Section deleted requiring leave during campaign

Deaf Smith County Commissioners antenna combiner will be \$10,875. elected Monday to delete the section of the county personnel policy requiring county employees to take a leave of absence while running for a county

That action came in a regular meeting of the commissison.

County Clerk David Ruland said he felt the policy was unfair. "I feel the way the policy read before, it would rule out some good qualified candidates," he said

County Treasurer Vesta Mae Nunnally echoed Ruland's remarks.

"Knowing the expense of campaigning, I feel it would eliminate experienced people who could not pay for a campaign if they were not working," she told the commission.

The change in the policy is set to go into effect in time for the next elec-

In other business the commission decided to accept a bid from Motorola of Amarillo to purchase a new radio system for the county sheriff's office.

Commissioners also accepted a bid from Stevens Chevrolet for three new vehicles for the sheriff's depart-

The cost for the vehicles will be \$29,951

Sheriff Joe Brown said that three of the cars the department uses have over 100,000 miles on them

Commissioners also elected to advertise for applications for a new County Veterans Service Officer.

At a previous meeting, commissioners elected to disolve the office because they felt it was not servicing the county. In Monday's meeting, veterans from throughout the county asked the commissioners to reinstate the office.

Commissioners unanimously elected to re-instate the office.

Advance tickets are priced at \$6 for adults and \$3 for students. All tickets at the gate will be \$7 each.



Students making higher exam scores

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas high school juniors are making better scores on the exit exams that are required to get a high school diploma, the Texas Education Agency said Monday.

Eighty-nine percent of the approximately 184,000 juniors who took the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills test in October 1986 passed the math section, compared with 88 percent in October 1985, the TEA said. Eighty-seven percent passed the English language arts section, compared with 91 percent last year.

"We are extremely pleased with the October 1986 results of the TEAMS exit level test," said Commissioner William Kirby. "The results show higher average scores along with a stable passing rate on a more demanding test, which in turn indicates that the academic improvement initiated by House Bill 72 are reaping results in student achievement."

House Bill 72, the school reform bills passed in 1984, requires students to pass a basic skills test in math and English in order to receive a diploma. School districts must provide remediation to students to fail either or both sections of the test.

The test is administered for the first time when student are in the 11th grade. Student have at least four opportunities to pass the test.

National **GOP** governors meet with Nixon

PARSIPPANY, N.J. (AP) - Republican governors, assured by a

top aide to President Reagan that the Iran-Contra affair will not become another Watergate, are getting Richard M. Nixon's view of the new controversy.

Nixon, forced to resign the presidency in 1974 by the Watergate scandal, was sitting down with the governors in closed session today to discuss foreign policy.

Shortly after their session with Nixon, many of the governors planned to fly to Washington for a meeting with President Reagan.

Mitchell Daniels, presidential assistant for political affairs, told the governors Monday they should feel free to ask Reagan about the Iran-Contra controversy "if you so choose."

In a reference to Watergate, Daniels said, "Many Americans are troubled that we may relive the events of 1974, that somehow this nightmare hassle will return. It's not going to happen."

Daniels assured the governors: "There will be no coverup."

The session with Nixon, who lives in Saddle River, was arranged before the disclosures of the secret arms sales to Iran and the funneling of money to the Contra forces fighting to overthrow the leftist government of Nicaragua.

Frank J. Fahrenkopf Jr., chairman of the Republican National Committee, said the meeting was arranged by the Republican Governors Association

Gov. John Sununu of New Hampshire, chairman of the association, said Nixon could "give the governors insight into what we might be expecting in the next few months... I think it's a good opportunity to hear from somebody who was there and probably wishes he had a chance to do it over again."

Squabble over dogs leaves six dead

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) - A man who had threatened to "do some shooting" if he didn't get his dog back from his ex-girlfriend walked through her house with another woman and "executed" six sleeping people, police and neighbors say.

"The motive would appear to be so senseless and trivial that most of us couldn't even understand it," homicide Lt. Richard Brierly said Monday

David E. Welch, 28, and Rita Mae Lewis, 29, were arrested less than nine hours after the shootings Monday following a standoff with police at another house in south Oakland. Brierly said they would be

"It looks like they just walked through the house and murdered people," said Brierly. "These people were executed. They didn't have a chance to defend themselves at all."

Authorities did not immediately identify the victims, but the San Francisco Chronicle reported today that one was Welch's 16-year-old

Leslie Morgan, 21, and 3-month-old Dexter Welch were wounded and were hospitalized in stable condition, authorities said. Dexter is the son of David Welch, and Morgan was an old boyfriend whom Welch's ex-girlfriend had returned to, the Chronicle said.

Relatives and neighbors said Welch had been feuding with residents of the house since one of two pit bulldogs disappeared while

India death toll reaches 16

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Karnataka state was wracked by Moslem rioting and arson today, and one rioter was shot to death by police, the government's All-India Radio reported.

At least 16 people have died since Sunday from police gunfire in violent Moslem protests over an article in the largest Englishlanguage newspaper in the southern state.

The newscast said a curfew was extended in the ancient city of Mysore and a ban on public assembly imposed in other parts of the state, with a heavy police presence in many cities. Rock-throwing flared again this morning in Mysore and the state capital,

Bangalore, the United News of India reported. The government radio said Moslem violence spread today to the town of Tumkur, northeast of Bangalore, and one person was killed when riot police opened fire to scatter rampaging mobs. The rioters

tried to set fire to public property, it said. The broadcast said 76 people were arrested on rioting charges Tuesday in Mysore, raising the total number of arrests in the state to

more than 175. India's chief law enforcement official, Home Minister Buta Singh, appealed in Parliament on Monday night for people to remain calm.

The first violence started when thousands of Moslems walked in processions Sunday in Bangalore to protest a fiction story in the English-language Deccan Herald, which they claimed insulted the prophet Mohammed.

The story, entitled "Mohammed the Idiot," was about a mentally retarded, deaf mute named Mohammed who committed suicide. Moslem community leaders said it made derogatory references to the prophet Mohammed, founder of Islam.

Aquino to settle weapons dispute

MANILA, Philippines (AP) - Rebels today called on President Corazon Aquino to settle a dispute over their right to carry weapons during a planned cease-fire, saying her intervention would "make or break" the accord.

The dispute centers around statements by the military that it reserves the right to arrest members of the communist New People's Army seen brandishing weapons in populated areas during the 60-day truce, scheduled to take effect at noon Wednesday.

Officials of the Communist-dominated National Democratic Front, which signed the pact with the government Nov. 27, say the agreement does not require the rebels to surrender their arms.

Animals make great gifts

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) -Last year, Mary Palmer bought her friends some bees and part of a pig for Christmas. This year she's buying her 6-year-old nephew a rabbit.

But don't get the wrong idea. Palmer doesn't tie a red bow around the animals' necks and deliver scampering bunnies and squealing pigs to her friends and relatives at Christmastime.

Hers actually is a gift of food for destitute families in Third World countries, given in the name of those friends and relatives who might otherwise receive a gift they can't use or don't like.

For the past couple of years, the Albuquerque woman has been participating in Heifer Project International, a worldwide ecumenical organization that provides a variety of food-producing livestock - and training in their care - to needy families. The animals enable those families to produce food and income for themselves and to help their neighbors through sharing.

Palmer and thousands of others throughout the United States contribute money to the project, which supplies the animals to developing countries throughout the world.

"I think I do it just for the self-help, that it helps other people," Palmer said. "My nephew's already got a lot of toys and it's a good way to teach him that Christmas is a sharing

The friends, a retired minister and his wife, in whose name Palmer gave the bees and a share in the pig last year, said they couldn't have been happier with their gift.

"I didn't have a lot of money to spend on a gift," Palmer said. "I wanted to give them something and I knew they'd appreciate the fact that it goes to help other people. They were very pleased that I chose that way to show that I care about them."

On a recent Saturday, Palmer was working as a volunteer at an "Alternative Christmas Fair," an annual church project that stands apart from traditional holiday arts and crafts fairs.

This fair featured the Heifer Project and another project called "SELFHELP Crafts," a marketing outlet for skilled craftspeople from developing countries around the world. Baskets from the Philippines,

brass candlesticks from India and carved wooden Nativity sets from the West Bank join the locally made afghans, mittens and knitted tissue

Proceeds from SELFHELP Crafts, a worldwide organization run

primarily by volunteers under the auspices of the Mennonite Central Committee, are channeled back to the producers, helping them earn a living through their traditional crafts

items and the fair's bake sale go to the Heifer Project.

The Alternative Fair was sponsored by three Albuquerque churches - La Mesa Presbyterian; the Albuquerque Friends Church, a Quaker group; and Sandia Brethren in Christ, a Mennonite group.

The Rev. Howard Paul, pastor at La Mesa, said the Heifer Project helps people in developing nations improve their livestock and improve their economic clout. Some animals also have been given to farmers in this country, in states including Mississippi and Alabama, he said.

This year, Paul and his wife bought a share in a heifer to give in the name of Paul's late brother-in-law, a Virginia heifer farmer who died last

"The sentimental thing is I used to live overseas in Colombia and I could see the delivery system at work," Paul said. "I could see the benefit of having a brood sow or animals that grow well in a small part of land. They could produce meat and also income for the family.'

On the Heifer Project's "shopping list for the world" 50 cents will buy a chicken; \$20 will buy a flock of 40. Bees can be purchased for \$20 a colony or \$2 per share. A heifer costs \$750 or \$15 a share; a rabbit \$15 or \$1 a share. Goats, sheep and pigs all can be purchased for \$100 or \$5 per

People buying the animals as presents receive gift cards that can be sent to friends or relatives informing them that "a gift of (fill in the blank) has been sent in your honor through Heifer Project International to help a needy family help themselves."

According to a project flier, livestock in developing regions "can convert otherwise wasted forage from marginal land into muchneeded protein without competing with humans for cereal grains." The project supplies animals of superior genetic quality that are capable of producing more food than native animals from the available resources, the flier said.

Gretchen Geller of Albuquerque, who attended the fair, bought 10 chicks in the names of some of her family members.

"I guess I just like the idea of doing this," she said. "I get a little distracted with the old economic number done at Christmastime."

Study says teen-age pregnancy must be aggressively attacked

WASHINGTON (AP) - Teen-age tive use by all sexually active teensex, which results in a million pregnancies a year, must be countered with aggressive sex education programs and "diligent contraceptive use" to reduce births and abortions among the nation's youth, said a study released today.

An expert panel assembled by the National Research Council, following a two-year study of teen-age pregnancy, said "the highest priority" must be given to pregnancy prevention - including widespread distribution of birth control devices to youths.

The panel said the problem is so large and the reasons behind teenage sexuality so diverse, that no single approach can solve it. Different programs supported by government, business, religious groups, foundations and others are required, it said.

The report said it is mainly the responsibility of families to teach

human values and appropriate behavior to children. But it said private and public institutions, including government, should supplement this role.

preferable to unintended pregnancy, the legal options of abortion or adoption should be available to a young woman unable or unwilling to bear a child, the report said.

There is no scientific basis for restricting the availability of abortions to teen-agers, said the panel. adding that "minor adolescents should be encouraged, but not required, to involve their parents and partners in the decision-making process."

The panel also said society must avoid treating teen pregnancy as a problem solely of girls. The attitudes, motivations and behavior of boys are central to the problem and must get more attention, it said. The study, supported by five major

Unusual disease

DEAR DR. GOTT - At 22, after a lifetime of searching, my daughter was told she had Prader-Willi Syndrome. Few doctors are knowledgeable about this disease. What can you tell us about it'

DEAR READER - Prader-Willi syndrome is an unusual disease marked by lack of muscle tone, mental retardation and a phenomenal appetite. Children with the condition literally will eat everything in sight: It's not unusual for them to clean out the refrigerator in one sitting unless parents have padlocked the door. The cause is thought to be a lack of hormones from the pituitary gland or a malfunction of the brain's appetite center. Mild diabetes often accompanies the syndrome. The biochemical cause of Prader-Willi disease may be due to a chromosomal abnormality. The disease usually occurs sporadically, but familial cases have been

reported. DEAR DR. GOTT - On my package of K-Lyte there is a warning that in cases of hyperkalemia, it could

hyperkalemia? DEAR READER - Hyperkalemia is too much potassium in the bloodstream. Excess potassium causes nausea, diarrhea, muscle weakness and a form of heart stoppage called ventricular fibrillation. The product you are taking contains potassium, hence the warning about overdose.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I have had glaucoma for 30 years. I was able to keep the pressure down using a variety of drops until last year, when I had laser treatments. Now the pressure is up again. Should I have another laser treatment or should I try more drops? My doctor is so busy that I've had to tell him about the new drops

available DEAR READER - I don't know whether you are a candidate for further laser therapy or if you will need to take medicine. One way or another, the eye pressure must be kept down. An ophthalmologist can help you decide which type of treatment to use. Find one who is not too busy to give your eyes the attention they need.

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

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
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

Herd advances to state 4A grid semifinals

CANYON -- The Hereford Whitefaces got off to a quick offensive start, and staged a great defensive effort to defeat the Wichita Falls Hirschi Huskies 17-12 in a state class 4A quarterfinal battle Saturday at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium.

The victory puts the Herd in the state semifinals against the McKinney Lions on Saturday. The game will be played at 8 p.m. at Texas Stadium in Irving.

Last Saturday's game was a marked difference from Hereford's two playoff games. Hereford scored two first half touchdowns and then led 17-0 in the fourth quarter.

In the 26-17 bi-district win over Big Spring, Hereford was behind 17-7 going into the fourth quarter. And against Cleburne, Hereford trailed the Yellowjackets 7-6 before a miracle finish with a field goal with. two seconds left gave the Whitefaces a 9-7 victory.

The win over Hirschi also was the best overall team effort of the season, in the mind of Herd Coach Don Cumpton

'We were ahead for a change. We didn't have to come from behind. That was nice," Cumpton said.

'We played well, both offensively and defensively and also with our kicking game - our best game of the season," he adds.

The Herd's defensive effort was certainly one of the best of the season, according to statistics.

Hereford allowed Hirschi only 52 yards rushing, the fewest allowed this season. The previous best of the year was allowing Clovis 65 yards.

Hirschi recorded only 10 first downs in the game. Hereford's best defensive efforts against opponents as far as first downs are concerned were nine versus Andrews and 10 versus Frenship before Saturday's

Also, Hirschi had just three first downs rushing, the fewest the Herd has allowed in one game this year. The previous best was limiting Clovis to four first downs rushing.

Two other statistics also bring out the great defense of the day defense in the opponents' first down and third down plays. Hirschi averaged 3.7 yards per game in first down plays, the sixth time this season that the Whitefaces kept op-

In 13 first down plays, Hirschi was able to get first downs just four times. That was the fourth best defense in third down plays this year for the Whitefaces. In seven of the 13 games, Herd opponents have achieved first downs in fewer than half of their third down plays.

The Herd defense was led by linebacker Michael Phibbs with 12 tackles, and by defensive end Richard Castillo with nine tackles.

Defensive end Derrell Page had seven tackles, strong safety Ricky Ruiz six tackles, and three others each had five tackles - defensive tackle Lee Young, linebacker Bobby Medina, and defensive end Kyle

Phibbs and Medina each sacked Hirschi quarterback Keith Stevenson twice, and Castillo and Page each sacked Stevenson once.

The game began as a defensive battle, with no more than one first down recorded in the first three possessions of the game - two by Hirschi and one by Hereford.

The Whitefaces began their second possession at their own 13-yard line. A 16-yard gain by Vincent Brown and a seven-yard gain by Mark Artho got the Herd into good field position.

In two straight third down plays, the Whitefaces converted for a first down after the officials had to call for a measurement. The last of those measurements was at the Hereford 49-yard line.









Hugh Downs remembers his many hours before cameras

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Hugh Downs estimates he's spent 10,000 hours on television. That figures out to more than a year - nearly 60 weeks of nonstop talking, 24 hours a day

"I've worked on so many different shows and done so many shows at the same time," Downs said in an interview. "I once said I'd done everything on radio and television except play-by-play sports. Then I remembered I'd covered a boxing match in Lima, Ohio, in 1939."

In 1935, Dizzy Dean of the St. Louis Cardinals won 28 games and his brother Paul had 19 victories. They also had 10 saves between them but the Cardinals were beaten out for the pennant by the Chicago Cubs.

The largest drawbridge in the United States is the Marine Parkway Bridge, which spans parts of Jamaica Bay in New York.

He was host of NBC's "Home Show" in the 1950s. He was Jack Paar's sidekick on NBC's "The Tonight Show" for five years. He was host of the daytime game show "Concentration" for 11 years. He was host of NBC's "Today Show" for nine

He is currently co-host of ABC's "20-20."

"This is the first time in my whole TV career I've only done one program at a time," he said: "Maybe I was insecure in the past and didn't want all my eggs in one basket. That's how I racked up 10,000 hours."

Johnny Carson, host of "The Tonight Show" for nearly 25 years, has logged only 7,100 hours, according to Downs. "But Carson never did 10 hours a week on one show and another show at the same time."

Downs tells about his many hours on the air in "On Camera: My 10,000 Hours on Television," published by Putnam.

His other books include an autobiography that he wrote "rather arrogantly in my '30s" in 1957 and "A Shoal of Stars," about a 1965 sailing voyage across the Pacific, he said.

Downs began his broadcasting career at the age of 18 as a \$12-a-week announcer on a small Ohio radio station. He worked in radio until television came along. He was an announcer in Chicago for "Kukla, Fran & Ollie" and "Hawkins Falls," which he said was television's first soap opera. In 1954, he went to New York for "The Home Show.'

Downs divides his time between homes in Arizona and New York. "I travel a lot," he said. "My wife travels with me. We hope to be in Spain at the end of the year for a piece on Segovia for '20-20.""

He is co-host of "20-20" with Barbara Walters, who was also his partner during part of his time on "The Today Show."

The Gallup Organization interviewed 1,013 randomly selected people by telephone last February for the survey. which had a potential sampling error of plus or minus four percentage points.

We're just fortunate that we had no injuries," said Carol Bryant, manager of the St. Bernard Parish Cultural Center, where the beauty pageant was held Sunday. "I significantly more likely than was really worried about all

Promoter Ann Berry blamed the trouble on a handful of "rowdies" who stormed the stage after the pageant, which began Sunday morning, ran about four hours behind schedule by evening. They demanded refunds of the \$40 entry fee.

The Sunday pageant, to declare the "Cutest Kid in the World," was to begin shortly after 10 a.m. registration, but it was nearly four hours behind schedule by early evening, Mrs. Berry said.

Frustrated and tired of waiting, she said, some parents of younger contestants began demanding the ref their entry fees. She said there were 260 contestants, although some parents say there were 500.

An "unauthorized person" connected with the contest

about \$1,200 was returned. Mrs. Barry said. "One woman was a troublemaker. She got up and tried to hit me on the stage at 5:30 p.m. She hit the P.A. After about 40 minutes, the

contest resumed, she said, but about 7:30 p.m. another mother climbed onstage. snatched the microphone from her and urged the remaining parents to get their money back and help themselves to trophies.

In the ruckus, parents took cameras, watches that were intended as prizes, a computer and a cash box with door receipts. Mrs. Berry said. "Somebody from the troublemakers jumped up on stage and said, 'Hey I'm going to get my trophy.' That's when I fainted and they took me off the stage.

"The 'Cutest Kid in The World' trophy was over six feet tall. It went down an aisle with two men fighting over it. I can't believe it.'

Security guards escorted the pageant staff to their cars, Mrs. Bryant said.

"I've never been to a beauty contest that turned into a riot," said Sandra Waller of Buras, whose 1-year-old daughter Shabonne was a contestant.

'I've never seen one run as late as this one, or as badly,' said Gail Adams, a New Orleans mother whose daughter, though just 2 years

began giving refunds, and old, has trophies from more than 30 such competitions.

"I know she meant well. said Jewell Hoffman, another mother. "I was very, very upset at the way those adults were acting. What kind of example are they setting for their children?"

By late Monday, nine mothers and fathers had complained to a justice of peace whose jurisdiction includes the pageant offices in Metairie. They contend that Mrs. Berry and her staff were hopelessly disorganized. perhaps dishonest

Mrs. Adams complained that a trip to Disney World promise to the first 325 entrants turned out to be only two nights' lodging in a hotel and required the user to pay a \$10 processing fee. Some parents doubted the validity of promised magazine and television modeling contracts for the winners.

Mrs. Berry said she never claimed the trip was more than accommodations, and that the top two baby beauties would appear in magazine and television ads for other contests her company is pro-

She said a friend kidded her recently about an Oct. 12 contest in Pittsburgh, where parents stormed the stage and grabbed trophies. ". laughed and laughed. I said no way anything like that will happen to us.



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
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
