Rance; by making publication of this Citation once each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the Sixty-ninth Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said sixty-ninth Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Deaf Smith County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in the City of Hereford, on the 1st Monday in May, A. Court on the 6th day of October, A. D. 1923, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1424, wherein Byron Kimmons is Plaintiff, and T. H. Olinger, and the unknown heirs and legal representatives of T. H. Olinger, and W. S. Rance and the unknown heirs and legal representatives of W. S. Rance are Defendants, and said petition alleging that plaintiff is the owner in fee simple of the following described lands in Deaf Smith County, Texas: a portion of section No. 61 Blk. K-3, and being a portion of block No. 75, in the town of Hereford and Additions as shown by the plat thereof of record in the deed records of Deaf Smith County, Texas, and bounded as follows:

Beginning at the S. W. corner of the said block; thence E. 150 ft. to a point in the S. line of the said block, thence N. parallel with the E. line of the said block, 160 feet to a point; thence W. parallel with the S. line of the said block to a point in the W. line of the said block; thence S. with the W. line of the said block to the beginning.

Also alleging that plaintiff and those under whom he claims have been in continuous, peaceable, and adverse possession of said land, cultivating, using, claiming and enjoying the same, for a period of more than ten consecutive years next preceding the filing of this suit, and that plaintiff and those under whom he claims have been holding and claiming the same under deeds duly registered in Deaf Smith county, Texas, and paying taxes thereon, for a period of more than five consecutive years next preceding the filing of this suit.

Further alleging that plaintiff is in possession of said land and entitled to the possession thereof, and that the defendants are asserting and claiming some right, title, interest and estate, and right to the possession of said property; and plaintiff charges that all of the defendants' rights, titles and claims are subordinate and inferior to plaintiff's said rights, and title, but that defendants assert them to be superior, and thereby cloud plaintiff's title.

Plaintiff prays that defendants' said claims be cancelled, annulled, and re-

moved as a cloud on plaintiff's title, and that he be quieted in his title, and possession of said land.

Herein fall not, but have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.
