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## Hereford man cruises with the U.S. Navy

Ask Neil McNutt of Hereford what he liked best about his vacation this summer and he most likely will respond: "Everything!"

And well he might. McNutt was one among 927 civilians sailing from Hawaii to San Diego aboard the U.S.S. Nimitz, a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier.

He boarded the giant ship in Pearl Harbor on July 23 and arrived in San Diego, Cal., on July 29. The days, and nights, were chockful of new experiences for the veteran agricultural pilot.

McNutt was invited to make the cruise by a Hereford High School graduate, Steve Hope, who is an E-3 petty officer aboard the Nimitz.

Operation Tiger Cruise is a special public relations program of the Navy. Guests were invited by a family member or friend to join the cruise.

"Steve and I got to be good friends when he worked for me at the airport," said McNutt, senior pilot with American Dusting Company. "He was responsible for my invitation."

Except for the air fare from the mainland to Hawaii, the cruise cost neither McNutt nor Hope a penny.

In a week full of experiences to cherish, McNutt believes the departure of the Nimitz from Pearl Harbor, sailing past the World War II sunken U.S.S. Arizona, will remain forever in his memory.

"The men were wearing dress whites, standing at attention on the flight deck as we passed the Arizona," he recalled. "I could look down and see the outline of the sunken ship."

"There was not a sound on deck. They held the hand salute until we had cleared the harbor."

"It causes chills all over you when you see it."

During the next several days, Navy personnel conducted the visitors on tours of the ship, introduced them to the day-to-day operations of the carrier and treated them to a display of the Navy's strength.

"We got to watch aircraft launch from 'vultures row' on the control

island of the carrier," he explained. During the launch activity, McNutt was positioned just behind the "air boss," the man responsible for all the take-off and landing procedures.

The visitors toured all areas of the ship except the nuclear reactor and main shaft rooms, McNutt said. During the cruise, he learned to get around the ship alone although he usually was accompanied by his sponsor, Steve Hope.

"I could find my way to chow and to quarters," said McNutt. Speaking of food aboard ship, the Hereford man said he found most meals nourishing and tasty. However to break the monotony of shipboard

meals, the carrier has a fast food mess hall.

"They call it the McNimitz," laughed McNutt.

Besides launch and recovery of the ship's aircraft, there were training sessions involving gunnery, aircraft fly-by and other maneuvers.

The carrier was accompanied by three other ships and although McNutt said they were told a submarine was in the group, too, he never saw it.

The nuclear carrier, named for Admiral Chester Nimitz, the Texan who commanded the fleet in the Pacific during World War II, is a (See NIMITZ, Page 2A)

## State weather records fall as heat continues

Record-breaking dry weather continues to seethe across the state this summer, claiming as its latest victims residents in Central and South Texas.

Austin and San Antonio on Friday broke records for consecutive days without rain as both cities hit day 55, and forecasters aren't calling for a change any time soon.

In San Antonio, this summer's rainless period is the longest dry spell in more than a century.

The Alamo City had a 44-day dry period last fall, from Sept. 15 to Oct. 28. The current spell, however, stands alone in the city's 108-year-old collection of weather records.

"For the agricultural community, this is most definitely a drought," said Mike Albach, manager of the planning division of the Edwards Underground Water District.

"But for San Antonio, which has a public water purveyor, this is just a prolonged dry spell because of the ample amounts of underground water after the wet spring," he said.

Austin shattered a 1962 record of 54 consecutive days without rain. That dry spell was from July 1 to Aug. 24. And Friday's high of 100 degrees tied the record of 11 consecutive 100-degree days set in 1962 and 1986.

The Dallas-Fort Worth area in July marked its first rainless month since November 1903. Besides 0.66 inch of rain recorded on Aug. 7, Dallas has seen no rainfall since June 25, according to the National Weather Service.

For those people whose patience is pushing the mercury along with the temperatures, forecasters say hold on a little longer. The current dry streak is expected to continue into next week.

The stagnant late-summer pattern that has prevailed is expected to break down at some point, although it was hard to tell Friday when or how that would happen, said San Antonio weather service forecaster Robert Blaha.

Stephen Leach, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Austin, says it may take an extreme

change in the weather before Texas sees some relief. "It probably will take a tropical storm to break us out and give us a lot of rain," Leach said.

## Experience with pope changes youths' lives

Youth and adults from Hereford added their voices to thousands greeting Pope John Paul II and worshipping with him during World Youth Day in Denver, Colo.

Traveling by bus to Colorado, the

Hereford delegation of youth and adults between the ages of 13 and 39 joined with people from 105 different countries in the celebration.

St. Anthony's Catholic Church and San Jose Catholic Church members joined forces over six months to pursue their dreams of visiting with

leader of the worldwide Catholic Church.

"The pope is the father of all people in the Catholic religion," said 16-year-old David Farr. "He is the most important man in the world."

Directed by their respective coordinators, church members

initiated bake sales, donation drives and breakfasts to raise the necessary \$162 per person.

"Our responsibilities were minimal. The Amarillo Diocese organized transportation and tickets for the 572 area participants," said Teresa Munoz, a chaperon on the trip.

Each diocese was placed in a lottery to determine who would receive tickets for the numerous events.

About fifty Hereford residents left for Colorado early in the morning on August 11.

Arriving in Denver, the group was welcomed by the Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic Church who served as host to the Texans.

The youth immediately began a whirlwind of activities.

"We got to the church and then turned around and went to the Civic Center Park for a concert with Wynona Judd and Ricky Skaggs," said Trisha Munoz, a twenty-year-old participant.

"I was surprised at the number of free concerts," said Jacquelyn Bezner. "We left the park at 11:30 p.m. and could still hear the music for hours later."

Bezner attended the celebration with a church from the Fort Collins, Colo., area.

She was one of a few students chosen to attend the opening mass early Wednesday afternoon.

"It was a beautiful procession of bishops and cardinals from around the world," said Bezner.

Amy Liscano also received a special opportunity after a nomination by her pastor based on her faith and dedication to the community.

"I was nominated by my pastor to meet the pope and President Clinton as they arrived at Stapleton Airport

Thursday," said Liscano, a 17-year-old member of San Jose Catholic Church.

While the pope and president arrived separately, the waiting crowd enjoyed music despite a constant drizzle of rain.

"Even though I was sopping wet, having the pope so close to me was amazing," stressed Liscano.

"I couldn't believe how big the President's plane was. But, he and his family look just like they do on T.V.," she said.

Those not fortunate enough to attend the airport ceremony participated in seminars throughout the day. Students were divided by age groups.

"The purpose of the seminars was to get everyone to communicate with one another. All of the speakers encouraged us to take what we learned over the week and evangelize in our communities," said Trisha Munoz.

At 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, a crowd of approximately 75,000 gathered in Mile High Stadium to officially welcome Pope John Paul II.

"When everyone saw the pope fly in they screamed and hollered. You couldn't hear anything," said Farr.

The noise level reached such high levels the stadium screens shook.

"Seeing the pope made me tingle all over," said Paul Guerrero, a 15-year-old from San Jose. "My heart had never beat so fast."

During the welcome, the pope focused on the theme, "We are One Body."

Gifts presented to the pope included a pair of tennis shoes with gold laces.

"It was hilarious. He even wore (See POPE, Page 2A)

# Health reform 'next step,' Clinton says

EDGARTOWN, Mass. (AP) - President Clinton Saturday was mixing vacation fun with a serious call to arms for health-care reform, declaring that Americans need "the security of knowing that health care is always there for you."  
Clinton's weekly radio address, taped before he left Washington for an 11-day vacation on Martha's Vineyard, said America "must take the next step" now that his economic package has won final approval.  
"We must reform our health-care system so that you and every American will be assured not only of economic security, but the security of knowing that health care is always there for you," he said.  
The Clinton presidency is in low gear right now, as the president and his family relax at a private beachfront compound on this 100-square-mile island. He's not expected back in Washington until Aug. 29.  
Behind the scenes, however, administration officials are gearing up for the September release of Clinton's oft-delayed health-care plan. The president sought to answer his critics in advance by offering a string of assurances in his radio address.  
"The plan will be built on three guiding principles: security, savings and simplicity," the president said.

records from Richards' tenure as state treasurer show she ran a sophisticated political operation on state time.  
Richards' press secretary Bill Cryer said the Republicans' allegations are "ridiculous."  
Richards, a Democrat, was treasurer from 1983 until 1991. Mrs. Hutchison, a Republican, succeeded Richards as head of the agency and served 2 1/2 years before winning

election to the U.S. Senate June 5.  
A Travis County grand jury is looking into allegations that state equipment and employees may have been used for personal and political purposes under Mrs. Hutchison.  
But Ms. Hughes says records obtained by The Associated Press Friday from Richards' tenure at the Treasury "appear to show an entire political organization in a state office."  
"If they have allegations that anything was done political in nature at the Treasury, they are barking up the wrong tree," Cryer said.  
"Nothing like that was ever done."  
The records outline several headings for files stored on Treasury computers under Richards, including, "Campaign Services," "Contribution" and "AWR Personal Correspondence."  
Cryer confirmed that the 10 pages of records filled with headings for various files were kept on agency computers. But he said the file names were a simple catalogue for letters that came in to or were sent out by Richards or Treasury employees.  
Cryer said if a letter was political or personal, it would be forwarded to Richards' campaign office, which operated separately from the Treasury.  
"This is a correspondence log," Cryer said. "When we received letters at the Treasury asking a political question or asking for political information, we undoubtedly logged it in and then batched it up and sent it over to the political office."  
"I am sure that's the way any thoughtful political official handles this. We have no control over who sends us letters or why."  
State law forbids public officials

from using a state office for non-state business.  
The records were discovered by attorneys assisting Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison through a two-month-old grand jury investigation of possible wrongdoing while she led the Treasury, according to Mrs. Hutchison's campaign spokesman David Beckwith.  
Ms. Hughes said Friday the matter needs to be investigated the same way Mrs. Hutchison is being examined by Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, a Democrat.  
Mrs. Hutchison has called the probe an attempt by Democrats to derail her re-election bid next year.  
"This raises disturbing questions, not only about Richards' use of state computers for personal and political business, but also the fairness of justice in Travis County," Ms. Hughes said.  
"This is hard evidence that state computers, state offices and employees, who worked on those computers, were involved in personal and political work on state time."  
Ms. Hughes said the Treasury file names from Richards' tenure such as "Campaign Services," "Contribution" and "Congratulatory" appear to "have very little to do with state business and very much to do with running a state campaign."  
"These are the kinds of files you put together when you are running for a political office in the state of Texas," Ms. Hughes said.  
"I don't really have any idea what 'Contribution' or 'Congratulatory' are," Cryer said. "I don't have any ability to go and dig these things out."  
"A lot of this probably was destroyed as a matter of space-saving

96,000-ton ship. It stands 11 stories tall from the water line.  
Aircraft, including a squadron of the F-14 Super Tom Cat made famous in the motion picture "Top Gun," leave and return to a flight deck 1,029 feet long, more than three times the length of a football playing field.  
Seven squadrons with a complement of 2,500 men and officers are stationed on the Nimitz, in addition to the ship's crew of 3,300 men and officers.  
A ceremony marking the change of command of one squadron was conducted while McNutt was aboard the Nimitz. He lists that event as one

of the most impressive scenes he witnessed.  
McNutt especially enjoyed meeting the commanding officer, Capt. John B. Nathman, during the cruise. He also was treated to a visit to the officers' mess aboard the ship.  
The Nimitz had been in the Persian Gulf on Operation Southern Watch for nine months before sailing back to U.S. waters and hosting Operation Tiger Cruise.  
"While on board the carrier, visitors were expected to abide by regulations, including participation in certain drills executed by crew."  
"We were roused at 6 o'clock one

morning for a man-overboard drill," McNutt related. "Each man had a specific station to report to so they could be sure everyone was accounted for."  
After 20 minutes, the head count determined no one was missing, McNutt continued.  
"As it turned out, someone's lifejacket had blown overboard, but they had to be sure there was no one in it," he added. "They had a helicopter standing by to conduct a search, if anyone was missing."  
McNutt's host on the cruise, Steve Hope, expects to be discharged from active duty next month. He has spent almost two years in the Navy and on

Abilene Bankshares is the parent company of Hereford State Bank.  
The acquisition contemplates an offer by the Abilene company to exchange about 1.2 shares of its common stock for each share of Concho Bancshares stock.  
Following completion of the stock exchange, Concho Bancshares will be merged into First Abilene Bankshares, and Southwest Bank of San Angelo will become a member of that holding company.  
The overall transaction is to be more completely defined in a written contract and will be subject to regulatory approval.  
Concho Bancshares has approximately 200 shareholders in the San Angelo area. The company's principal asset is Southwest Bank of San Angelo, which was chartered in 1975 and currently has total assets of

\$91 million and shareholders' equity of \$6.5 million.  
Under the proposal, Southwest Bank will retain its name and status as a state chartered banking organization with existing management and directors.  
"The directors of Concho Bancshares and Southwest Bank are enthusiastic about the proposed affiliation with First Abilene Bankshares and the potential benefits for our shareholders, customers and employees," said Drake.  
"We are extremely pleased to have the opportunity to be associated with Southwest Bank and its shareholders," Murphy said. "We have high regard for the directors and management of this fine bank, and we look forward to working with them in providing high quality financial services in the San Angelo market."  
First Abilene Bankshares is the parent company of, in addition to Hereford State Bank, First National Bank of Abilene; First National Bank, Sweetwater; Eastland National Bank, Eastland; First National Bank in Cleburne; and Stephenville Bank and Trust Co., Stephenville.  
Consolidated assets of the company totaled \$877 million as of June 30, and shareholders' equity amounted to \$86 million. Common stock of the company, traded over-the-counter, is currently quoted with a bid/ask price of \$39/\$43 per share.

# Country's savers having problems

NEW YORK (AP) - What has this country got against savers?

Extolled in words by presidents, legislators, bankers, economists and those who proclaim them to be the salt of the earth, savers and the things they stand for are frequently violated in deed.

Not organized politically, they are often overlooked, taken for granted, ignored.

By whom? Well, to cite the latest case, the president of the United States and his staff, who suggest that their proposed tax increases will be greatly offset by low interest rates.

It's true in a way: true for borrowers, but painful for savers, who are the lenders. But thinking of borrowers, even at the expense of savers, is an old habit at the very highest levels of government and industry.

Some might recall, for example, those awful 1970s (for savers), when inflation allowed borrowers to repay in ever-cheaper dollars and take a tax deduction on top of everything.

While borrowers were thus enriched - it was a decade when real estate millionaires were made overnight - savers were forced to accept a cap on interest "earned," and pay income tax on fictional earnings.

They were earning nothing, of course; they were losing every day because inflation was depreciating the buying power of their savings. And then they had to pay taxes on their interest "income," making their losses even worse.

Meanwhile, those who borrowed the money of savers were in effect making money every day and getting a tax deduction to boot. They borrowed \$1 and repaid perhaps 25 cents, and had their note stamped "paid in full."

Something had to be done for savers. Weren't they, after all, the folks who provided capital for economic expansion, i.e., for the creation of new companies and jobs and wages and profits? And, of course, tax revenue!

Deregulation of banks was instituted in the late 1970s, allowing interest rates to seek market levels. Immediately, interest income as a percent of disposable income soared, from under 11 percent in 1978 to 18 percent in 1989.

In addition, Individual Retirement Accounts came into being, allowing

# Guards at Smithsonian do more than just protect museum relics

WASHINGTON (AP) - All day long they get question after question: "Where's the bathroom?" "Where's the Hope Diamond?" "Have you seen my 5-year-old son?" Sometimes their feet hurt. Sometimes they get headaches. Still, many Smithsonian museum guards say nothing beats peak tourist season.

"I love it, I love it, I love it," said Martin Slydell, a guard at the National Museum of American History. "I mean - Arizona, Texas,

Georgia, Alabama, California, Chicago, New York - there are people from everywhere."

In the summer months, the paths along the national Mall fill with rivers of people, cameras dangling from their wrists, money pouches around their waists, sneakers on their feet.

The museums of the Smithsonian often are their first destination in town. And the museum guards among the first people they met.

So protecting precious artifacts is only a small part of each day's work for the guards: They're also part tour

guide, part Dear Abby. They explain how to use the city's subway system, tell visitors where to find exhibits they came to see, point them toward landmarks like the Capitol, and make them feel welcome.

Many visitors zigzagging through the dimly lit American History lobby fail to notice Slydell - a 50-year-old man standing tall and proud in an immaculate guard's uniform.

But he takes everything in. In the year he's been at the museum, he has methodically memorized everything. Whatever the question, chances are he'll have the answer.

Those who ask about the Foucault Pendulum, a top attraction, are told:

"There are 64 pegs up there. One is knocked down every 20 minutes. When one is knocked down ... it means the Earth has rotated 15 degrees. ... In a 24-hour period, all of them will be knocked down. The museum is rotating beneath the pendulum."

Slydell talks to curators when they set up new exhibits. He reads all the pamphlets.

When he offers facts and figures,

visitors often stare in wonder.

"A lot of people are expecting security to say, 'Don't do this. Don't do that,'" he said. "They don't expect us to be educated."

When 22-year-old Elaine Slay got a job as a Hirshhorn Museum guard two years ago, she didn't know a Picasso from a Calder. She was like many tourists who wander into the donut-shaped museum of modern art.

"They may say things like, 'What is this? My child can do this. You guard this stuff? Is this what they call art?'" Slay said.

But Slay has grown to love the paintings since she started reading exhibit labels and listening to tours.

"Just because a painting has squiggly lines doesn't mean it's art. But it doesn't mean it isn't art either," she said.

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# Siamese twins separated in surgery; Amy dies so Angela could get heart



PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Kenneth and Reitha "Joey" Lakeberg sacrificed one daughter so her twin might have a chance to live.

After 5-1/2 hours of surgery to separate the 7-week-old Siamese twins, Angela Lakeberg was resting comfortably in intensive care today at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Her condition was critical but stable.

"I honestly didn't think either one would make it out of the operating room," the father said. Although doctors gave Angela a slim chance of long-term survival, Lakeberg said he felt "totally optimistic."

"She looks good," he told WBBM-TV of Chicago. "She's got her color. She opened her eyes just briefly, and then went back to sleep of course. But we got to hold her hand and stroke her hair and she looks good."

The other twin, Amy Lakeberg, died about two-thirds of the way through Friday's operation, said Dr. James A. O'Neill Jr., the chief surgeon.

Members of the 18-member surgical team that severed Angela's liver from Amy's and sewed the twins' shared heart into Angela said they were encouraged by early signs of success.

"I don't think it was a miracle," O'Neill said. "It was a lot of hard

work." Doctors decided which twin would live based on anatomy, O'Neill said. Before the surgery, nurses painted Angela's tiny fingernails pink and left her sister's bare.

Georgia Welsh, the twins' aunt, said she was surprised at the choice, since Amy seemed to be more aggressive. "Amy was always leaning over and pinching Angela," she said.

Family members said their good-byes to Amy before the operation.

Surgeons first separated the twins' liver tissue, then moved on to reconstructing the six-chambered heart. A normal heart has four chambers.

The shared heart was insufficient to keep both alive for more than a few more weeks, doctors said.

Welsh sat outside the hospital during the early hours of the surgery. In one hand, she clutched a plaster imprint of both the twins' 2-inch hands, made minutes before they were anesthetized for surgery. In the other, she held a clown doll the twins played with during their last moments of consciousness together.

The operation was the fourth at the hospital on conjoined twins with shared hearts. The longest survivor, separated in 1977, died of liver failure after three months.

O'Neill acknowledged the chances

of long-term survival for Angela were slim. He said, however, that surgery would not have been recommended had there not been a reasonable chance.

The twins were born June 29 at Loyola University Medical Center in suburban Chicago. Doctors there

opposed separation. Lakeberg, of Wheatfield, Ind., and his wife brought their daughters to Philadelphia on Tuesday.

Indiana Public Aid provides \$997 per day, and Children's Hospital has said it will absorb the rest.

## TAES to cut number of districts from 14 to 12

COLLEGE STATION — The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has decided to redistrict in order to cut administrative costs and respond to the changing needs of the state.

The plan reduces the number of districts from 14 to 12, but no district offices will close, said Dr. Zerle Carpenter, director of the Extension Service. Neither will extension programs be curtailed because of the change.

The plan eliminates one of two current district offices located in Overton in East Texas and one of the two located at the Bryan annex of Texas A&M University.

Several of the district Extension director positions are vacant, so staffing changes are expected to be minimal. Two district directors and some support personnel are expected to be reassigned.

"This plan will save more than \$300,000 per year to Extension, and

allows for a more uniform distribution of counties and county Extension agents among the 12 districts," Carpenter said.

The plan goes into effect Sept. 1. A one-year period will be allowed for various groups served by Extension to make adjustments to the new district lines.

"As these adjustments are made, I hope that the number of youth and adults serving in leadership roles will not be diminished, but rather enhanced through creative organizational structuring," he said.

Carpenter said the redistricting provides for a more uniform grouping of urban and rural counties for more efficient and effective consumer and family education programs.

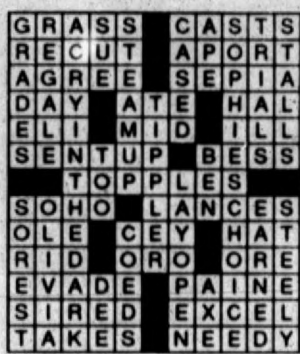
The plan essentially returns the Extension Service to the same number of districts it had 20 years ago.

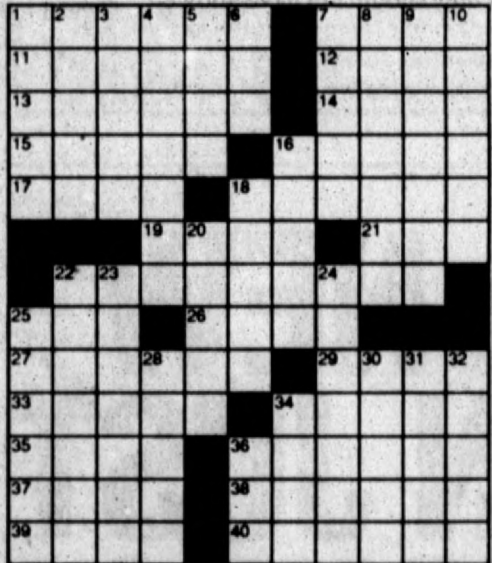

## Herd has work left after Plainview scrimmage

## Herd DE Kuper on all-star team

Hereford's senior and junior football players got their first work against real opponents Friday in Plainview, and they came away knowing they had work to do.

The tough, older Plainview squad was clearly ahead of the Herd. The Bulldogs, ranked third in Class 4A by one publication, returns the better part of last year's team that beat Hereford

in bi-district.

Each team got six sets of 20 plays on offense. Plainview got into the end zone 10 times while Hereford didn't at all.

"The offense, execution-wise, was very poor. The things we worked on in practice, we didn't do in the scrimmage," said Hereford coach Danny Haney, adding: "I thought we hurt ourselves badly with dropped passes and fumbles."

The Whitefaces are adding a new passing system to the offense, and it'll take time to get it down, Haney said. Hereford had some success with it Friday, but most of the passes by quarterbacks Elias Reyna and Michael Brown went for incompletions, though several good passes were dropped.

Hereford showed some fire during the first-team offense's second set.

Tight end Mark Kuper caught a 20-yard pass, then tailback Marquise Brown ran over Bulldogs on consecutive plays, but Hereford ran out of plays at that point.

In Hereford's last offensive session, two drives went deep into Plainview territory, but both were killed by turnovers--one on an interception on a tipped ball.

Most of Plainview's scores came when the second or third squads were in the game, and many of them were on long plays--a problem which can be corrected.

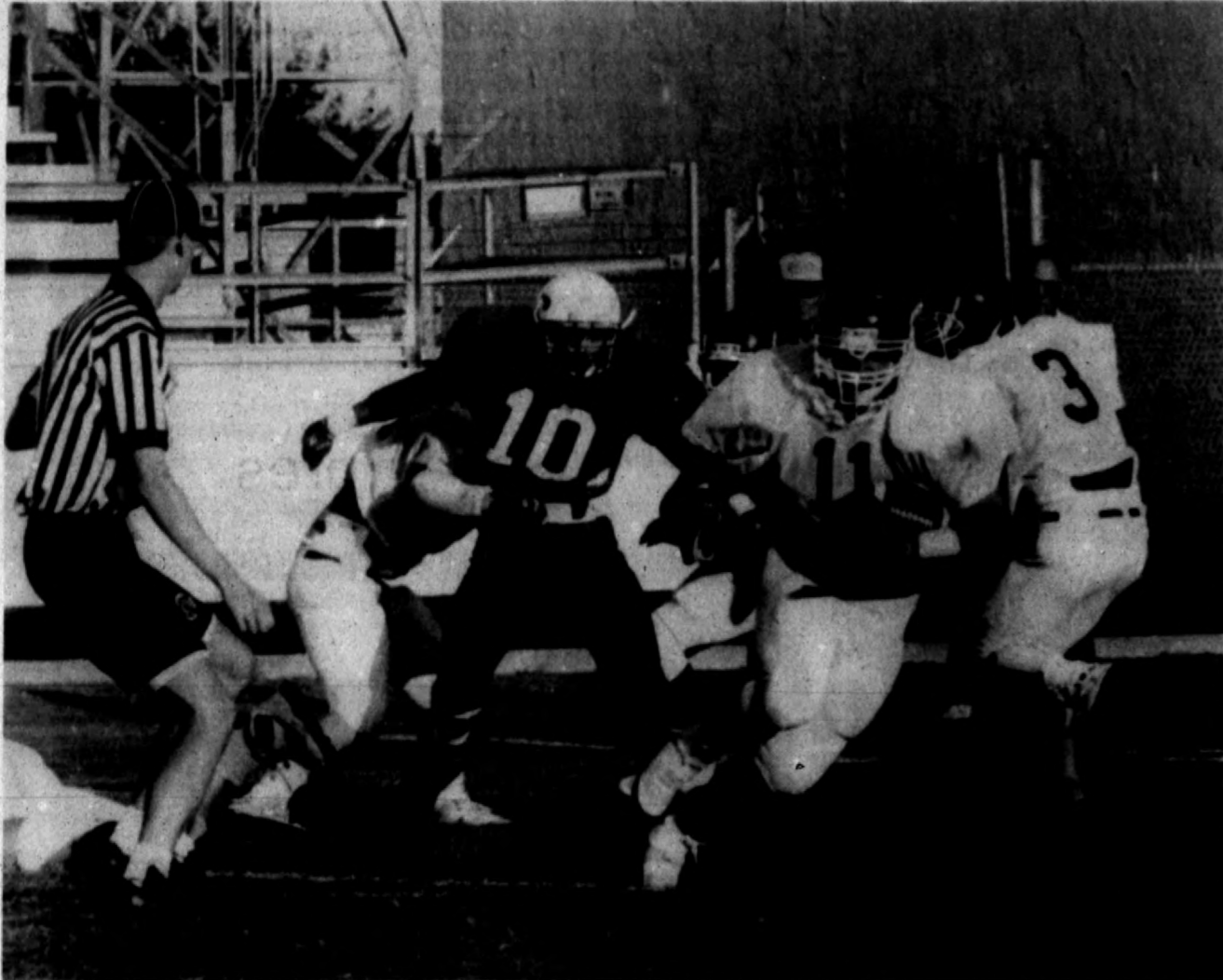
"I thought in the first round, the

first 20 plays, we played very good defense," Haney said. Plainview scored twice in the session: once on a 20-yard run by the quarterback, and once on a 20-yard pass play.

"We stood up toe-to-toe to them," Haney said. "They're a lot bigger than we are, but we stood toe-to-toe with them. They had to pass to score. We made some mistakes in the later sessions that allowed them to score with the run."

Hereford senior defensive end Mark Kuper received a statewide honor by being named to The Associated Press Preseason Super Team, which was released Saturday.

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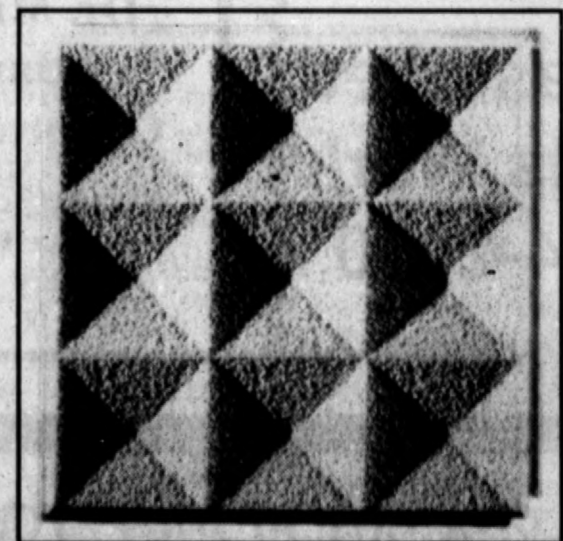

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# S'lake Carroll will repeat; Davis may just win

DALLAS (AP) - Sure, Southlake Carroll looks like a lock for repeat Class 3A title, and Jerod Douglas is the type of player that can make Converse Judson the first Class 5A repeat winner in six years.

But those aren't very risky picks. This is going out on a limb: Houston Davis will win.

No, not a state title. Not even a District 20-4A crown. But they will finally win, ending the nation's longest-ever losing streak that enters the year at 73. Their last victory was in the sixth game of the 1985 season.

The run likely will end either in week six on the road against Houston Furr or two weeks later at home against Houston Westley.

"We figure we'll start with the first one," Davis coach Chuck Arnold said. "If it doesn't pan out we'll go to the next one and just keep trying until we get the monkey off our back."

As for the rest of the 1993 season, here's what The Associated Press' crystal pigskin sees:

**CLASS 5A: Converse Judson in Division I; Arlington Lamar in Division II**  
Judson is a no-brainer; as easy a

choice as it is hard to tackle Douglas. With one of the state's largest talent pools to choose from and a recent tradition rivaled only by Odessa Permian, the Rockets will celebrate the 10-year anniversary of their first title with their third.

An interesting sidelight to this year's team is that the quarterback is Clint Rutledge, the only child of coach D.W. Rutledge.

The elder Rutledge's words are tinged with emotions as he describes the bond he has with this team because of his son and his friends, whom the coach has watched grow up on and off the field.

"Every year, I get to know the classes well, but when they're away at your house, you get even closer to them."

One game to watch is a week four game on the road against defending Division II champion Temple, which ended Judson's long home winning streak last year. It was the Rockets' only loss of the season.

As for Lamar, coach Eddy Peach's squad is poised to avenge a 1990 title game loss to Aldine.

The Vikings have a lot going for them, especially a region in which Dallas Kimball and Dallas Carter are the top threats. Carter knocked Lamar out of the playoffs in the first round last year.

**CLASS 3A: Southlake Carroll Who else?**  
Bob Ledbetter's victory machine is the team to watch again as it adds to its state-record regular-season winning streak of 61 games and heads toward a national record with its seventh straight undefeated regular season.

Graduation has taken its toll, but with all-sport superstar Dane Johnson in the backfield - at quarterback or running back - the Dragons are the surest thing going.

But don't expect Ledbetter to agree. "This is the year people have been looking for Carroll to have," he said. "We're a normal school and we'll have these ups and downs."

Sorry, Bob. Normal schools don't go 96-5-1 in seven years.

**CLASS 4A: A&M Consolidated**  
The mere thought of repeating last year's exciting Class 4A title game between Waxahachie and Jeff Watson--err, A&M Consolidated--is a great thought.

But with the Indians having lost quarterback Lamont Moore to Baylor, the Watson-led Tigers are a lock to win their second title in three years.

The only possible weakness is a lack of experienced running backs, but that'll be overcome by Watson and a strong receiving corps.

A challenge will come in the opening week against Belton, which beat A&M each of the last two years. Should they get past that hurdle, an undefeated season could loom.

**CLASS 2A: Honey Grove**  
This will be a sweet choice and even tastier revenge for the Warriors, who sprung to a district title in 1992 after winning five games the previous year.

Unlike the cartoon coach by the same name, Charlie Brown has a solid squad. He's getting back nine starters on offense and 10 on defense from last year's team that went undefeated until losing a tiebreaker in the first round of the playoffs.

The Warriors' biggest challenge will be getting past highly touted

Omaha Paul Pewitt in Region III.

**CLASS 1A: Runge**  
More revenge, this time for the Yellowjackets.

Like Honey Grove, Runge's only non-victory was a playoff tie. The Yellowjackets' season ended because of one more penetration by Bartlett,

which won the state title two weeks later.

Coach Carl Peters returns half the starters from a 12-0-1 team that should again breeze through the region (even getting past Bartlett, which is rebuilding after losing six key players) and into the semis.

From there, it's just two more wins and a title.

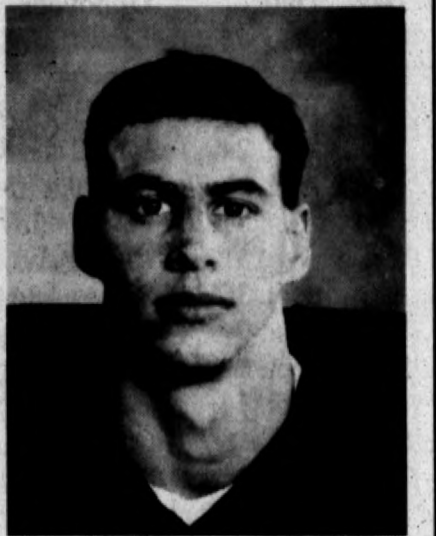

## Robinson aims to revive Southern Cal

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Southern Cal hasn't been the same since John Robinson left after the 1982 season. Now Robinson is back for a second term as head coach, hoping to restore the glory to one of the nation's most famous football programs.

USC's record under Robinson from 1976-82 was 67-13-2. The Trojans have declined since then, going 26-20-1 in four seasons under Ted Lottner and 44-25-3 in six years with Larry Smith at the helm.

Even worse, Southern Cal was 0-10 against Notre Dame and 4-5-1 against UCLA in the Tollner-Smith years. In Robinson's first head coaching stint at USC, the Trojans were 6-1 against Notre Dame and 5-2 against UCLA.

Southern Cal's appearance in the Freedom Bowl last winter turned out to be Smith's final game. He was fired after a 24-7 loss to Fresno State and Robinson, who was let go by the Los Angeles Rams a year earlier, was rehired almost immediately.

With Robinson in charge and a lot of starters returning, the Trojans should improve on last year's 6-5-1 record.

"Offensively, we will try to evolve back to the type of offense that we've run in the past, which I've always referred to as a balanced offense," Robinson said.

That means a lot of student body left and student body right, a

run-oriented system that produced two Heisman Trophy winners - Charles White and Marcus Allen - in Robinson's previous seven-year tenure.

Returning to the top of the Pac-10 might be too tall an order for the Trojans considering the opposition.

The Washington Huskies, 31-5 the past three years, hope to play in their fourth straight Rose Bowl on New Year's Day and are the preseason favorites. However, their fate might be determined before they play their first game.

The school's football program faces a series of challenges by the conference, including alleged improprieties involving Husky boosters and athletes.

Even if the verdict later this month is favorable, Washington has no automatic ticket back to Pasadena.

"I would think that there are probably about a half-dozen teams in our league that can win the title," Coach Don James said. "I think our league race is probably as wide open as it's ever been."

Bill Walsh is in his second tour of duty as Stanford's head coach. Walsh returned a year ago and led the Cardinal to a 10-3 record, including a 24-3 victory over Penn State in the Blockbuster Bowl.

"We're very excited about our program," Walsh said. "We're counting heavily on our top-flight freshmen group to come and participate very early."

Washington, Stanford and Southern Cal were among six Pac-10 teams to play in bowl games last season. The others were Arizona, Oregon and Washington State.

UCLA, Arizona State and California didn't play in bowl games, but they weren't that bad. UCLA and Arizona State were 6-5, and injury-plagued Cal was 4-7.

Oregon State was bad. The Beavers went 1-9-1 last year, and don't figure to be much better this year.

The Western Athletic Conference had one of its best years in 1992, sending a record five teams to bowls. WAC coaches believe this season could be even better.

"The competition in the WAC is the best it's been in 32 years of

existence," Brigham Young's LaVell Edwards said.

"The WAC is at its zenith," San Diego State's Al Luginbill said. "We're not just a basketball conference anymore."

BYU, Fresno State and Hawaii finished in a three-way tie for the conference title last year, with San Diego State one game back.

The league's most celebrated player is San Diego State's Marshall Faulk, a junior who led the nation in rushing the last two years.

Utah State, which hasn't won a conference title since 1979, is the preseason favorite in the Big West Conference based on experience - 15 starters return from last year's 5-6 team. Nevada, Louisiana Tech and San Jose State are other possible contenders.

The American team won nine of the 12 track and field events at the first modern Olympics in 1896.

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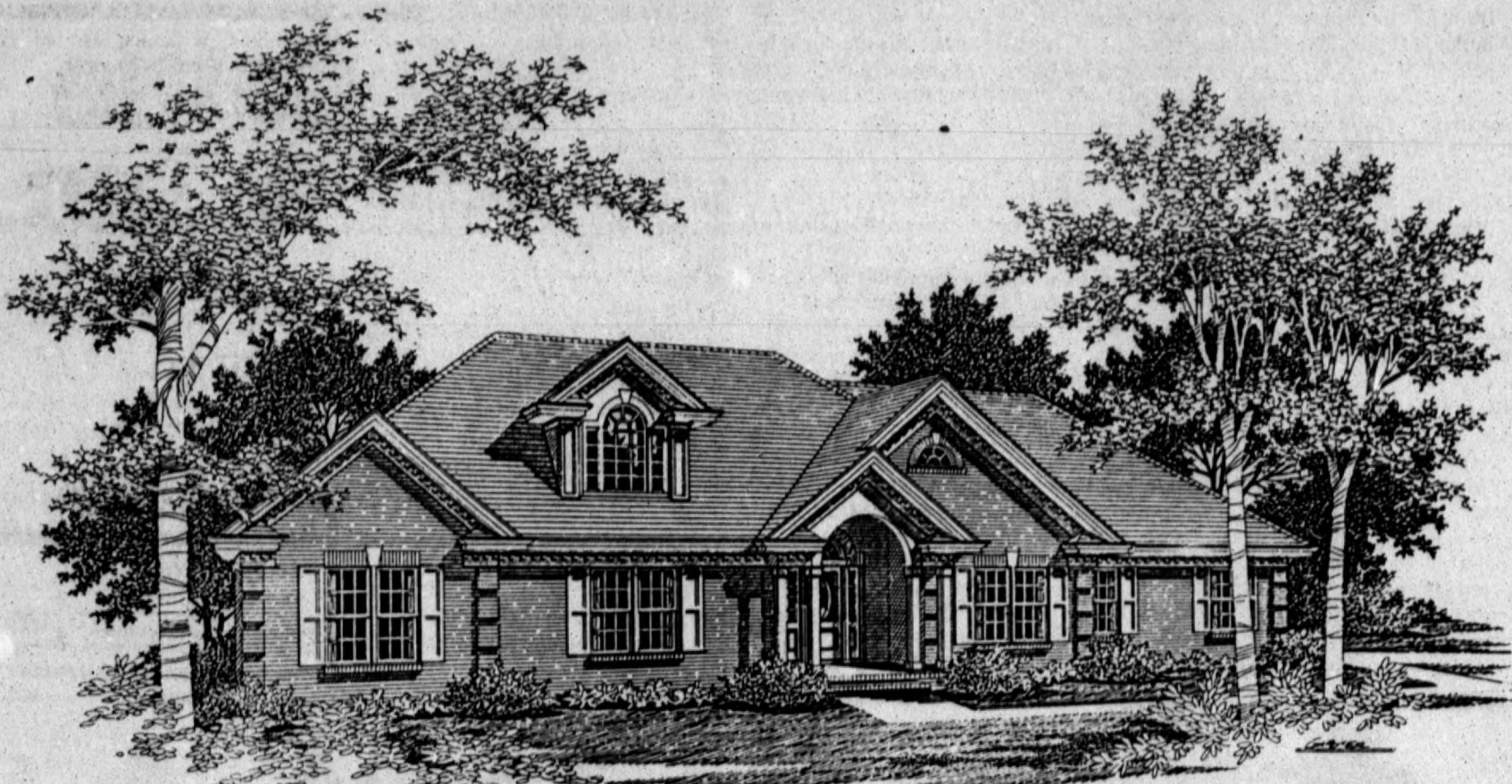
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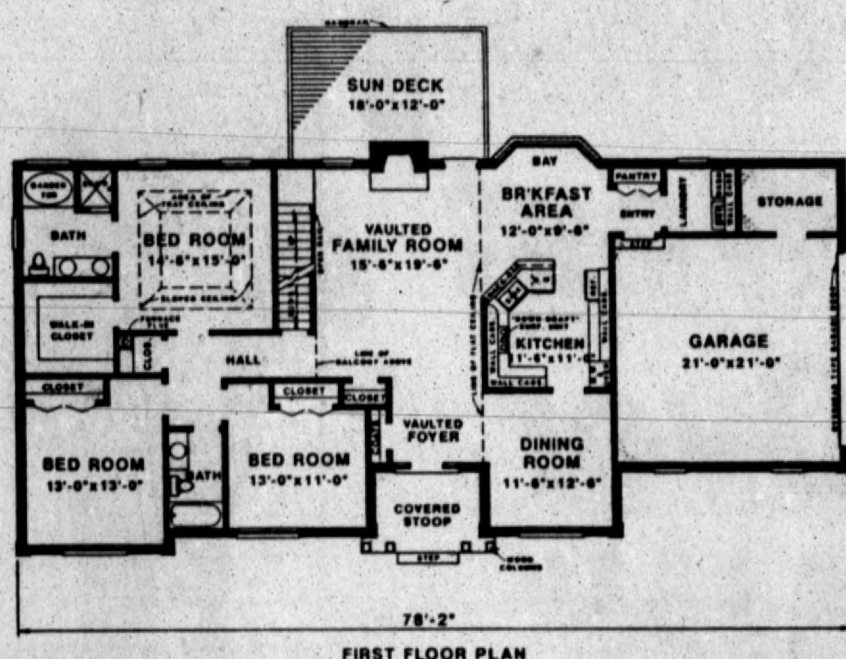




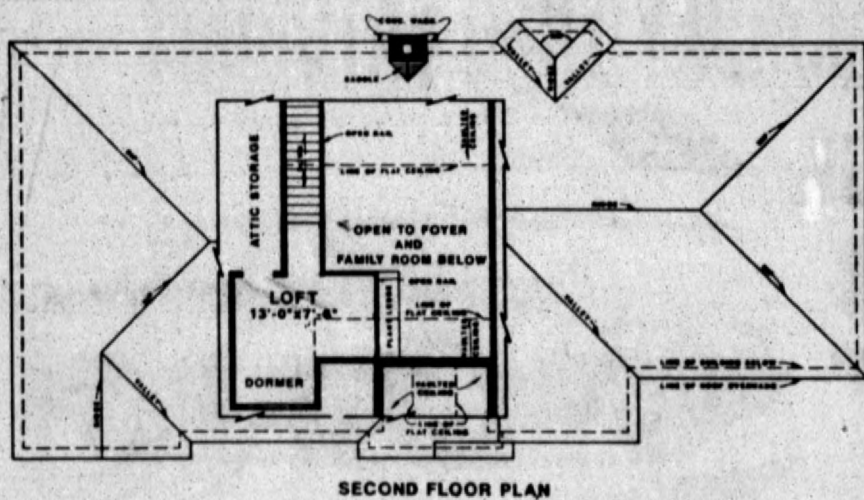

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**A.** There are several angles to consider when the draft does not appear adequate. Most wood stoves have recommended drafts. You can

check this with a manometer that should register .05 in. of water when placed in the flue. The location of the stove in the house is also important. If the stove is in the lower level of a tri-level, 14 feet of chimney may not be enough. Large trees can interfere with your draft causing high-pressure areas around your chimney. Also, you could have air leaks in your house, causing air to rush out various cracks creating a lower pressure around your stove. Opening a window slightly sometimes helps, but it must be on the pressure side of the house. Opening and closing doors of certain rooms can sometimes affect the air pressure in a house as well.

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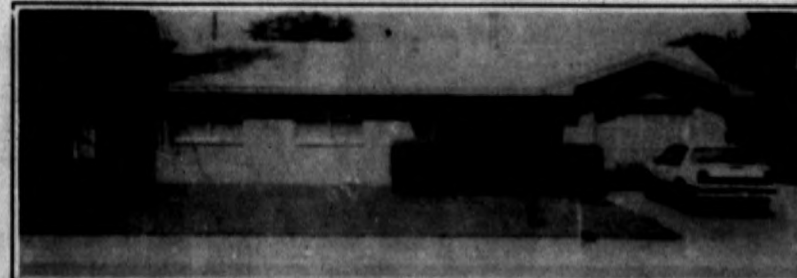
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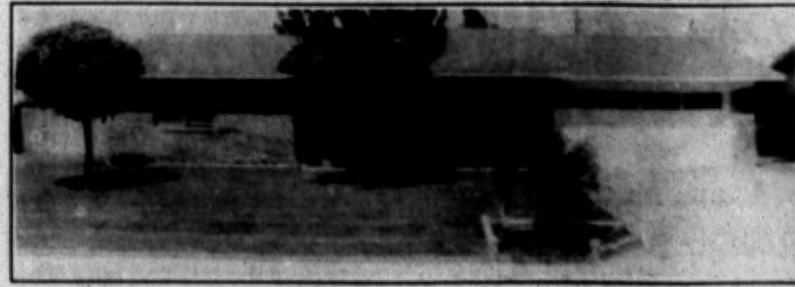
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# Luster has faded from U.S. space program

WASHINGTON (AP) - It was 1969 and three men had just returned from the moon. They got parades and medals and a presidential dinner. Their burn-stained space capsule was hauled around to all 50 state capitals, escorted by highway patrolmen with the reverence and awe accorded to Old Glory herself. It was hot as the dickens but people lined up for hours just so they could say they had seen the thing.

It was history and triumph and the United States was No. 1. Oh, my, America was proud.

Fast-forward to 1993.

Apollo is history. Skylab is forgotten and the space shuttle has flown 57 times since 1981. Ho hum.

With the tragic exception of Challenger, all launches and landings look the same - up and down, up and down - and network television long ago quit carrying them live. Ask the man on the street to name a current astronaut and get a blank stare.

For nine years, there's been a boring debate in Washington: does the United States need a space station? Last month, in Congress, the no-sayers came within one vote of killing the project.

Where have all of NASA's friends gone?

In the 1960s, NASA could do no wrong. It had the whole country in its corner and the goal was simple: beat the Soviets.

Nobody's head rolled when the early rockets blew up or when John Glenn failed 10 times to get off the ground before becoming the first American to orbit Earth or when NASA spent \$26 billion to get 12 men onto the moon.

"NASA was a creature of the Cold War," said Don Fuqua, the former chairman of the House space committee and now president of the Aerospace Industries Association.

"When the Berlin Wall came down, there no longer was this enemy out there that we had to compete with."

The bleachers where the cheerleaders once sat now are filled with critics.

One of them, a congressman, told his colleagues recently that NASA had led them around by the nose for years and "bamboozled" Congress. Even NASA acknowledges it underestimated costs and overpromised results.

That was just one of the many confidence-eroding circumstances.

The Challenger disaster, which killed seven astronauts on the 25th shuttle flight, was "an accident rooted in history," according to investigators who concluded the agency had gotten sloppy.

The Hubble Space Telescope's inability to see to the edge of the universe as promised was due to careless miscalculation. The \$1.4 billion Galileo space probe to Jupiter is handicapped because its main antenna is jammed.

On its 12th anniversary, the space shuttle fleet was on only its 54th mission; NASA had promised up to 400 by then. The shuttles have proved to be cantankerous, finicky and expensive.

In 1989, on the 20th anniversary of the first moon landing, President Bush announced a 30-year program that would see a U.S. colony on the moon and an expedition to Mars.

Nothing more has been heard of that \$500 billion-plus proposal.

On and on, America may have crossed the last affordable frontier.

Where have all of NASA's friends gone?

The NASA Alumni Association recently began talking about staging an event next year to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the moon landing. It dropped the idea for lack of interest.

"The pioneering days of space are simply over. Even a Mars landing doesn't have nearly the appeal that a moon landing had," says Walter Cronkite, an unabashed booster in the space program's early days when he covered flights for CBS.

"There has been a big change in tastes," says John Chancellor, who did the same for NBC. "I was in Moscow when (Soviet cosmonaut) Yuri Gagarin went around Earth.

"I saw a country of 200 million people have a nervous breakdown in front of our eyes. There was a huge amount of nationalism then, an us-and-them nationalism. Now there are no commies under our beds," Chancellor says.

A young congressman from New Jersey, Dick Zimmer, has led the fight against the space station.

"I consider myself a friend of NASA," he says. "I think I'm giving it tough love."

Where have all of NASA's friends gone?

As a candidate, Bill Clinton was a friend of the space station and as president he practiced tough love, ordering NASA back to the drawing board. With good reason.

Since 1984, when Ronald Reagan proposed it, the station's expected costs climbed from \$8 billion to \$31.3 billion by NASA's own estimate.

Even that, said the General Accounting Office, was low. The station would cost at least \$40 billion to build and more than \$100 billion to operate over its 30-year planned lifetime.

Clinton gave NASA administrator Daniel Goldin new marching orders:

cut the cost in half. Goldin had the station redesigned and downsized for the umpteenth time and Clinton adopted a version he said would save \$18 billion. The Zimmer forces still shuddered at the idea of spending that much.

"This space turkey," was a recurring phrase during the House debate. Allusions to Columbus failed to sway doubters. "Egyptians, Ottomans and Romans all were victims of their own foolishness," said Rep. Marge Roukema of New Jersey.

"The price tag is out of this world," said Rep. Carolyn B. Maloney of New York. "One hundred billion dollars for a Motel Six in space when we have an infant mortality rate in Harlem... that rivals many third world countries."

Where have all of NASA's friends gone?

"NASA's problem is that for a long time they took their friends for granted," said Rep. Robert Walker, the Republican leader of the House space subcommittee. "Most people (in Congress) who spoke against the

station made it a point to say 'I'm not against the nation's space program.' More tough love.

On one House roll call, the station survived by a single vote, 216-215.

"They like space and they like the idea of space but are not willing to spend the billions that NASA wants to spend on it," says Howard Benedict, executive director of the Mercury Seven Foundation.

Will the excitement return? "I don't think it can. Going to the moon was a one-time thing. There will never again be an adventure like that, even going to Mars," Benedict says.

It is indisputable that when NASA is doing spectacular things, the interest revives. All the networks, with their millions of viewers, watched fascinated when three astronauts caught a huge satellite in their gloved hands last year after days of trying the capture the way it had been rehearsed.

NASA's friends surely will be watching in December or January when the agency undertakes its most challenging mission in years, repair of the Hubble telescope.

It will involve the magic formula of derring-do and risk, acts of great courage and potential calamity.

"Hubble is a very bold mission," says administrator Goldin. "This is the type of thing Americans are about. They love it."

Mark Albrecht, who ran the Bush administration's National Space Council, thinks "nay-sayers and Luddites" are always present when it comes to spending money on space research. Their voices are muted, he says, when NASA is engaged in missions and projects that are captivating.

"When we stop talking and fiddling and start building the space station, with construction measured in a few years, it's got the potential of getting people excited," he says. "We post-World War II Americans have space wired in our primary fabric."

Perhaps it was a generational thing in the early days, says Brian Duff, formerly of NASA, who had the happy duty of escorting the Apollo 11 capsule around the country after its triumphal return.

In those days, NASA had powerful friends in the White House and elsewhere.

"John F. Kennedy invited John Glenn to Hyannis, where he went waterskiing with the president," Duff says. "Lyndon Johnson didn't let an astronaut come back from a space flight without giving him a medal."

Where have all of NASA's friends gone?

James Webb, who headed NASA then, liked to say that government is good at doing things people want done. People wanted to go to the moon and NASA did it for them.

"I don't think there's popular enthusiasm for a space station or going to Mars or the moon," says Duff. "My sense is that NASA is going to have to figure out what people want done."

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## Lowering cost essential to make space travel common

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M. (AP) - Since the nation's space program began decades ago, humans have orbited the Earth, walked on the moon and dreamed of the day when spaceflights would become as common as airplane trips.

But a crucial obstacle must be overcome if travel is to take that next step. The problem is not so much the frigid void of outer space or gravity, but the prohibitive costs of launching spacecraft.

"I think like any new frontier that has been opened, it always waits on reasonably reliable and low-cost transportation," said Bill Gaubatz, program manager for McDonnell Douglas' single-stage-to-orbit (SSTO) rocket project. "Space is that kind of frontier waiting to be opened."

The U.S. government and aerospace firms are trying to find the key.

What is thought to be a promising effort, McDonnell Douglas' Delta Clipper-Experimental, is expected to be tested at the Army's White Sands Missile Range later this month.

The DC-X, funded by the federal Ballistic Missile Defense Organization, is a one-third scale prototype of a single-stage, reusable rocket that would take off and land vertically, something that to date has only been successfully accomplished in old science fiction films.

The program's goal is to create a new launch system which eliminates the costly practice of throwing away expensive equipment during each launch, as conventional rockets do when they shed stages and boosters.

DC-X has undergone various engine tests during recent months, all successfully, said Gaubatz.

**POST-CATARACT OPTIONS**

When the eye's natural lens becomes clouded and the cataract is removed, it must be replaced by another clearer lens to focus light onto the retina so the patient can see clearly. There are a number of options open to the patient; the doctor will usually recommend the one most appropriate for the particular individual.

- Glasses can be worn to take over the task of the missing lens. The glasses can enlarge the image, but side vision will be restricted.
- A contact lens can be worn in the affected eye to take over for the natural lens. Soft or extended-wear lenses are usually prescribed if they are effective for the patient's vision needs. The patient must be able to insert and remove the contact lenses.
- An intraocular lens can be implanted directly in the eye during surgery as a permanent replacement for the lens removed.

Most often eyeglasses will still be needed to provide additional correction for sharper vision, even if contacts or implants are used.

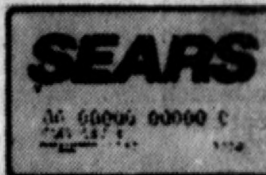

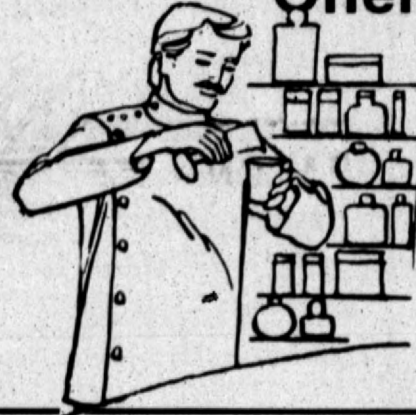

## Encourage your child

By encouraging your child to read regularly, you can help ensure a lifetime full of reading pleasure and academic success.

Here are some approaches you can try:

-Visit the local library. Ask the librarian to recommend a wide range of books, appropriate for your child's age. Vary the selection so it includes adventure, history, biography and other subjects.

-Link the subject matter to family excursions. After your child reads a book of dinosaurs, arrange an afternoon at the national history museum. A biography on a famous person could be tied to a trip to a related historic site.

-Encourage children to bring the book to life. Children can entertain family and friends by acting out a favorite scene from *Huckleberry Finn*, *Anne of Green Gables* or *The Wind in the Willows*.

-Make reading a family affair. Set time aside each week to read aloud to your child and ask her to read a favorite chapter to you.

-Set reading goals and rewards for performance. Post a chart on the refrigerator to track numbers and titles of books and award small prizes when certain benchmarks are reached.

-Suggest to your child that he become an author. By keeping a journal of books read and activities, a child can cross the threshold from reader to writer.

Here from Dr. Robert J. Kealey, executive director of the elementary Department of the National Catholic Education Association (NCEA), are some suggestions for valuable home learning experiences:

-At least once a week, take your children on a planned trip--to a museum, the zoo, nature trails, sporting events, the shopping mall.

-Each day a few minutes should be set aside for the family to do nothing but read. This will establish a daily habit as parents serve as healthy role models.

-Children should also be involved in a variety of activities that foster writing skills. These activities can be as simple as writing a shopping list to writing a letter to a classmate or a report about a favorite TV show or activity. Keeping a diary also fosters the writing habit.

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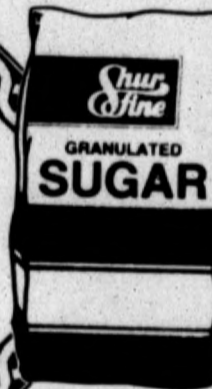

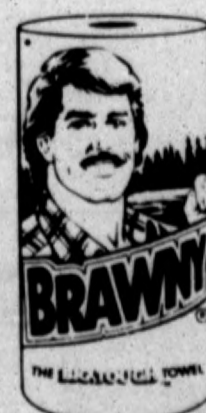

## CLIMBING THE LADDER

(Last of Two Parts)

Last week in Part One of this column we discussed and shared several definitions. Though we may define success differently, most of us desire fulfillment from our careers and personal lives. We would rather have wealth than poverty and we prefer respect and admiration to dishonor and disgrace.

You must anchor your "ladder of success" on a firm foundation if you aspire to reach great heights. The best foundation has one leg of the ladder planted firmly on honesty and the other on integrity. Those who enjoy the fruit of their labors live their lives with honesty and integrity.

Alexander Pope said, "An honest man's the noblest work of God." Sam Houston said, "I would give no thought of what the world might say of me, if I could only transmit to posterity the reputation of an honest man." George Washington called honesty "the most enviable of all titles."

### Success factors

• **A sense of direction** - A common factor found in the lives of successful people is knowledge of where you want to go. For example, consider a factory worker who desires to become a foreman. The worker should learn about the requirements of the foreman's position. What special knowledge or expertise is required? Do training programs, educational courses or books exist that might help him prepare? The worker should direct his efforts toward that goal.

Consider the example of a small business owner who wants to grow her business and hire additional employees. She might focus a portion of her time on developing a marketing plan to ensure growth and devote other effort to learning how to manage employees.

• **Not afraid to work hard** - Thomas Jefferson said, "I'm a great believer in luck, and I find the harder I work the more I have of it." I've known a good many successful men and women and they all receive pleasure from working hard. I'm not sure whether their happiness comes from their hard work or is the actual work itself.

Study the lives of successful people like Henry Ford, Helen Keller, Norman Vincent Peale, Marie Curie, Billy Graham, George Washington, Wilma Rudolph, and Abraham Lincoln. You will find that they not only loved their work, but they also loved to work.

• **Perseverance** - Another rung on the ladder of success is an unwavering commitment to do whatever it takes, for as long as it takes. Edison might never have perfected the light bulb had he given up after a hundred tries.

A young, aspiring artist submitted samples of his sketches to a prospective employer. He was encouraged to find another line of work. "You will never earn a living as a commercial artist," the

employer stated. The young man didn't accept that advice. Instead he practiced, studied drawing and struggled onward. He developed his skills and eventually became successful. Today, Walt Disney's work is known around the world.

• **Enthusiasm** - Ralph Waldo Emerson said "Nothing great was ever achieved without enthusiasm." W. Clement Stone calls enthusiasm, "the inspiration to action."

Those whose success we admire most are enthusiastic about their work, their dreams and life itself. Everyone will love you if you maintain an enthusiastic attitude in everything you do.

• **Balance** - Successful people have balance in their lives. Although they may have developed one talent or skill above all others, they did not neglect other important aspects.

Some of the most successful people I know are balancing their career, family, physical, spiritual and emotional needs effectively. By maintaining the balance they enjoy happiness and fulfillment.

A final personal thought on success. I may never achieve wealth, fame or other distinction in this life. Therefore, I approach every day as a short journey whose destination is satisfying in and of itself.

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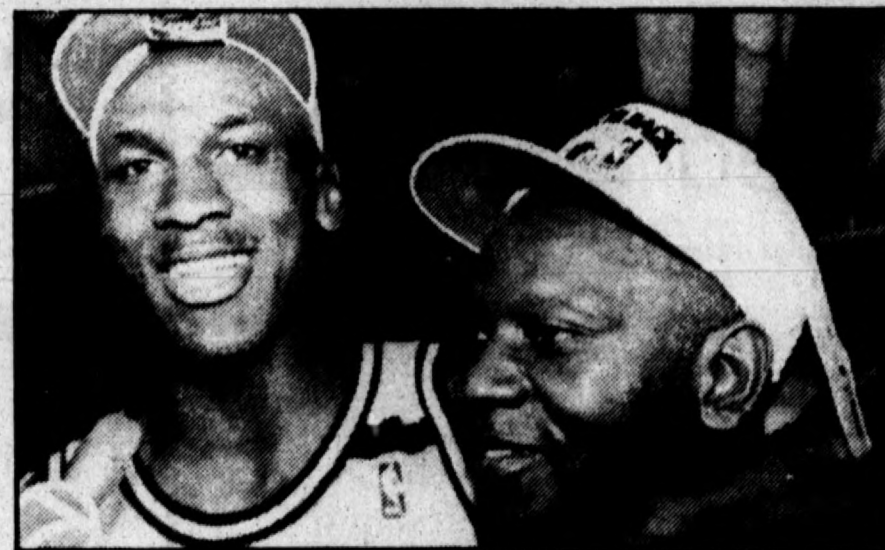

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## Days of 'Living Single' may be numbered

If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, then Fox's new sitcom "Living Single" is fawning over the CBS hit "Designing Women." The half-hour comedy series premieres Sunday, Aug. 22, immediately following the season premiere of "Martin."

"Living Single" follows four upwardly mobile black women living and working in New York City. Khadijah James (rap artist Queen Latifah in her first series role) plays the founder and publisher of Flavor magazine, an urban publication with a female slant. Assisting her is Synclaire James (Kim Coles of "In Living Color"), Khadijah's airheaded cousin. They share a brownstone with Khadijah's childhood friend Regine Hunter (Kim Fields, Tootie from "The Facts of Life"), a nouveau-riche social climber and Maxine "Max" Shaw (Erika Alexander of "Going to Extremes"), a wisecracking divorce attorney.

The parallels to "Designing Women" are obvious, to say the least. Khadijah is a younger Julia Sugarbaker, Synclaire correlates to sweet but naive Charlene Frazier, Regine to Suzanne Sugarbaker and Max to Mary Jo Shively. It's a comparison the producers and cast try to downplay.

"We're ... not going to handle as many issues (as "Designing Women"). It won't be an issue-driven show at all," says Alexander. She tweaked the shrill and preachy final seasons of "Women" by adding, "No one will sit on the couch and spout a percentage or a statistic."

Also starring are T.C. Carson as ladies' man Kyle Barker and John Henton as geeky handyman Overton Wakefield Jones, who may be the perfect match for Synclaire. Neither char-

acter does anything to improve the image of black men. At the same time, the pilot episode relentlessly portrays men as conniving liars. At one point, the women wonder aloud about what life would be like without men, and Khadijah, who is frequently referred to as "mother," proclaims, "There'd be a lot of fat, happy women and no crime." Yet both cast and producers seemed taken aback by accusations of male-bashing.

"I don't think there's male-bashing, to be honest with you," says Latifah. "I think there's some realistic situations that we deal with, and men and women are going to argue. And women are going to get mad at men, but it's not done distastefully, and we as women who love men don't want to do that."

The plain fact is that the premiere episode of "Living Single" is loud and crude. Three of the four actresses are generally up to snuff, given the limitations of their characters as written. Fields, however, while absolutely beautiful, plays Regine so broadly that she looks as if she's taking part in a bad improvisation exercise. And the male characters pop up only in order for the female foursome to make human origami out of them.

"Living Single" has a good time slot, sandwiched in Fox's Sunday comedy lineup between the popular "Martin" and "Married With Children." If the show is going to survive, though, some massive retuning will be necessary. One big factor "Living Single" has going for it is Latifah, who shows herself to be a promising comedian of considerable skill. As series creator Yvette Denise Lee puts it, "Khadijah is ... the pot that all these strange other plants are growing from. It all comes back to her."

Hold that thought, Ms. Lee.

Miller's moving plays make memorable movies

TNT presents Arthur Miller's "The American Clock," a new installment in the cable network's acclaimed Screenworks series, on Monday, Aug. 23. The drama stars David Strathairn, Mary McDonnell, Loren Dean, Darren McGavin and many others in a moving memoir of the 1929 stock market crash...

All of Miller's plays, in one way or another, are about debts and obligations, the inevitability of consequence; it is no wonder that one of his most involving, disquieting plays is called, simply, "The Price."

That show, in fact, was the basis for a fine TV dramatization some years ago. Unfortunately, that program is not available on video, nor is the '60s version of Miller's "Death of a Salesman," starring Lee J. Cobb. Still, many of his works, either adapted or written directly for film or television, are available for home viewing.

1948's "All My Sons" features Ed-

ward G. Robinson in an unforgettable portrayal of a tortured defense contractor and father. Burt Lancaster and Louisa Horton also star.

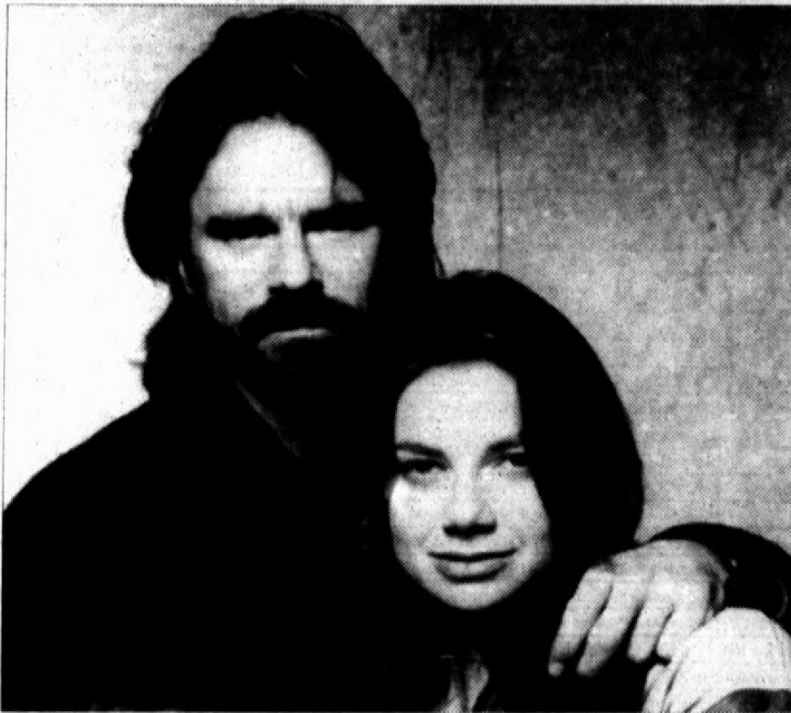
Fredric March plays the road-weary hustler Willy Loman in the 1951 version of "Death of a Salesman," with able support from Mildred Dunnock as his long-suffering wife. CBS' television staging of the hit 1985 Broadway revival starring Dustin Hoffman may be too stagey for some tastes, but the acting is superb.

Miller gave Clark Gable his last film role in John Huston's "The Misfits," co-starring Montgomery Clift, Eli Wallach and the writer's then-wife Marilyn Monroe.

Sidney Lumet directed the 1962 filming of "A View From the Bridge," starring Raf Vallone as a New York dockworker and Maureen Stapleton as his unhappy wife.

Miller won an Emmy for writing the script for 1980's "Playing for Time," starring Vanessa Redgrave as Holocaust survivor Fania Fenelon.

Bowden still seeking first national title

Florida State coach Bobby Bowden continues his quest for his first National Collegiate Athletic Association title when his Seminoles face the Kansas Jayhawks in the Kickoff Classic, the first game of the 1993 college football season, airing Saturday, Aug. 28, on ABC.
