JONES AT THE BIG CONVENTION

Tells of Great Democratic Conclave—See Baltimore and Washington—Waves Flags Also.

To the Editor of the Brand:

Thinking perhaps your readers would be interested in reading an account of the Democratic Convention recently held at Baltimore and viewed by one from the Panhandle, I herewith hand you a short review of same. I was fortunate in securing a ticket to all the sessions held, and witnessed each session with the exception of one. The convention hall was an immense structure, it being the Fifth Maryland Regiment Armory, and had a seating capacity of 16,000 and standing room for about 8,000 more. It was prettily decorated and presented a fine appearance when filled to its capacity, which it was at all sessions. That the convention was a history making event is admitted by all, and that the people ruled admits of no question of doubt. The grand spectacle presented there of the rank and file

of the democratic voters demanding and getting what they wanted must be a grand inspiration to those who, in the near future, must go out before the people and present the cause of democracy to the great body of voters and asking their support of the ticket nominated. How different our position from that of our opponents. We should be proud of the 40 who went to the convention pledged to Wilson. Throughout 46 ballots the solid delegation of 40 votes was cast for the man whom the majority of the democratic voters had chosen, and the Texans did themselves "proud." They were not only voters in that delegation, but they were workers as well. Every Texan should feel proud of the ovation given by Henry and Johnson. They both addressed the convention, and Cone Johnson, at the time of the greatest tumult, and when five or six prominent men had tried to quell it, took the platform and in a half dozen words had the vast audience quiet, and in two minutes you could hear his voice in any part of the house. His speech short, but to the point, and had the ring of sincerity to it that the vast throng was demanding, and the attention and ovation he received

should make every true Texas feel proud.

In the preliminary skirmish—the election of temporary chairman—the progressives lost out, but instead of being by a majority of 325, it was less than one fourth that number. That was their last defeat. In the next test of strength—the nominating of a candidate before making the platform—the progressives had a decided victory. This was a hard blow to the New York delegation as they wanted to make the platform, in fact the general impression prevailing was that they had brought it along with them.

The next history making event was when Bryan declared that no candidate could accept the vote of the New York delegation and feel himself free from the hampering and restrictions that has generally gone with this vote, regardless to whom it has been thrown, be it the Democratic or Republican party. I will not attempt to picture to you the grandeur of that scene. There was Bryan after he had thrown the bomb, facing a seething mass of humanity gesticulating angrily, the place turned into a perfect bedlam, and Bryan standing there immovable, waiting for the tumult to subside, the picture of a gladiator. To me it was the grandest sight I had ever witnessed. This might have been because I have always been a loyal follower of this Prince of Men, to me he has always been the greatest of them all. I still think that as a man, a statesman and a Christian gentlemen, he has no equal in this or any other country, however there are others who think differently, but I feel proud that I have always had this high opinion of the man.

The operation was a delicate one, but it was generally understood that the "cancer" had to be removed ere the patient could hope to recover, and as the world now knows the

operation was successful, the patient hung between life and death for several hours, and finally slowly yet surely started on the road to recovery, and unless some unforeseen complications should arise should be good for at least 20 years of useful life.

Next in order came the nominations of the various candidates before the convention. First in order being Underwood, the nominating speech being over the candidate received quite an ovation, I think Clark was the second to be nominated, and the ovation was very generous, lasting about 40 minutes. It was getting quite late, but as the ruling of the chair had been that all candidates must be nominated at the same session, by the time it came around to Wilson's turn it was morning, but the Wilson folks held on; they were not a bit sleepy. Hungry? Yes, a little, but this did not matter. We were there for a purpose and proposed to stay until we had accomplished it. Wilson's time came, the orator of the occasion mounted the platform and proceeded with the nominating speech. He had said perhaps a dozen words, when unfortunately he alluded to his subject as the man from New Jersey—this

was as far as he got in his speech, some fellow-out in the audience yelled for Wilson, and it was all off with the speaker. If he ever got any further along with his speech I never heard him. From that yell the great event in the way of demonstrations took place, the chairman was powerless to stop it, an appeal to the officers had no effect, the noise was terrific, banners of every form and device appeared, some large, some small, many from New York, probably twenty-five counties of New York were represented by penants of various devices such as, "We Want Wilson;" "Win With Wilson;" "Wilson the man of the hour;" "Give us Wilson and we will give you New York." The south leaned up with many penants also, flags and banners by the thousands were waived, men seemed to loose all controll of themselves, even the women caught the spirit and waived flags and shouted for Wilson, and even I, who thought my time for demonstrations had past, stood upon a seat and waved two flags for one hour and fifteen minutes. My wife said I was worse than a kid, but as the song goes, Every body was doing it. Doing what? Shouting for Wilson. The next event was the voting for

the various candidates put in nomination. The first ballot showing Clark 440, Wilson 324. This looked rather blue for the Wilson followers, but each ballot thereafter showed a steady Wilson gain, never a break in the Wilson forces all along the line, and after the twenty-fifth ballot the Wilson men felt sure of success, and how well they anticipated the result is now a matter of history.

The convention has given to the people a clean, progressive ticket, and a good platform, and that it will sweep the country is my sincere belief.

Another event that was national in its importance, and that it was my fortune to witness, was the taking of the vote in the Senate at Washington that unseated Lorimer. In sitting there listening to the roll call, I felt very much like I was attending a funeral. The clear call of the clerk of the name of each Senator and the doleful answer of Aye or No as the case might be, was depressing, and my sympathy could not help but go out to the man who had strenuously worked to ward off the disgrace that he evidently felt keenly. It was very evident the Senators disliked to do that which they were then doing, but it was a duty they dare not shirk, yet sitting there listening to the roll call I could not help but speculate and wonder how many had gone to the Senate on practically the same conditions as did Lorimer, and the words were constantly before me, "Let him who is without sin cast the first stone."

After about 13 years since seeing Baltimore, you must know my wife and I had a very pleasant visit. I had not seen the town since the big fire and the improvements are on a big scale. Baltimore provided well for the visitors and, notwithstanding the assertion of many papers, prices were reasonable, there was ample accommodation for all, and the town could have provided for many more had they come. I think the greatest injustice done by the outside papers was the assertion that the people of Baltimore was exorbitant in their charges. I know from personal investigation that this statement was false.

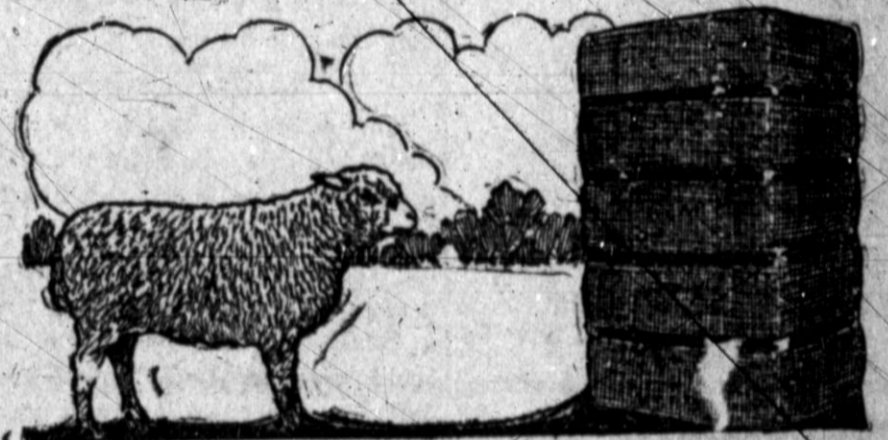

The effect of the City Commission and the ladies to rid the town of weeds and filth accumulations is to be commended. Some, however, are paying little heed to their admonitions and are allowing the weeds to play riot in the front yards not to mention the insurrection of thistles in the back yards. What are we, the citizens of Hereford going to do about it? It what? About those who willfully refuse to either cut the weeds and rake up their trash or to assist in any way in cleaning the town. Won't Hereford look like

winning a Holland clean town prize? Just as well talk about winning wings in a burning brush heap.

While talking about weeds, would it not be well to let the eye fall upon the millions of buzzing flies that are swarming around the stores and other places of business, not to say around our dining tables at meal time. Most of these flies are bred and born right under the shadow of our houses. The open vaults, the filth piles in the rear of stores and stables, are the principal breeding places. If we kill all the flies others will take their places *poce* tempo. The mayor of Amarillo said the other day that if Amarillo should kill all their flies in one day, the next would bring a million more unless their breeding places were destroyed. Canyon has inaugurated a "fly killing campaign," prizes amounting to \$10 being offered by a lumber company. This is all right as far as it goes, but they should offer a prize to the boy who would find a clean privy or a clean stable in the town.

Scraping the City.

The Commission has set about clearing the streets of obnoxious weeds and has employed J. P. Wood to scrape the gutters and streets with a road plow or scraper. This machine takes up a lot of weeds, but there are many corners and nooks and places where the plow cannot be pulled. The work done, however, will be a long step in ridding the town of weeds.

Weeds and Flies

The nuisances of any town are weeds and flies. Both are the direct result of pure and unadulterated laziness; official inactivity of the city authorities, or the shameful negligence of the citizens. Beginning in time, both the weeds and flies could be eradicated, but to wait until our streets, alleys and yards are full of weeds, and our stores and houses are swarming with flies, and then to make a noise like the approach of a national election, is simply to the thief to steal our horses while we hold the door open. But it is well to provide against losing a second horse.

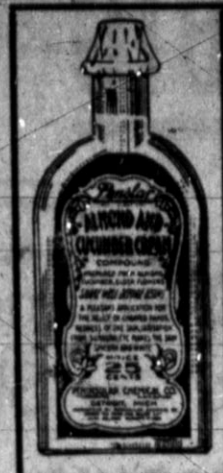

Texas Industrial Notes.

El Paso—It is reported that an eastern packing firm has secured an option on 104 acres of land near this city upon which will be built one of the largest packing houses in the south. Indications point to an early start on construction of the buildings. Representatives of the company state that \$800,000 will be invested and that 1,000 persons will be given employment.

Austin—The charter of the Bryan and Brazos River Railroad has been filed with the secretary of state. The company is capitalized at \$50,000. According to the charter, the company will construct a railroad from Bryan to some point in Burleson county, a distance of about twenty-five miles.

Cleburne—The local canning factory is enjoying a big run of business and is putting up about 700 cans per day. About 35,000 cans of blackberries have been preserved so far this season and the factory output of

peaches is expected to pass this high mark.

San Antonio—The King ranch near here has been sold for a price exceeding \$100,000 and will be broken up into small farm tracts. The ranch covers an area of 7,451 acres.

Austin—The state of Texas has ceded to the United States government lands in Ellis, Kaufman and Orange counties which will eventually be utilized for navigation purposes. The Ellis and Kaufman tracts are for Trinity River lock and dam sites. The land ceded in Orange county lies adjacent to the Sabine River where the Federal Government will widen and deepen the Sabine-Neches Canal.

Taylor—The recent election to decide on the issuance of \$25,000 in bonds for street paving was carried by a large majority, only three votes being cast against the issue.

Wichita Falls—At a mass meeting held in this city recently, it was decided to organize a Young Man's Publicity League. The new commercial organization will start at once to secure adequate publicity service and will arrange to purchase space in several of the largest advertising mediums of the country.

San Antonio—The Medina Irrigation Company has extended an invitation to the delegates of the Democratic Convention which convenes in Austin next month, to visit the dam site on the company's holdings south of this city. The dam is expected to be completed by January first.

Fort Worth—From the most conservative estimate, there was approximately \$16,110,000 of foreign capital invested within the state during the month of June. The majority of this amount was invested in municipal and electric railway securities.

Fort Stockton—The Fort Stockton Irrigation Company has started work on its project in Pecos county. The reservoir to be constructed will impound sufficient water to irrigate 25,000 acres of land.

Pecos—The state experimental station near here has completed arrangements for an exhibit of farm products at College Station during the session of the Texas Farmers' Congress July 30-31 and August 1st.

Clarendon—The second annual Donley County Fair will be held October 3rd, 4th and 5th. The association has announced that the necessary stock of \$5,000 has been sold.

The Democratic Executive Committee for Deaf Smith county has issued a call for all precincts to hold a convention on Saturday, July 27, at 2 o'clock p. m., at which time each precinct shall elect delegates to the county convention to be held on the following Saturday, same being August 3, and there to elect delegates to the various district conventions and the state convention. The State Convention will meet at San Antonio, Tuesday, August 13. All district conventions will be held on the fourth Saturday in August.

Electors on Ticket.

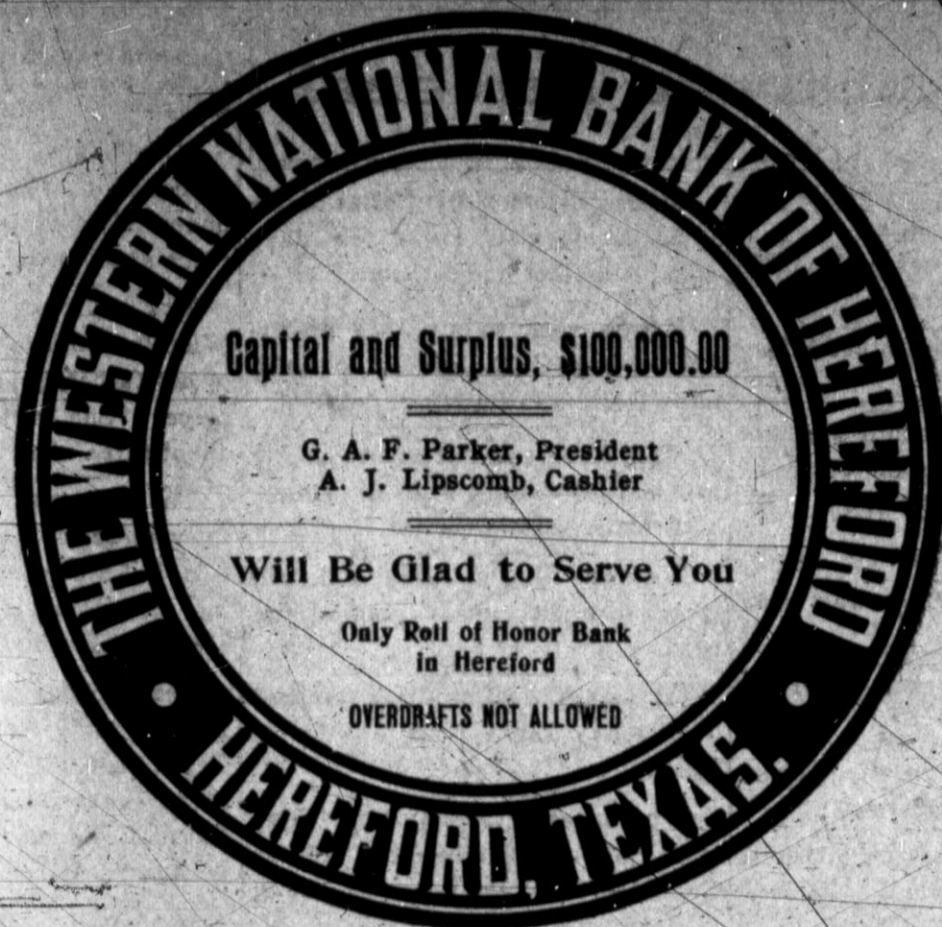

Why Not "Recall" the Law.

Every law must be interpreted before it can be executed; somebody must do the interpreting. This cannot be left to sheriffs and other ministerial officers; it cannot well be left to juries for they are unskilled in such matters and from might come a new interpretation with each new case and each new set of twelve. It is customary for the court to decide what the law is and leave the facts in each case to the jury. Could anybody suggest a better mode?

As for recalling the judges, let the people recall their obnoxious laws instead. They, and not the judges, make the laws, and thus they are responsible for them. Having made laws and constitutions, and now discovering that they think these are bad and they do not like them, the great reform (according to some orators) would be to recall the judges who interpret. It would be no more childish and unreasonable to break the mirror, because it reveals a smudge on one's face. Keep the mirror, for its truthfulness and usefulness; go and wash the face.

But the judge may be incompetent or mistaken, or even corrupt. Conceivably, he may be either. If he is in fault, opportunity for recalling him comes at the end of his elected or appointed term; meanwhile, every State constitution provides orderly means for removing him—insurance.
