
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More snow blankets Hereford area

Almost a foot on ground

Three to four inches of snowfall Monday night and early today layered onto the six inches from Saturday night to pile up a foot of snow across Deaf Smith County.

KPAN Radio reported winds of 45 mph and six inches of snow Saturday night for a moisture content of .44 of an inch. Drifts were reported up to three feet deep. Monday night's moisture content had not been measured at press time today.

The chilly front caused the Monday morning low to dip to 4 degrees.

Today's forecast calls for an 80 percent chance of snow which is to reduce to flurries tonight. The low tonight will be in the lower teens with winds northeast 10 to 15 mph. Wednesday should be partly cloudy and warmer, with a high in the 40s.

Icy roads have prompted travelers advisories for throughout the Texas Panhandle.

Travelers advisories also were in effect through tonight for the South Plains and far West Texas and in the Permian Basin and Concho Valley tonight and Wednesday because of icy and snow-packed roads.

Forecasts called for mostly cloudy skies over West Texas with scattered area of snow through tonight in the

Panhandle, South Plains and far West Texas. Over North Texas, skies will be increasingly cloudy and some rain is expected in East Texas. It will be cloudy and cool over South Texas with scattered light rain expected over most areas.

Lows tonight will be in the lower teens in the Panhandle, and the 20s over the rest of West Texas, the 20s and 30s over North Texas and mostly in the 30s in South Texas, ranging from the 20s in the Hill Country to the 40s in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Highs Wednesday will be in the 30s and 40s over West Texas, the 40s in North Texas and South Texas and in the 50s in the Big Bend area of Southwest Texas.

Early morning temperatures were in the 20s north of a line from El Paso to Midland to Abilene to Dallas to Texarkana and in the 30s over Central Texas and in the 40s in South Texas. Extremes ranged from 20 at Wichita Falls to 58 at Brownsville.

Other early morning temperatures around the state included 25 at Amarillo, 29 at Fort Worth, 32 at Waco, 38 at Austin, 50 at Corpus Christi, 37 at Houston, 31 at San Angelo, 25 at Lubbock and Midland and 26 at El Paso.

Election date set, trash bids okayed

Hereford City Commission Monday night officially set the city election for April 4 and authorized the city manager to solicit bids on trash containers for the health department.

There will be five places up for election on the city commission. Under the new single-member district system, the commission will expand to seven members with five members representing specific areas and two to be elected at-large.

The mayor's post and Places 1 and 3 will be up for election, as well as the at-large positions of Places 5 and 6. The at-large seats will be filled for just one year this time and will be two years thereafter. Fisher announced Monday he would seek reelection as mayor. Place 1 is currently held by appointee Loran Nixon, and Tom LeGate is the incumbent for Place 3. Candidates have until Feb. 18 to file for election.

City Manager Darwin McGill was authorized to seek bids on approximately 115 dumpsters for the city. The purchase was already budgeted for an estimated \$37,375. McGill said the new containers would eliminate the city's last barrell route.

The commission also authorized the manager to solicit bids for the Hereford Municipal Airport lease. The five-year lease expires in April. A second reading of the franchise ordinance for Hereford Cablevision was read and approved. The ordinance extends the franchise to a full 10 years, since the company plans on installing news lines an additional channels.

The regular meeting of the commission lasted only 30 minutes Monday night. Attending were Mayor Fisher and all four commissioners-Loran Nixon, Tom LeGate, Emory Brownlow and R.W. (Bud) Eades. McGill, City Atty. Earnest Langley and city secretary Bonnie Duke were also present, as well as Hereford Brand reporter Speedy Nieman.

Fisher seeks 3rd term

Mayor Wes Fisher Monday filed for reelection, seeking his third term as mayor of Hereford. The city elections are scheduled April 4, when four commission seats and the mayor's post come up for election.

The city election will be held under the new single-member system, based on four geographic areas and two at-large positions. In addition to the at-large posts, terms coming up for election in April will be for Place 1, currently held by appointee Loran Nixon, and Place 3, currently held by Tom LeGate. The at-large terms will be for one year this time, then will go to two-year terms thereafter.

The time period for filing for city ection started Monday and ends Feb. 18.

serving four years as mayor, Fisher served four years as a city commissioner and three years on the city's planning and zoning commission. He has also served on the Deaf Smith County Juvenile Board for eight years.

Fisher is part owner and executive vice president of Barrett-Fisher Co. in Hereford. He has served in various positions of leadership in the produce industry on the national, state and local level. A resident of Hereford for 24 years, he is a member of First United Methodist Church.

State Insurance approved for midwifery

AUSTIN (AP) - The State Board of Insurance has approved an application that will enable nurse-midwives in Texas to buy liability insurance in the private marketplace for the first time since mid-1986

The board approved an application by American Casualty Co. of Reading, Pa., to sell malpractice coverage to nurse-midwives.

American Casualty is a subsidiary of CNA Insurance Co., the lead carrier in a consortium formed to help ease the shortage of coverage for nurse-midwives.

Since mid-1986, insurers had refused to renew such policies or to write new policies. This forced nurse-midwives to turn to the state's Joint Underwriting Association, which, according to the Board of Insurance, is a market of last resort for health care providers who cannot find coverage in the voluntary market.

Texas prison poplualtion drops

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Texas prisons will continue accepting inmates as long as they remain under a 95 percent capacity mark imposed by the state to avoid overcrowding, a prison spokesman said.

"I feel that we're still under (95 percent). We'll probably go on with business as usual," Texas Department of Corrections spokesman Charles Brown said Monday.

The Texas law setting the 95 percent capacity limit was passed in 1983 after a federal judge ordered officials to take steps to reduce overcrowding in Texas' penitentiaries.

But inmate population in the 26-unit system, the nation's second largest behind California, exceeded that limit Friday forcing officials to close its doors to new inmates.

Weekend paroles pushed the inmate population below the limit, allowing prison officials to reopen Monday.

Inmate population Sunday totaled 38,207, or 168 prisoners short of the ceiling of 38,375, Brown said.

An estimated 21 more inmates were released Monday and about 60 new prisoners were accepted, but Brown said he would not have an official count until later today.

Marine found, but dies from crash

WASHINGTON (AP) - Military officials at the Cherry Point Marine base have identified a marine who died and another who was listed as missing after their jet crashed into the Mediterranean Sea over the weekend.

Pilot Capt. Miguel I. Gonzalez Jr. of Laredo, Texas was recovered about 12 hours after the A-6 Intruder crashed into the sea, said Maj. Dennis Brooks, a public affairs officer at Cherry Point.

Gonzalez was "suffering from severe hypothermia and other injuries" and died after extensive medical efforts, said Capt. Craig Fisher, a Marine Corps spokesman.

The search is continuing for the bombardier navigator, 1st Lt. Robert J. Cox, Brooks said Monday.

The jet failed to return as expected at 5 p.m. Saturday, local time, Fisher said. The plane was from Marine Attack Squadron 533, based in Cherry Point, and currently on a training mission in the western

Mediterranean with the USS John F. Kennedy aircraft carrier.

Double, triple shifts worked

Weather has effects on hospital staffing

Extreme weather conditions have effected staffing as nurses work double and triple shifts to provide care for a full-to-capacity patient load at Deaf Smith General Hospital. Incoming patients are being placed according to availability of rooms. The recovery room is being used as a temporary ward. Carolyn Andrews, assistant director of nursing, states "The decision about placement is being made upon admission of new patients, but we will not turn anyone away."

A sudden increase in patient admission combined with the inability of some employees to commute to work due to hazardous road conditions have created a challenge for staffing the 40-bed hospital. Leslie **Brush and Andrews is responsible** for scheduling employee work hours. Andrews observes, "We have a number of loyal and dedicated staff working double and triple shifts. The staff as a whole is pulling together and getting the job done. In spite of adverse conditions we are able to continue giving quality care to our patients."

Pneumonia, flu, orthopedic and surgery patients account for the current patient surge at DSGH. "No one thing is really overwhelmingly responsible," says Andrews, "we just have business as usual. This happens sometimes."

She does express gratitude that for the timing of the current influx. "I'm just glad this didn't happen two weeks ago when most of our staff was out with the flu," she said.

Would require citizens to prove residency New immigration rules proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration is proposing tentative immigration rules requiring every citizen or alien hired for a new job to prove residency and eligibility to work in the United States, an administration source says.

It would be the first time the rules, which are aimed at slowing down illegal immigration, are applied to all U.S. citizens.

The rules, which were being released today by the Immigration and Naturalization Service, provide the first glimpse into administration plans for enforcement of the landmark immigration law passed by Congress in 1986 after years of unsuccessful efforts.

Under the proposed rules, evidence of eligibility for work could be shown with a passport or a naturalization certificate or a combination of documents such as a Social Security card and a driver's license with a photo.

These would have to be shown to an employer within 24 hours of employment, said the source, who spoke Monday only on condition of anonymity. Forms showing the employer has verified eligibility must be available in the workplace in case of an inspection by immigration agents.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Ten states, mostly large grain and cotton producers, accounted for more than 63 percent of the \$7.7 billion in federal payments to farmers in 1985, according to a new economic study by the Agriculture Department.

Texas led with \$848.1 million in the calendar year, followed by: Iowa, \$691.1 million; Nebraska, \$518.4 million: Illinois, \$491.5 million; North Dakota; \$483.7 million; Kan-

Under the proposed rules, aliens may show any of a number of different types of work authorization documents issued by the INS.

The immigration law has two cornerstones: penalties for employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens and amnesty for those people who have lived in the country illegally since before Jan. 1, 1982.

The legalization program takes effect May 5. The employers' sanctions begin June 1. For a one-year period, only warnings will be issued to employers for their first offense.

Those seeking amnesty will be allowed to use a number of documents to prove continuous residency dating back to the legalization date. The documents may include car registration, mortgage payments, deeds, bank records, rent receipts, utility bills, school records or medical reports.

Following a requirement of the law, the legalization applicants must also show that the applicant is not on

new committee chairmanship after six years in the minority, wants to raise the federal minimum wage by at least \$1.25 an hour, to \$4.60, and extend catastrophic health insurance to Medicare recipients.

Kennedy, D-Mass., also said he will use his chairmanship of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee to fight President Reagan's proposed cuts in education programs, to raise funding for AIDS research and to enhance job-training programs.

"We have a better opportunity than at any time in the last eight years to make progress on some of these issues," Kennedy said Monday in an interview in his Senate office. He also said the members of the new Democratic Senate majority have "more of a sense of working together" than when they last had control in the 1970s.

Kennedy, perhaps the nation's best-known liberal politician, said his proposals would be offered in the context of public concern over huge federal deficits. He said his proposed minimum wage increase would not have a direct impact on the budget.

Workers strike against rail line

NEW YORK (AP) - Corporations arranged car pools, chartered buses and rented hotel rooms as New York braced for the first big test of the 3-day-old strike against the country's busiest commuter rail line.

The strike against the Long Island Rail Road, used during business days by nearly 150,000 commuters, widened late Monday as a coalition of five crafts unions joined the walkout. Eight unions representing about 1,700 of the railroad's 6,600 unionized employees are now involved in the strike.

Coalition spokesman John Caggiano apologized to commuters but predicted a lengthy strike as negotiations ended late Monday with no new talks scheduled. Railroad officials said they hoped talks would resume today.

Soviets launch two new submarines

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two new missile-carrying submarines in the Soviet fleet could push the Kremlin over limits in the SALT II treaty once sea trials of the vessels begin this spring or summer, administration sources said.

One of the new subs is a Typhoon-class submarine - the largest such vessel in the world - and the other is a Delta IV-class submarine, the sources said Monday. The Typhoon normally carries 20 multiple-warhead nuclear missiles, the Delta IV 16. The sources, who agreed to discuss the matter only if not iden-

tified, said shipyard activity at the northern Soviet port of Severodvinsk indicated the two submarines had been launched in December.

The new launches would bring to five the number of Typhoons completed by the Soviets and the number of Delta IVs to four.

Nationally, net farm income totaled \$30.5 billion in 1985, down 7 percent from a record level of \$32.7 billion in 1984, the report said.

Government payments were cranked into farm gross income, from which the agency deducted total expenses to get the net income figures for the 1985 calendar year.

The agency says direct payments to farmers in 1986 may have totaled about \$13 billion and could rise to around \$15 billion in 1987.

DEAR DR. GOTT - What are the physical and psychological effects of long-term (10 to 15 years) use of marijuana? An adult member of our family has used it daily for 13 years and says the world is boring without it. Living with him is like living with two people. What can I do?

DEAR READER - A person who uses mind-altering substances is two people: a real person and a crazy per-son. You can deal only with the real version. People use drugs for a variety of reasons: It feels good, they want to escape from life or they can't stand themselves.

One fact is clear: A person under the influence isn't playing with a full deck. Alcohol, cannabis and other hallucinogens affect brain function as well as behavior; physical and psy-chological damage will ultimately result.

You have no control over the adult family member who uses marijuana because "the world is boring." This attitude is distinctly his problem. However, you can alter your behavior: You do not have to react to him. I suggest that you seek out a support group, such as Al-Anon, or call your local hospital to see what groups are available in your community.

DEAR DR. GOTT - The pain from my husband's hiatal hernia has gotten to be almost constant. I've heard that there is now laser esophageal surgery

available. Could it help my husband? DEAR READER — No. The pain from hiatal hernia is due to acid reflux, the backflow of stomach contents up into the sensitive esophagus, which is not protected from acid. Hiatal hernia is treated by taking antacids which neutralize acid, or medicine to reduce production of stomach acid. As a last resort, surgery can be done to correct the defect that allows gastric juice to travel upstream.




DEAR DR. GOTT - What is organic brain syndrome?

DEAR READER - Organic brain syndrome means that a patient's mental powers are diminished because of physical changes in the brain. For example, multiple strokes, senility, senile dementia and many degenerative diseases of the central nervous system (such as Alzheimer's disease) are classed under the broad heading of organic brain syndrome. In contrast, there are acute brain syndromes - such as drug or alcohol intoxication - that are temporary. Patients with organic brain syndrome usually show shrinkage of the gray matter in the brain's cerebral cortex. which controls judgment, emotional state, memory and cognitive function. These physical changes are permanent

Nominations for rural hero being accepted by council

The search is under way for a rural hero for 1986, according to Ben Bullard of Waco, president of the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council, which presents the annual rural heroism award.

The 1986 recipient will be announced Monday, March 23, at the 48th annual Texas/Southwestern Safety Exposition to be held at the Hyatt **Regency Hotel in Houston.**

Deadline for submitting 1986 entries will be March 2, Bullard said. Send all nominations to Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council, P.O. Box 2689, Waco, Texas 76702-2689.

To qualify for the honor, a candidate must have performed a heroic act of human-life saving within Texas boundaries during the calendar year 1986. The entry should preferably be related to farming or ranching, Bullard noted.

The 1965 winner was C.R. Marsh of Crosbyton, who rescued a tractor operator from her tractor after the cotton stripping basket made contact

with a power line.

The victim jumped from the tractor but was pulled back into the vehicle by the high voltage current which necessitated the rescue.

Marsh later won the Carnegie Medal, a national award for heroism. Letters of nomination should include a written account of the accident with names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons involved. When available, newspaper clippings and photos should accompany the nominations, Bullard said. Bullard is associate director for

safety and health for the Texas Farm Bureau.

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

UT grid coach says winning is major goal

AUSTIN (AP) - Head football coach David McWilliams of the Texas Longhorns says winning - not just being competitive - is his major goal for his first season at Texas in 1987.

"That's not quite strong enough for me just to say I want to be competitive. ... I want to win, win as much as I can, or all of it, right now," McWilliams said.

"And I understand saying it doesn't get it done, but that's exactly what I'm going in with. I just never felt very good about not going for the top," he said.

McWilliams, 44, called a news conference Monday after spending all but five days on the road recruiting since taking the Texas job Dec. 6. He said his next day off would be Feb.

A former player and assistant coach at Texas, McWilliams returned as head coach for the 1987 season after one year at Texas Tech, where he was selected as Southwest Conference coach of the year.

"I had 26 years invested at the University of Texas, and that was just a strong pull I couldn't overlook," he said of his job change. McWilliams replaced Fred Akers,

who was fired after 10 years. Akers later became coach at Purdue.

McWilliams' first test at Texas comes Feb. 11, national signing day, and he said despite getting a late start because of the coaching change, "We're getting a very good response.

'We're back in on a lot of the real top players that are in the state, that are going to visit us ... I'm very en-

thusiastic about our recruiting right now."

He also said he felt Texas, which had a 5-6 record last season, had "a good nucleus coming back both offensively and defensively." The major losses include offensive lineman and defensive backs and ends, he said.

Asked if bad publicity about SWC recruiting violations was chasing good recruits out of state, McWilliams said, "Last year that was true a good bit. This year, I haven't noticed it being quite as strong."

He also was asked if he would use 1977 Heisman Trophy winner Earl Campbell, a new member of the University of Texas administrative staff, in recruiting.

"I think recruiting is something that you use every type of strength that you have for your university, and I think Earl Campbell is a strength ... not only for the university but the athletic program, too, so certainly we plan to use Earl" as an oncampus recruiter, McWilliams said.

"All that I can try to do is come in and do the best job I can and work as hard as I can and hopefully be myself, and if that doesn't work, then I don't have a second plan," he said. "I've got to make this one work, because I've only got one."

Houston defeats Cleveland Cavaliers

Rockets' defense is key in 127-103 victory

quarter, the Houston Rockets were as good as any team in the NBA, says Coach Bill Fitch.

"We bordered on being great," Fitch said Monday night after the Rockets scored 19 straight points in the third guarter on the way to a 127-103 victory over the Cleveland Cavaliers.

"I think our defense keyed us," Fitch said. "We were getting some steals and running our fast break off them. It was like we were putting on a clinic, the way we were running our fast break."

The Rockets, who won for the sixth time in the last seven games, trailed 68-64 when Akeem Olajuwon made a layup to start the Houston rally with 10:43 to play in the third quarter.

All eight of the Rockets' field goals during the streak came from close range. Four of the baskets were dunks, including three by Ralph Sampson.

"I've seen teams get hot before, but they really got it going," said Cleveland guard Ron Harper. "I think every time they made a shot, we lost heart."

Houston led 83-68 before Cleveland's six-minute drought was ended by John Bagley's layup with 4:28 to go in the period. The Cavaliers got no closer than 13 the rest of the way.

Sampson finished with a seasonhigh 33 points and added 16 rebounds. Olajuwon scored 22, with 14 rebounds.

"We played some good defense and got the running game unleashed," Sampson said. "Anybody can run effectively if you rebound and get the ball out. We always seem to have that spurt defensively, but we need to do that for the whole game."

Cleveland led 62-60 at the half behind 19 first-half points by rookie John "Hot Rod" Williams, who scored only four more in the second half. Keith Lee had a season-high 20 points for the Cavaliers, and Harper finished with 17.

The Cavaliers made 43 percent of their field goal attempts, including only 33 percent in the second half.

Alvin Robertson scored 27 and rookie Walter Berry added 22 Monday night to lead the Spurs to a 113-106 NBA victory over the Los Angeles Clippers.

In addition to his 22 points, Berry had 11 rebounds, two blocked shots and three assists. He hit 11 of 14 field goal attempts.

"I never thought playing this well would happen this quick," Berry said. "Playing more minutes makes me feel comfortable and that is the whole key."

Berry, college basketball's player of the year last season, was obtained by the Spurs in a trade with the Portland Trail Blazers in December. "They cause a lot of problems for the defense, they are both very different offensive players," Weiss said. "I fully intend to use Walter about 33 minutes a game as we go on."

Mitchell said that playing behind Berry does not pose any problems for him.

"I know things are different here now," Mitchell said. "But I am a professional and I kust go out there and play as hard as I can. I really don't care about what has been going on between management and myself." Los Angeles Coach Don Chaney added his praise for Berry's perfor-

mance. "Walter Berry played very well," Chaney said. "He really takes a lot of strange shots but they went in."

"We did make a game of it, but couldn't get over the hump. I would trade the points for a win. We are not going to quit," said Cage.

The Clippers closed to within 98-92 with 7:00 remaining, but Robertson had four baskets and Berry added four points to give the Spurs a 107-96

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) Texas Rangers infielder Toby Harrah has announced he will retire from the game and accept a position as manager of one of the American League club's farm teams.

Harrah said earlier in the year he wanted to stay with the club at least one more season but Monday he acknowledged his playing career was over.

"I love baseball more than anything else," he said. "I did everything I could to try and stay in baseball but it just didn't work out that way. Baseball as a player is behind me."

Harran, 38, who played the last two years with the Rangers, will manage the Gulf Coast Rangers, a team that will play at Port Charlotte, Fla., the AL club announced.

"We feel he will make a significant contribution in his new role working with our young players," said Rangers General Manager Tom Grieve.

Harrah completed his major league career with 195 home runs, 918 RBIs and .264 average in 2,060 games.

After playing for the Washington Senators-Texas Rangers franchise from 1969-78, he spent five seasons at Cleveland and one with the New York Yankees before returning to the Rangers in 1985.

Harrah is the Rangers' all-time leader in several categories - 579 runs, 122 home runs, 546 RBIs, 317 extra-base hits, 1,666 total bases and 668 walks.

He was selected three times to the American League All-Star team while playing various times at short-stop, third base and second base.

In addition to his managerial duties, Harrah will perform special assignments in the Rangers' minor league system prior to the opening of the 64-game Gulf Coast League schedule in June, the Rangers announced.

Harrah also will attend the Rangers' minor league spring train-ing camp, which begins at Port Charlotte on March 11.

Campesinos given land, farmer refuses to leave

LA TRINITARIA, Mexico (AP) -Leaning on the shoulder-high. roughhewn fence by the farmhouse, the young man glared across the plowed field to the scores of campesinos who had moved onto the land.

"They're utterly audacious, those people," said Francisco Cruz Morales, 26. "This land has a government certificate that it is within the legal limits for cattle land and can't be taken and they don't respect it. It's the money that talks."

"Not because they barge in are we going to stop the litigation," his father, Lorenzo Cruz, 64, said later, sitting in one of the two one-room houses where the family of 12 lived.

Fifty yards away, 150 landless campesinos stood near their scattering of low, stick-and-grass shelters and told how the government had given them the land, 20 miles from the Guatemalan border, under the agrarian reform program.

"We'd go in by force if we had to," said Antonio Ramirez Hernandez, leaning on his machete. "Two years we've been fighting. We're tired of so many expenses and that they haven't been able to give us possession of this land.'

Each side accused the other of wielding firearms, hurling insults and threatening violence.

Showing a formal complaint, the group said that after they arrived with local officials, 60 armed landowners had come to back the fami-

The standoff and legal entanglements were typical of southern Mexico's rural conflicts.

"It seems to me they didn't have a good lawyer," German Alvarado Torres said of the family as he paged through files on the Cruz case. He is head of the Agrarian Reform office technical department in Tuxtla Gutierrez, the Chiapas state capital.

When campesinos first asked for the land in 1953, a survey found none available. The governor denied the request. A presidential denial, standard procedure at the time, would have been final, but there is none in the file.

In 1982, they asked again. A check back to 1952 determined the land was never registered. Although it was registered in the 1940s, the file holds no response from Cruz' father to a 1983 request for documents.

A 1984 presidential decree awarded 1,023 acres originally belonging to Cruz' father, including Lorenzo's 358 acres, to the campesinos.

Although the certificate Cruz Morales mentioned cannot be legally issued after a presidential decree, it was, in 1985.

Injunctions usually are easy to obtain, but Cruz' requests were denied.

Oscar Ochoa, state secretarygeneral of the government-aligned National Campesino Confederation and a congressman, said the "the law is flagrantly violated" in agrarian reform.

"You see that sometimes the land has cost the campesinos more than if they had bought it," he said. "Bribes are the problem."

The Cruz home, with its collection of calendars dating back to 1936 and altar with its abundance of saints and flowers from the garden, was lit with gas lamps. Water came from a well across a field. The sleeves on

Francisco's shirt were meticulously patched.

While they appeared better off than the peasants, Ochoa said that "here, at times, land is taken from people who are poorer than those they are giving it to."

Usually owners are left a small piece of land, but Cruz was not.

LOS ANGELES (AP) representative of all the things that happened." "We began by talking to more than 100 former POWs and each had great stories to tell," said Shapiro. "We wanted to get it down to nine men. It was the toughest selection process I've ever been involved in. It's a tribute
