Incomes, spending up 2 percent, best since April

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans increased their spending by a huge 2 percent in December, the biggest rise in more than 11 years, while their incomes went up by 0.8 percent, the best showing since April, the government reported today.

The huge gain in personal consumption spending was attributed in

part to a rush by consumers to buy big-ticket items while they could still take advantage of the sales tax deduction. The federal tax law changed on Jan. 1, eliminating that deduction.

The 2.0 percent increase followed a 0.6 percent November rise and a 1.9 percent October plunge. It was the biggest monthly increase since a 2.5 percent advance in May 1975.

Personal incomes also showed a solid 0.8 percent advance in December, sharply higher than the modest gains of 0.2 percent in November and 0.3 percent in October. It was the biggest income gain since a 1.2 percent rise in April.

While the spending and income gains were substantial last month, analysts are still concerned that consumer spending will weaken in the new year, causing a slowdown in the overall economy.

Consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of all economic activity so substantial decline could plunge the country into a recession, something that economists are not forecasting at the present time.

Personal consumption spending, which includes virtually everything except interest payments on debt, shot up at an annual rate of \$57.3 billion in December, compared to a November rise of \$17.1 billion. Purchases of durable goods rose \$47.5 billion, with sales of new cars accounting for most of the increase.

Purchase of non-durable goods, items not expected to last three years, rose by \$7.1 billion, slightly ahead of the \$5.1 billion November increase. Purchases of services, which include housing costs, rose at a slower rate in December, a \$2.7 billion increase compared to a huge \$16.4 billion November gain.

Wages and salaries, the most important part of the income category, rose \$6.7 billion at an annual rate in December, compared to a faster \$9.9 billion November advance.

Final figures in for United Way

Final figures for the United Way of Deaf Smith County campaign, conducted in September and October, show a grand total of \$115,105.94, it was announced today by Wayne Amstutz, executive director.

The total was 104.6 percent of the goal of \$110,000 and marked the first time in a number of years that the United Way reached its goal here. The final figures were released because of some late contributions.

M.D. Gentry was president of United Way last year and Helen Langley was the campaign chairman. Holward Birdwell has been elected as the 1987 president.

The UW campaign committee will be meeting next Tuesday, and the new campaign chairmen will be announced at that time, said Amstutz.

"We want to extend a special thanks to all citizens of Deaf Smith County—all businesses and employees, individuals, churches, and our agricultural people for making a life more meaningful to those touched by the United Way agencies," Amstutz said.

Allocations to the UW agencies were previously approved by the budget and admissions committee. The dollar figures are: Big Brothers-Big Sisters \$17,651; Camp Fire \$16,821; YMCA \$15,000; American Red Cross \$14,693; Boy Scouts \$9,219; Salvation Army \$3,716; High Plains Epilepsy \$3,716; Girl Scouts \$1,500; and Children's Rehabilitation Center \$900. Administration, campaign and salary expenses were \$8,100.

Military says troops overreacted in shooting

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The military said today troops "overreacted" when they fired on militant farmers marching toward the presidential palace, killing at least 12 and wounding 94. Leftists denounced the shooting and threatened more protests.

The regional military commander for central Luzon, Brig. Gen. Eugenio Ocampo Jr., placed troops in the six provinces north of Manila on full alert against "disgruntled elements of the military and unscrupulous civilians" who may try "to destabilize the present government."

The clash Thursday on Mendiola Bridge about 300 yards from the palace was the bloodiest street battle since President Corazon Aquino took office Feb. 25 following a near bloodless people's revolt that toppled President Ferdinand E. Marcos.

The government said 12 people were killed and 54 others remain

hospitalized, most with gunshot wounds. Hospitals had the same death count, but said 94 people were wounded.

Government radio put the death toll at 15, and some newspapers counted 16 dead and 15 others in critical condition with gunshot wounds.

An estimated 10,000 protesters, organized by the militant Movement of Philippine Farmers, marched on the palace after holding a rally downtown to demand land reform.

Elite Philippine marines guarding the palace following recent coup rumors opened fire when the marchers tried to push through police ranks.

An American community service worker, visiting the Philippines, said a study rural life, said the troops fired without warning.

"I heard shots and thought they were firing blanks at first," said

Janie Moore, director of the Petersfield Human Services Corp., in Youngs Island, S.C.

"Then I saw five people in the street with blood coming from their wounds. The police didn't warn the marchers before firing and the shots were made indiscriminately into the crowd of onlookers which included women and schoolchildren."

The Armed Forces General Headquarters blamed the incident on a "lack of dialogue."

Panel to expand investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special Senate panel will expand its investigation of the Iran-Contra affair following State Department acknowledgement that the Reagan administration continued secret contacts with Iran as recently as last month.

Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., said the fact that State Department and CIA officials were meeting with Iranian representatives a month after the disclosure that arms sale profits were diverted to Nicaraguan rebels indicates that President Reagan's foreign policy is seriously out of control.

State Department spokesman Charles E. Redman said Thursday Reagan and Secretary of State George P. Shultz consider Iran a strategic country and believe the United States has a "legitimate interest" in better relations with Iran.

But the U.S. official indicated the talks were broken off in December. "We will not discuss further arms shipments with Iran," he said. "And we are exerting all our influence to discourage arms sales to Iran by other countries."

Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, chairman of a select committee probing the Iran-Contra affair, said he will expand the investigation to include the disclosure. He said he "had no inkling" of the contacts between U.S. and Iranian representatives in December, and added that "nothing surprises me."

On Wednesday, Shultz told the House Foreign Affairs Committee that Vice Adm. John M. Poindexter assured him last May that the United States was not providing weapons to

Poindexter, who was then President Reagan's assistant for national security affairs, told Shultz "it wasn't so" and Donald T. Regan, the president's chief of staff, said he was alarmed and concerned about reports of a deal, the source, who requested anonymity, said Thursday.

Actually, the U.S. weapons shipments had begun in February, three months earlier, while Israel had sent arms to Iran in September

and November 1985, with the Reagan administration committed to replenishing Israel's armories.

Shultz testified he had been alerted by a cable from Charles H. Price II, the U.S. ambassador to Britain, while attending the economic summit meeting in Tokyo May 3-6. He sought out Poindexter and Regan, who also were in the Japanese capital with President Reagan.

According to the source, Shultz also testified that Poindexter had informed him in February that the Americans held hostage in Lebanon

would be freed soon.

The presidential assistant made no mention in the Feb. 28 conversation with Shultz of the fact that U.S. weapons were being shipped to Iran, the source said.

Shultz has not commented on the testimony he gave the Committee. But in a session last Friday with reporters at the State Department he indicated his displeasure with Poindexter, who resigned in November when the secret

Pennsylvania treasurer kills self at press conference

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Pennsylvania's treasurer shot himself to death at a crowded news conference after saying he was wrongly convicted of bribery and that the judge who was to sentence him today imposed "medieval sentences."

R. Budd Dwyer pulled a high-powered revolver from a manila envelope Thursday morning and waved off frantic onlookers in his office, some of them screaming "No! No! Budd, don't do this!"

About two dozen horrified reporters, photographers and aides watched as the 47-year-old Republican put the gun barrel into his mouth and pulled the trigger. Cameras recorded the act.

Dwyer died instantly, said Dauphin County Coroner William Bush.

The state attorney general had ruled Wednesday that Dwyer would lose his job after being sentenced for awarding a state computer contract in return for a promised \$300,000 payoff. No money changed hands.

Dwyer, who was to have been sentenced by U.S. District Judge Malcolm Muir, had faced up to 55 years in prison and a \$305,000 fine on 11 counts.

"I've repeatedly said that I'm not going to resign as state Treasurer," Dwyer said in a suicide note released after his death.

"Please tell my story on every radio and television station and in every newspaper and magazine in the U.S. ... Please make sure that the sacrifice of my life is not in vain."

Dwyer purchased the .357-caliber Magnum revolver in 1982 and had it

properly registered, state police said.

Rob Dwyer, 21, said his father had given no indication of what he intended to do.

"We're pretty broken up," he said, his voice breaking during a telephone interview. He said he heard the news at home with his mother, Joanne, 47, and sister, Dyan, 18.

Mrs. Dwyer, her eyes swollen from crying, talked briefly with reporters at the door of the family's Hershey home. She said only that she was sorry about what had happened.

Before pulling the gun, Dwyer read for more than 20 minutes from a statement proclaiming his innocence and criticizing the news media, the

Marchers commemorate abortion law

DALLAS (AP) — Fourteen years after the Supreme Court legalized abortion, protesters are still taking to the streets demanding that the landmark decision be reversed.

At a rally Thursday commemorating the landmark decision, abortion foe Bill Price told a crowd of about 1,000: "I hope you pray every night that Ronald Reagan will have one more chance to make one more appointment to the Supreme Court."

The chanting protesters, holding black balloons, braved freezing winds in a march from City Hall to the federal courthouse where the case was filed that led to the Supreme Court decision. Many of the marchers clutched Bibles, and others pushed children in baby strollers.

"We feel that in Dallas we have a special responsibility to stop abortion," said Price, president of the Greater Dallas Right to Life Committee. "Rallies like this are important because they show there is broad-based public support for the pro-life movement."

Richard Land, recently named as an administrative aide to Gov. Bill Clements, told the Dallas crowd to "dedicate our memory to the 20 million babies who have been sacrificed."

"Seek God's faith and pray that he might heal this land of this tragic blight on its honor," he said.

Texas Ranger receives fatal bullet

HORSESHOE BAY, Texas (AP) — A Texas Ranger was shot to death and an unidentified man died in a shootout as officers attempted to arrest a man suspected in two separate kidnappings, authorities said today.

During the shootout Thursday night, a 2-year-old kidnapped child was found safe and unharmed, and the body of an abducted maid was later discovered in a boat house nearby in this lakeside resort community, said David Wells, a Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman.

Ranger Stan Guffey, 40, of Brady died in a Burnet hospital late Thursday night, Wells said early this morning. Guffey was the first Ranger to be killed in the line of duty since 1978, Wells said.

He said the kidnapping suspect died at the scene of the shooting on Lake Lyndon B. Johnson west of Marble Falls.

City ordinances in violation of law

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — A city considering prohibiting drinking behind the wheel probably will drop the idea, now that the Texas attorney general says such ordinances exceed cities' authority, a state representative said.

And cities who already have those ordinances may have to re-examine them, officials say.

State Rep. Al Luna of Houston requested the attorney general's opinion on ordinances in Arlington and Corpus Christi that make it illegal to take a drink while driving, although possession of open containers is legal. State law does not prohibit drinking and driving, unless the driver is legally intoxicated.

Luna said the Houston City Council, which was considering adopting a similar ordinance, probably will not do so now, Houston officials had asked Luna to study the matter.

The attorney general's office says it isn't sure how many cities have similar ordinances, but that those that do are infringing on state authority.

According to an opinion issued Jan. 16, the state's alcoholic beverage code reserves for the state the exclusive right to regulate the manufacture, sale, transport and possession of alcohol in Texas.

IRS ordered to simplify W-4 forms

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service has been told to consider designing a simpler W-4 form for workers to calculate the proper income tax withholdings from paychecks following widespread complaints that the new form is too complicated.

The IRS already has mailed out about 300 million of the four-page documents, which are designed to help taxpayers adjust their 1987 paycheck withholdings to square with the tax law revisions passed by Congress last year.

But Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III said Thursday the current form and the lengthy worksheet that it includes for calculating the scores of changes in deductions and tax rates that Congress made is "entirely too complicated."

"I have asked that there be a review of the W-4 form with a view toward changing it, seeing if we can simplify it," Baker told the House Budget Committee.

"We're going to ... see if we can't come up with a better form," he said.

The Treasury secretary said he did not know how long it would take to develop a new form or when it might be distributed. But he said that taxpayers in the meantime should continue filling out the present version "to avoid a lot of unpleasant surprises down the road."

The W-4 form is the document which tells employers how much to withhold from employees' paychecks — an amount which, in turn, is based on how many dependants or other allowances an individual or couple claims.

Because of the widespread changes made last year in the tax laws, all taxpayers are being required by the government to fill out W-4s this year and submit them to their employers by Oct. 1.

The IRS, which as late as last week had said there were no plans to change the forms, had urged taxpayers to get them back to employers as soon as possible "to avoid incorrect withholding" for the year.

Stock market roars back

NEW YORK (AP) — After taking a one-day breather, the stock market has come roaring back to its torrid 1987 pace in what analysts say is an apparent signal that investors believe stocks will keep climbing for some time.

Stock prices Thursday shrugged off the broad declines of the day before, moving higher in a rebound that pushed several market indexes to record heights.

One of the most widely followed market barometers, the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, soared a record 51.60 points to close at a new high of 2,145.67. That topped the record gain of 44.01 points Jan. 5 and pushed the Dow over the record close of 2,104.47 set Tuesday.

The record close was the 13th this year for the blue-chip market index, which had followed the general decline Wednesday and lost ground for the first time in 1987.

Wednesday's broad-based losses were written off by many analysts as a temporary "correction," in which investors decided to cash in on profits made so far in the 1987 rally.

"Now that the correction is over we can go on to new heights," said Raymond F. DeVoe Jr. of Legg Mason Wood Walker Inc.

Much of Thursday's advance was attributed to buying by investors who had been wary about getting into the market during the New Year rally but who had become increasingly afraid of missing out on a prolonged advance.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Fernando Allende is certainly not M-M-Me-Mel Tillis.

For one thing, the popular Mexican motion picture star and singer — who has done some American acting work on "Miami Vice" and "Flamingo Road" — is a little younger and somewhat more handsome than Tillis.

But the stuttering Mel and the suave Fernando have the same job — to m-m-move them Whataburgers.

And that points up a growing trend among many Corpus Christi businesses: the drive toward capturing more of the Mexican-American economic market through advertising campaigns specifically aimed at that ethnic group.

Corpus Christi-based Whataburger, for instance, has had a long-time advertising campaign featuring country and western singer Mel Tillis as the hamburger chain's spokesman.

But for the past year, Whataburger has been using Allende as Tillis' Spanish-language counterpart, acting as spokesman on Whataburger commercials aired on major Spanish-language media outlets in most major Texas cities as well as Arizona and New Mexico.

Whataburger has long been acknowledged locally by some Spanish-language media outlet representatives as a leader in its Hispanic-oriented advertising.

But the latest campaign featuring Allende is seen as representative of a larger movement, particularly locally, in earmarking advertising campaigns for Hispanics.

And behind all the activity in Hispanic-targeted advertising campaigns is the drive to cash in on what is acknowledged as the significant economic clout among Hispanics.

"As Hispanics have grown in economic power, it has become an economic necessity to attempt to gain more of that market," said Robert "Moe" Morehead of the Corpus Christi advertising firm Morehead, Dotts & LaPorte.

"There's been a fairly radical change in advertisers' thinking in the last five years," adds Servando Caballero, general manager of Spanish-language television station KORO-TV.

"I think it's because of the realization that the Hispanic is a growing minority and that Hispanics, as the years have passed by, now have more money to spend on purchases," Caballero said.

"Substantial monies have gotten into Hispanic pockets and they are willing to spend," Caballero said, adding that Anglo advertisers are realizing that "just like everyone else, Hispanics like to have nice things, brush their teeth, take their baths and use products that are marketable."

Several officials with Spanish-language media outlets here — KCCT and KUNO radio, and KORO-TV, Channel 28 — acknowledge an increasing number of Spanish-language commercials and advertising campaigns done by local businesses that used to shy from such activity.

"People are realizing that the most efficient advertising buy is Spanish-

language radio," said Manuel Davilla, president, general manager and part-owner of KCCT-AM.

"They realize there are a lot of Hispanics out there listening to Spanish radio and willing to buy products," he said.

Luis Munoz, vice president and general manager of KUNO-AM Spanish-language radio, said his station has seen a 7 percent advertising increase over the past year because of more commercials geared toward the Mexican-American audience here.

Carolyn Paxson, owner of the El Paso advertising firm Paxson Advertising Inc., said the Allende campaign, which her company is packaging, has proved to be an excellent move, spurring growth in sales of Whataburgers in Hispanic communities.

"The Hispanic market is a huge market," Ms. Paxson said, a factor Whataburger has acknowledged and targeted with more individualized local Spanish-language campaigns for years.

However, the Allende campaign, which is a systemwide campaign, is one that Whataburger initiated only a year ago, and with very successful results so far, Ms. Paxson said.

"I think Whataburger was far-sighted. Now almost every major food producer in this country is realizing the potential of the Hispanic market," Ms. Paxson said.

In Corpus Christi, businessmen, particularly in the automobile business, are finding that advertising in Spanish-language outlets is a

way to enhance sales growth potential.

Andrews Distributing, Tradewinds Ford and First City Bank of Corpus Christi, among others, have put major emphasis on selling their products to Hispanics on Hispanic-oriented media outlets, said Morehead.

And, as is the case with Barry Andrews of Andrews Distributing, which distributes Miller and Miller Lite beer here, active and visible support of community activities is a key to helping the local Hispanics — and getting them to purchase his product, said Holly Rabb of Morehead, Dotts & LaPorte.

"There are some smart business people out there, like Barry Andrews," Ms. Rabb said.

"I confess, I would have a hard time working with John Poindexter right now," he said.

In other developments:

—Intelligence sources, speaking on grounds of anonymity, told The Associated Press that Nicaraguan rebels set up a bank account to handle \$10 million in "humanitarian" aid from the sultan of Brunei, but that a senior State Department official instead gave the sultan a Swiss account number controlled by then-White House aide Oliver L. North. U.S. officials have said they do not know what happened to that money. North's Swiss bank account number was supplied by Elliott Abrams, assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs, the sources said.

—In a Washington Post-ABC News poll conducted from Jan. 15 to 19, 67 percent of the 1,505 respondents said President Reagan isn't doing enough to get the facts out about the Iran-Contra affair. Fifty-six percent said they did not believe the president was telling the truth concerning the controversy. That compares with an ABC poll in early December in which 53 percent said Reagan wasn't doing enough to get the facts out and 49 percent said he was not being truthful.

Planned Parenthood says

Parents, not schools, should teach values

WASHINGTON (AP) — The president of the Planned Parenthood Federation, responding to Education Secretary William J. Bennett's proposals for education against premarital sex, says parents, not schools, should teach children to abstain from sex.

Faye Wattleton, president of the family planning group, said Thursday that Bennett's speech calling for schools to jettison sex education courses that don't teach abstinence was "politically inspired" and fodder for "the anti-sex-education elements in this country."

But some educators said they welcomed Bennett's emphasis on character-building as a key element in any sex education course.

Bill Honig, California's superintendent of public instruction, said, "The sex ed classes (in the 1970s) that said, 'Here's your body, keep it clean and do what you want with it' were the worst. ... Now there's a huge shift in sex education. They are putting in the values question and the ethical consideration."

Bennett delivered the provocative speech Thursday morning at a National School Boards Association conference on character-building. Bennett's department gave the group an \$83,000 grant to hold the meeting and distribute 20,000 copies of a handbook on successful sex education programs.

Nellie C. Weil, president of the National School Boards Association and vice chairwoman of the school board in Montgomery, Ala., said she welcomed Bennett's emphasis on character, but "he is wrong in assuming that public schools are not teaching the rightness and wrongness of things."

She said schools are stepping up sex education efforts, partly in response to Surgeon General C.

Everett Koop's recent call for straight talk to inform children about the dangers of AIDS.

"We desperately need now the public's attitude to reinforce what we're doing, so indeed when a child goes home and says to Momma and Daddy or whatever single parent might be at home, 'I was told in school that I shouldn't do this,' we're going to have their support in saying, 'Right, you shouldn't do that,'" she said.

Laurence J. McQuillen, a spokesman for the American Federation of Teachers, said his

union opposes any national policy on sex education.

"It really is properly in the realm of local school districts," he said. "Standards that would be appropriate for New York and San Francisco probably would not sit well for cities in Alabama."

Chamber official says small towns are hurting

Small towns in West Texas are hurting, says Jerry Conner, director of economic development for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

"They are losing people and they are hurting," he says. "Their children are moving to towns where there is industry that pays higher salaries."

So the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor a workshop to give community leaders the rudiments of economic development. "The objectives of the workshop are to assist business and economic leaders in understanding why and how economic development occurs", he says, "to help them develop a feasible and workable strategy for community economic growth, and to help them plan and initiate viable economic programs and activities for their communities."

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To Borger's 'Lucky Dogs' in overtime

Whiteface boys lose heartbreaker, 92-87

A more appropriate nickname for the Borger Bulldogs might be "Lucky Dogs" after Thursday night District 1-4A varsity boys' basketball game between the Hereford Whitefaces and Borger.

The Hereford Whitefaces put forth a great big question mark concerning Borger's top 10 ranking in the

state when they battled the 'Dogs to the tune of 13 ties and an overtime - before losing to Borger 92-87.

It was the fifth straight district defeat for the Whitefaces in a string of heartbreaking losses, after winning their first three district contests. Hereford is now 8-12 for the season.

The major area of discussion in the Hereford High School gym after Thursday's game seemed to be what

many felt was controversial officiating. And it was not only Hereford fans who felt so, because Borger head coach Duane Hunt was called for a technical foul and appeared to have been close to having at least one more called on him.

Perhaps the strangest call by the officials during the game was "simultaneous fouls" against two different Hereford players. The officials gave both Borger players one-and-one free throw attempts.

Even though the Hereford Whitefaces lost, they continue to prove they are not a team to be overlooked in the District 1-4A schedule.

Borger held an eight-point lead on two occasions in the fourth quarter - 75-67 with 5:20 left in regulation and 77-69 with 4:49 left.

The Whitefaces sliced the Bulldogs' lead to 77-75 when Todd Weaver scored a field goal, coupled with two free throws and a field goal by Rodney McCracken in the next minute and a half.

Borger put its lead up to five points with 2:21 left in regulation time. A basket by Weaver with 2:10 left and a basket by Bobby Baker with 1:50 left enabled Hereford to move within one point, 80-79.

Borger scored a basket with 1:20 left, and Baker was fouled four seconds later when attempting a fast break layup. He made both free throws.

The Bulldogs then missed a shot with 40 seconds left. Baker put the Whitefaces into the lead for the first time since late in the first half with a

basket with 26 seconds left in regulation.

Baker, who was fouled when attempting that shot, failed to make the free throw, leaving Borger just a point behind.

Borger called a timeout with 23 seconds left, and committed a turnover with four seconds left. Hereford's Todd Weaver appeared to have been fouled intentionally by a Borger player, but a referee called traveling against Weaver, and one second remained on the clock.

That one second seemed to be a very long one, because a Borger player caught the inbound pass with his back to the basket, pivoted, then went up for a turnaround jump shot.

A referee called a foul against Hereford on the shot, ruling that the shot was attempted before the buzzer sounded. One of two free throws were made, putting the game into overtime.

Hereford gained control of the ball to begin the overtime period. Bobby Baker scored a field goal on an inside shot and was knocked to the floor, but no foul was called against Borger.

Baker left the game for a few moments limping, but later returned to the game.

Borger tied the game at 85-85 with 2:29 left, and then moved into the lead at 87-85 with 2:01 left. Turnovers and missed shots and free throws hurt the Whitefaces the rest of the way, including a missed field goal attempt with 2:13 left.

With Borger ahead 89-85, Hereford missed two free throws, and then with Borger leading 91-85 with 21 seconds left, Hereford failed in the first of a one-and-one.

Borger then escaped the HHS gym with a 92-87 victory over Hereford.

"I thought the kids played real, real well. I thought they played one of their best games this season," Hereford Coach Mike Fields said.

"We did everything we needed to win, but it just didn't happen. I felt that our bench contributed well tonight. Everybody played well off the bench," Fields continues.

"It hurts that we lost the game, but we're real proud of the effort the kids put out - because Borger is ranked eighth or ninth in the state. Nobody else had come within 13 points of them in the district, and we felt we should have beat them," he adds.

Four Whiteface players scored in double figures, led by Baker with 22 points. Rodney McCracken, who had 13 rebounds, scored 18 points. Weaver totaled 17 points and Kevin Hansen had 10 points.

Hereford made 36 of 67 field goal attempts for 53 percent, but missed 10 of its 25 free throw attempts.

The first quarter was tied six times before Hereford moved in front 25-20. The Whitefaces led 31-22 with 6:38 left in the first half, and against led by nine points at 35-26 with 5:43 left.

Hereford still led by eight points, 41-33, with 2:45 remaining in the half. But Borger put together a rally, tying the game three times before gaining a halftime lead of 49-47.

Borger then had an eight-point lead twice in the fourth period before Hereford rallied to take the lead 83-82 with 26 seconds left in regulation.

Borger was led by Charles Walker who scored 31 points.

In another high scoring boys' game, the Hereford junior varsity defeated Borger 80-71. The HHS junior varsity now has 12 victories against seven defeats.

Hereford held a 40-37 halftime lead, but Borger gained a 56-49 lead in the third quarter. The Whitefaces put together a hot fourth quarter,

outscored Borger 31-17 for the 80-71 victory.

Ross Torres led Hereford with 18 points, and Pat Mercer and Bobby Robbins each totaled 14 points. Clint Cotten, who led in rebounds with seven, scored six points, and Chad Clements and Jason Bullard each also scored six points.

Hereford made 33 of 65 field goal attempts for 51 percent.

The Hereford High School varsity and junior varsity boys' basketball teams will play at Frenship tonight. Games times are 7 p.m. for the junior varsity and 8:30 p.m. for the varsity.

Next Tuesday, Hereford plays at Canyon, with game times of 6 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., and on Friday, Jan. 30, Hereford hosts Pampa, with game times of 7 p.m. and 8:30 p.m.

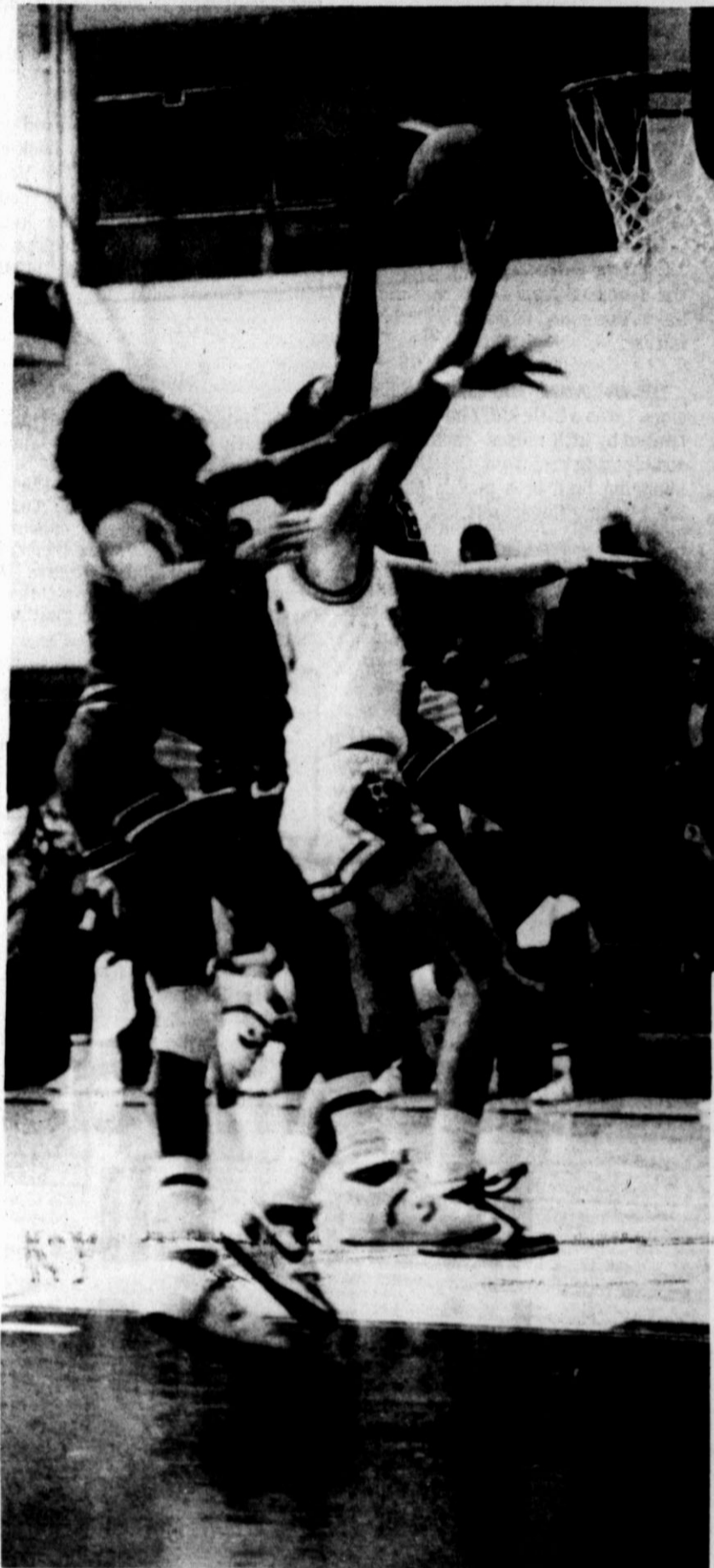

Drugs not sanctioned in U.S. growing in popularity

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — Demand has exploded for a potentially lethal trio of pills Mexican doctors prescribe for weight control, prompting federal officials to reconsider a policy allowing the drugs into the United States.
The regimen of three pills containing four different drugs has been linked to deaths, mental illness, heart disorders and other physical ailments, federal officials say.

"The American public has been looking for a diet miracle for years and they'll take anything. Unfortunately they're going to hurt themselves," said Donald Heulton, a regional director for the Food and Drug Administration in Dallas.
"It's not a panacea for everybody. The lucky ones are the ones who are going to only lose weight. There's no question they work, if they don't kill you first," Heulton said Tuesday.

The U.S. Customs Service allows the drugs to be brought into the United States if prescribed by a registered physician and purchased at a registered pharmacy.
The drugs must be declared upon crossing into the United States, and must be of a small enough quantity to satisfy inspectors that there is only enough for personal consumption, said Charles Conroy, a Customs spokesman in Houston.

But Heulton said he believes it is illegal to bring the drugs into the United States.
"It's a gray area we are exploring now," he said. "It falls into a loophole associated with short resources."
Heulton favors the FDA adopting a policy to ban any importation of one of the drugs, Redotex.
"It should not be allowed in, not even in personal luggage," he said.

Arnold Lochner, diversion group supervisor for the DEA's Houston office, said ingredients in all three pills are prescribed in the United States, but not for the type of diet regimen prescribed by Mexican doctors.
The most popular weight-loss regimen involves Ponderex, an amphetamine used as an appetite suppressant; Redotex, an appetite control drug that contains an active ingredient found in the depressant Valium; and Monduretic, a diuretic, said Lochner.

Although a version of Ponderex and the active ingredient in Monduretic are prescribed in the United States, Redotex is not allowed as it is not believed to be safe or effective, Heulton said.
He said he can't understand the purpose of Redotex, which combines a stimulant and a depressant — both controlled substances in the U.S. — that would seem to cancel each other out.
The ingredient in the diuretic is prescribed in the U.S. for high blood pressure, but unsupervised use of the drug can cause potassium depletion, resulting in heart problems, Heulton said.
Taking all three in combination, as prescribed in Mexico, is especially dangerous, he said. Heulton and Lochner said side effects from the drugs range from severe diarrhea and pneumonia to psychosis.

Programmer decides nerds have more fun
CHICAGO (AP) — Mike MacDonald is a computer programmer, a part-time model and a marathon bicyclist. But he'd rather be a nerd.
For \$65 to \$75 an hour, MacDonald becomes Horny K. Fletcher, a nerd who wears taped glasses, a red plaid coat and blue plaid pants, his shirttail caught in his fly and a piece of toilet paper stuck on his neck as if he had cut himself shaving.
"People call me and ask me to go to parties as their friend," said MacDonald. "It's a different angle, and people are kind of charmed by the idea. I don't do a skit. I just kind of play on who people are."
MacDonald, 26, created Horny for Halloween. But after he got laid off from his computer programming job, he decided the nerd was so much fun he'd like to go into the nerd business.
Rent-A-Nerd, which began Jan. 5, has slowly taken off. MacDonald, of suburban Oak Park, says he has about a half-dozen jobs lined up, and calls are coming. He also became a local media hit, doing interviews and call-in stunts on talk shows.
"I'm getting into a thing where I want people to believe in who Horny is," he said in an interview Tuesday. "I think he's an inspiration."
Horny's hair is greased, with a crooked part, and he sometimes wears a Q-tip in his ear. His pockets hold a strange assortment of odds and ends that provoke conversation and laughter: two slide rules, dental floss, extra shoe strings, a calculator, rubber cement, a tiny oil can, five combs, an IBM reference chart and a hundred pennies.
"Whenever I think of something to add, I add it," MacDonald said.
When he walks into restaurants, heads turn. He's gotten calls from women who want to go out with him, from old people who remember how they were treated as nerds in school, and from young people who feel like nerds now.
"There is nothing funnier than the human animal," according to Walt Disney, cartoonist and producer (1901-1966).

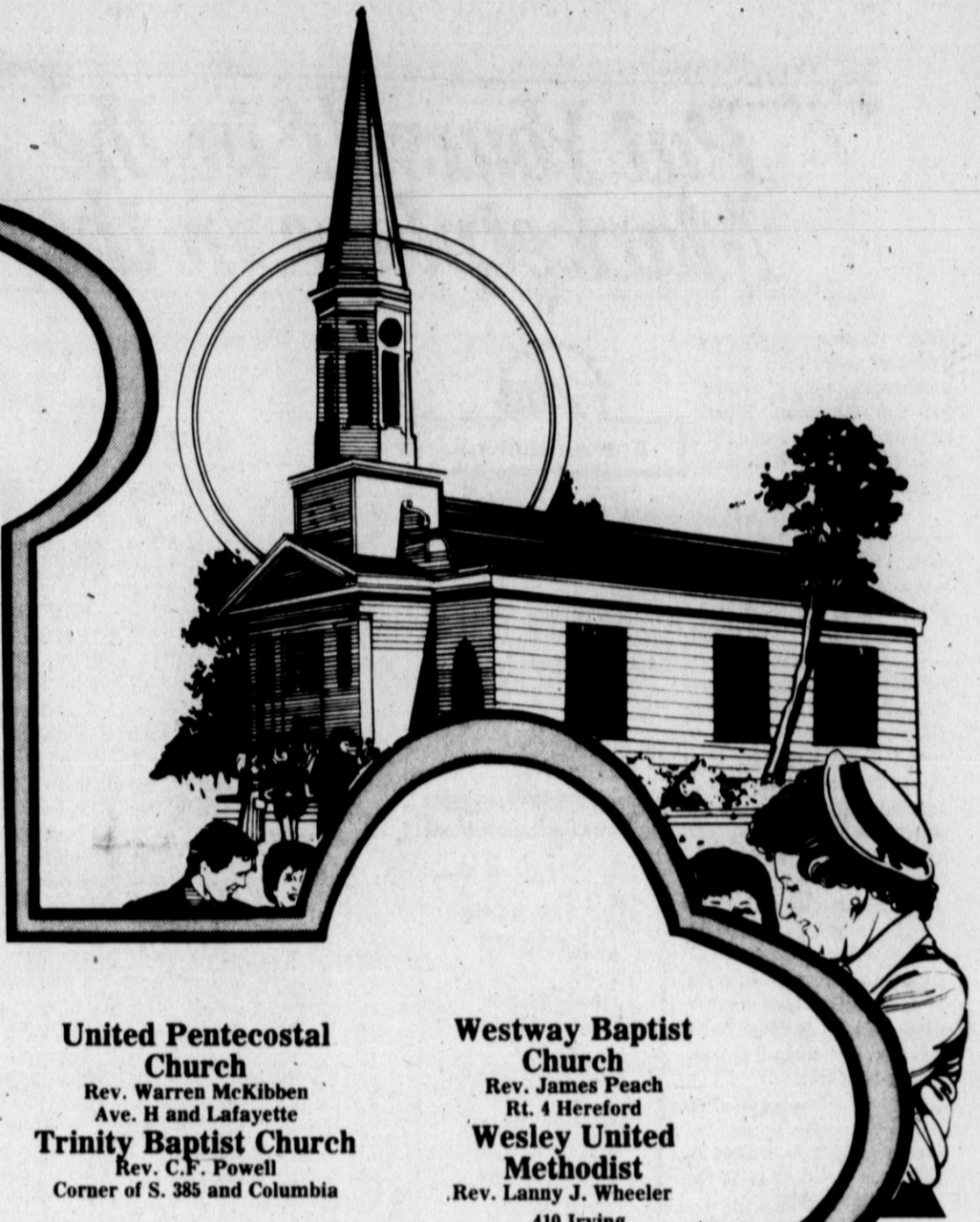
