A tremendous chicken dinner, with all the trimmings, was served the banqueters in the good old Castro way, which everybody in this country knows about and appreciates, and the spirit of good fellowship and aggressive business cooperation abounded througout.

The meeting was in the nature of a regular business meeting of the new commercial organization, at which re-' ports from organization committees previously appointed were heard and work plans for the first year outlined and agreed upon. The Hereford members had been invited to attend and lend what assistance they could from their experience in this work. A membership committee was named, new members secured on the spot, and other details discussed and worked out for an aggressive campaign to put Castro county on

After the business session ended the visitors were all called upon for short talks, each contributing what he could to the idea of the hour. The Hereford delegation consisted of E. W. Harrison. Henry Wilkinson, G. A. F. Parker, County Judge W. M. Megert, F. H. Oberthier, Edgar Ireland, C. C. Acker and Seth B. Holman.

B. C. Kilgore, on behalf of the Castro Chamber of Commerce, formally welmod the the dord men to the city and expressed the local appreciation for such interest in a short expressive address. Other Castro men who talked briefly were Judge C. F. Kerr, Edwin Ramey and Chairman Galle. Mr. Galle stated that he had attended the Hereford Chamber of Commerce Banquet last week and had kept detailed notes on it, which he repeated for the benefit of his audience, even to the jokes of Joe L. Pope, which vastly tickled the audience. Mr. Galle then added a few jokes of his own, which also brought down the house.

The meeting adjourned with mutual expressions of good will and cooperation for the good of all between the two countles and the Hereford men returned home late in the afternoon, full of chicken dinner and enthusiasm for the spirit of community welfare and real Texas hospitality manifested by our hustling neighbors to the south.
