

## Staff of 300 assigned for \$1-billion study

# DOE project office to locate here

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) will locate the offices of its Salt Repository Project and integrating contractor in Hereford and field services personnel in Amarillo, it was announced this morning.

The Hereford offices will house about 50 DOE and 250 contractor support staff assigned to undertake detailed characterization of a 9-square-mile area in bedded salt in Deaf Smith County to determine its suitability for a high-level radioactive waste repository. The study is estimated to cost about \$1 billion.

The project's field services contractor, which will manage geotechnical and other field studies, as well as the core and other field

samples storage facility will be located in Amarillo.

A third office, for the project's exploratory shaft construction contractor, will be established next winter at the 61-acre site about 25 miles north of Hereford. This office will be established after completion of the land access and acquisition process.

Specific locations for the offices will be announced within the next several months, following market surveys and compliance with other DOE real estate regulations, announced DOE.

Linda McClain, Texas project manager who will be moving to Hereford soon, said DOE will try to locate the Hereford offices as soon as possible, "and we anticipate most of

the people moving to Hereford this summer."

Tom LeGate, city representative for the local Waste Deposit Impact Committee, said this morning the group was "very pleased that the DOE and Battelle offices were selected as the ones to be housed in Hereford." He added that this represents the "more stable personnel" for the project.

"We understand this number will be expanded to 380 to 400 staff people in 1988-89, and about 200 will be located at the site office when it is established," LeGate added.

Asked about the increase in number of people to be assigned here, McClain said the estimate in the Environmental Assessment was based on a number of staff remain-

ing in Columbus, Ohio. That has been changed and most of the staff will move here.

The department had previously announced that it was planning to move about 300 people to the three offices this year. The total workforce, after the offices are established at the site, now appears to be around 1,000.

Meanwhile, 10 people from the DOE Salt Repository Project Office and the Office of Nuclear Waste Isolation (ONWI), operated by Battelle Memorial Institute, the integrating contractor, are moving from offices in Columbus to temporary office trailers to be placed on land leased by DOE near Vega.

Staff at these temporary offices will be available on a daily basis beginning March 2 to respond to

questions about job and contracting opportunities for local people and will assist in locating permanent office facilities for the project. The process of relocating DOE and Battelle technical and management staff from the Columbus office is expected to take about six months.

Rep. Beau Boulter, Republican of Amarillo, said this morning that he was "not worried that this increased presence means they believe Deaf Smith County is more desirable than the sites in Nevada and Washington." He added that it is "obvious" that one of DOE's ideas is to become such a significant economic presence in the area that the public will be more welcome to the idea than at present.

Site characterization, which en-

compasses studies to determine the suitability of the bedded salt site approximately 2,500 feet below the surface for a repository, is expected to require more than five years and represent an investment of approximately \$1 billion. Similar studies also will be conducted in a geologic formation called tuff at Yucca Mountain in Nevada and in basalt at the Hanford reservation in Washington.

These activities are part of DOE's Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, which is responsible for managing the nation's high-level nuclear waste. The Nuclear Waste Policy Act directs DOE to develop a waste disposal system for the permanent disposal of spent nuclear fuel and high-level radioactive waste.

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## State jobless rate steady in January

DALLAS (AP) — The Texas job market held steady as the new year began, with unemployment last month unchanged at 9.6 percent from the end of 1986, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"The outlook, certainly with unemployment leveling off, albeit at a high rate, is more favorable now than a few months ago," Regional Commissioner Bryan Richey said today.

The number of Texans seeking employment rose by 263,000 last month from January a year ago, when the unemployment rate was 6.7 percent, Richey said.

In the first month of 1987, 796,000 Texans were looking for work, while in December, 804,000 jobless sought employment as the unemployment

rate stood at 9.6 percent. However, the number of employed also declined to just under 7.5 million, according to statistics.

Richey said last month's figures indicate that the worst may be over and that joblessness in the state is bottoming out. The state's unemployment rate has been stable for the last six months, hovering around 9.6 percent, he said.

Nationwide, the economy created 375,000 to 450,000 jobs last month to hold the civilian unemployment rate at 6.7 percent, the lowest in nearly seven years, officials said.

Unemployment in Texas has been above 8 percent since last February, when the job market began to receive first effects of a slide in oil prices.

## Cablevision to revamp system by end of June

Hereford Cablevision announced Thursday that its expansion and system revamp has officially started and should be complete by the end of June at a cost of \$700,000.

Lloyd Ames, manager, said that by the end of June all customers should be hooked over to the new system which will have four to five more channels on basic service with up to two more options on pay television channels. It will probably be March or April before the new channels will be announced, pending contract agreements.

Rates could go up \$2 to \$3 on the basic service for the extra channels.

Approximately 4,100 customers have the basic cable and about 40 percent of those have pay television.

Ames said there should not be any interruption of signals on the current system while the revamping is done. The new system also will rectify the interference customers are having with Cinemax.

Bigham Cable Construction Co., of Gulf Breeze, Fla., will be the contractor for the work which is to include about 60 miles of cable to be laid. The revamping will be completed in sections, but all customers will get the new channels at once.

## Bentsen introduces omnibus trade bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and 14 supporting senators announced the introduction of a sweeping trade bill they said would tighten Congress' reins on the president and give trade laws some teeth.

"We are today introducing bipartisan legislation designed to shrink the U.S. trade deficit by encouraging growth in trade worldwide," the Democratic chairman of the Senate Finance Committee said Thursday.

Bentsen said 55 senators had signed on as co-sponsors to the Omnibus Trade Act of 1987. The measure would constrict the president's ability to negotiate trade agreements by having him report to Congress more often.

It would also toughen enforcement of trade laws designed to keep the world trading market free to open competition, Bentsen said. The U.S. trade deficit for 1986 is projected at \$173 billion.

Sen. Jack Danforth, R-Mo., the ranking minority member on the Finance Committee, joined Bentsen

in hailing the measure as a life-saver for American industry and predicted President Reagan would go along with most of its provisions.

"The question is can we do something the president can go along with. I think we can and so does Senator Bentsen," Danforth said. "I don't believe it's time the United States crawled into a hole of protectionism."

Bentsen said he met with Reagan about the trade imbalance last month and was encouraged that the president showed signs of a reversal in his position of last year that there should be no changes in trade laws.

"He told me that he would send a trade proposal to Congress by late this month," Bentsen said. But he added that Reagan showed no abatement in his opposition to an oil import fee to provide relief to domestic producers.

Bentsen said the trade bill would send a signal to countries that have enjoyed trade surpluses in recent years that they are living in "a fool's world" if they continue unfair protectionist practices.

## State Wave of border violence reported

RIO GRANDE CITY, Texas (AP) — Sheriff Gene Falcon says he fears recent attacks on Starr County ranchers by illegal aliens foreshadow a wave of violence in the hilly county on the Rio Grande. The sheriff warned ranchers this week against venturing on their land alone as investigators searched for two illegal aliens who stabbed a man in the neck, bound him with baling twine and left him to die.

The man was burning cactus and tending cattle near the Starr-Hidalgo county line when he was attacked Tuesday afternoon, investigators said.

"The bulk of this stuff is border banditry," said Al Helgeson, acting chief of the McAllen sector of the Border Patrol.

Starr County, a known corridor for drug smugglers, "is one area where a lot of aliens are directly involved in heavy criminal activity involving big bucks, namely narcotics," he said.

## Prisons stay closed another day

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Prisoners are being given mattresses on the floor in two county jails, but despite the release of more than 100 inmates, officials said the population in state prisons remained too large to accept more convicts today.

The prison system remained closed Thursday, a day after officials said the number of inmates had surpassed a 95 percent of capacity limit set to curb crowding.

It was the second time in a month prison doors were closed to new admissions.

On Wednesday, the Texas Department of Corrections' 26 units were closed when the population reached 38,472, or 95.21 percent of capacity — 86 inmates over the cap.

The closing came after 200 inmates were admitted, but only about 68 were released, pushing the population even higher in the nation's second largest prison system. Wednesday's midnight count, announced Thursday, was 95.34 percent, or 38,523 inmates — 135 over the limit.

About 120 were released Thursday, officials said.

"We'll have to have a few more days like that," TDC spokesman Charles Brown said. "Actually, it would be good if we had a week like that."

## Treasurer says cash will run out

AUSTIN (AP) — The state treasury may join the list of economic failures in Texas unless the Legislature passes a tax increase to begin Sept. 1, state Treasurer Ann Richards says.

Ms. Richards told the Senate Finance Committee Thursday that the state will run out of cash and won't be able to pay its bills this fall.

"Seven months from now, we are facing the same kind of serious jeopardy we had been facing before," Ms. Richards said. "There's a lot of banks closing across the state and we can close our bank too. Of course, the last resort is having to close your doors."

Last year, the state borrowed \$600 million through cash management notes to avoid bouncing checks. That money will be paid back in August, Ms. Richards said.

"But we cannot issue cash management notes next year unless we are certain that the funds will be available to repay them," she said.

Ms. Richards said the state must enact the tax increase by Sept. 1 because it has to make a payment Sept. 23 to the Foundation School Fund.

Gov. Bill Clements' budget proposal won't help the cash shortfall, either, because many of his suggestions rely on money that may not be collected soon enough, she said.

## National AIDS probe on Liberace begins

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — Liberace's fans and family gathered to attend today's memorial service, while officials rejected his death certificate and began an investigation into whether the flamboyant entertainer had AIDS.

Spokesmen for Liberace repeatedly have denied published reports that the 67-year-old pianist had the disease.

Dr. Ronald Daniels, who signed the death certificate, said Liberace's death Wednesday was caused by cardiac arrest due to congestive heart failure brought on by subacute encephalopathy, an inflammation of the brain.

"We're not disputing the cause of death," said coroner's office spokesman Sabas Rosas. "We simply want to conduct an independent investigation, which we have to do in these cases. We're not doing anything different in this case. We're following protocol."

State law requires coroners to investigate deaths suspected of being caused by contagious disease, and it is Riverside County policy to investigate deaths that occur in the home or without a physician present.

The county health department refused to accept the death certificate Thursday, when officials discovered the coroner had not been contacted as required, Coroner Raymond Carrillo said.

## Was Conrail crew watching TV?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Authorities began dragging a river near the recent Amtrak accident in Maryland in search of a television after a tipster raised the possibility that two train crewmen involved in the crash were watching a football game.

The National Transportation Safety Board disclosed Thursday that an anonymous telephone caller urged authorities to look at a certain location of the river near Baltimore, saying someone was seen throwing a television into the water shortly after the Amtrak train collided with a Conrail locomotive.

A National Football League playoff game between the New York Giants and San Francisco 49ers began about 30 minutes before the Jan. 4 accident, and several dramatic plays occurred in the minutes just before the collision.

A spokesman for the Baltimore County Police Department said divers stopped searching the Gunpowder River near the accident site late Thursday afternoon without finding anything but that a resumption of the search has not been ruled out.

Investigators have been focusing on the conduct of the Conrail engineer, Ricky Gates, and brakeman, Edward Cromwell, whose locomotive ran a series of signal warnings before skidding into the path of the Amtrak passenger train. Sixteen people were killed and 175 injured in the accident.

## NRC would waive emergency plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff is proposing a rules change to allow startup of nuclear power plants even if local authorities refuse to plan for accidents and utility operators cannot guarantee emergency assistance to area residents.

The draft regulation would not relieve any currently licensed plants from their emergency obligations. Rather, it appears primarily designed to cut through political obstacles to two virtually completed, multibillion-dollar reactors — the Seabrook plant, just inside New Hampshire from the Massachusetts line, and the Shoreham plant on Long Island.

State and community leaders, including Govs. Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts and Mario Cuomo of New York, are attempting to scuttle licensing of the plants by boycotting the disaster planning now required by the NRC before any startup.

Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., who obtained copies of the NRC staff proposal late Thursday and made it available to reporters, called it "an outrage. It slaps the face of governors charged with protecting the health and safety of their citizens."

As Motsie Blevins celebrates her 94th birthday this week she admits that she has slowed down some and there are some activities she has given up.

"I used to paint, that picture of the horse over there is one of my son's favorites, but my hands are too shaky to paint now," comments the cheery lady.

A one time professional seamstress, Motsie now uses her sewing machine only for mending.

Friends and neighbors once decorated their homes for showers and parties from the flower garden Motsie tended with care. Two years

ago she quit trying to keep up with the yard work and it is this activity which she misses the most. "It hurt me worse than giving up anything else to give up gardening," she states.

But far from dwelling on the negative changes aging has brought to her, Motsie concentrates on those things which she still can do.

Fiercely independent she continues to keep her home spotless. With organizational skills which make her the envy of family and friends, Motsie keeps her house in order. Each salt shaker, each napkin has its place. This is an especially incredible achievement as she suffers from arthritis which limits her mo-

tions and prevents her from lifting her arm above shoulder level.

Using a towel rack mounted at a level to support her arm Motsie rolls her fine white hair each day. Her house is full of unique inventions and gadgets she has fashioned to enable her to continue her independent lifestyle.

A large part of that lifestyle is her involvement with the Central Church of Christ of which she is a long time member. Her church is so important to her that when she became uncomfortable with driving at night she sold her home on Avenue D and bought a new one, across the street from the church.

Church members watch to see

their friend walk across the street and usually meet her at the end of the driveway as she says, "Just to make sure I'm alright."

Motsie was born in Indian Territory, in what is now Ardmore, Okla., on Feb. 7, 1893. She and her husband, W.H. moved to Hereford from Lubbock in 1942. Mr. Blevins assisted in building the prisoner of war camp located just outside of Hereford during World War II.

Blevins remained in Hereford as a builder. He and son L.R., built tract houses in northeast Hereford where a street is named in honor of the family.

The world has change during Motsie's life but she doesn't spend her time worrying about the differences. She states, "I have had a good life and I don't bother to worry about other people's business."

The change of which she envies today's young women concerns fashion. She tells, "At one time we lived eight miles north of Hereford on a farm. Well, you can imagine we worked hard and we had to wear those dresses."

Ever inventive, Motsie made herself split skirts, or as she calls them, culottes.

She remembers, "I'd be wearing my culottes and working then someone would pull up out front and I tell you I could unzip them culottes and be in a dress by the time they got to the door." She is very admiring of today's fashionable slacks for women.

These days Motsie's life is far from empty because she fills her days reading, working in her home and visiting with friends. Her favorite day-to-day companion is her dog, Yogi. Trained to fetch her paper and to enter only certain rooms of the house, the dog keeps a watchful eye over Motsie and is well rewarded with the care Motsie gives in return.

The Blevins' son, L.R. and his wife Lillian are now visiting from Carmichael, Calif. They and friends will honor Motsie with a reception in her home tomorrow from 2-5 p.m.

## Reagan turns 76 without fanfare

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, still shunning questions from reporters about the Iranian arms sale controversy, is turning 76 today without any of the fanfare that has marked some of his previous birthdays in the White House.

First lady Nancy Reagan said Thursday there will be a big birthday cake on the table as she and the president celebrate with friends tonight in a White House dining room.

Some of Reagan's past birthdays have been celebrated in public, with Mrs. Reagan bringing a cake into the White House briefing room or onto the stage at a speaking event. No public appearances were scheduled for today.

Mrs. Reagan told reporters the president, who has had no give-and-take sessions with journalists in recent weeks, would wait until he had more information before answering questions about the crisis brought on by secret arms sales to Iran.

But she scoffed at stories that have appeared suggesting that Reagan, the oldest man ever to serve as president, might be slipping mentally.

"I thought they were ridiculous," she said. "And anybody who has been in meetings with him lately would tell you the same thing."

The first lady suggested that her husband's recuperation from his prostate surgery on Jan. 5 might also be a reason that he has not scheduled any news conferences or other opportunities for reporters to query him.

She said he was "all recovered" from his surgery, but White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said that, although in "excellent health," the president will continue on an abbreviated schedule for a few more weeks.

"The president still has a restricted schedule but his recovery is proceeding exceptionally well. He is gradually assuming a heavier daily schedule," Fitzwater told reporters.

Physicians said recovery from the operation, for relief of an enlarged prostate gland, generally takes about six weeks, during which the

president is advised to avoid strenuous exercise.

When asked why Reagan has not been available for questions from reporters even though he has begun making some appearances, Fitzwater said, "The schedule has been restricted for the last few weeks and it probably will continue to be so for another couple weeks."

So, for all the miserable daughters who feel smothered by their overbearing mothers, I say, change the pattern of your life so it is not repeated.

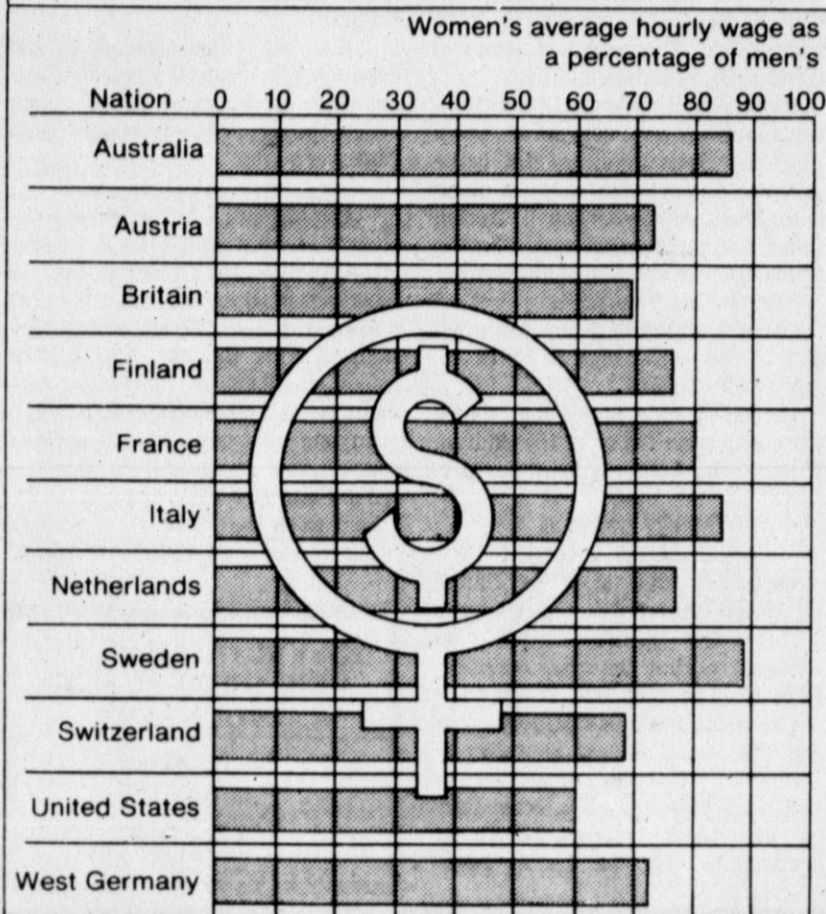

117-111 over Seattle

## Spurs win 7th straight

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — For the first time since 1981, the San Antonio Spurs have won seven in a row, putting them one game shy of a club record.

The Spurs defeated the Seattle SuperSonics, 117-111, Thursday night.

That put the team close to record eight-game streaks set in 1970 and again in the 1978-79 season. They play the Rockets Feb. 10 at Houston after the All-Star break.

"We made a few mistakes in the fourth and they pushed us a little out of our game," Spurs coach Bob Weiss said.

"We had some turnovers and missed shots (the team hit just 21 percent of its tries in the fourth), but then we steadied and held on."

The Spurs held a 70-51 halftime lead.

San Antonio led by as many as 24 points in the third quarter when the Sonics stormed back to within two points, 111-109, with 2:25 left in the game.

Forward Mike Mitchell grabbed an Alvin Robertson shot blocked by Alton Lister and fired it back in from seven feet to put the Spurs back up by four and the Sonics never got closer.

Mitchell, rumored to be on the trading block, had not seen action in the last five games.

Spurs guard Jon Sundvold scored a career-high 25 points, including two long sailing three-pointers. He fueled the Spurs engine with 10 assists, including bounce passes for the easy layups and slams.

David Greenwood worked his way to 18 rebounds and 20 points and had five assists.

Seattle was led by forward Xavier McDaniel with 26 points and Maurice Lucas with 22.

In other NBA games Thursday, the last night of play before Sunday's All-Star Game in Seattle, Houston beat Golden State 120-110, Washington defeated Cleveland 94-85, Portland edged the Los

Angeles Lakers 105-104, Utah defeated the Los Angeles Clippers 126-103, New York beat New Jersey 135-118, Indiana downed Detroit 98-93, Milwaukee beat Chicago 120-105, and Phoenix stopped Denver 113-110.

**Rockets 120, Warriors 110**  
Akeem Olajuwon scored 21 points, grabbed 11 rebounds and blocked nine shots to lead Houston past Golden State.

The Rockets led the entire game. Chris Mullin scored 20 points for the visiting Warriors.

**Bullets 94, Cavaliers 85**  
Move over, Akeem and Ralph. The NBA's Twin Towers are now in Washington.

Moses Malone led a third-quarter charge and Manute Bol blocked 12 shots Thursday night as Washington beat the Cleveland Cavaliers 94-85.

Malone, one of the best established big men in basketball at 6-foot-10, and Bol, at 7-foot-7 and still awkward in his second year, have rarely been on the court at the same time this season.

"The most we've played together was a minute or so before last week," said Bol, who shared 15 minutes of playing time with Malone against Cleveland.

Bol and Malone formed a pretty imposing front line, akin to Houston's pairing of 7-foot Akeem Olajuwon and 7-foot-4 Ralph Sampson. But, at least for the next six weeks, the Rockets' Twin Towers are under repair because of a knee injury to Sampson.

Terry Porter scored 18 points, including two game-winning foul shots with four seconds left, as Portland won for the first time in 11 games against the Lakers.

**Knicks 135, Nets 118**  
Patrick Ewing scored 38 points with 15-for-19 shooting from the field and Gerald Wilkins scored nine of his career-high 34 points during an 18-0 streak in the fourth quarter as New York pummeled New Jersey, han-

ding the Nets their eighth straight loss.

**Pacers 98, Pistons 93**  
Vern Fleming scored 24 points and Chuck Person added 22 as Indiana ended its seven-game losing streak by beating Detroit.

Isiah Thomas scored 33 points, 19 in the fourth quarter, as Detroit had its three-game winning streak ended.

Ricky Pierce scored 32 points and Terry Cummings 29 as host Milwaukee beat Chicago.

The loss was the Bulls' sixth straight on the road.

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## Many free agents remain unsigned

### Spring training nears

Tim Raines could put the Los Angeles Dodgers back on top. Bob Horner might do the same for the Toronto Blue Jays and Lance Parrish would give the St. Louis Cardinals a chance.

Rich Gedman could fill a hole in Houston. Andre Dawson might make Detroit dangerous.

Spring training starts in less than two weeks in places like Vero Beach, Clearwater and Phoenix. But for many teams, the baseball season will begin in limbo.

This is the time of year when rosters are always uncertain. Which of those left-handers can overcome arm problems and become the missing piece of the pitching puzzle? Can the young stallion beat out the fading slugger in left field? Is there a good-finding shortstop among the bunch?

Such questions seem important now. By midseason, they may be meaningless. The rookie sensation is back in Double-A because he can't hit a curve, and the lefty is out of the rotation because he can't throw one over the plate.

With apologies to the likes of Vince Coleman and Calvin Schiraldi, how

often does that maybe-yes, maybe-no player in spring turn out to be summer's hero?

But this year is different. Much different.

Never before have so many players who could make an impact in October been floating around so freely in February. And when the difference between first-place and first-plane-home can be so small, never have so many good teams still faced critical needs that could be filled with the available talent.

Meanwhile, high-priced free agents like Raines, Parrish, Gedman, Horner and Dawson are sitting at home, occasionally going through the now-seemingly routine of turning down contract offers for less than they could have gotten from the clubs they departed.

The Dodgers have wanted a replacement for center fielder Ken Landreaux for two years, and need a sparkplug to help them rebound in the National League West. Raines could be the exactly what they're looking for.

From the time the Cardinals lost the 1985 World Series, Manager Whitey Herzog said the club's No. 1 priority was getting a catcher. Since then, they've traded for Mike Heath, tried Mike Lavalliere and Alan Knicely, and are still searching. A power hitter like Parrish could be the perfect answer, even though the Cardinals are saying they do not want him because of back problems.

The Blue Jays were inclined to dump all of their designated hitters after reaching the 1985 playoffs. Instead, not able to find anyone else, they wound up keeping Cliff Johnson. Wouldn't they rather have Horner?

The Boston Red Sox, in the meantime, could use Gedman. He was their starting catcher until Jan. 8, when he rejected a three-year, \$2.65 million offer and became a free agent, ineligible to re-join the club until May 1.

Many Boston players have said the team should re-sign him when the

rules allow, and the Red Sox have said they will leave their offer on the table.

So say Boston does re-sign him. Where does that leave the Red Sox and their hopes of repeating in the American League East?

For the first month of the season, Boston's catcher would be — at this point — Marc Sullivan. He is a .200 career hitter and son of the team's chief executive officer. So what is the difference between Gedman and Sullivan for a month? A few victories perhaps, and maybe another division title.

Some of Boston's other AL East rivals are dealing with the same predicament. Detroit, minus Parrish, will shuffle Heath, Matt Nokes and Dwight Lowry behind the plate. The New York Yankees, needing starting pitching, will do without Ron Guidry, albeit he is coming off his worst season.

Teams continue to say they cannot pay the high salaries Raines & Co. want, claiming they cannot afford to win at that price.

But, dollars and cents notwithstanding, good sense continues to say there are a lot of clubs and players — and possible pennants — lingering in limbo these days.

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## Basketball Hall of Fame to induct five players this year

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — For the first time in its 28 years, all of the inductees to the Basketball Hall of Fame in one year will be players. And these five men could play.

Walt Frazier, Rick Barry and Pete Maravich, three men known for their varied styles of play during the 1970s, and Bob Houbregs and Bobby Wanzer, who played during the 1940s and 1950s, have been selected for induction into the Hall of Fame, it was announced Thursday.

In each of the previous years when the Hall of Fame announced inductions, there was at least one non-player honored. It will be all players this year when the ceremonies are held on May 5.

Frazier narrowly missed selection each of the past two years. He is the fifth player from the New York Knicks' 1973 championship to be inducted.

Frazier, who lives in his native Atlanta, joined the Knicks in 1967 after playing college ball at Division II Southern Illinois. He was named to six National Basketball Association all-star and seven all-defensive teams during his 13 years with the Knicks and Cleveland. In the 1973 championship game he had 36 points, 19 assists and seven rebounds.

Frazier's backcourtmate on that team, Earl Monroe, was among 11 persons selected by a screening committee for possible induction, but he failed to receive the 18 votes needed for election from the 24-member Honors Committee.

Barry is now a television sportscaster. He was named to all-star teams 10 times during a 14-year professional career that included four years in the American Basketball Association with Oakland, Washington and New York and 10 years in the NBA with Golden State, with which he won an NBA title, and Houston.

Maravich, the nation's top collegiate scorer for three years at Louisiana State, still holds the NCAA career scoring record of 3,667 points in 83 games, and points scored in one season, 1,381 in 1969, when he averaged 44.2 points a game.

He led the NBA in scoring in 1977. He was named to four all-star teams during his 10-year career, which included stints with Atlanta, New Orleans, Utah and Boston.

Houbregs, a three-time All-American, was the University of Washington's leading scorer in 1953, when the Huskies finished third in the NCAA tournament, scoring 49 points against Idaho, 45 against Seattle and 42 against Louisiana State. He played professionally for the Pistons, both in Fort Wayne and Detroit, the Baltimore Bullets and briefly in Boston and Milwaukee.

Wanzer, 66, played for the Rochester Royals for 10 years before retiring in 1957. In 1962, he was named the first basketball coach at St. John Fisher College in Rochester and has held that post ever since.

## DR. GOTT Chelation therapy doesn't work

DEAR DR. GOTT — Since there is apparently no prescription medicine to remove arterial plaque, what do you think of oral chelation?

DEAR READER — Chelation is the bonding of one metal to another to remove a toxic compound from the body. It is useful in treating poisoning from heavy metals, such as lead. Chelation to retard or reverse arteriosclerotic plaque is quackery. No valid scientific study has ever shown chelation therapy to be of benefit in treating arteriosclerosis.

DEAR DR. GOTT — Are hair dyes dangerous? Are the chemicals absorbed through the scalp and into the blood?

DEAR READER — For the average person, hair dyes are not dangerous. However, some people experience allergic reactions to the compounds. Although the dyes are not absorbed through the skin, they can cause rashes and hair loss in susceptible individuals.

DEAR DR. GOTT — In the past five years I have developed a few doz-

en fatty tumors, mostly on my torso. Could large and frequent doses of antibiotics have contributed to this problem?

DEAR READER — Antibiotics do not contribute to the formation of benign fatty tumors (lipomas). No one knows why these growths appear; the tendency to develop lipomas may be inherited.
