After Commander-inChief Hoover evicted the defenseless bonus campers from Washington with Federal troops-infantry with fixed bayonets, calvary with drawn sabers, the chemical warfare section with its bombs, all reinforced by tanks-a military spirit became evident in administration circles and the conduct of the Hoover campaign For instnace, in addressing his latest conference of financiers and industrialists, Mr. Hoover told them that he had won the financial battle of Chateau Thierry and was preparing for a Soissons offensive.

The Hoover election campaign of late has relied almost entirely upon the army and navy, members of the Cabinet and the "little Cabinet." Theretofore, the principal Cabinet spokesmen for the Hoover candidacy were Secretary of Agriculture Hyde, Secretary of the Interior Wilbur and Secretary of the Treasury Mills, but suddenly the vangard of Cabinet electioneers was most conspicous by the presence of Secretary of War Hurley, Assistant Secretary of War Davison, Secretary of the Navy Adams and Assistant of the Navy Jahncke. It was stated at the time that Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, present military administrator of the Phillipines, would be commondeered to reinforce the Cabinet spokesman.

Secretary Hyde and Secretary Wilbur were completely in eclipse. The former, assailing Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt's reforestation plan to aid employment, had stated that one man could plant a million trees in a day, and had been laughed out of the picture; the latter had told a Philadelphia audience that the depression had been good for children's health by reason of a more restricted diet, which started a demonstration resembling an incipient riot.

Secretary Mills, however, kept abreast of the military spokesman under the changed order, although he has been less convincing in his statements since he gave Congress three different sets of figures to balance the budget-all wrong.

And now the army and navy Cabinet spokesman have met with disasters. When Assistant Secretary Davison attempted to asperse the status of the evicted ex-service men by calling them "a polyglot mob of tramps and hoodlums, plus a sprinkling of communist agitators." and repeated the stale and exploded reasons given for their eviction, he was booed and other wise treated with disrespect at an American

Legion meeting in Brooklyn. Secretary of War Hurley's Providence, R. I., attack on Governor Roosvelt's Columbus speech has been so completely answered and his statements so thoroughly refuted that he appears to be the only casualty of that quixotic assalt. Following the hostile reaction to the Davison speech, the White House gave notice that Cabinet members who are Legionaires, speaking at Legion conventions, speak only for themselves and not for the Administration. This appears to put a quietus upon the proposed speech by Secretary Hurley at the forthcoming national gathering of the Legion at Portland, even though the bold Mr. Hurley had the temerity to attempt a defense of Mr. Hoover and himself in the matter of eviction of the ex-servise men.

Secretary of the navy Adams made his blunder when he told an assemblage of Republican women in Boston that he heard President Hoover in 1929 beg Mr. Mellon to use all the powers of the Federal Reserve Board to check the wild speculation in Wall Street, which was an admission that President Hoover foresaw the danger but issued no warning to the people.

As a fitting ending to the fiasco of the military conduct of the campaign, Mr. Hoover has ordered Colonel Theodore Roosevelt to remain in the Philippines.

With the entire Cabinet self-discredited in its conduct of Mr. Hoover's campaign, it would seem that the so-called Hoover High Command (the new military title for the board of strategy) will be limited to the members of the secretariat loaned by big corporations and the squad of guest correspondents at the Rapidan camp.

It is estimated that the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment and the revision of the Hawley-Smoot tariff would give the government a revenue of possibly two billion dollars. With nearly four billion dollars deficit in the United States Treasury are you going to vote to give this revenue to the government by voting the Democratic ticket, or vote against it by votng for Mr. Hoover, who has refused to avail himself of this revenue for the past four years?

Even though the stock market took it on the chin yesterday for a 93 point drop following the Government estimate for August, it is likely that the September estimate will come in at a smaller figure. 4,000 bales is not many, comparitively speaking, and if the floods over the country generally haven't damaged the crop much, it is because they weren"t there in the first place. The estimate was only for the month of August and the damage that has been done, has taken place since that time. In view of the professed policy of the Farm Board to hold off the market something close to a million and a half bales, the law of supply and demand may get a chance to strutt its stuff this year. If the law works the way the books say it does, cotton cannot help but increase in price. What the mutton heads on Wall Street do to the market remains to be seen but if they haven't learned anything in the past three years, it is a safe prediction that seats will be selling at a further reduced price. Anyhow, optomism is in the air until the flop comes, we are going to enjoy this little period of cheerfulness wile we may.
