

## HISD prepares for new school year

The Hereford Independent School District has announced its registration schedule for the 1993-94 school year.

Teachers will return to the classroom for in-service training on Aug. 16 and 17, then students will begin classes on Aug. 18.

Parents registering any student new to the district must bring all available educational records, proof of age, immunization records and the child's Social Security number to the school.

Bus information is available at the time of registration.

### PRE-KINDERGARTEN

Pre-kindergarten class registration will be held Monday, Aug. 9, and Tuesday, Aug. 10, at Stanton Special Programs Center, 711 E. Park, in the gymnasium.

Registration will be from 8:30 a.m.

to 3:30 p.m. both days.

Parents who have pre-kindergarten children entering school for the first time should bring proof of age documents, immunization records and the child's Social Security number.

The pre-kindergarten classes will be half-day, with morning or afternoon assignments made by the building administrator.

Transportation to school will be available in the morning for eligible bus riders (outside the two-mile limit) and transportation home after school will be available for eligible bus riders.

Parents are responsible for all other transportation.

Breakfast and lunch will be provided for the morning classes and lunch will be provided for the afternoon classes. To be eligible for

the pre-kindergarten class, the family must meet income (proof of income is required) or limited English proficiency guidelines.

### KINDERGARTEN THROUGH GRADE SIX

Registration for grades kindergarten through six will be held at the primary and intermediate campuses on Monday and Tuesday.

Parents may register students between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on either day.

Parents who have kindergarten or first grade students who are entering school for the first time, should bring proof of age documents, immunization records and the child's Social Security number.

Kindergarten classes will be registered at Northwest, West Central, Aikman, Bluebonnet and

### Tierra Blanca.

Kindergarten registration on the paired campuses will be on a first come basis.

When the kindergarten classes on a campus are at a maximum level, then students subsequently registering will be required to attend the kindergarten classes at the other paired school in that attendance zone.

Actual student assignment to teachers will be made by the building principal.

### JUNIOR HIGH

There will be an orientation meeting at Hereford Junior High for parents and their children who will be in the seventh or eighth grades.

The meetings will be held on Thursday, Aug. 12, beginning at 6:30 p.m. for the seventh grade and at 7:30 p.m. for the eighth grade.

## Summer of uncertainty ends as Hereford college grad finds job

Master's degree becoming vital, says Jill Johnson

A summer of uncertainty ends for Jill Johnson as the 1993 graduate of Texas A&M University finds employment with the San Antonio Livestock Exposition.

Receiving a bachelor's degree in agricultural education, Johnson was graduated with hopes for immediate employment.

"I went through school expecting to land a job with a \$40,000 salary," she said. "Instead I found a tough job market."

For graduates across the country, locating employment has become a strenuous and discouraging task.

"This was a nervous time in my life. I didn't know if I would ever

find a job despite a college education," said Johnson. "At times, it seemed like a high school graduate was more likely to find a job."

Her four-month search for employment intensified the frustrations of an uncertain future.

"I knew exactly what I wanted to do with my life, but I just couldn't do it. My life was put on hold," she remarked.

Johnson estimated that for each open position there were at least 100 applications and those that were hired had a master's degree.

"There are so few jobs available. I would hate to be 30 years old and looking for employment," said the 22-year-old.

As her first interviews proved

fruitless, Johnson decided to return to College Station in the fall to earn a master's degree.

But, in the meantime, her summer was taken up with an internship with the Deaf Smith County Extension Office.

Johnson planned veterinary science projects, dog-care clinics and food-nutrition during her three-month internship.

Her original career plans did not include extension work, but she enjoyed the work and considers it a valuable learning experience.

"This field is one I really enjoyed. Working with youth taught me a lot about the agricultural industry and the value of education," said the 1989 Hereford High School graduate.

As a first-time participant in an internship, Johnson wished she had more actively sought internships while in school.

"They provide you with hands-on training, something employers really stress," emphasized Johnson.

While internships not only offer experience, they also allow students to discover specific fields of interest.

"So many freshman enter college without any idea as to what they want to study. An internship allows students to discover what field they want to pursue while simultaneously making valuable contacts for the future," Johnson said.

Contacts were especially important for the young woman as she chose to enter the beef industry. "I quickly learned that it's not always what you know, but who you know," said Johnson.

The TAMU graduate recommended joining organizations which relate to a student's field of study.

"I joined the Texas Aggie Cattle Women's Association, attended conventions and worked at the Houston Livestock Show for two years," she said.

"You can't afford to be shy. Meeting the right people can get you in the door," Johnson replied.

Certified to teach agricultural science, Johnson has instead set her sights on the livestock and beef industry.

"I have grown up around the cattle industry and understand its diverse effects on Texas life. This is an exciting business and I feel I can contribute to it," answered Johnson.

Low-paying teacher salaries also pushed Johnson to look for work outside the classroom.

The decisive vote Friday night came from Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb., the last senator to make up his mind.

Kerrey, who ran against Clinton for the White House last year, declared he "could not and would not cast a vote that would bring down" the administration even though he complained that Clinton had strayed from the "high road" and some of his original goals for shared sacrifice in reducing the deficit.

The president was expected to go to Charleston, W.Va., on Monday for a downtown rally celebrating the victory. Aides said he was likely to sign the measure into law Tuesday at the White House.

Shortly after the vote, the president addressed cheering aides from the North Portico of the White House, jokingly praising Gore for "his unwavering contribution to the landslide."

Despite the narrowness of the margin of victory, in which Clinton did not receive a single Republican vote in either chamber, the president declared: "What we heard tonight at the other end of Pennsylvania Avenue was the sound of gridlock breaking."

It was the most far-reaching economic plan since the 1981 program by then-President Ronald Reagan that cut taxes and increased defense spending. The Clinton economic plan reverses 12 years of Republican economic policies.

Over five years, Democrats say the Clinton plan would shrink federal deficits by \$496 billion. That would not eliminate the red ink, but it is designed to push the shortfall down to \$213 billion by 1998 - instead of the \$361 billion it would be otherwise.

## Marie Griffin donates property to firemen

Marie Griffin of Amarillo, a former Hereford Realtor, has donated the old A&P Sheds and land on W. Hwy. 60 to the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department.

The land and property, with an appraised value of approximately \$41,500, was deeded to the HVFD this week, reported Jay Spain, fire marshal. He said the gift includes several acres of land, which still needs to be surveyed.

The property is located a couple of miles west on US-60, on the south side of the highway between Griffin & Brand and Caviness Packing Co.

"The volunteer firemen are very appreciative of the support of Marie Griffin," said Spain. "She was a strong booster of the department when she lived here, and donated an old fire truck to us about six or seven years ago."

The volunteer firemen spent about three years restoring the 1928 American LaFrance truck, and it is now used as a showpiece for parades and special events.

Mike Watts, fire chief, said tentative plans are to use the property for training purposes. "Right now, we're planning to set up a 'smoke house' to train firemen on use of their air packs, and we'll have our hazardous material training there."

Watts pointed out that the department has had a training field just off S. Kingwood behind the Shur-Gro Liquid Feed business for many years. "We will continue to use that location for certain training, and it will be handy to the new site, as well."

Spain pointed out that most of the renovation work at the new site will be done by volunteer firemen, so it will be a longterm project. "We'll work on the buildings and training materials as time and finances allow," said the marshal. There are three buildings remaining, one of them with about 10,000 square feet of floor space.

Like the old truck, the property has been deeded to the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department, not the City of Hereford. HVFD is incorporated, said Spain.

In a male-oriented business, Johnson has yet to see women as

**AVIANO, Italy** - NATO military planners are finishing plans for a possible air campaign against Serb positions in Bosnia, and Secretary of State Warren Christopher is warning Serbs "they would be very unwise to depend on any indecision" within the alliance.

**WASHINGTON** - The House passes a \$5.7 billion spending bill to repair damage from months of flooding and heavy rain in the Midwest.

## Tornado hits Wal-Mart store in Virginia, kills 3, scores injured

### COLONIAL HEIGHTS, Va. (AP)

Engineers tried Saturday to stabilize the wreckage of a discount store sliced open by a tornado, while rescue workers searched through the debris for any more victims.

At least three people died and scores were injured as high winds wrought havoc Friday across southeastern Virginia.

A tornado cut a 40- to 50-foot path through the Wal-Mart about 1:30 p.m., killing three people and injuring 119 others. State Police spokesman Charles Vaughn said one Wal-Mart employee was unaccounted for.

Thirty people were injured in neighboring Petersburg, where the storm knocked down buildings, buckled walls and ripped off roofs in the historic Old Town district. More than 100 people were forced out of their homes.

Most of the injuries statewide were minor, authorities said. Damage in Petersburg was estimated at \$10 million.

Spencer Boykin, 25, of Colonial Heights, was standing in front of Wal-Mart when the tornado hit.

"There were people covered in blood, and there was screaming everywhere," he said. "It was unbelievable. I've never seen anything like it."

Doctors and hearses were summoned to a triage center in the parking lot of nearby Southpark Mall. Authorities used blaze-orange hats propped on poles to mark the location of the bodies in the debris.

The names of the dead were being withheld until relatives could be notified. Two were Wal-Mart employees, authorities said.

One person was in critical

condition at Southside Regional Medical Center from injuries suffered at the Wal-Mart, a hospital spokeswoman said.

About 80 miles east in the Norfolk suburb of Chesapeake, a tornado caused an estimated \$1 million damage to homes and knocked down power lines, police said.

Eight people were slightly injured when the roof flew off a flea market in Newport News. At Langley Air Force Base in Hampton, winds damaged buildings and two F-15 fighters.

National Weather Service meteorologist Peter Wolf authorities won't know exactly what hit Virginia until a survey team from Washington inspects the damage today. "We've had several reports of tornadoes, but I don't know if they are the same one or several," he said.

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# IRS to help to delinquent taxpayers at special session here on Tuesday

DALLAS -- Taxpayers who have not filed on past years' returns will have the opportunity to do so this week in Hereford.

"If you haven't filed past years' tax returns, the best gift you can give yourself is an appointment at the Hereford Community Center, Tuesday, Aug. 10," said Gary O. Booth, director of the IRS Dallas District. "The Hereford Community Center (corner of Park Avenue and Avenue C) will be staffed between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. to help taxpayers get

right with their government."

This is an ongoing effort sponsored by the IRS to help taxpayers who have failed to file returns in the past.

"What struck me about those who have come in for help is the sense of tremendous relief they expressed," said Booth.

"One young couple hadn't filed for three years and that fact alone had been a source of considerable anxiety in their marriage. When they saw that they owed taxes for 1988, they

weren't very convinced that they were doing that was best for them. Yet, as their assistor worked through tax years 1989, 1990 and 1991, refunds wiped out that first year's liability and they even wound up with a small refund," said Booth.

"A trucker stopped filing in 1989, the year his wife had to have emergency surgery. Filing his tax return was not his first priority. While his wife recovered and he got his affairs in better order, he was afraid to file subsequent tax returns because

he thought for sure he'd be going to jail. We helped him, too. He worked out an installment plan to pay off what he owes, and is still trucking."

Booth said that taxpayers who IRS returns owe it to themselves to get back into the system.

"For many, it is fear that creates a barrier. We see our job as making it as easy as possible for taxpayers to comply. Many may have paid in withholding or estimated tax payments which are held in credit to their accounts. And if they owe us, we can work out payment arrangements to bring them square with us.

"I want to assure taxpayers that we sincerely want to help. Our experience has shown that most people want to file overdue returns and settle their affairs with the government," Booth said. "And from our own vantage point, if we can help people back into the system on their own, we will not have to focus on more costly enforcement efforts later."

## Businesses advised to ask for fire technician licenses

The State Fire Marshal's Office is issuing a warning to Texas businesses to verify the credentials of any technician who services fire protection equipment, including fire extinguishers and automatic fire suppression systems.

The warning was issued following reports from Austin, Houston and Dallas that a man posing as a fire protection service technician had defrauded several businesses.

The person is not an employee of a licensed fire protection company and is not licensed by the state as required.

"If your business is approached by a fire protection service technician, as to see his or her license, which is easily identified by the large state seal emblem printed on the front," said State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson. "If the person cannot produce the license, contact your

local law enforcement department or the State Fire Marshal's Office. Business owners should be suspicious of anyone requiring cash payment for services."

If you are in your teens or early 20s, have or are expecting a child, you are welcome.



**Amidst all the hullabaloo over Clinton's economic package, it hasn't been mentioned often enough that it includes the biggest tax increase in history. The plan passed with Al Gore's tie-breaking vote Friday.**

Most conservatives were opposed to the plan. Rep. Larry Combest said reaction had run about 20-1 against the plan in our 19th Congressional District. We hope it does some good, but it still appears to be another liberal plan to tax and spend.

And, the reason some congressmen kept holding out for more spending cuts is this fact: when you remove all the gimmicks and gobblegook, the proposed budget really boils down to \$15 of tax and other revenue increases for every \$1 of spending cuts.

We keep thinking back to what Congressman Larry Combest said on his last visit to Hereford. "Watch how your representative or senator votes, not the glowing things he

reports when he comes home--usually what he knows you want to hear.

We also remember his 4-percent solution for getting rid of the deficit. Holding spending increases to the current low rate of inflation in order to balance the budget. He previously estimated that a 4-percent cap each year for three years could take care of the deficit. Now, with the deficit still increasing, he's changed that to a 2-percent solution and about four years. What a tragedy that voters keep electing people to office who tell you all the good things they're going to do for you. The problem is all those goodies are provided by your taxes.

We all need to understand the language used in Washington. Under the new economic package, the proposed taxes are real, even made retroactive to Jan. 1, 1993. But the proposed cuts are "promises" that may or may not be delivered in the future.

The Clinton plan increases taxes, increases spending, increases the debt and fails to eliminate one single federal program," said Combest.

Sen. Phil Gramm said Friday that Clinton's plan takes about 16 cents out of every dollar of business profits.

"The bottom line is that even with all those new taxes, total government spending goes up next year by \$54 billion. There are no net spending reductions in the president's plan."

Gramm also added: "I think we are buying a one-way ticket to a recession. I believe this bill is going to put hundreds of thousands of people out of work. One of those people will be Bill Clinton, but in the three and a half years before that happens, a lot of Texans and a lot of Americans will be hurt."

### Beef comeback

After years of being slaves to the latest scientific study or nutrition craze, people are returning to the basics, at least when they dine out. A study, released by the National Restaurant Association (NRA), has found the more and more people are looking for taste, rather than nutrition when they eat out.

In 1986, the survey found that 53 percent of individuals asked said that they made a point of ordering nutritious foods when they dined out. That percentage fell to 47 in 1992. The chief benefactor in this change has been beef. Per capita consumption of beef is steadily climbing.

In analyzing the results of the survey, Mary Adolf of the Beef Industry Council, said, "Some people say it relates to hard economic times. You can't buy a new car, so you'll go out to dinner and enjoy a steak."

Stephen Elmont, president of the NRA, has a different view. He thinks the Baby Boomers, who have driven most trends, are no longer as nutrition conscious as they once were. "This is the group that started the aerobic exercise craze," said Elmont. "Now, 15 years later, perhaps they are coming to grips with the realization they're never going to fit into their college wardrobe again."

It could be that beef consumption is just following a well established trend. Industry statistics show that beef consumption was high in 1976, then slumped. There was a steady rise in beef consumption that peaked in 1986. If that same trend is followed, this increase should peak in 1996.

For whatever reason beef is making a comeback, it is a shame that it ever slumped. Beef is one of the most wholesome foods that can be consumed. Properly prepared, it is rich in protein, filled with essential minerals and relatively low in fat.

Beef deserves its place of honor on any dinner table. It is heartening that so many people are returning to the basics of good food--taste and flavor.

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



reserves and putting them into the Water Bank an opportunity to determine if the Bank will be of benefit to people in the High Plains Area," said A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District manager.

In June, Gov. Richards signed the law creating the Texas Water Bank, which is to be administered by the Texas Water Development Board in Austin.

Under provisions of the law, the bank will be established to encourage marketing of water to provide adequate water supplies.

The bank will allow individuals to transfer as much as 50 percent of their water rights into the bank. While on deposit, surface water rights are protected from cancellation for an initial 10-year period and for an ensuing 10 years following the Texas Water Commissioner's approval of a water rights transfer.

Deposits in the bank may include water rights or the right to use water

under an authorized water right.

These deposits may consist of surface water, ground water or water from any other source, such as treated wastewater effluent or irrigation tailwater.

Rep. David Counts, D-Knox City, a co-sponsor of the water bank bill, TWDB executive administrator Craig Pedersen and Deputy Executive Administrator for Planning Dr. Tommy Knowles are expected to

attend Wednesday's meeting.

"The TWDB representatives want to gather comments from area officials and residents as to what will make the Texas Water Bank attractive or unattractive to depositors. TWDB staff will begin the rule-writing process soon and are conducting these meetings to that public comments can be considered prior to the rule-writing process," Wyatt said.

The Toronto Blue Jays did it again - another come-from-behind victory secured in their final at-bat.

John Olerud singled on the first pitch he saw with the bases loaded in the 11th inning Friday night, giving Toronto an 11-10 win over the Milwaukee Brewers.

The four-hour, 15-minute game featured 36 hits - 19 by Toronto, 17 by Milwaukee - seven lead changes and seven ties. With the win, the Blue Jays increased their lead in the AL East to two games over Boston and New York, who both lost.

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## Tyson gets knocked out of court

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - A state appeals court dealt Mike Tyson another blow Friday when it upheld the former heavyweight champion's rape conviction.

"He's angry," said the Rev. Charles Williams, a confidant who talked with the imprisoned Tyson by telephone. "He feels and knows in his heart that he was innocent, and he knows that he did not get a fair trial."

The Indiana Court of Appeals panel upheld the conviction and six-year sentence in a 2-1 decision that rejected several defense arguments.

On a key issue, the judges ruled the trial court acted within its authority in blocking the testimony of three defense witnesses who would have contradicted Desirée Wash-

ton, the Miss Black America pageant contestant who brought the rape complaint against Tyson in 1991.

In the 72-page decision, the majority also ruled the court rightly kept jurors from hearing testimony about Washington's sexual past and evidence which the defense claimed would show Washington had a "powerful and secret motive" to lie that she had been raped.

"My review of the entire record in the cause leads me to the inescapable conclusion that he did not receive the requisite fairness which is essential to our system of criminal justice," he said.

Tyson's appeals attorney, Alan Dershowitz, said he would seek an immediate appeal. "The facts have been misstated and a grave injustice has been done to Mike Tyson," Dershowitz said.

Indiana law requires that Tyson's attorneys ask the appeals court for a

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# Cowboys' program helps out minority coaches

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - The face always seems to be smiling, even when John Blake is fed up with his players.

At 32 and in his first year in the National Football League, Blake is a player's picture of what you'd like your coach to be - fun, caring, smiling, commanding respect on the field and laughter at the dinner table. He's a coach no NFL player would probably know, Blake says, if not for the league's minority fellowship program.

Without his experience working at past training camps, the Dallas Cowboys defensive line coach says, he would be back at the University of Oklahoma this fall coaching the defensive line.

Twenty percent of NFL coaching positions are held by minorities, and 65 percent of players are minorities, according to league figures.

In 1980 there were just 14 minorities coaching in the league; in 1987, 40; in 1993, 66, the NFL says.

The NFL has greatly changed its internship program since it took its

first belated steps toward increased minority coaching opportunity in the early 1980s. Early on, the NFL would invite an entire staff from a predominantly black school to visit training camp.

The numbers were too large for the coaches to gain valuable hands-on experience and get feedback from the team's coaching staff. The program excluded minority coaches at predominantly white schools.

Since 1987 the NFL has focused on getting talented minority coaches at the college level working with their NFL counterparts at training camp.

This allows them to show their skills and develop valuable contacts, in addition to learning tips to take back to their college programs.

"The purpose of this program is to increase opportunities for minority coaches in the NFL and to identify college coaches in terms of talent," NFL spokesman Greg Aiello says.

Since 1987, 200 participants have gone through the program, of whom 15 have later been hired as full-time assistants, including four coordinators this past year.

Blake, Cowboys tight end coach

Robert Ford and Bears assistant Clarence Brooks all worked in the Jerry Jones Minority Coaching Fellowship program at Cowboys camp in recent years. Brooks landed a job with the Chicago Bears and new head coach Dave Wannstedt this year. The Cowboys hired Ford in 1991.

Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson had known Blake for years. Blake was a nose guard at Oklahoma when Johnson coached at Oklahoma State. It was the work Blake did with Cowboys coaches, however, that caught Johnson's eye and led to him being hired.

"We were familiar with him due to his involvement in our minority program," Johnson says.

Ford, who strongly believes in the fellowship program, doesn't like the implication that this is "the only way to get minorities jobs in the NFL. That is not the case (with the program) and I know that."

"We have to make sure the minorities are qualified," Blake says. "There are plenty of qualified minorities; we just have to make sure they're the ones who get the jobs or it is a disservice to everyone."

Especially the top-notch coaches who are left behind. Ford counts it as a blessing he is not one of them.

"I feel I am very close to being a head coach right now," says Ford, who worked with the Cowboys fellowship program in 1990. He had spent 15 years as a college coach and one year with the U.S. Football League before joining the NFL but doesn't blame racism for keeping him out.

"I've never outwardly encountered problems because of my race," he says, "and I was at Mississippi State for years. There may have been, but if it was subtle."

"But without networking ..."

No pro job.

"It's an opportunity to get seen and heard and get exposure," Brooks says. "You have got to be good to get a job, but you have to network. Without that you won't get a job. I think Robert Ford is exactly right in that it implies minorities can't get a job without special help, but this is the next best option because of the lack of opportunities."

Brooks went through the program with the Cowboys in 1989, where he

met Wannstedt, who hired him this year after getting the Bears head coaching job.

One reason the number of minorities in coaching are so low, the coaches say, is because minority college players don't see coaching as a realistic avenue for long-term success.

The NCAA has not studied why more minority college athletes do not go into coaching, though they have researched the issue concerning women.

Stan Johnson, NCAA director of professional development, said it's an issue worth studying and he plans to add that question to an upcoming survey of student-athletes.

"We know who goes into physical education and become teachers, but little beyond that. Why do we have only four Division I head football coaches (who are black)? They become discouraged because there are no role models."

The role models issue is sensitive to black coaches.

"I hate the term 'black coach,'" Brooks says. "I'm a coach who happens to be black. There is a subtle insinuation that, 'You guys are here to keep the black kids in line.'

"Or they'll tell you, 'Hey, talk to

this kid' because you are black."

"I don't only coach black ballplayers. I've had black kids I've coached and loved and black kids I've hated. I've had white kids I've loved to coach and white kids I couldn't stand."

"I'm a coach who happens to be black. I think black and white players need minority role models. Yet we know a lot of young black children have positive black role models."

For those who go through the program, getting a job with an NFL team isn't always the goal. The learning experience can be just as important.

Jose Louis is the inside linebackers coach at Oregon State, and he has been in Cowboys camp this summer coaching everybody but linebackers.

"It's great," he says. "It's a great program because you learn by working in new areas."

If it works well enough, Brooks says, it might no longer be necessary.

"I don't want this to come out wrong, but I hope someday there's no need for a program like this," Brooks says. "In the future I hope there don't have to be allowances made to get people seen and heard in the NFL."

"If you're good enough you get the job, and if you're not, you don't."

## Baylor's economic problems foretell woes for all of Southwest Conference

WACO, Texas (AP) - Herbert

Reynolds has convinced me.

When the president of Baylor University says the school lost \$525,000 last year on its football program, then economic problems must really be hitting athletic departments hard.

Baylor is one of those private schools that examine each dime with a microscope before they spend it.

It's not that they are cheap, but the Baptists are known to be very, very prudent with a buck.

Baylor averaged 37,000 fans last year, appeared on television a couple of times, and made it to the John Hancock Bowl where they whipped up on the Pac-10 Arizona Wildcats.

And they lost money?

"Normally, the football program makes money but expenses are getting high and when you don't make money on football it hurts other programs," said Reynolds.

He said Baylor lost \$2.3 million total on its men's and women's athletics.

"And now the court settlement of Title IX has ushered in a new era that will be precedent setting in every way," Reynolds said. "It's sobering to see what we face. We want equality but we want fair play and it's going to take time to adjust."

The court settlement on Title IX means women's scholarships will have to be brought more in line with the total of men's scholarships, depending on a number of formulas including the enrollment of particular schools.

"This is a challenge for our program and we've got to find a way to keep sports and keep the institution afloat and viable," Reynolds said. He said the Bear Club and other foundations would have to raise some \$3 million a year to keep Baylor athletics in the black.

Reynolds said Baylor has seen studies on how important athletics

can be to a particular university.

"We do feel strongly it is a window to the larger world," he said. "Sports can be an image maker for the university. We'd just like to see what we do."

Schools are going to have to become money-raising geniuses.

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When a money hawk like Herbert Reynolds takes off his green eye shade and pronounces things are economically bad in his athletic department, then you know it must be just that throughout the SWC.

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Vision, however, is the recognition, comprehension or perception of what the individual sees. For example, when looking at a strange object for the first time, we do comprehend or "visualize" what it is. The second time we see it, we will recognize it. For some people, perception problems may translate into reading problems.

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# Ladies' riding team brings back sidesaddle

BRYAN, Texas (AP) - Six prancing horses with riders mounted sidesaddle circle the arena with leisurely precision. From a parallel course, three horses pivot left and three pivot right to form two lines in single file, circling in opposite directions.

Again the two lines pivot until the horses and riders face each other almost head on. Only a few inches' grace allows the converging mounts to pass each other without colliding and without ever breaking their steady, delicate stride.

The members of the Texas Ladies Aside are riding in high style.

The Ladies Aside is the world's only Peruvian horse sidesaddle drill team. It has more than 50 members nationwide, eight of whom live in the Brazos Valley. Many more join the drill team to ride in parades.

For members of the Ladies Aside, dressing up in a smartly tailored outfit to sit aside, not astride, their smooth riding is a form of elegant self-expression.

"It gives us a chance to look elegant, wear a nice dress and look feminine, yet participate in an active sport," said Ladies Aside member Ruth Riegel.

In the dozen or so regional parades graced by the Ladies Aside annually, the equestriennes are impossible to miss. Their Peruvian horses perform with a high, proud gait that almost seems like prancing.

In 1990, the Ladies Aside's carefully polished routine won a shared first place in the Kentucky Derby Pegasus Parade. Other parades favored by the Aside include Foley's Thanksgiving parade in Houston and the Bryan-College Station Christmas parade.

The Ladies Aside's parade routine

and special indoor exhibitions consist of leisurely yet intricate dressage involving up to 12 riders at once. The sweeping, coordinated maneuvers - pivoting, facing off on a parallel course or suddenly turning away at an angle - bring the horses within inches of each other.

For most of the members she knows, riding sidesaddle carries a sense of pride in being able to execute something difficult, said Ladies Aside co-founder Sallie Cochran of Caldwell. She also considers it an "enhancement to your femininity."

"It's something devoted entirely to women," Cochran said. "It's great fun to indulge yourself in that and be good at it."

Today, the sidesaddle is mostly thought of as an archaic device that harkens back to the days of rigid Victorian formality. In that era, women riding astride a horse was scandalous behavior in polite society.

Cochran taught herself to ride sidesaddle from a book. When she became interested in sidesaddle in 1983, there were no instructors in the area who were schooled in the mostly obsolete riding technique.

"I had seen a picture years before of a woman in a pith helmet, holding a parasol, leaping a horse over a 4-foot-fence," Cochran said. "It looked like a challenge."

Further piquing her interest was seeing Alice Wolf, an associate professor with the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine, mounted sidesaddle while jumping her horse. As for Wolf's love of sidesaddle, she considers herself born in the wrong century.

"It's just a more elegant way of riding. Also people notice if you jump sidesaddle."

With the passing of the sidesaddle was lost a refined, elegant style of riding that women had made their

own, said Riegel, who has extensively researched the development of the sidesaddle.

"I don't look at it as reaffirming the prejudices of the Victorian era," Riegel. "I look at it as something unique, something that people had to do if they wanted to be considered well bred."

Sidesaddle is also the only practical way for many disabled riders - male and female - to stay mounted.

What might seem like an awkward arrangement to those used to riding astride actually provides a much more secure "seat," Riegel said. The right leg hooks over a pommel left of center on the saddle's front. Supporting the left leg is a stirrup that breaks away in an emergency.

"If the horse starts bucking, unless the horse goes over backwards, you won't come out of the saddle," Riegel said.

In attire, the Ladies Aside strives for a middle ground between the English tradition of formal but functional riding habits complete with long strict hemline, and the style of the Spanish-Mexican "charras," who perform sidesaddle drills at full gallop in flouncing skirts.

Skirts worn by the Ladies Aside are long enough for a dazzling effect on horseback, but clumsy when afoot. Hanging 10 inches lower than the rider's feet, riders must pin up the garment to walk. The Ladies Aside's most popular outfit includes a red jacket topped off with a Spanish style flat brim hat.

rehearing, and if that request is denied, they would ask to have the case moved to the Indiana Supreme Court.

Greg Garrison, who led the prosecution team, said the decision "makes us all feel good." Marion County prosecutor Jeffrey Modisett said that it "shows the law outweighs Mr. Dershowitz's public relations efforts."

Tyson, now 27, was convicted in February 1992 of attacking Washington the previous July in his hotel room.

He was sentenced to six years in prison, followed by four years' probation. Marion Superior Court judge Patricia Gifford sentenced Tyson March 6, 1992, and ordered him held during his appeal. He has served 17 months of his sentence at the Indiana Youth Center.

Tyson found out about the decision early Friday in a telephone call from his attorney.

"He was very, very disappointed," Williams said. "He still feels he was innocent."

"We do a lot of parade work and to appeal to the crowd, we do wear some frillier costumes," Riegel said.

Male escorts are not forgotten when it comes time for the Ladies Aside to perform. The Ladies Aside's official auxiliary is The Men Besides (The men ride astride.)

A Peruvian poet once described the Peruvian Paso as "the horse who travels like a conqueror." Its unusual delicate, precise and proud gait conveys that conquering spirit, known to the Peruvians as "brio."

Eileen Craig of Caldwell, who with Cochran founded the Ladies Aside, first became familiar with the Peruvian Paso during a 15-month stay in Colombia. Settling in Texas in 1970, she found that only one ranch in the state that raised the imported breed.

The local popularity of the horse traces to 1980 when Craig rode a Peruvian Paso in the Bryan-College Station Christmas parade for the first time.

"Cowboys around here had never seen anything like it," Craig said. "It blew them away."

Aboard a Peruvian Paso, the ride is smooth enough that one of the Ladies Aside's favorite routines is having the riders raise champagne glasses high with the horse in motion. Rarely, if ever, does the rider spill a drop.

The rhythm of most breeds' gait has all four hooves momentarily leaving the ground; the return to earth is a jolt for the rider. Riegel said the Peruvian Pasos have a natural four-beat gait that always keeps one

foot on the ground.

More unusual, the smooth gait is hereditary: The horses require no special training. Though shod for trail riding or street parades, Peruvian Paso must compete without shoes in horse shows for the breed. In Peru, horses are rarely shod. Also, heavy shoes often interfere with the horse's unique rhythm.

Giving the horse's gait an extra flashiness is a naturally swinging front leg action called "termino." In most breeds, this action would be a defect, Riegel wrote in a research paper.

"Here, the trait is an extravagant, proud gesture that seems not to interfere with the horse's way of going but, in fact, enhances it," Riegel wrote.

Besides its distinctive gait, the Peruvian Paso has a pleasant disposition and an affinity for working with people. Craig said that for older and inexperienced riders, the horse is ideal.

Riding sidesaddle in Peru might not strike ardent feminists as a step forward for women, but an invitation to ride in an exhibition drill at the National Show in Lima, Peru, was a triumph for the Ladies Aside. In the native country of the breed they

champion, few women ride in horse shows.

The most ignominious moment for the Ladies Aside was during a night parade in downtown San Antonio when Cochran's sure-footed Peruvian slipped on the slick brick street. Both rider and mount hit the pavement hard.

"The members refer to it as the night I was shot down in front of the Alamo," Cochran said.

Mishaps are rare, however. Most often, the Ladies Aside's performance leaves the audiences astounded.

"I usually hear two comments," Cochran said. "First, they ask, 'How do you stay on that thing?'"

"Then they say, 'It looks like you're having so much fun.'"

## Ag finance increase going to voters

AUSTIN -- Texas voters will decide in voting on Nov. 2 whether an agricultural finance program's funding authority will be increased from \$25 million to \$100 million.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry believes the measure passed by the Legislature "has the potential for creating jobs and strengthening local economies throughout the state as we propel Texas agriculture into the 21st century."

If approved by voters, constitutional Proposition 16 would allow the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority, TAFA, to raise additional funds by issuing commercial paper notes backed by the state's bonding authority.

TAFA was established by the Texas Legislature in 1987 to help ag processing and ag diversification companies start up or expand operations.

With \$25 million in funding approved by voters in 1989, TAFA

has assisted 34 businesses across the state -- including nurseries, fiber-related industries and food processors. These companies project to create 4,700 jobs directly or indirectly and to add \$463 million to the gross state product.

"With the initial \$25 million, this finance program has given taxpayers more than their money's worth with a 1800 percent return on their investment," Perry said. "However, we have successfully structured the program to prevent debt to the state's taxpayers. The fund

is self-supporting and backed by the state's strong credit rating."

In another ag finance measure, the Texas Legislature transferred the administration of a farm and ranch finance loan program to TDA. The program, which formerly was administered by the Veterans Land Board in the General Land Office, will finance up to \$150,000 to any state resident wanting to buy farm or ranch land. Financing should be available by February 1994.

### Soft drinks sell overseas

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sales of American soft drinks are taking a big gulp out of the foreign market.

Thanks to "growing demand for variety in foreign beverage markets, U.S. soft drink exports reached a record \$188 million in 1992, more than doubling sales since 1988," says a report in this month's issue of Agricultural Trade Highlights prepared by the Foreign Agricultural Service.

"While most soft drink sales globally involve products that are manufactured and consumed in the same country, U.S. shippers are succeeding in the growing trade of finished soft drinks," it said.

The report predicted that U.S. soft drink exports would rise to \$300 million by the late 1990s. It set the world export market in soft drinks at \$1.5 billion now.

But the top supplier of soft drink exports is the European Community, the report said, accounting for one-fourth of total sales. That was down from almost one-third in 1986.

The United States surpassed Japan in the late 1980s as the world's second largest soft drink exporter, and now accounts for 13 percent of the total export market, up from 5 percent in 1985.

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
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## Texas drought of 1950s was an event that remains in the mind of former news reporter

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) - Elmer Kelton remembers the lean years three decades ago.

"Driving down the highways, especially those long, straight roads west of San Angelo where the drought was born and from whence it spread over the whole Southwest, you see pasture after pasture with the gates wide open, the windmills tied off. There's no livestock in these pastures. There hasn't been in a long time."

The award-winning novelist wrote that newspaper account of the seven-year-long 1950s drought when he worked for the San Angelo Standard-Times as agricultural editor. He later wrote a novel about the traumatic era, "The Time It Never Rained."

"From a newspaperman's point of view, it was our major story, for seven years," said Kelton, who worked at the Standard-Times from 1948 until 1963.

While the current lack of rain has created some anxiety, it's nothing near drought proportions, Kelton said, "but it is a very worrisome dry spell."

"Whether or not it turns into a drought remains to be seen."

And anyone who remembers the '50s drought can't regard even a "worrisome dry spell" lightly, he said.

A drought, Kelton explained, doesn't necessarily mean a total lack of rain.

"It means that you don't have enough rain in a consistent pattern to keep vegetation alive. It rained off and on throughout the '50s drought, but it was not enough."

The definition of drought also depends on what part of the country you live in, Kelton added.

"It means different things to people in different areas," he said. "I remember, during the '50s, talking to a land buyer from Kansas who said they were in a terrible fix, that they had been through three droughts that summer."

"I told him, 'We've been through three summers with the same drought.'"

Awareness of the '50s drought came gradually, Kelton said, as one dry year led to another and another and another.

"In West Texas, you don't really know if you're in a drought for a couple of years," he explained. "In the early '50s, we knew we were in trouble. But then to have it last for seven years was just ridiculous."

Kelton said he became emotionally involved.

"My family and friends were involved with the drought; they were on the land, fighting it, trying to survive. The drought became a very emotional thing with me."

"The two most traumatic experiences of my life were World War II and the '50s drought. You don't ever totally get over the scars of either one."

Kelton recaptured the emotional turmoil of the drought in "The Time It Never Rained."

West Texans identify with the book - and have adopted Kelton's phrase "the time it never rained" as part of the regional vocabulary - because the novel hits home, Kelton said.

"Most of the things that I wrote either happened to people I knew or people I knew about," he said.

"We lived it."

Kelton's newspaper accounts from that era reflect the ordeal.

A story he wrote for the Standard-Times in 1952 chronicled the problems Eola suffered from a drought-driven dust storm.

"This little cotton farming town 22 miles east of San Angelo looked like a nightmare out of the Dust Bowl days Monday as citizens began a long battle to dig out from under big drifts of topsoil," he began.

"School had to be canceled. Many families had not been able to cook a meal at home since Friday. Sand clogged cars and pickups stalled on the streets. Housewives were shoveling drifts of sand out the front door while a west wind in its third day was bringing new dirt in the back."

The '50s drought not only changed the West Texas landscape, but it also changed the way West Texans viewed the land.

"It very definitely taught us some hard lessons about range management as well as lessons about farming methods," Kelton said. "It brought a lot of conservation lessons home to people, and those lessons have been passed on."

"People are better caretakers of the land now, not because they didn't want to be before the drought, but because of the educational effect of the drought."

"The drought taught us the limitations of this land."

The drought brought major changes to the lives of people who made their living on the land.

"In every farming community within reach of San Angelo or any other town that offers employment, the story is the same," Kelton wrote during the '50s.

"There are few young men on area farms today who don't work in town or in the oil fields to make up for the revenue the dry land has failed to produce."

He wrote of a farmer who attended a funeral and realized there was not one young face among the mourners.

"That's what the drought has done to us," he told the reporter. "The young ones have all gone from here. Just us older ones are left."

"The drought put a lot of people off the land, especially the ones who were leasing," Kelton said. "And it broke some people who did own their own land. The debt load finally surpassed the value of what they owned and they reached the point where there wasn't any way out."

"Oh, some came back. But a lot didn't."

Government relief programs made only marginal dents in the misery, he said.

"The government did all the government could do, but an awful lot of their programs turned out to be more hurt than help," he said. "A lot of the feed programs turned out to be counter productive."

He remembered one program where the government announced on a Friday that they would begin a \$10 a ton subsidy on hay.

By Monday, reacting to the news, dealers had increased the price of hay \$15 a ton, leaving farmers worse off than ever.

"The thing that helped most, as I remember," Kelton said, "was the loan programs. But they often tended to carry people so deeply into the hole that they couldn't get back out."

Hope kept people going, he said.

"You always hoped that next season would bring. You hoped that it would rain in the spring, and, when it didn't rain much then, you hoped that it would rain in the fall."

"You were kept alive by hope."

When then-President Dwight Eisenhower announced that he would visit San Angelo in 1956 as part of a tour of the drought-stricken Southwest, he was well received, Kelton remembered.

"It was quite a show," Kelton said. "Everyone knew that there wasn't much more the government could do, but the visit was symbolic."

Around 12,000 West Texans turned out to greet the president at Goodfellow Air Force Base.

"When President Eisenhower steps off his plane in San Angelo for a look at the drought area, he'll see a thirsty land seared by sun and whipped by dusty winds during seven or more years of subnormal rain," Kelton wrote in 1956.

"He'll see farms which haven't made a decent crop since 1950, farms that look deserted because the operators have been forced to seek jobs to feed their families, working their land late in the afternoons or over the weekends, if they work at all."

Shortly after Eisenhower's winter visit, a miracle happened: rain fell; the drought began to break.

"It was a coincidence, of course, unless the President had a direct pipeline to the Good Lord," Kelton said.

"But it began to rain and people called it the good Republican rain."

"That was right at the end of January. And it kept on raining. We got pretty good rains at the first of March, and it continued right on through the year. That fall, the lakes filled up to the point they had to let water out of North Concho (O.C. Fisher) to get it down to conservation level. They never had to do that before or since."

"There's no more beautiful sight in Texas today than a wet, cold ranch hand wading in mud and water above his boot tops, repairing a washed-out water gap, or a farmer stranded in a rain-soaked field, his tractor hopelessly bogged down in the mud," Kelton wrote after a '50s thunderstorm.

"There haven't been so many happy, smiling faces in West Texas in years as have shown up since the rains began a couple of weeks ago."

As the drought ended, pastures and farms gradually began to green. Crops grew again and livestock fattened.

"It was amazing to me how quickly after the drought broke that a lot of people got their debts paid up," Kelton said.

And how quickly life got back to normal - more or less.

"You never quite recover from something like that drought," Kelton said. "You never forget that it can come again."

"You do remember."

He and his wife Janet have eight children, five of whom live with them.

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

## Hospices help families

Nationwide, about 200,000 patients each year are admitted to hospice programs. Although the number increases steadily each year, public awareness about hospice care is still low.

The purpose of hospice care is to provide a comprehensive range of services to help a patient and family manage a terminal illness.

Those who choose hospice care agree not to seek invasive treatment for their terminal condition other than to control pain.

Hospices provide nursing care, chaplaincy services, home health aides, physical and occupational therapy, dietary counseling, prescription drugs, medical supplies and equipment.

For seniors who decide on hospice, Medicare's coverage may help. Covered under Medicare Part A, the hospice benefit usually requires only a five percent co-payment on drugs and inpatient nursing home care to give short-term respite to the in-home caregiver.

Additionally, care at home in a hospice program usually is less expensive overall than aggressive treatment as a hospital inpatient or than living in a nursing home.


In addition to Medicare, many private insurance plans cover hospice care.

Some good advice for getting children started on a lifetime of healthy eating habits can be taken from Ronald Kleinman, M.D., chief of the Pediatric Gastrointestinal and Nutrition Unit at

"This isn't a competition, but the mass media makes it out to be one," he said.

An important factor is whether dietary recommendations to reduce disease risk in adults should also be applied to children, Kleinman said.

"The ultimate goal of any nutrition recommendation for children is to promote optimal growth and development," Kleinman said at the American Medical Association (AMA)/International Food Information Council (IFIC) media briefing in New York. "If we concurrently improve the long-term health of children, that would be ideal. But there is no proof that a change in children's eating patterns will reduce the risk of certain illnesses as adults."

Health and nutrition experts recommend that 30 percent of calories in the diet, averaged over a period of several days, should come from fat for children ages 2 and older. About 10 percent of total fat should be saturated, 10 percent monounsaturated and 10 percent polyunsaturated.

Children should be able to eat with the rest of the family and have ample nutrients to support normal growth. They should eat a varied diet with lots of fruits and vegetables, lean meats, grains, low-fat dairy products and fish.

Some nutrition recommendations for children may not be based on sound evidence, according to Kleinman. For example, removing salt from your children's diets does not mean that they will not get hypertension, nor does reducing sugar prevent diabetes.

"Any parent who tries to micro-

manage a child's diet by counting the grams of fat in each food or counting the grams of fat on a day-by-day basis is headed for disaster," he said. "It's obsessive-compulsive behavior that yields no rewards whatsoever, and it just creates more tension."

Instead of labeling foods as "good" or "bad" try to influence your child's food choices. Also, provide a variety of food, including alternatives for specific foods.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap, or national origin.



### Who's minding the farm?

Less than two percent of the U.S. population lives on farms today. In 1920, the percentage was 30 percent; and when the U.S. Constitution was signed, the United States was 90 percent farmers.

But the grocery stores are always full and the export terminals are always busy. Who's doing all of the work?

In a great feat of productivity improvement, the U.S. economy and its farmers have increased the use of farm machines, improved crop varieties, and scientific pest controls to such an extent that 98 percent of the population can work at thousands of other jobs and buy all of their food at affordable prices. Only 24 cents of each food dollar - both for food eaten at home as well as away from home - goes to pay for the farm value of the food.

Productivity improvements are the foundation of any economy's ability to improve its people's living standards. By being so productive, each U.S. farmer can feed 94 people in the U.S. plus another 34 people overseas. Our farmers add immensely to the nation's wealth with every crop.

The U.S. agricultural work force represents just 3 tenths of one percent of the world's agricultural work force, but it produces 12.6 percent of the world's agricultural commodities by value.

There are three new displays at the library this month—all of them by kids. Included in the display is a Detroit ball cap and a ball signed by all of the Tigers. The boys are good friends and have been collecting for several years. Bobby is the son of Francisco and Camilia Villarreal and Julian is the son of Max and Janie Greigo. Both boys will be in the eighth grade at Hereford Junior High this year. I'll tell you about the other displayers next week.

There is a lot of variety on the new book shelf this week. Of somewhat local interest is *Ride For The Brand* by Red Steagall. Some of you may recognize Red as the spokesman for AmWest Savings, but he was pretty big country music a few years ago, at least in "these parts". He is a native of Sanford (near lake Meredith) and when I was a "radio personality" (who am I trying to kid?...I was a disc jockey) in Borger, it seemed like

everyone I met knew him personally. Of course I don't doubt that many of them did, but I couldn't help but wonder how many of them would have claimed it if he had not been a "star." Anyway, back to *Ride for the Brand*...In the preface, Red tells about his lifelong love for poetry, and his own attempts in that line. Though known as a songwriter, he realized that not all his work was suited to music. This is a collection of those poems.

Speaking of poetry, I could really get up on a soapbox about that. I'm grateful to my own parents for bringing me up on poetry and music. Edgar A. Guest and James Whitcomb Riley have fallen out of favor in these times, but their poems have a quality that teaches a sense of rhythm. A certain lady at my house was brought up on a Spartan Scandinavian fashion. Poetry was left out of her education, and her parents liked classical music. I was taught to recite "Somebody Said That It Couldn't Be Done" and grew up enjoying the Kingston Trio, cowboy ballads, and gospel music. Say what you will about my tastes, but at least I can clap my hands to music! At any

rate, after being force-fed tons of blank verse in institutions of learning, I'm glad to see guys like Baxter Black and Buck Ramsey and Red Steagall bring poetry back to the common folk.

I suppose you're really more interested in other new books than in my personal history and opinions. If that's the way you want to be, then okay. *Outwitting the Gestapo* is the story of Lucie Aubrac. Married to a Jew, this French Catholic fought the Nazis in WWII France. Aubrac, pregnant with her second child, audaciously planned and took part in raids to free captives—including her own husband—from the infamous prisons of Klaus Barbie, the "Butcher of Lyon." Dozens, if not hundreds, of stories of other underground Nazi-fighters have been published, but each one has its own merit and is a source of inspiration.

If you regard yourself as "totally stressed" you'll want to see *Dancing Through Life in a Pair of Broken Heels*, but it will probably help if you are female. This is a combined effort by Mickey and Cathy Guisewite. Cathy writes the comic strip that bears her name, so you know that this is going to be a pretty onesided approach. I found it amusing, having just returned from a vacation with four females. (Sounds like a dream, doesn't it. It was, by another name!)

From the best seller list comes *Like Water for Chocolate* by Laura Esquivel. It was surprised to learn that this was "numero uno" in Mexico in 1990. Subtitled "a novel in monthly installments, with recipes, romances, and home remedies," it is a tale of family life in turn-of-the-century Mexico, where traditions, regardless of how restrictive, are binding.

If you haven't been by the museum lately, take a little extra time to visit next time you come to the library. The work that has been done this summer has really perked the place up!



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### Hints from Heloise

Dear Readers: With so many of us using nonprescription over-the-counter (OTC) drugs when we are ill or have a headache, it's always a must to check packaging for tampering.

Most OTC medicines are required by law to be sealed in "tamper-evident" packaging, but you should still take precautions before opening the package and using the product.

According to the Nonprescription Drug Manufacturers Association, here are some things to look for:

- Read the label on the seal for information on what tamper-evident features you should look for.
- Check the packaging for any damage before you buy it. If you suspect the package has been tampered with, point it out to the store manager.

After opening the package, examine the medicine to make sure tablets or capsules all look the same. If you are suspicious, don't take it; return it to the store that you bought it from.

When buying nonprescription OTC drugs, take the time to look for tampering. It may just save your life. — Heloise

#### ORGANIZATION SYSTEM

Dear Heloise: Keeping all my shelves, drawers and closets tidy and neatly organized is a challenge that I ignored for 24 years. But this year I discovered a system that works for me and it has made me feel like a different person!

When I go through my shelves and closets, I label each section with masking tape and a pen: sugar, light bulbs, grater, glasses, etc. When I take something from the shelf, I know exactly where to put it back. ## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### HEADLINE: MISSPEND ONE, LOSE TWO

In business we use the dollar to keep score. We track our sales in dollars or more appropriately thousands or millions of dollars. We record our expenses in dollars and measure our profits in dollars.

The dollar, like a run in baseball or a point in basketball, is a unit of measure. It is a common, easily understood gauge of the level of business activity and an indication of the financial success of the firm.

We also use the dollar as a measuring device for the public sector. We measure the Federal budget in trillions of dollars. Most state budgets add up to billions and local counties and cities are usually in the millions.

Like most managers, I spend a lot of time worrying about dollars. It seems to me when my budget is very tight new

opportunities arise everyday to spend money. Some of these opportunities fall into the "must do" category while others fit the "wouldn't it be nice" class.

#### Misspent Money

One of my chief concerns is the high cost of misspending dollars. I've learned that every time I misspend a dollar, it costs the value of two dollars. Not only do I lose the dollar I spend foolishly, but I also lose the productivity, benefit and value of the dollar I could have spent wisely.

Several years ago I got excited about having a hand-held metal detector. You can use a metal detector to locate buried treasure and I was swept away with the thought. I spent more than \$400 for the top-of-the-line model and set out to find my fortune.

After an hour of searching, my arm grew tired. My treasure consisted of a rusty hinge, a bent spike nail and an aluminum pull tab. I found no gold doubloons, no silver dollars and no copper coins.

The metal detector, used less than one hour, rests peacefully in my attic. I've kept it for more than 10 years as a reminder of my foolish misspending.

#### Cutting Spending

Over the years I've worked with hundreds of small businesses and dozens of government entities. Misspending and over spending is a fact of life.

Here are some tips on cutting unnecessary spending. First ask yourself if this expense is necessary. Will the item you

are purchasing generate profits in the business? Will it save material or labor costs? Will it boost the morale of your work force? If the answer is no, you can live without the purchase.

Second, determine the total cost before you spend any money. Computers are a good example of supposedly sound investments that can carry a heavily loaded follow-on cost.

Recently, a client shared an example of how a \$3,000 basic computer system purchase turned into a \$6,000 expense. The new computer needed newer software, new printer technology and additional employee training. My client could justify the \$3,000 initial cost, but the follow-on cost lowered their rate of return to an unacceptable lever.

Finally, don't spend money just because you have it. Our government excels at this. At the end of each fiscal year many government agencies spend money in a heated frenzy. In government, if you don't spend it, you may lose it. So bureaucrats dump billions on unnecessary and unjustifiable expenditures just so the budget won't be cut next year.

For small businesses it's not a matter of spend or lose it. Maybe often than not it is a case of "I want it and I deserve it." And like my fast fortune metal detector, the hasty purchase often occupies space in the back room or garage. A classic case of misspend one, lose two.


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

## Yeardley Smith's heart belongs to Lisa Simpson

BY JOHN CROOK

Yeardley Smith has kind words for Louise Fitzer, the compassionate, mild-mannered research assistant she plays on "Herman's Head" (which joins the Fox Thursday night line-up effective Aug. 12). But probe a little deeper and it becomes apparent that there is no contest: Her heart belongs to 8-year-old saxophone prodigy Lisa Simpson, whose voice she provides in the smash Fox animated series "The Simpsons."

"I feel much closer to Lisa Simpson than to Louise," the actress says. "[Lisa] is a more intricate character at this point. She's been on the air a little bit longer, and I feel I can take more chances."

"The relationship between me and my father, and Homer and Lisa, is extraordinarily similar. And I never sat down with the writers and said, 'This is what it was like for me when I was 8,' but it was, you know. That sort of struggle is very ... I completely identify, whenever there is a conflict between them," she explains.

Smith's affection for the character has grown since the days when the family was simply filler on "The Tracey Ullman Show."

The "Ullman" family, she recalls, was "much sharper, literally, in the drawing of it. And much meaner. Much more combative. Lisa was brilliant, but you didn't see much of her soul. And then that relationship with her father evolved, and that whole conflict. But the most important thing, regardless of her intelligence, and her prodigy status as a saxophone player, is that she remains only a child. She is only 8."

Smith is unwavering in her respect

for the writers of "The Simpsons," but she isn't afraid to protect the integrity of Lisa's character. In particular, she recalls an episode in which Lisa wanted a pony, and Homer took a second job to give her one.

"There was a part where Lisa gets a crush on the stableboy," she recalls, "and it was quite sexual. And I went to the writers and said, 'You know what, this is very funny,' because it played wonderfully at the rehearsal table, but I said, 'I honestly don't think that at the age of 8 this character would be this aware of that kind of sexuality.' I hate to say it, because I'm sure there are 8-year-olds who are, but Lisa Simpson isn't, and I really felt strongly about it, so they changed it."

"She is such an observer," she says, working up steam, "and in her internal strife, she speaks volumes."

"Maggie (the littlest Simpson, who almost never speaks) is, of course, the ultimate observer, and, you know, she can do one thing and, again, it ...

To Glynnis O'Connor, it sounded like a dream job: the opportunity to spend more time with her family and the chance to sink her teeth into a meaty character. But what O'Connor didn't count on was the rigor of playing one of daytime television's most lively detectives, Margo Hughes, on "As the World Turns."

"I was on this show ('ATWT') about 20 years ago," says O'Connor, "when it was a half-hour show and was taped live each day. Things have really changed since then. I had no idea the amount of material you have every day, sometimes 20 or 30 pages. I am used to doing a couple of pages a day when I'm working on a film. Margo is involved with so many different characters on the show, and she has so much history."

"On one of the first shows that I appeared, there was a birthday party for my daughter on the show, and there were so many different cast members in the scene. I had no idea who most of them were. I remember meeting somebody and doing a scene with her and later finding out she used to be married to Margo's dad. Things like that happen all the time, but you just kind of laugh it off."

At first, O'Connor was nervous about taking over after Ellen Dolan decided to leave the role. "Ellen was loved by everybody, and she had the character down," says O'Connor. "I knew it wouldn't be easy when I first went in there. I walked around feeling like an idiot for a few months, but it has gotten better."

"I work a lot of hours, but you know, there really is no such thing as a free lunch, and the work here is really great. The cast and crew are so real and down-to-earth. There are no egos on the set, and that is rare in this business."

While this was only O'Connor's second foray into the soaps, she has had a successful career in movies, television and theater. Her films include, "Ode to Billy Joe" and "Our Town." She has done several TV movies, including "Sons and Daughters" and "The Boy in the Plastic Bubble."

**Cronkite still strong on TV at 76**

NEW YORK (AP) - In its infancy, television gave the nation two heroes, both of them mustachioed and both named Walter.

Beginning in 1954, Walt Disney, hosting the weekly anthology series that bore his name, solidified his role as the laureate of fantasy.

Meanwhile, a young CBS News correspondent named Walter Cronkite was hosting "You Are There" and "The Twentieth Century." Still in his 30s, he already was a figure of reassuring authority.

Time has passed, Disney is long gone, but at age 76 and more than a decade into "retirement," Cronkite continues to hold, and earn, the nation's trust.

Who better to voice problems the nation would rather not hear?

"In the post-Cold War era, the U.S. is being called on to be the world's policeman," said Cronkite, speaking with a reporter one recent morning as lawlessness raged in Bosnia, Somalia, Cambodia and too many other troubled lands. Then, in that oh-so-familiar cadence and timbre, he rolled out one vexing question after another:

"Do we want to play that policing role? If we want to play it, what

limitations will we impose? Where do we want to send American personnel, to risk their lives in the interest of ... what?"

Those concerns he takes up in "Where Do We Fight?", the second in an ongoing series of quarterly "Cronkite Reports" specials on the Discovery Channel. The one-hour inquiry will be telecast tonight at 10 p.m. EDT, then repeated at 1 a.m.

In a natty pin-striped suit, sitting in his handsome corner office, Cronkite looked every bit the elder statesman of TV journalism. But then he let slip a bit of the newshound's common touch: As he spoke, he fetched a Bic pen from his desk drawer to stir his coffee. That done, he gave his breakfast sweet roll a good dunking.

Although Cronkite keeps this office high in CBS' "Black Rock" tower in midtown Manhattan, he has gone elsewhere for many of his TV projects since leaving the "CBS Evening News" anchor chair in 1981.

Based on a portion of the program available for preview, how things were put together for "Where Do We Fight?" reflects Cronkite's taboos on TV razzmatazz.

No wonder. Among TV newsmen, Cronkite indisputably is

old-fashioned, if for no other reason than this: Beneath the tanned, remarkably unlined face known to millions, printer's ink still flows through his veins.

Fondly he recalled his days at The Houston Press, which he quit school in the 1930s to work for. He recounted how the tough little city editor would paw over every page, eyeball every column of the rival Chronicle, looking for discrepancies.

"Cronkite!" Cronkite erupted, mimicking the city editor.

"You'd shudder and come up to his desk.

"Cronkite, THEY said that damn fire was at 1410 Westheimer. YOU said 1412 Westheimer! What the hell? Who's right?"

"And you'd be on the phone calling the police, checking on the story for the next edition."

It's a vivid reminder that "Cronkite" wasn't always a synonym for "the most trusted man in America," or even for "the nation's premiere anchor."

Once upon a time, it was just the name of a kid busting his keister to learn his craft.

Now, half a century later, the man the kid became has lost little of his wonder, and none of his drive to get it right.

### Ullman says BBC not amused by Simpsons

Tracey Ullman, the British-born actress of a thousand voices, says she finds her wildly diverse characters have one thing in common: They're people with problems.

Speaking in a verbal kaleidoscope of dialects to TV critics in Los Angeles recently, Ullman confessed, "I never wanted to be the princess. I always wanted to be the ugly sister with the problem."

Promoting her two HBO specials that will premiere this fall, she said her low profile since the end of her Fox variety show was due to burnout and the birth of her second child. She confirmed that she wants her children to be educated in England.

"I want (daughter) Mabel to go to a British school, because if I had to play games in the playground in January in an air tech shirt, she's going to have to do it, too! And I want her to be beaten on Thursdays ... and suffer in the class system like I had to, yes," she said, laughing.

When her Fox series ran in England, Ullman added, the BBC made one colossal misjudgment. "The BBC, in their wisdom, edited them," she recalled, then switched to an upper-class-twit voice: "'Those little yellow people, the Simpsons, aren't very funny at all, so we cut them out.' I said, 'You're out of your mind! They will be the biggest thing in the world.' Now they're kicking themselves."

## HBO offers provocative 'Undercover'

When it was produced and scheduled for presentation, HBO's latest edition of "America Undercover" was already timely. Titled "Why Am I Gay? Stories of Coming Out in America," the hour-long documentary debuting Tuesday, Aug. 10, examines the lives of several adult homosexuals, their methods of coping, and the thoughts of experts in varied disciplines on why some people grow up to be gay.

But the program's newsworthy status was greatly enhanced by a report, released in mid-July, from research scientists working with the National Cancer Institute. The paper strongly indicates that homosexuality may be genetically programmed at birth.

If one's sexual orientation, be it straight or gay, is predetermined — not a matter of choice — then it calls into question the cruelty and rejection many gays experience, even from their own families. It also would seem to augment the skepticism with which experts regard groups such as the Freedom At Last Ministry, a religious organization that promises to help its live-in followers learn to control their homosexual impulses. The Kansas-based group is featured in one of the HBO program's four segments.

Also seen in the show are Edgar, a police sergeant in New York City; Michael, an HIV-positive entertainer; and two Houston women who counsel gay and lesbian teen-agers.



## P-Pals give PBS kids' blocks a solid new look

For a young person, the time gap between "Sesame Street" and "Barney & Friends" can be cavernous indeed, especially when filled with advertisements for PBS adult fare such as "The MacNeil-Lehrer Newshour" and "Wall Street Week."

In order to make their children's programming blocks more child-friendly, PBS, in conjunction with affiliate WGBH Boston, developed the P-Pals. The Pals are a gang of perky, P-shaped animated characters inspired by the well-known PBS P-head logo. Each Pal has a distinct personality and they live in a world where most things are also shaped like the letter P. The characters are featured in short vignettes that help lend cohesion to PBS children's blocks.

"They will help children stay involved with the programs," says Carole Feld, vice president of PBS advertising and promotion, "by giving them child-oriented messages during the program breaks. The P-Pals will introduce programs, give station IDs and seasonal greetings, and frame promos for kids' shows."

Many PBS affiliates are already airing the P-Pals shorts, and the rest are expected to implement them by the end of summer. Some stations are supplementing the shorts with local voice talent, instructional messages and public service announcements to give their kids' blocks a distinctive new look.



## HOME BIJOU

Caine and company shine  
in Bogdanovich's hilarious 'Noises Off'

Admittedly, Michael Frayn's dizzyingly busy story of a hapless acting troupe touring America in a bad sex farce works better on stage than film, but Peter Bogdanovich's 1992 movie version of "Noises Off" is still a lot of fun. Mile-a-minute pacing and deft camera work combine to show almost simultaneously the elements — backstage fighting among the players, the dreadful play they're obliged to perform — that were separated in Frayn's carefully structured, two-act stage show.

But it's the cast that really makes "Noises Off" so enjoyable. Michael Caine gives his funniest performance in years as Lloyd, the sarcastic, Valium-popping director eager to shove his acrimonious ensemble out on the road and move on to a more dignified gig directing "Hamlet" in New York. Carol Burnett provokes laughs (and a little sympathy) as an aging comic who has sunk her meager life savings into the play in hopes of financial

security and a last round of applause. John Ritter is terrific as the lame-brained actor who's completely inarticulate without a script. Besides a fine, funny characterization, Ritter's slapstick skills are put to good use.

Denholm Elliot is so good as a hard-drinking, senility-addled thespian, it's a shame his role isn't bigger. Nicollette Sheridan sheds her shrewish "Knots Landing" persona to play a ditzy blonde starlet, and Christopher Reeve is surprisingly effective as the talentless numskull so frightened by violence he gets a nosebleed at Ritter's every pratfall.

Also effective are Marilu Henner as a verbose Pollyanna, Mark-Linn Baker as Tim, the show's exhausted all-purpose trouble shooter, and Julie Hagerty as the bewildered stage manager.

"Noises Off" will obviously find its most appreciative audience among people who've had some experience in the theater, but the marvelous performances, the fast pacing and Frayn's witty script should entertain everyone.

### Lewis, Powell lead U.S. track team

Americans Carl Lewis and Mike Powell square off once again in the long-jump competition when ABC presents the World Track and Field Championships from Stuttgart, Germany, on Saturday, Aug. 14. The competition continues on ABC Sunday, Aug. 15; Saturday, Aug. 21; and Sunday, Aug. 22.

Lewis and Powell's long-jump battles the past few years have quickly become part of track and field legend. Powell became an overnight sensation on Aug. 30, 1991, in Tokyo when his jump of 29 feet, 4 1/2 inches broke Bob Beamon's 23-year-old world record of 29 feet, 2 1/2 inches (once thought to be "the record that would never be broken") and broke Carl Lewis' 10-year streak of 65 consecutive long-jump victories.

Lewis, the eight-time gold medalist considered by many to be the greatest all-around track-and-field athlete of all-time, got revenge in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics. Lewis led off with a jump of 28 feet, 5 1/2 inches, and Powell, though he came close on his final try, couldn't catch Lewis.

Lewis will also compete in the 100-meter dash, his gold medal-winning event at the 1988 Seoul Olympics when Canadian Ben Johnson was disqualified for drug use. Lewis' performance in the 100 has been slipping lately, however, earning him third at the recent USA Championships.



### Third time a charm for Stockwell, Parton's love song

**Q:** I enjoy "Quantum Leap" and would like to know more about actor Dean Stockwell. What kinds of movies has he been in? Could you please print a picture of him from when he was young? —Christina Massey, High Point, N.C.

**A:** Stockwell was born in North Hollywood, Calif., in 1936, and made his Broadway debut at age 6 in "Innocent Voyage." Signed to an MGM contract, the curly-haired youth made 18 films, including "Anchors Aweigh" (1945), "The Boy With Green Hair" (1948), "Down to the Sea in Ships" (1949) and Rudyard Kipling's "Kim" (1950) before leaving show business to pursue odd jobs for several years. Upon his return to the film industry, he starred in "The Careless Years" (1957), "Sons and Lovers" (1960), "Long Day's Journey Into Night" (1962), "The Dunwich Horror" (1970) and "She Came to the Valley" (1977). After leaving show business a second time to marry and begin a family, Stockwell resurfaced in such films as "Blue Velvet" (1986), "Beverly Hills Cop II" (1987) and "The Player" (1992). His performance in "Married to the Mob" (1988) earned him a New York Film Critics' Circle Award and an Oscar nomination. In addition to "Quantum Leap," for which he won a Golden Globe, Stockwell has appeared in "Columbo," "Murder She Wrote" and as the host of NBC's "Caught in the Act."

**Q:** In May I saw a movie on PBS' "Great Performances" that captivated me. It was called "Verna: U.S.O. Girl" and starred Sissy Spacek, Sally Kellerman and Howard Da Silva. Any information you would give me would be appreciated, especially about its availability on video. —Lucille Beverly, Elko, Nev.

**A:** Produced in 1978 on location in Braumholder, Germany, and featuring hundreds of actual American soldiers stationed there, "Verna: U.S.O.
