Mrs. Tannahill suffered a broken arm and severe cuts and bruises.

A right-angle crash of two

cars at a weed-obscured inter-

The accident occurred about noon, when Mrs. Tannahill, who was taking her husband's lunch to him in the field and was driving north, crashed into the car driven by Mr. Bell, who was coming east toward Hereford. Bell was alone in his car, which was demolished, as was the Tannahill machine. Both, Mr. Bell. and the Tannahill child suffered skul fractures. All occupants were thrown several feet from the cars.

Mr. Bell died early Sunday morning at the Deaf Smith County Hospital. Carlton Tannahill died Sunday morning at an Amarillo hospital, where he was rushed for special treatment. Mrs. Tannahill was re ported this morning to be improved.

The accident Saturday was the first road fatality for Deaf Smith County for 1941, High weeds at the fence corners, which practically obscured visibility at the intersection were generally blamed for the accident.





The Garden Club



The following information, prepared for the Garden Club by Mrs. Lyle Blanton, may prove helpful to the gardener who is planning to get iris bulbs into the ground this fall.

The bulb iris was just becoming generally known in the United States when a rigid plant quarantine act shut them out, and there was no domestic supply to replace them. When growing was permitted again the grower found that more money could be made by selling the flowers wholesale than by digging, curing and setting the bulbs. When the supply did increase, the commercial florists were waiting to

use them for forcing. Now, the gardener experiences no difficulty in getting the bulbs and the leading groups include the Spanish, English and Dutch, generally considered garden flowers, and the Filifolia and Tingitana, favored for florists

The Dutch group is considered better adapted to American soil; it is more attractive and has a range of colors that will meet any demand.

Iris bulbs should be planted early enough in the fall for the plant to become well rooted before freezing weather: October and November are good months Whitehead Addition. to get them in the ground. The growth in the fall after plantweather, thus preventing blackspot disease.

Like all bulb plants iris require soil with good drainage. The Dutch and Spanish groups dition. require moderately light sandy soil; the English type requires a heavy moist soil. All need an deed of trust. abundance of water during growing and flowering season.

White and blue Dutch Iris are a splendid combination and the Poggenbeck and Yellow Queen combine well.

Baby Iris are among the few plants universally recommended for rock gardens. The Dwarf Bearded and the Crested Iris are especially good. Baby Iris may be used effectively along a garden path or as a border; and the "Griminea" is recommended, as it grows without much care under ordinary garden conditions:

Japanese Iris are well adapt- * * ed to the southern states. They do best in well drained soil and grow luxuriantly if planted along the margin of a pool or brook for they require plenty of moisture. Clumps may flower for several years but they become crowded and stunted and although stalks are numerous the



Last week-end an unfortunate incident occurred near Hereford. A group of unidentified men drove up beside a truck loaded with Mexican laborers and warned the Mexicans that they must leave town. The warning was further said to have been emphasized with threats to the physical welfare of the group on the truck: The incident has causwide-spread comment over town.

Some people see fit to defend the Mexicans upon the ground that they were sent here by the Texas Employment Service at the request of potato growers in this district. Presence of the Mexicans is also defended on the ground that there simply was not enough labor to gather here." Folks will also point out that it is the privilege of any person to sign up for employment through the state organization, and that men are employed through this organization to help harvest the annual wheat crop. They will further tell you that the Mexicans have one leader through which to deal, that they are orderly-and that they will go to some other place as soon as the potatoes are harvested. Furthermore, they say that the bray echoing from lofty craigs Mexicans are spending most of their earning in this community, and that they are far superior to other types of labor which we might import.

All of these things may be true, and I am sure that they are excellent reasons for employing the Mexicans. To me, they are entirely beside the point. They speak of weak-

The real question should be: 'Is Deaf Smith County a part of the United States of Amer-

The constitution of the United States guarantees protection to all citizens (Amendment XIV-Section I). This was ratified by more than three-fourths of the states in 1868, and since that time it has been a mark of civilization that distinguishes our country from many of those which we today look upon with disfavor. In these trying times we are proud of our country. We read with dismay of Hitler's purge against the Jews. Yet a similar, perhaps even less reasonable situation occurs right in our own home county. The action is certainly not American; it does not rhyme with the words "land of liberty and freedom." This sounds more like doings of the Gestapo in Nazi Germany.

Fortunately, none of the threats have been carried out. Let us hope that this community does not become entangled with G-Men in a Federal case, which might lead to unpleasant complications and adverse publi-

FROZEN PUMPKIN PIE

2 tablespoons cornstarch 3 tabespoons cold milk 2 cups sugar 2 cups scalded milk 2 tablespoons light molasses pinch of salt egg yolks -4 cup cold water

1 teaspoon granulated gelatine
1-2 cup minced preserved ginger
1 teaspoon lemon rind and 1 tablespoon juice
1 cup broken pecan meats
1 1-2 cups cooked pumpkin teaspoon cinnamon teaspoon powdered ginger

1-2 pint whipped cream Add the sugar to the scalded milk and stir until dissolved and milk simmers. Pour over corn starch, which has been blended with the 3 tablespoons cold milk and beaten egg yolks. Add molasses and return to the fire. Stir constantly until mixture thickens. Remove from fire and add pumpkin, gelatine which been discovered in the 1 december of the start solved in the 1-4 cup cold water, spices and nuts. Place in refrigerator and allow to start freezing. Fold in the whipped cream and return to the refrigerator and allow to finish freezing without agitating. Have individual pie shells already prepared and when ready to serve place a mound of the frozen mixture in the baked shell and serve immediately.

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
