NEW PUMPING OUTFIT TESTED

Lifting Water For Irrigation by System of Buckets on Endless Chain Operated and for First Time.

There is something new under the sun, at least, at Hereford. This is the new system of lifting water just installed and tested for the first time Wednesday afternoon. This is the new pumping outfit of J. L. Johnson's, on his 85-acre farm six miles east of town and located along the south side of the railroad, the well being at the east end of the Joel Switch. In company with Photographer McGhee, Mr. Johnson took a Brand reporter out to the well Wednesday afternoon to see the first test of the water-lifter. The outfit consists of a 12 H. P. engine and an endless chain bucket pump of 700 gallon capacity. While there are several ways of pumping water, this method in reality lifts the water by means of a series of "buckets" attached to double endless chains, which pass over sprocket wheels driven by a double system of friction pulleys. The buckets, so called, are not in the shape of the usual bucket, but are semi-circle throughs four feet long and will contain 12 gallons of water. These are attached to the chains in such a manner as will allow the mechanism to "dump" the "buckets" as each in turn passes over the sprocket, thus emptying the water into a discharge box. In a few minutes after arriving at the farm, everything was ready to "go." The engine picked up the load and in less than a minute, the "buckets" began to discharge the water, each one bringing up its full capacity of 12 gallons. A watch held in the hand and the buckets counted as they passed over and poured out the water, showed that 60 emptied during the time of one minute. This gives the total amount of water "lifted" in one minute at 720 gallons. When it is considered that the work was being done with a 12 H. P. engine, the amount of water delivered is simply wonderful, and more that could be expected. The "lifter" is properly named—The Famous Water Elevator.

Mr. Johnson is well pleased with his outfit. He has 75 acres of growing wheat and intends to give this a good "drink" at the right time this spring. His demonstration will be watched with much interest.

"Uncle Jimmie" Dies.

James N. Raglin, familiarly known as "Uncle Jimmie" by his Hereford friends, died suddenly at the home of Sam Warden Wednesday morning about 11 o'clock. Rev. Purser conducted services at the house Thursday morning, and Rev. Baker also conducted services at the grave. A good number of his friends attended and assisted in performing the last sad rites to this aged man. "Uncle Jimmie" was 82 years of age and had been in ill health for some time. Last Friday he was taken ill with pneumonia, but his death was not expected; but Wednesday, while attempting to get up from his bed, he fell to the floor and soon expired. In his younger days and during the prime of life, he is known to have been a very wealthy man. Little is known here is his family.

FAT STOCK SHOW OPENS MARCH 8

Big Premium List is Now in Readiness.

SEVEN DAYS OF PLEASURE

Committee Chosen From Breeding Associations Make Rules Governing All Contests—Beef and Dairy Breeds to Exhibit.

When the National Feeders and Breeders' Show at Fort Worth, Tex., swings open its doors Saturday morning, March 8, the greatest cattle show ever presented to the American people under Southern skies will begin a history making exhibition.

Cattle fattened on the ranges of West Texas and Oklahoma, those from the pasture lands of the settled East, and last but not least, from across the border in Old Mexico, will pass under the careful eye of the most skilled judges known to the different breeding associations for honors which means everything to their owners. The cattle classification this year includes every known breed of consequence, and suitable prizes go with each division.

All the cattle entering for competition will come under the rules of the "Sifting Committee." This committee is composed of members to be recommended by the various breeding associations and will pass upon the ages and eligibility of all entries and see that such entries are within the age limit. The age limit on both breeding and fat cattle will be rigidly enforced. J. P. Yearwood of Georgetown, W. C. McKamy of Renner, Jarrett King of Taylor, H. B. Johnson of Chickasha and J. W. Cook of Beville have been chosen to act upon the Sifting Committee.

A code of rules have been drafted and adopted by the committee and a copy mailed to the different exhibitors so that they can familiarize themselves. The rules will be followed to the letter in every detail, and all exhibitors will be forced to observe them.

Rules Governing Show.
Any protest as to eligibility on account of age of animals entered in the fat classes of the show must be filed with the Secretary prior to the day on which they are to be judged. Information concerning the class that any animal or carload is entered in can be had at the office of the Secretary. Specifications showing ages of cattle by dentition is given hereunder for the benefit of exhibitors.

Specifications showing teeth of cattle at ages described, which is adopted as a basis of determining ages of cattle.

Twelve Months—An animal of this age shall have all of its milk (teat) teeth in place.

Fifteen Months—At this age center pair of incisor milk teeth may be replaced by center pair of permanent incisors (pinchers), the latter teeth being through the gums, but not yet in wear.

Eighteen Months—The middle pair of permanent incisors at this age should be fully up and in wear, but next pair (first intermediate) not yet cut through gums.

Twenty-four Months—The mouth at this age will show two middle permanent (broad) incisors fully up and in wear, and next pair (first intermediate) well up, but not in wear.

Thirty Months—The mouth at this age may show six broad, permanent incisors, the middle and first intermediate pairs fully up and in wear, and the next pair (second intermediate) well up, but not in wear.

Thirty-six Months—Three pairs of broad teeth should be fully up and in wear, and the corner milk teeth may be shed or shedding, with the corner permanent teeth just appearing through the gums.

Thirty-nine Months—Three pairs of broad teeth will be fully up and in wear and corner teeth (incisors) through gums, but not in wear.

The game of purple strains will trail from the long sheds, back of the Coliseum, to and from the tan bark ring daily. All of the judging, by official judges and A. & M. students, will be done in the open ring before the public, and the awarding of the ribbons will take place the last day from the same ring.

More than 6,000 entries were made in the Livestock Department of this big show in 1912. This record will be surpassed by more than 2,000 in March, and one of the biggest increases will be registered in the cattle division. The cattlemen of the Western plains having been breeding for perfection for several years and these herds will be represented as never before.

Baby Beef Clubs.
An addition to the Cattle Division is the Baby Beef exhibits which have been given a place. This class of beef is grown by the boys on the farm and to them goes all the credit and the prize money. In less than a year Baby Beef Clubs have sprung up all over the Southwest, and the rivalry between the individual boys and the clubs promises to be keen. Boys from Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico have already sent in their entries and this feature promises to be one of the principal drawing cards in the Cattle Division. Places in both sections—above and below the quarantine line—have been provided for the proper housing of exhibits.

The Fort Worth Stock Yards Company, Armour & Company, Sears, Roebuck & Co., and Clay, Robinson & Co., are offering prizes ranging from \$250 to \$500. In all nearly \$500 will be paid in this department.

In the Breeders' Division.
From the great array of Shorthorns, Herefords, Red Polled, Aberdeen-Angus and others will compete for the largest stakes hung up in the history of the show. From year to year the contest has waxed warm in the Hereford and Shorthorn Divisions, but this year the Aberdeen-Angus will play for honors in every class.

The Brahma cattle from South Texas and a herd of two from India will be on exhibition. This grade of stock will not be entered for competition, but

simply brought to the show for exhibition purposes.

Special Days for State.
Special days will be given states of the Southwest at the National Feeders and Breeders' Show in Fort Worth March 8 to 15, inclusive. Already Arkansas and Texas have been designated days and other special days will be announced later by the management.

Manufacturers of the Southwest will hold a show in connection with the National Feeders and Breeders' Show at Fort Worth on March 8 to 15, inclusive. Special space has been granted the manufacturers for their exhibits.

The National Feeders and Breeders' Show will attract thousands from all over the Southwest.

Rain, Sleet and Snow.

Friday most all appearance of snow had gone. The moisture would amount to about one-third of an inch. Farmers who have wheat say that their ground has sufficient moisture.

Our Rural Schools.

"If the Brand will give a little of its valuable space, I wish to offer a suggestion about our county schools. But few of them have enough scholars to make it interesting to the children or to keep the teacher very busy. I have heard that several of our schools have but 8 or 10 and some

but 2 pupils. To teach these few costs the county from \$40 to \$50 per month. Why would it not be much better for the county to provide transportation for these few pupils so that they could all attend one central school where two or three teachers would be employed. The cost would be much less and the benefits much greater. What do others say? Would like to hear from others. A Patron."

Glazier Review.—The above communication coincides so closely with what the Review has long thought that it is quoted verbatim. Some wise one will say the schools in this country are so far apart it would take till the next day to get the children to a central school. Well, the "Patron" and the Review are not talking about having the children ride behind mules, but in autos. There would not be so many tardy and absent nor so many complaints about headache or sore throat when the kids get up in the morning. The Review is not prepared to say whether a central school would mean less expense or not, but believes it would be best for the education of the children. A system which requires little children to walk 2 or 3 miles to school, or necessitates their boarding—actually being away over night from their parents—is wrong.
