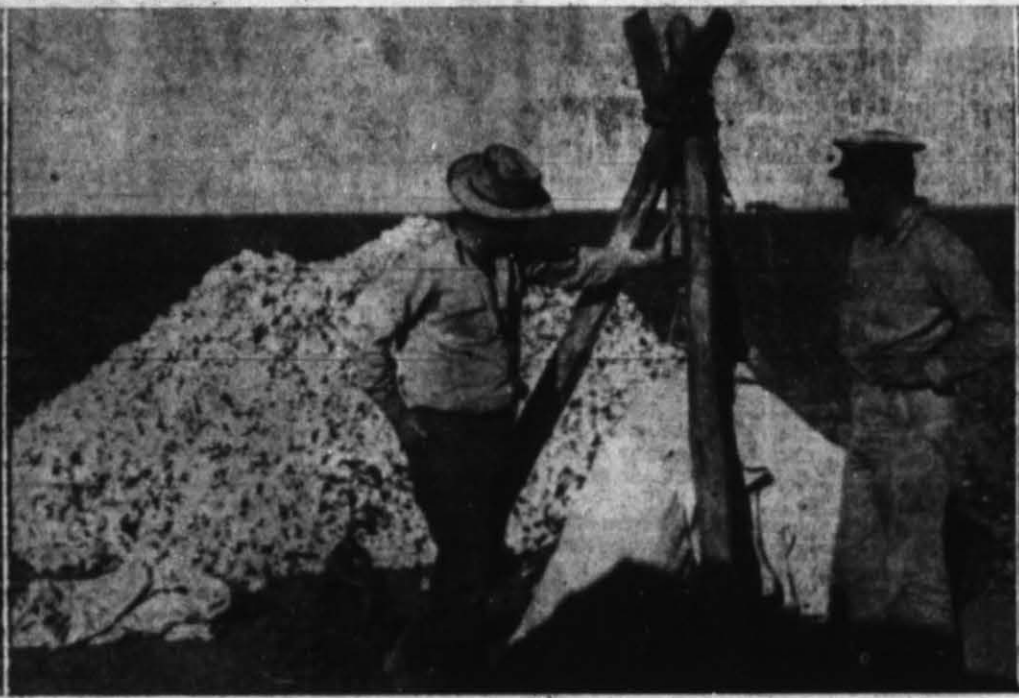

## New Hereford Gin Ready to Handle Area's Big Cotton Crop

COTTON MOVES IN ON IRRIGATED FARMS AND DEAF SMITH COUNTY GROWERS REAP RICH HARVEST

### New \$80,000 Plant Opens On Tuesday

Hereford's new \$80,000 cotton gin began operations yesterday afternoon after delays in shipment and installation of machinery had caused several postponements.

Several bales of cotton were already on the lot waiting for ginning yesterday morning (Tuesday) and a big rush was anticipated by the ginners as soon as word that operations had started could get around. Hundreds of bales of cotton, already picked and waiting for the gin, are piled on the ground in ricks in fields all over the area. Claude McGee, manager of the gin, said that the plant would be operated day and night if the demand makes 24-hour operations necessary.

The gin will have a capacity of about 100 bales in a normal working day, and this can be nearly doubled if a day and night shift is employed.

In the meantime, picking of the first large-scale cotton crop grown in this area in many years is well underway, and the yield is reported to be averaging between three-quarters and a bale to the acre over the entire irrigated area.

Yields as high as a bale and a quarter to a bale and a half per acre have been reported, McGee said. C. N. McClure, one of the leaders in the cotton planting experiment this year, has 135 bales of cotton picked and piled on the ground in two large ricks at his farm southeast of Hereford.

Mechanical pickers were scheduled to go into operation within a few days. Rains and snow during the past week slowed the cotton harvest, but farmers report that the bad weather has caused little or no damage to the crop. Most of the cotton is still on the stalks, and very little has fallen on the ground.

An estimated 2,500 to 3,000 acres of land was planted to cotton in this area this year. With a heavy yield assured now, farmers are assured of a big market. Cotton was quoted this week at about 24 1/2 cents per pound on the New York market for middling grades and cotton seed is selling at about \$90 per ton.

The Hereford gin, completely new and modern throughout, has been constructed by Taft McGee at a cost estimated at more than \$80,000. It was scheduled for operation early last month, but delays in installing some of the machinery forced postponement of the opening until this week.

Workmen were busy Tuesday morning completing installation of a boiler which formed the final unit in the plant.

The gin is located at the east edge of Hereford on Highway 60.

Santa Claus will be in town, and will be gifts for all youngsters. Details of the program will be announced later.

The program is sponsored by the merchants of Hereford, and is under the direction of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, with the cooperation of other civic clubs.

### High Costs Too Much for Solo, Says Fowlkes

"Form a stock company and build a hotel for Hereford," was the advice offered Chamber of Commerce directors and members of the Chamber of Commerce Hotel Committee at a conference with architects and contractors Monday by hotelman Preston W. Fowlkes, Okmulgee, Oklahoma, hotel operator who has been interested in building and operating a hotel in Hereford.

Fowlkes, who has been studying plans for building and operating a modern hotel here for several months, calmly told the Chamber of Commerce directors that the project was too big for one man without "a greater subsidy than I would be willing to back or you would be willing to pay."

Fowlkes told the group that he would be willing to make a considerable investment if a stock company were formed, or that he would consider leasing and operating the hotel if it were built. He said that he was definitely interested in operating a first-class hotel in Hereford.

Contractors estimates of building costs have gone up sharply in the last few months, he told the group, and the estimated cost of building and furnishing a modern 58-room hotel, for which plans have been prepared, is now pegged at about \$320,000.

Also present at the conference, which was held at the Chamber of Commerce offices Monday afternoon, were Architect John W. F Moore and a member of his firm and contractor Charles H. Sharp, who have been working with Fowlkes on plans and estimates for the proposed building.

Architects plans for a modern 58-room structure, all rooms with private bath and shower, plus a banquet hall capable of seating 225 persons, coffee shop and space for businesses on the first floor, were presented to the Chamber of Commerce group.

Fowlkes told the group that rather than ask for a flat subsidy which would be considerably higher than the \$75,000 which he had first estimated, he would recommend formation of a stock company with local capital to construct the building.

He said that he would consider investing in such a company, possibly to the extent of the cost of furnishing the building (estimated at \$40,000).

## Farm Production Goals for 1948 Boosted to New High; Spuds Get 5 Per Cent Increase

Farm production goals for 1948 will remain at wartime levels, according to an announcement by secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson Monday.

The secretary cited large foreign and domestic food commitments as the reason for maintaining farm production at the highest possible levels for another year.

Goals for some commodities are being increased over the 1947 figure. A surprise boost was in the 1947 potato goal, which is being increased by five per cent over last year. A reduction of 1 percent in the wheat goal for 1948 was included.

The Secretary's request for increased production of spuds in 1948 brought speculation among local growers as to whether this area's

goal would be increased.

County goals for spud production have not yet been announced here, although F. O. Collier, local PMA secretary, said that the announcement has been expected daily from the state offices of the Production Marketing Administration.

Rumors have been that goals are not to be increased in areas where government support buying was heavy in 1947.

Collier said he did not know whether this county would receive a 5 percent increase in the production goal for next year or not.

Other products for which increased production was requested are corn, 7 percent; grain sorghums, 36 percent; soy beans, 1 percent; cotton, 3 percent; dry beans, 18 per-

cent; oats, 2 percent; barley, 4 percent; and rye, 26 percent.

The big increase asked in grain sorghums was not unexpected, since the 1947 crop was short and the failure of the '47 corn crop has created a great demand for grain for livestock feeding.

Decreased acreages for wheat, 3 percent; truck crops for fresh markets, 2 percent; truck crops for processing, 1 percent; and rice 1 percent were also asked.

Goals were unchanged for sugar beets, sugar cane, sweet potatoes, flax seed, and tame hay.

Anderson called for an increase of nine million acres over the record-breaking 247 million acres in cultivation during 1947.

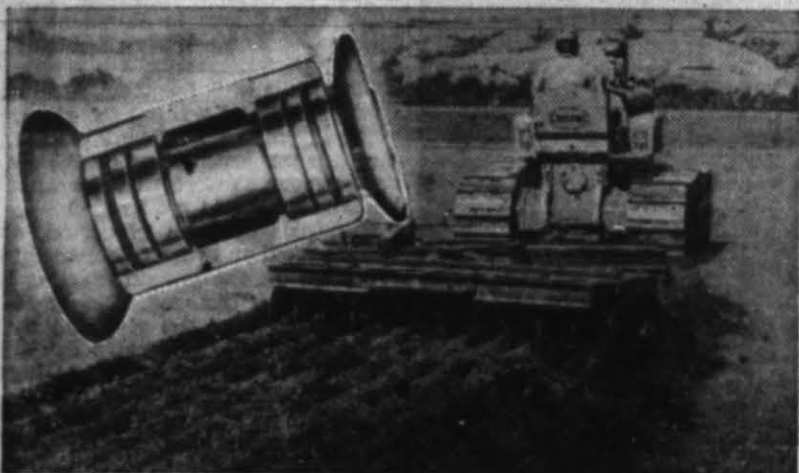

stockers made up the bulk. Common and medium calves brought \$12.50 to \$18 at Houston, \$13 to \$12.50 at San Antonio, and \$12.50 to \$17.50 at Fort Worth. Good and choice grades sold at \$19 to \$22 at Oklahoma City, \$18.50 to \$22.50 at Wichita, and \$22 down at Denver.

Southwest hog markets regained part of recent losses during the week in gains of mostly 25 to 50 cents. Butcher hogs advanced \$1 at San Antonio, where good and choice medium weights closed at \$25.75, while Fort Worth and Denver paid \$28. Oklahoma and Wichita bought most comparable lots from \$25 to \$25.50.

Texas sheep markets continued steady to strong, but other southwest terminals closed barely steady to as much as \$1 lower. San Antonio bought good and choice ewes at \$7.75 to \$8.50, and Denver paid \$8.50 to \$9. Common and medium ewes brought \$7.74 to \$8.25 at Fort Worth and \$6 to \$7 at Oklahoma City. Goats held firm.

Lower wool tariffs announced for the first of the year stimulated foreign buying.

## MARKETS

(USDA)—Southwest farm markets paid mostly steady to higher prices last week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reported.

Cotton prices advanced sharply, and net gains averaged \$6 to \$7 a bale. Sales increased too, as farmers offered freely in most areas. Rains halted picking.

Continued active demand raised corn prices about 15 cents per bushel for the week, and other feed grains followed the upward trend. Wheat advanced slightly, as more favorable weather for winter wheat offset large foreign requirements. Friday's close found wheat at \$3.16, white corn \$3.01 to \$3.02, and sorghams \$3.95 to \$4.

Milled rice eased slightly last week, as limited rough rice sales held fairly steady. Some feeds dropped early in the week but strengthened toward the close. Hogs offered less freely, and prices remained firm. Peanuts moved at the support level but many failed to qualify for top price.

Southwest markets paid steady to slightly stronger prices for eggs and poultry the past week. Current receipt eggs brought 43 to 45 cents per dozen at Denver and 45 to 50 at Fort Worth. Cuddled eggs sold around 50 cents at Dallas and New Orleans. Thanksgiving turkeys moved to market largely at or near support prices.

Colorado onions and potatoes and Louisiana sweet potatoes remained about steady to firm during the week. Excessive supplies of satsuma oranges found their way into the New Orleans market because of curtailed shipments out of the state. Cabbage sold higher at most consuming centers, and limited shipments from the Lower Rio Grande Valley found strong markets. Valley peppers and tomatoes eased toward the end of the week. Grapefruit advanced further, but oranges were dull.

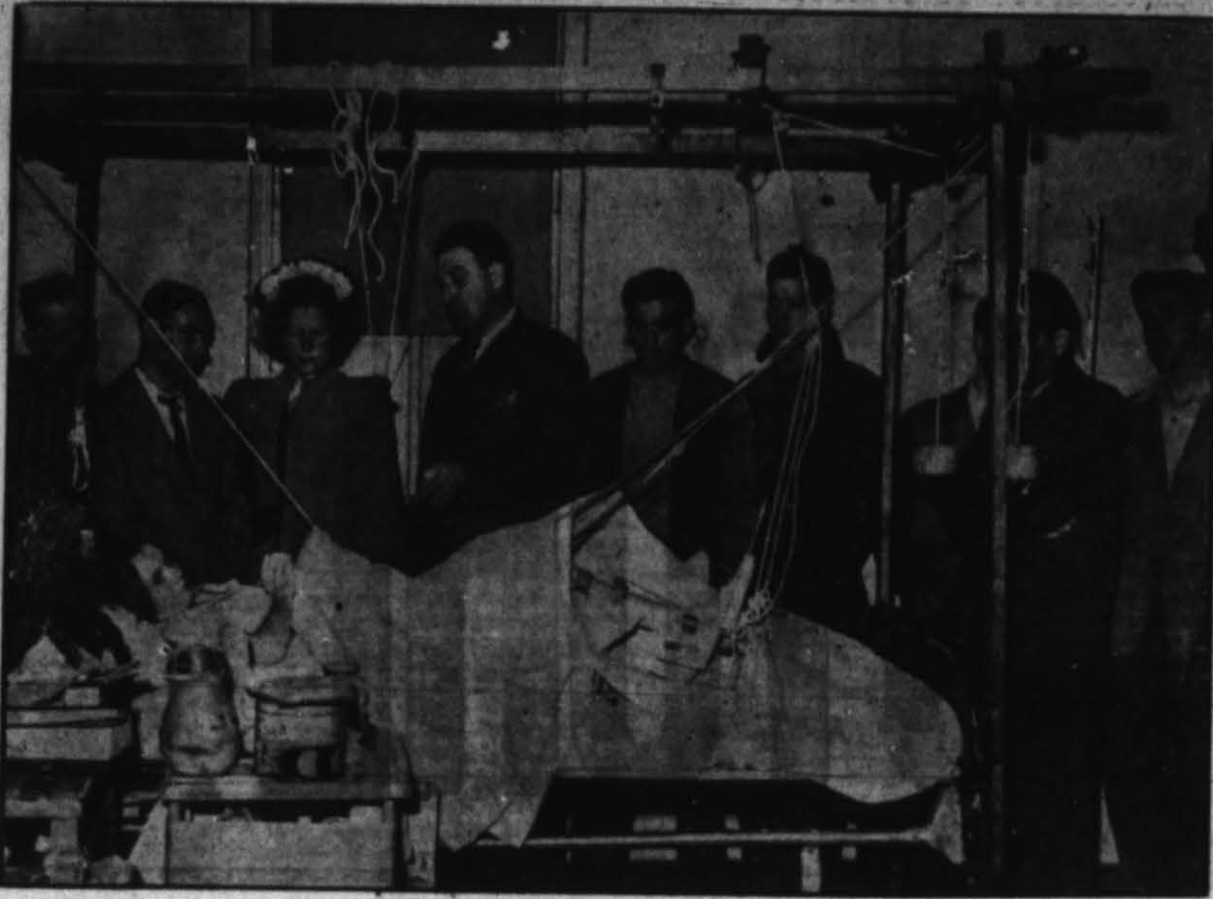

What does Thanksgiving dinner have to do with thanksgiving? According to the Encyclopaedia Britannica, meals have been regarded as thank-offerings since ancient times. "It is probable that among Christians, as among Jews, every meal, and especially every social meal, was regarded as being in some sense a thank-offering."

rule cautions, "A man shall not taste anything before blessing it," and St. Paul explains, "He that eateth, eateth unto the Lord, for he giveth God thanks." Thanksgiving Day's traditional turkey played a part in Indian prayer offerings more than a thousand years ago. Certain American Indian tribes kept turkeys in captivity—not for food, but for their feathers, which were plucked from the living

bird and burned in prayer offerings to appease the gods. In the early Christian church, one aspect of thanksgiving was the offering of the fruits of the earth to God to show gratitude for creation, preservation or redemption. Appropriately, therefore, it was following their first harvest in 1621 that the Pilgrims set apart a day for thanksgiving at Plymouth. The Massachusetts Bay Colony held its first observance in 1630, Connecticut as early as 1636, and the Dutch in New Netherlands in 1644. During the Revolutionary War the Continental congress appointed one or more thanksgivings each year, except in 1777. President Washington appointed a day of thanksgiving (Thursday, November 26) in 1789, and appointed another in 1796. President Madison, in response to resolutions of congress, set apart a pro-day for thanksgiving at the close of the War of 1812. By 1858 proclamations appointing a day of thanksgiving were issued by the governors of 25 states and two territories. At present Thanksgiving Day is annually set by proclamation of the president and of the governors of the various states, and is observed with religious services and as an occasion for family reunions.

participate prior to the election date will receive ballots, Collier said.

Farm owners, tenants, or sharecroppers are eligible to participate in the election if they have taken part in the farm program during the past year.

Participation in any phase of the program is sufficient for eligibility, Collier said, including the Commodity loan program, the price support program, crop insurance program, or the sugar program.

Names of members of the nominating committee, and their nominees for the five positions on the county committee, will be announced, probably next week.

No community committeemen are to be elected. Prior to last year, Deaf Smith county was divided into 9 communities, with a committee elected for each one, in addition to a county committee. Last year the plan was changed, and Deaf Smith county was designated as a one-community county, with a single County Committee elected from the county at large to administer the farm program. That plan remains in effect.

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## Hunting Safety Rules Set Up by National Rifle Association Offer Tips to Gunners

The Canyon Eagles upset this department's calculations, and maybe some others, by walloping the Tulla Hornets 12-0 last Friday afternoon in the playoff, and from all reports, deserve plenty of credit for playing at all, weather conditions being as they were. The Hornets, however, having had their share of basting this season by powerhouses from other districts, shouldn't be too downhearted over the loss. At least they won't have to go through the agony of being steam-rollered by the Perryton Rangers from District 1-A.

Any team which can roll over Phillips Blackhawks the way the Rangers did last Friday night, isn't going to provide any picnic for any opponent. The hunch-heralded "bat-

With the hunting season in full swing now and every hunter "fair game" for his fellows in the field in the annual national massacre, suggestions for hunting safety released by the National Rifle Association seem particularly pertinent.

Some of the major errors on the part of hunters which account for a large proportion of the annual toll in human lives from hunting accidents are very graphically portrayed in the cartoons at the top of the page, prepared by the NRA.

Know your gun and ammunition, be sure of your target, be sure of your backstop, be careful where you point your gun, and never guess about whether or not your weapon is loaded—these are the major points in the NRA Hunting Safety campaign.

These tables will be of help to hunters in judging the range of various weapons.

A .22 calibre long rifle is dangerous up to one mile.

A .30-30 cartridge is danger-

ous up to a mile and a half.

A .30-06 cartridge is dangerous up to two miles.

A .22 calibre bullet will penetrate at least seven one inch boards, so be careful where you tack up your target.

The box that the ammunition comes in will tell you the range of the ammo, and a map survey or personal reconnaissance of your hunting ground is a good idea to familiarize the hunter with his target background.

Be sure of your target. A lot of hunters each year are mistaken for game by "quick-shot" artists. A good idea, recommended by the NRA, wear bright clothes when you're in the field and help some other gunner make sure of his target. Don't camouflage yourself.

Watch where you point the muzzle of your gun. Keep the muzzle pointed in the air, or toward the ground, when you are carrying it and never aim at any object you

don't intend to shoot.

Never use your gun for a cane or a vaulting pole. A clogged muzzle can turn your rifle or shotgun into a hand grenade.

More hunting accidents are caused by unloaded guns than by any other kind. A smart shooter always inspects his gun before firing, and when it's not in use, keeps it in "open action." Don't depend on the safeties—sometimes they don't work and if that action is open, your gun can't go off accidentally, and there will be no doubt about whether or not it's loaded.

The same man who would scream to high heaven at the mere thought of flying with an inexperienced pilot will hunt with a companion who is positively ignorant of the hunting sport. He wouldn't drive with an inexperienced driver, but will meander through the woods with someone whose only knowledge of guns is where the trigger is located.

Duck-hunting season, which is enjoying a temporary holiday, will re-open on December 16 for another 15 days of shooting. Remember that the plains are flat, and even a shotgun charge will carry for a considerable distance. Be careful where you aim before you pull the trigger. There might be another hunter in those bushes across the lake.

### Cage Season To Open Here Next Tuesday

### Perryton Rangers in Historic 33-0 Victory Over Phillips

### Ragged Play Features Game On Icy Grid

Rushing the waning football season, Coach Douglas Groom started work-outs with his Hereford High School squad last Thursday afternoon and began making plans for the season's cage campaign. Handicapped by their cracker-box gymnasium which has kept basketball in the realm of minor sports in Hereford for years, the Whitefaces will nevertheless field a team this winter and plan to take another shot at the district title.

The basketball district conference, unlike the football league, remains unchanged this year. The Whitefaces will compete in District 1-A against teams from Dalhart, Dumas, Canyon, Tulla, Friona and Dimmitt—the old District 1-A line-up.

The district tournament will be played at Burton Gymnasium, in Canyon in January.

The Whiteface cagers will open the basketball season on the local court next Tuesday night in a game with the Vega High School quintet. Their second scheduled match will be with the Dimmitt Bobcats at Dimmitt on Tuesday, December 9.

Only two games are scheduled before the Christmas holidays, although some tournament dates may be accepted before and after Xmas. (Continued on page 8)

Coach Floyd Murry's Rangers from Perryton made Panhandle football history last Friday night when they smashed the powerful Phillips Blackhawks, perennial Regional champions, 33-0 on the Phillips gridiron to walk away with the District 1-A title.

More than 4,000 fans turned out in icy weather to see the game which had been billed as the "battle of the year" in Panhandle Class A football circles.

The game ended a 41-game winning streak in Class A competition for the "Hawks," who have won the Regional title for six of the past seven years.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Rangers had the game under control all the way, and set some sort of record during the final half of the contest when the Blackhawks failed to make a single first down.

The Rangers were playing without the services of their ace half-back Vernon Flowers, who underwent an emergency appendectomy on the eve of the game; but his substitute, Tommy Fletcher, playing his first year of football, turned

out to be a capable replacement, scoring two of the Ranger touchdowns on long downhill dashes.

Keith Flowers, stand-out Perryton back, was the workhorse of the game, however, spearheading the scoring drives and turning in an outstanding defensive game.

The victory left the Rangers undefeated for the season, and placed the District 1-A crown in their laps. Rangers will meet the Canyon Eagles of District 2-A in the bi-district play-off game.

Down in District 4-A, the conference title is still undecided. The Lockney Longhorns, heavily favored to capture this conference, lost their first game of the season last Friday night when they went down in a startling 7-6 upset before the Paducah Dragons.

Although the Longhorns still have an edge in the district standings, they have wound up their conference season, and Paducah, with a game still to play against Matador, can clinch a conference tie by defeating the Matadors.

If the Dragons can top Matador in their Thanksgiving Day meeting, they will probably get the nod to represent District 4 in bi-district play, since it's too late in the season for a play-off game between the two teams.

The District 4 representative will meet the Shamrock eleven in the play-off, since Shamrock has already clinched the District 3-A title. Conference play in all the districts but District 4-A has been completed, and the Paducah-Matador game is the only conference tilt left on the schedule before the bi-district play-offs begin.

### V. A. Announces Plan for Close Inspection Of Houses Financed Through G. I. Loans

The Veterans Administration has announced a new plan for VA inspection of houses financed by GI loans while the houses are still under construction.

VA will make a pre-construction appraisal of "reasonable value" based upon complete plans and specifications. A minimum of three inspections are required as work advances to assure adherence to the agreed standards.

The commitment will remain valid for a specified period - usually predicated on the probable time necessary to complete construction.

With the new plan, VA for the first time is assuming directly the function of assuring proper construction - from plans to completion - of houses built for sale to veterans with GI loan financing.

Inspections will not be required by the Federal Housing Administration.

### Astronomers To Get Close Look At Planet Mars

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 21--Astronomers are going to get a good look at the planet Mars next February 18, Dr. Gerard P. Kuiper, director of the University of Texas McDonald Observatory, says.

On that date, Mars will be close enough for magnification to a size four times as large as the full moon appears to the eye.

Mars will make its closest approach to earth for the next two years. Astronomers will look at the planet through a spectrometer, sensitive instrument which applies the science of electronics to astronomy.

The racing term "furlong" (one-eighth of a mile) originally meant "farrow-long." The furlong represented the distance which oxen could conveniently plow at a stretch, and over which the plowman could keep a "straight line."

### Questions-Answers For Veterans

Q. Is Veterans Administration doing anything to keep abreast of improvements in prosthetic equipment so that we veterans may get the benefit of them?

A. Veterans Administration employees who aid disabled veterans in selecting and fitting artificial arms, legs, eyes, and other devices are going to school to learn the latest developments and improvements in the prosthetic field.

Q. I received an overpayment in subsistence allowance after I left school. Will I have to refund the amount I received to the government?

A. Yes. Q. I am being rehabilitated under Public Law 16 and I would like to know what medical treatment is available to me?

A. Under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) you are entitled to any kind of medical treatment needed (hospital or out-patient) to prevent interruption of your training.

Q. How and where do I apply for hospitalization for a service-connected disability?

A. See your nearest Veterans Administration contact representative or apply at a VA regional office or hospital. A letter addressed to the nearest VA office will suffice. In case of emergency, you can telephone the nearest VA office collect.

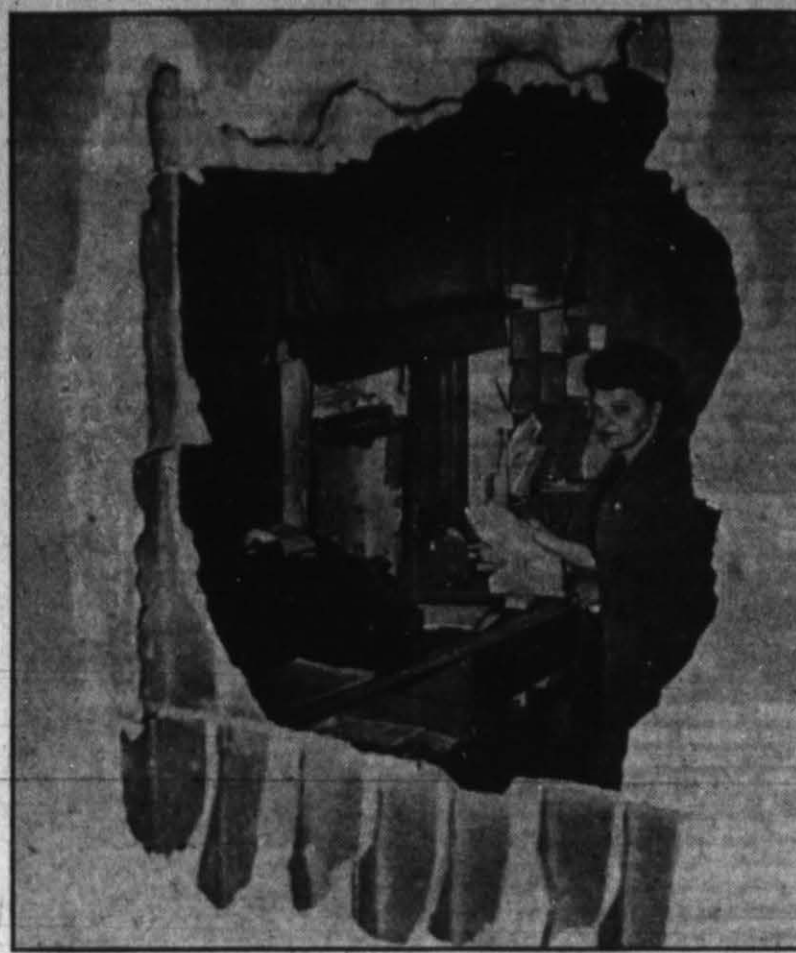
right up alongside General Marshal and President Truman.

# Cowart Flays Political Handling of Farm To Market Program; Urges Pressure Move

## C-C Secretary Says Harrison Paving Remote

Prospects for paving the Harrison Highway, No. 1 project of the Chamber of Commerce for the past two years, are exceedingly remote under

present and projected Farm-to-Market road plans, Chamber of Commerce Secretary Pete Cowart reports.

Cowart has figured out that if all plans go as scheduled in Texas for financing farm-to-market road construction, Harrison Highway could be completely paved by 1960.

Here's the way things have worked out according to Cowart: Early in 1945, the Texas Highway department announced a 3-

Harry Sotos apparently is just realizing what hit him—four months in jail, \$1000 fine—for taking a \$1000 bonus from a prospective tenant in Chicago.

But the biggest joker was this: Not more than ten miles of road were to be built in any one county in one year.

Also proposed by the Legislature was a constitutional amendment, which will be submitted to vote next year, abolishing the ad valorem tax for state general fund purposes, and allowing counties, by vote, to levy an ad valorem tax of 30 cents per \$100 upon themselves for the purpose of conservation or for farm-to-market road construction.

Based on the present tax rate in Deaf Smith county, Cowart figures that if the amendment carries, Deaf Smith would be able to build about 3.5 miles of road per year. At this rate, Cowart figures, Harrison Highway would be completely paved in 1960—maybe.

Pointing out great inequities in state highway construction between the heavily-populated but poor tax-paying counties of East Texas and the heavy taxpayers in West Texas, Cowart states that 21 West Texas counties, including Deaf Smith, are

paying over one-half of the state taxes while a major portion of road construction in the state is being carried out in the poorer counties of East Texas where there are more votes.

"As it stands now," Cowart concludes, "Harrison Highway will not be paved until some political pressure is brought to bear in Austin."

year farm-to-market road program which would have provided for the construction of 7,500 miles of road in Texas at a cost of about \$60,000,000. One-half of this cost was to be borne by the Federal government, the other half by the state. The State's portion of the cost was to come from a \$30,000,000 surplus already accumulated in the road fund from the gasoline tax.

One-half of this 7,500 miles of road has been built or is under construction. What has happened to the other 3,750 miles is, Cowart reports, a mystery.

The principal mystery, as far as the local Chamber of Commerce is concerned, is what happened to a promise by the State Highway Department that Harrison Highway would be the No. 1 project in Texas under the farm-to-market program in 1948.

Late in 1946, Cowart points out, and again early in 1947, committees from Deaf Smith county called on the state highway engineer and were assured by him that Harrison would be a No. 1 on the list for 1948.

In June 1947 the state Highway Department submitted a new plan for farm-to-market roads in order to comply with a new law passed by the 50th Legislature, under which the Highway Department could contract with individual counties to build their roads.

Under this plan, the State was to furnish the necessary engineering, one-fourth of the cost of building, and maintenance for the road. The counties were required to furnish the right-of-way and three-quarters of the construction cost. With the new plan, apparently, all promises for the construction of Harrison Highway under the farm-to-market set-up in 1948 went out the win-

## Sudan Seed Crop In Texas Lowest In History in '47

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 22.—About this time last year, E. A. Miller, extension agent agronomist for Texas A. & M. College, warned Texas farmers that the sudan seed crop supply was lower than it had ever been before.  
 It's worse this year.  
 Production of sudan grass seed for 1947 in Texas is estimated at 3 1/2 million pounds. That's the lowest crop on record, and just about two-thirds of what it was last year.  
 It's not only bad in Texas. The total production for the United States is 14 percent below the small 1946 crop.  
 The harvested seed is reported by the USDA Bureau of Agriculture Economics as being a little cleaner than last year and the yield per acre average is 34 pounds higher than the ten year average. The small crop is caused by the record small acreage.

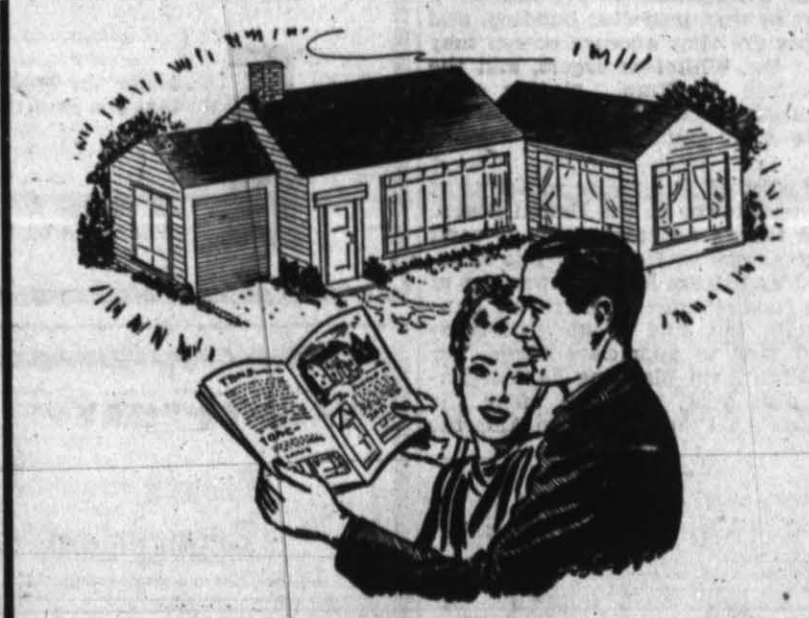
## Free Farm Lease Form Offered Through County Agent's Office

COLLEGE STATION, Appt. 21.—It's a farm lease signing for landlords and tenants and chances are they'll find Texas A. & M. College's B-144, "General Farm Lease Form" helpful in getting together on their agreement.  
 Thousands of the lease forms have been used since they were first issued in July of 1946.

The instrument contains 13 major headings and provides for some fifty questions which might arise. Points of conservation practices, rental rates and arrangements, livestock share agreements, hunting and fishing rights and improvements and repairs are covered.

The form was drawn up by an A. & M. committee consisting of L. P. Gabbard, chief of the division of farm and ranch economics of the Agricultural Experiment Station; J. L. Matthews, extension specialist in agricultural planning; and J. Wheeler Barger, head of the department of agricultural economics.  
 Barger says that, on the basis of its 18 months' trial to date the "lease form is a protection for both parties and will save time and money." He added that the principal concern of the committee was "not to produce something useful in court, but rather something to keep people out of court."  
 A Houston bank issued a reprint

le of the season" at Phillips Friday night turned out to be the "rout of the season" as the powerful Rangers smacked down the Blackhaws by a 33-0 score . . . and nobody has ever rated Phillips as a weakling in any recent year.

The Perryton victory Friday nite ended one of the longest winning streaks in Class A football history. The Hawks had been undefeated in Class A competition, since November 11, 1943, having won 39 games and tied two . . . and both of the tie games were won on penetrations, one from the Hereford Whitefaces in the bi-district play-off in 1945. During that time the 'Hawks had played seven games against Class AA competition, losing three in a row to Pampa, one to Quanah, splitting a pair with Brownfield, and defeating Hills, Oklahoma.

That November 11, 1943, incidentally, was lost in an upset to White Deer, and the 'Hawks came back to win the Regional crown. The Hereford Whitefaces had ended a previous 22-game winning streak in 1932 when they tied the 'Hawks 7-7 and won on penetrations.

Coach Floyd Murray, who'll be remembered by many fans in this area as a standout player for the West Texas Buffs a few years back, has hung up a pretty good record for himself at Perryton. His teams have won 23 games and lost 6 during his three years there.

Basketball season is about to get underway here at Hereford. Judging from previous seasons, this announcement probably won't excite any vast number of fans in Hereford, but Coach Douglas Groom, one-time star with the 'Tail Buffs from West Texas State, is working hard with a small squad of boys to turn out a crack Whiteface team this year. The Whiteface cagers are handicapped by their cracker-box gymnasium, which is probably the main reason why basketball has never developed into a major sport here. However, they will play some home games and deserve the support of all fans who can crowd into the limited seating space at Whiteface gym.

## Military Rites for War Dead To Be Arranged If Families Request It

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 1.—While various veterans organizations have signified their willingness to conduct military funerals for the remains of the war dead, there is no obligation upon the next of kin to have such services, Lt. Col. S. H. Partridge, chief of the American Graves Registration Division here, emphasized today.

"In the early planning for the war dead repatriation program it was anticipated that many families would wish to have their dead buried with military rites," Col. Partridge said. "The armed forces do not have the men available and invited veterans organizations to assume this responsibility."

"These organizations, from national headquarters down through local posts, promptly and gladly offered their services. Families desiring military funerals should contact some veteran's organization in their communities. If they are unable to make such a contact," Partridge recommended, "they should contact the Memorial Section, Fourth Army, Fort Sam Houston."

"However, a large number of persons have indicated that they do not care for military funerals; that they want their dead buried with the simplest possible ceremony. Such wishes should be respected. The fundamental policy of those responsible for the war dead repatriation program is that there must be no infringement upon the private rights nor intrusion on the grief and bereavement of the families who have already given the nation so much."
