

The following extension service bulletin contains valuable tips on the coming sugar rationing: .

Rationing of cane sugar may prove to be a blessing in disguise. "Specialists for the A. and M. College Extension Service say Americans use too much sugar for their health. During the last half century sugar consumption has jumped from 10 pounds to port of the Diocesan Council of between 75 and 100 pounds per person per year. The average consumption in England is 24 pounds. The same is true in Germany, while the average Japanese uses only eight pounds.

If there is any handicap it ikely will be heaviest on rural homemakers with large quantities of fruit to can. Homemakers save a part of their allowance for use during the canning season. Saving can be effected by serving desserts which do not require much sugar or by subtituting honey, molasses, or orghum syrup.

Experts predict more fruit will be canned and dried this year than ever before. Drying requires her parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. as preserving. For example, one Brumley, and other relatives. of fruit are used in making preserves, while one-half pound of sugar and one gallon of water

From the nutritional standpoint, canning is even more im-portant. It saves the Navor, color and vitamins of the fruit. Much of the food value is lost when fruit is made into jelly or preserves.

The class of Homemaking III is engaged in a series of culinary experiments involving the use of sugar. The work to date Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y has dealt with the various substitutions for sugar in a foun- Have Joint Meeting. dation butter cake. A foundation butter cake may be varied by the use of chocolate, cocoa, spices, nuts, raisins, etc.

Foundation Butter Cake 1 cup milk, 1 1-2 cups sugar, cups flour, 1-2 cup fat, 2 eggs, 3 1-2 t. baking powder, 1-4 t. "Into My Heart," a prayer by London was high point man salt and 1-2 t. flavoring. Total cost of the cake is 24c? Cream fat and sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add beaten eggs. Sift together all dry ingredients. Add flour and milk alternately to first mixture. Beat well after each adition. Add flavoring and bake in greased cake pans at 350 degrees F. Makes two thick or three thin layers.

Honey Substitute Cake

(total cost 37c) 1-2 cup milk, 3 cups flour 1-2 cup fat, 1-4 t. salt, 2 eggs, 3 1-2 t. baking powder, 1 5-8 cup honey, and 1-2 t. flavoring. Method of combination same as for foundation butter cake. Brown Substitute Cake

(total cost 25c) 1 cup milk, 3 cups flour, 1-2 cup fat, 2 eggs, 3 1-2 t. baking powder, 1 1-2 cups brown sugar 1-4 t. salt, 1-2 t. flavoring. Method of combination same as for foundation butter cake.




